On yesterday evening I received a telegram from Mr. Taper, our Superintendent at Spokane, informing me that you desired my presence as soon as possible at Boise City, and replied to Mr. Teber as follows:

## "Leave tomorrow evening for Boise."

On reconsidering this matter I discovered that the train leaving Denver at 6:00 P.M. on Monday evening arrived in Boise at
 midnight or Wednesday, while the train leaving Denver on Tuesday morning will arrive in Boise at $3 \mathrm{P} . \mathrm{M}$. Wednesday. As a rule the night train ib late while the morning trifle ats a rule arrives on time, therefore $I$ concluded to take the train on Tuesday morning and Wis. arrive in Elise, if on time, at 3 P. i. Weanusisy afternoon.

This morning after getting out my mail in regard to the operation on which I am now engaged, which included letters to the Denver office relative to the man Martin and fur thar instructions to Asst, Supt. GoJ.Hy, I visited the offices of the Governor, where we held a con sultation and went over the report of Asst. Supt. Gavin $\mathrm{H}_{\mathrm{o}}$ of the 15 th , which had just arrived.

I then called at police headquarters, where I met chief of police Phillipa and deputy U.S.Narshal Bryant. Both these gentlemen appeared very friendly and wiling to assist us in this matter, but they did not $h a v e$ any information of value to the case

During the evening Gov, Gooding called at my room and we further discussed the case, The Governor informed me that sheriff Nichols of Caldwell was in the city, and as we both desired to set the sheriff, the Governor left and in a short time returned with lir, ijicholis. After a few preliminaries we took up with the ann riff the matter of having orchard transferred from the jail to the penitentiary at Boise. Although the sheriff did not give us a definite answer, I think that we will succeed in getting the prisoner transferred in a very short time,

In the course of our conversation with the sheriff, he informed me that he had heard from Mr. Calvert, of the Calvert House, that Doyle had roomed there under the name of wintrtosh up to the night of the murder
 In the two interview that our operative has had with Mrs, calvert and. Martin Conway they never mentioned this, and it is jus i possible that the man who went into che Calvert Hotel in the exausted co ndition might rave been Doyle and Mrs. Calvert and Martin Conway did not want to give it out.

The sheriff also to ld me that on the night of the assassination of the late ex-covernor at about eleven ofolock this man Doyle ana a man known as TIm Wiley, the latter beirig in a beastly state of intoxication, went to the Pacific Hotel, where they occupied the same room. I am informed that this man Wiley is a fard drinker, but harm leas; that he has a few cows some place out in the valley, but that he usually spends hie winters in Caldwell.

The sheriff stated that when Doyle was arrested and the map of a part of the residence of the late ex-covernor and the pieces of wall paper were found on him that Doyle requested that the papers be destroyod, but that heath sheriff- refused to do this; that he kept the map and fave the other papers to capt. Swain of the Thill Detective Service Company. Feal so stated that when Orchard was arrested that on his person the officers found a watch, chain and locket that the prisoner did not wart to five up, although they made him do so. The sheriff stated that neither the watch nor the locket have as yet been opened. hat that he will have them examined later on, winch I advised him to do. THe sheriff also advised mo that he thinks in the course of a few day that he will be able to identify orchard by two witnesses as the man they saw talking in a saloon within two other men just before the murder of the lateachief executive.

While in the office of he hotel during the evenings I met mr. Josmutchinson, one of the citizens who was on the fovermoris committee. and who acted as a witness at the preliminary examination.

Mriputchinson stated that the morning after the mar der while examinding the scene of the murder a man told him that the woman living in the shack -Mrs, Wayne had picked up some copper, Mr, Hutchinson stated that he then went to the home of Mrs. Wayne and knocked on the door, which was opened by Mrs, Wayne, to whom he aid that he understood she had some copper. He said that the wo man then turned pale, but got Kim a fragment of the gate with some metal blown into it ; that the woman stated that Mrs, Moran gave it to her. Fe said that he later called upon Mrs. $\operatorname{lforan}$ and secured from her the steal aping that she picked up, same now belling in the hands of the state chemist Mr.futchinson stated that he still has the splinter of wood given to him ky Mrs. Wayne.
$M_{n} H u t c h i n s o n$ stated to me that he had heard that. Boyle had borrowed fifty or seventy five dealers from Mr, Mack, of the Nampa Bank, an a note indorsed by a citizen of Caldwell; that this occurred during the time that the man Doyle was in Caldwell, just before the murder, I will. state her that I have given all the above facts to Mr. Mason with instructions how to run them out.

Mr. Hutchinson also fated that during the preliminary he testified to finding the piece of fish line near the slack occupied by Mr, Wayne whom hemHutchinson- thought was in the employ of the late ex-governor:

It is evident that Wayne, one of the first witnesses for the stat to be examined, instead of leaving, the court room as he should have done remained. Inside, for as soon as Mr, Hutchinson had made his statement, this man Wayne jumped to his feet and in a $L$ oud and excited manner $\cap$ stated that he desired to male a statement; that Mr. Hutchinson swore. that he was Mr. Steunenbere"s hired man; when as fo matter of fact he was but the tres merely taking the place of a hired man; the i he was a nursery man.

I today had a conference with the Governor, and he handed to me the letter written ry Orchard on Kenyon Hotel paper, dated Salt Lace City, Utah, Nov. $25 \mathrm{th}, \mathrm{l}$, FO , addressed on the envelope to chasm Cody, siecal, Nevada, but in the letter the name is speiliad Shoddy. As this letter has been quoted in the report of Abet. Supt. G. J. $\mathrm{H}_{3}$, I will not dwell further on the matter except to say that it is very possible that orchard expected to meet, Shoddy in Salt Lake on his arrival there, in response to the letter he had written to him An care of their Frond at Park City, but on arrival at Salt Lake he discovered that Shoddy, or Choday, had left, and, therefore, he wrote again. Shoddy may her received tie first letter forwarded to him from Park City, and re may have assisted in the murder of the late ex-rovernor; in fact, he may have cone to Caldwell while Orchard was still in Sui Lake.

This matter was fully discussed, and $1 t$ was decided to have the hotel relaters at Boise, Nama an d Caldwell searched for the name of Shodie or Cloddy.

In compliance with the instrestona received from the governor, I wrote to the Denver office sending them a cop: of the letter together with a cory of the photograph of orchard, instmetine intern to detail an operative to ta e um this investigation at Salt Lake, Park City and other points with a view of locating this man Shoddy or Cody and the friend which orcharamentioned in his letter, and to obtain al: informal ion posibible relative to the movements of orchard while in salt Labe city.

I also held a conference with the governor and chief counsel Hawlej relative to finds matter, and subsefentiy held a third con.. ference with the overnorgand on being informed that deputy sheriff Williams had one up in t, the st Joe River country for tine purpose of locating' Simetins, and known that one of cur operatives had been detailed on the sane matier I had Asst. During the evening Gov. Goading called at my room in the hotel and we conferred upon the operation in hand. The governor told me that he was Ting to leave at four oiclock tomorrow morin; for shoshone, but that he expected to retu $n$ to Boise on Friday next.

I told the Governor that it was my intention to visit the state penitentia y tomorrow and hold another interview with the man Orchard, but on studying this matter over after the Governor left I cine to the conclusion that it would not be riving orchard time enourh to reflect upon what I told him on my last visit to him , and then decided not to visit the man until thu rude next.

I spent the entire eventing around the hotel and covered with a number of the citizens of the plea. but did not lear any thin: of import tet the matter in hand.

$(\sqrt{ }$ During the day I met chief justice Stockalager and had a short conversation with him.

I later met warden Whitney of the state penitentiary he informed me that he had allowed Orchard to have a hath and a shave and had also allowed him to exercise in the corridor of the penitentiary, and he said that the prisoner acted as though he were pretty well satisfied.

The warden agreed with me that tomorrow would be time enough for me to visit Orchard. He said that if it was not for the fact that the attorney is aft to call on Orchard at aq time that the longer I delayed going to see the man the better it would be for the operation: How. ever, he agreed to meet me at the end of the car line tomorrow at two twenty $p . m_{1}$. With a rig to convey me to the penitentiary.

During the afternoon I received a telephone message from asst. Supt. G.J.H. to the effect that Doyle had been arrested. This is rather unfortunate, as I had told the Governor to tell sherifir Nichols not to arrest this man Doyle until such time as I was able to go to Cadwell. I told Asst, Supt. G.J. $\mathrm{H}_{\mathrm{p}}$ that it would be impossible for me to so to Caldwell until Friday morning.

Daring the evening I met operative No 9 and gave nim further instrustione relative to the operation, after which I was in company with several prominent men of the place, but did not learn anything new ralkitive to the operation

Orohert and I remained in conference from about 2:00 P. $\mathrm{H}_{\mathrm{t}}$. until 6:50 P.M.

Ho seemed to be very glad to meet me and add, well, you aid come to see me as you agreed to do and I am glad of it."' Min mann or vas entirely changed from what it was on my visit to him on the Rind. I opened the conversation by asking him if he had thoroughly studied over the conversation te had on Monday, sid more especially the points wherein I huge rested regarding the matter of states witnesses. He replied the he had thought very little of anything else except this matter, and, after due deliberation, he could not sec whet interest I had in him that I would talk to him as I did on the gand. I replied that in one way I had no interest in him whatever, no more than I would have in any other wilful murderer, but as a man who advocated law and order I had an inter est not only in the welfare of the state of Idaho but every steve in the Union the wee affected by the blight of the Western Federation of miners. At the sene time, knowing full well, as he must know, that he was simply the tool of the Inner circle, $h e$, to e erect extent, had my sympathy. A men of hit intelligence and reasoning power; ae hie for chest Thad indicate, had, not only the ability of doing a large amount of good, 2. well as evil. As had stated to him on Monday, if he had formed associations of 1ew-abiding citizens when he first started out in the world instead of e crowd of socialists, anarchists end murderers, he would nave become a shining light in any community instead of now occupying the cell of a condoned felon, and relying on his intelligence when the right path was pointed out to him, I talked to him er id $i d$ on Monday, and ho certainly must bo aware that while he war alive he was a menace to his former associates, or rather the whole Inner circle of the Western Federation of Miners, and it was their duty to encage cool legal talent, who, through their advice, would buoy him up end tel him he could not bo convicted in this case, and after hie conviction to point out to him that the verdict of the District Court would be reversed in the Supreme Court, end, wile not forestilinge what the Supreme Court, or any other court would do, would say to him after the current Court had affirmed the decision of the lower Court that if lawyers would still be at his back, telling nim to "stand pet". se the Governor head politics aspirations and had to have the votes of every Union man in the State, including the western Federation of Miners, end therefore, et the leet hour would commute his sentence end eventuejly peron rim. This would be what would be represented to him by his lawyers even ur to the time hen he would take has journey from the cell to inf eoffípld. After his law ere had eec that he was properly executed the miner circle of

the Western federation would rest oontented an hie lipe were eepled torever, and the lawyers in the case had done the duty rogulrod op them by their clients. I wanted to agein reinind him that he wes not the olientin this case, but that the cliente were the Inaer cirele of the Wentery Federation of Minerg who paid the lawyerg, nct for the purpous of elearing $n i m$ lunt for the purpose of keeping his mouth ahuta His lawyere in advisimg him thie oure kenow full well thet he would be oonvicted and eventusily exeoutod, but in order to getisfy their olients exd carn their foe they had to advise him alang the inners as stated above. When his lavyer next called upon him he oould notify him wory word that $][$ had spolcen on this subject, and when he did so to look the lawyer fin the feot and I thought that he would aee fron hit actions that the lawyer, notwithatanding whatever he said, that he know what I hed said was true. He said, I want to sey to you Mr. MoParland thet $I$ will never mention to my laryer ome word that hag peseed between you and $I$, and if I can only opend upon you, make a thoroush sonfidant of you I could tell you mone things thet would gurprife yov. I know more about you thme you owepot. I am well aware that if you mede a pronise co a man, no matter what orime he had oomnitised, up he did hia part, you have al ways been that your pronise vas oarried out.

I told n in that $I$ vas very moh pjeased thist he kniew my real oharaater, and tola nim that that jught to induce him to mare a oonfident of mo but I would not ineist upon it. He meid, Now, I know grou would not eo into Court and tostify to something I did not say or in fact, Ro into court and revesi this convereation, whioh wovid bis immeteriel. I I told him he wan riont in hie murmipes and that a we not there for that
 makp of armument. I will now say mo you i am fulluy of the crime ar ansuged. I heve oommitited the orine. " He then peuesd: Now yeu understand this is not confearion but for the purpoee of retting informe-
 thorowehly underetood thet and that I hoyen thet he is not think thet I moudd eo into Court end testify that the wores ne hed now mpokan were given as a onfession. He geid. Now, your are the otoctive; you oome Co me for a confeseion; you have elready eteted to me thet you heve absolute proof of my quilt. Sh ch bedne the cese, why co you come to me and talk with me ae you heve done? What benefit wovld it be to me to meke a oonfeseion? I nomnitted the crime, you knop it enc cleim to neve proof of the facte. To this I repiled that he mat remember et the very outwet of ous tell on mondey that I dia not come there to find out whether he Fes fuilty of the murder of Ex-Covernor Steunenberg or not as we hed positive proof of his euilt and wovid keng him upon the proof in our goem gession, but as he was but the tool of the power behind the throne, the Imner cirale, the nanging of him would bevery ilttia ectisfaction. It wovid not brext up the organization or rather. the Inner Gecle ae there wes probably $86 \%$ of the members of the Vretern Federition of Minert who vere ontirejy innocent of the ousrifes and murdere thst had been oommittef and parpetrated throuph the inner Cirale, and if re woulo come up and
 doubt would take oEre of nim. To aubstantiate thif iact I recited e number of ingtances which he knew of himselp wherein men had beome states witnesee in murder ceces and not oniy eaved their nooks but simo evantualiy got their liberty. On thet erount he rould be bengeitted by mening a full confestion, but in makine o contoselon no mati have sil o the eruth. He must not etcempt to oover one of enese coneplretore through

which he was innocent- Sor the purpose of rootifying sowe real or imeginary grudge that he had against him, alad if he soncluded to mak a oonfossion I anked him to for God's salse telit the truth. and nut to oover any of the ocnapirator: through frimashly, and not to try to oonvict or inm pliont seme porson who was really innoceat.

He seid, Well, supposing that I told jou that John Smith told ne thet he had killed Jin Brown, would that be ovidisuse againist John Bmith? I did not. sec him kill Join Smith." I informed him that if there was corroborative vidence leadink up to the murder of Erown iby Smith that a comfesion that sinith had made to hin was thomost demaging: of all evidence, in fact under certain oiroumstances it was stronger than If he testified that he saw Smith kill drow, because tre defendente night prove thet he, Orohard, had a motive in removing: Erown and wae simply Evearinc away the life of Smith in order to oever nimeelf.

He said. Well, that is one point made clear by you. Eut supjosing several perties had guilty knowledge of a murder that was comnitted.end were not preaent at the murdor, what good wovid it be for the murderer to make a contegsion ab long as the stete had enough ovidenco to convict? Can you explain that Kr. MoParland?"

I told him that I would explain it. in this way. Xou will be one of the oonepirators. He said "All right." Now Smith, Brown, Jones and yourself consplre to murder Johnson. Johmson inves away at a dimtience. Smith, Brown and Jones beinge, men in authority, detail you to so and dommit the murder, advise you how to do it, furnich you with the meane to travel and support yourself while engeged in this matiter, and when you eirrive at the place where Johnaon residee, you discover that you Will have to have help. Therefore you teve into your nonfidence kob White and isil Eleok. After making proper orranements Johnson ie murdered. yob White and Fill Blaok make their esoepe and you are erm rested and sufficient ovidence has been gotten to convict you and heng you accordine to lew, silthough you mifht not neve fielded the derger, pulled the trifper or exploded the homb thet rilled Johnson. Foh mite and 3111 mack had not seen Jonee, brown and Smith upon the gubject of this murder at all. You were the only person thet they aw. Neverthelese, every eot of Eob Whito and Eill Elaok, if explainod in Court, would be evidence ageinst Jones, Brown and Smith, who were hundrede of milee eway from the scene of the murder. The conspiracy ended when Johnson eqs risied. As poseibly pre-arranged with Jonee, brown end Smith, or even if not arraneed, alter your arreat it wes their duty, just a. they heve done, to procure leasi talent, not, ae geted before, for the purpose of aoquitting you, as they knew that wes impossible, but for the purpose of keoping your mouth shut until you were lerelly hung. Would sey in connection with the above hypothecated oase, I wab Eimgly expiaining to Oroherd how in think in my own mind how this aurder was commitied. He maid, "Woll, if" Bob Whito and Eili Bicok were arresten and they tivened stater evidence, how mould thet be? $I$ seid thelr ovidenco would only affect you as they had never geen or talked wi in Jones, Erown or Smith at. the inception of this oonepiracy. You kept your mouth closed, which was the key to the situetion. Therefors, you would euffer the pencity, but if the Stete had Bob white and lill maok and had the same evidexioe acainst thom thet thoy have against you, they would not eccept them as ste.te witnosees becsuse the evidence woula oniy result in the hanging of you as the state had sufficiont evidence to hang you and they would gimply try sill three of you, convict you and hene you together, but if you confessed it would be quite difierent as your tesil-
mony woxld reach the very foundation and the hoad of these outrethroute known as the Ianer Cirole of the Wostern Tederagion of Misert. Thit being the oase the state woul gladiy asoopt yowr sesistance as state vitinese and tee that you are properiy taicen oare or aftorwards. To thi orohard roplise, It think, wr. MoParlana, $I$ now underatand the position that you take. You have made it very clear to me. Dat mpposing that I turnel gtaton ovidence, that morianoe conviots tho leaders, as you have explained, the stete tiakes aare of me by eventraliy giving me my liberty, (I reminded him at thia point that I mad not suaranteed anything of the kind. He remarked thet he knew that bust was maring this statenent for the sare of argwont) thon $I$ would be caken back to Colorado and tried for some or the orimes they clalmi have oom mitted there and it would be out of the power of the state of maho to resist."

I told hilm that if he acted properiy in this case wo would get the leaders and thet was all that the State of coloredo and the state of Idaho Fianed, era that: I thought oould absure him thet he wovld not be prosecuted for any crime thet he committed in colorado. To this he replied; If I beoome a states withese in piving my evidence I would probably have to admit some orime that I comitted in the stat of Colorado, as the perties who would be on trial knew of thie and no doubt it would be brouent out in the ovidence. Tmen whet would be the result? I sald that in that metter he would have to act under the advieg of the lawyers for the stiete. He oovid refuse to enefor suoh questione on the ground of inoriminating himeelf, or he gould stete the trutin and by doing so he would einow that in committing the arimes in quogeion ho acted under the advice of the Inner Circie of the Veatern Federition that was then on trial just as he had cone in this case. However, timet wuld be a matter for the lewers for the prosocution to advise him on.

He seid. "Now, there is another objection to my beoomirie \& State witnese. The people of the state rould never be setiefigt to ellow me to go unpunished. The Goverrior has fot to hearken to public gentiment,
 tola nim that if ne acted in good faith with the Stete whas the sentiment thet now existed woul be reversed, thet instead of looking uporinim as a notorlous murderer they would look upon him as aever, not only of the Stete of Idaho, but of all Stater where the blipht of the Inner circie of the Western Federation had struck, and acsured him thet he need have no fear on that seore.

I then cifed to him the cern of Keliy, the bum, whe, in the ase of the Poopie versue Hester, Tull ay, MoHagh \& Wash Killy were the marderers of Alexander $w$. Rey. The murder wed committed in 1867 and the cace wat tried in $28 \% \%$ Kelly the Bum beaame Stetoe witnees and in the course of hie testimony he mede the following gtatement, thet wien they had taken Ray'e watch and $\$ 26.00$ all the money in mis posseasian. Ray get town on his knees and begeed for hif ilfe and opfered to pive them 2 oheck for $\$ 40,000$ and while they were oflubretine as to whet, thoy would do with Ray because he wae personelyy eocueinted with all of thern, the itum fired $\varepsilon$ shot into Rey'g forehead, exoleimine thet evea doge can tell no tales. Kelly was truthfux. He mipht neve teetifiod that either of the other chree had fired the shot, or he macht have testified thet bill meFidouney, one of che murderex. who wandeca, et the time the cese came to trial. had pised this ehot. Whon the men wore onvicted and subsequently hune kolis the mun was broukt into court.
the indictment wes dismiseed and the good oftizens of Columbis. Countys Pa., recognizing that Kolly had rondered a groat servion to the state, gave him about $\$ 2000$ in ordor that he micht late the opuntry.

This, I think, oovered about the last of the objections of
this man. I took up the moral eide of this question, aiske him is ho beliuved in an alleoting and Divine Providence. He roplied, yes". I asked him if he believed in a hereartor. He replisd. "xae". I said, now, that being the oase, why is it that on Monday you sald you would rether be hung than remein in the penitentiary for a year. Are you sitily of that opinion? He raplied very frankiy that ainee he had talkel with me he did not want to be huny. To this I replied, while I amot making you any promises, if you telke my advice you will not be hung. If you do not you will be hung in very quisk order as the state is rondy to prosecute as soon as Court convenes. After your oonviotion, when you see the noose damging from the gallowe yro will then wint to sonfese byt you will be too late, as your testimony under those conditions would be of no importamce. Aithcugh he had gotiton up fron hie ohair several times when I made point wherein he thought that he oould avoit the ciellowe, in this case he walked over to we and eaid, "My God, if I cowld only place ocnfidenee in you. I want to talk. I ought to plase confidence in you, Your telk is risht. I know overy word you have saif is true. You cannot live one hundred years ionger. You certsinly have not pot to build a reputation as a deteotive and I amisatisfied that all you heve said is for my cood."

I sufegosted that I oall in Mr. Hawley, the leading ooursel for the Statie and lot him talk with him and that I wouid not be present. He said "No, the tine for calline Mr. Hawley has not yeio arrived, did if it doess come I want you to be present as I look up to you for some 1ittle proteotion. I don't now look upon you as anide deteotive, the seme as the dixuned sonsmof-bitohes that they threw into the cell with rac at Calawall. If it were not that their actione pere so contemptible I would have pitied them. whey are tho rind of men thet, swear mens lives away. I know thei you would not talke the witnese gtand end tegtim fy as to one vord that has passed between you and I here, nor would you add a word to what I have said. I have that much confidence in you. 1. told him that ho was rieht; thet. I oerteinly would not add anything to what he said nor tere the witness atiend at ail, except that after he had mede e confegsion that mis tectimony mifot reouire some corrohoration on my part. He said, "I want to know if you would grant me a favor. Vould you send for e certein men in Celdwell to come here to tein with me in your presence. I told him it ell depended upon Whorn the man was that he wanted to see, and after a little heritation he seid it was Judge 5 mith , before whom he would be tried. it asked $n \mathrm{~mm}$ if the would explain to me what he wanted to sey to Judge Smlth, provided I fatohed him here. He said, I do not know where to begin aty. I oxplain to him that it was my opinion thet if he made oonforsion to Judee Smith it would disqualify the Judge from trying the cese and that I did not believe the Judic would ifsten to anythine he maide except in Court, end anyhow, until he had made up his mind as to whet he was foing to say to Judge Swith there was no use in sending for tho Judfe. He said, "Well, wo will let that matter rest and vou come and see me tomorm row afternon. He weyt on to say, I expect my lawyer will be here eny day end I want to ascure you that not one word thet hes pasced fetween un here will ever be revealed to himp and I want you io bee to it that the Wercen does wot tell my lawer of your vigits here. If fou think you cinnot control the wirfon see the covernor ebout this mitter. 1 sedd
to him thet I thought the Varden oould be depended upan and I would talk with him but that $I$ was fully ectiefied that the Farden was all right, and that $I$ would not iike to go over his noad and go to the Governor. He seid, "Yes, the warden is ell rient, and is the only man In this damed Institution thet hes got eny heart in him, and inow toe that he ie tratsiter me all rifht se far as he cas go, and i moula not like to have him know that I doubtod his obility to keep his mouth shut, but, you know he is an officer and ell offloors at times ilke to telk." However, I essured him that the Warden oonld be depended upon to say nothing upon this metter. He said, "rill ne let my lawer in to see me if he comes?" I said, "Yes; nut ne will heve to he present, not within earbhot, but so he can see what tranepires." He aida, "I. want the werden precent". I esid the lewyer micht kick about thet but don't you kiok providinf you ere proine to eerve the state. He seid, - You can depend upon it, I em not foine to kiak about anything. I have changed my mind ontirely." He then went on to asy thet he hed met our Superintend ent Cary once in Holland'e Care Restaurant, nert foor to the Curtis Street entrine to the rabor Opera House. He setid he supposed Cary would not remember him. Somebody wes trectinp and when Cary went out he learned who he wes. He madd he knew all about ne and where I lived on Cepitol Hill. Ho kind of drem benk a little ene selo, wiou live on dincoln Street". I esid, "No, I live about two miles further bept then Jincoln St." He gaid he hadmede miftake es to the etreet but geked me if I gtill rept them severe bulldors. I. seda, "Yos." ky this oonverection the indioctions are that the Inior cirole wes keeping tib on me, nthourh in thif I may be mideter. It beine noe: neerly Eix o olock ne vot ur and sijid, I exain want to bey thet if I coulo make un mivine to implicitlyaybu I thank oould pet this metter adjusted end you rill now romice thet, you will rome here tomorow afternoon," stopoinf whort he siad. "I went to sor you why it wer that you never ar ested dhomes Hurley, one of the Molly Mociures who comitted suicide in the Gunnison jail. you cortainly knew where he fer fice it hae been a myetery to me and goveral others why you ijo mot tefre him beck to Penneylvinic ad try him." J replied to this thet it is eveily explained. Hurley wes eimply the tool of Jeck Kenoe, the nean of the Inner circle of the Molly becuires, just as you ere the tonl of moyer, Heywooa, impkine end others. Vhile I mitht heve pnown whare Hurley wes located, as ee ned oonvicted $a j$ of tre Irige (ircie, inclucine tife
 tool like Hurley. Ir thie ceee you stend just en Nurley aif, e poor, untcrunate tool, no thet bein the offe, to tell wou the truth, late to see you hung firi those that are more fullty escepe, sine thet. If why I bave taken such peine to set you around to the preper way of tramenge whereby you ocr eorve the state end possibly fave your ovin iffe. He seid, well, I now eatisfied why you did not fet Hurley, boceueb it has ofter been disouse that you ooula have put your finger on him and dio not do $i t$, and nobody knew the reason why."

He went on to tell me that the Farden had been vory rind to. hin since my lest visit Monday. He oot a chence to exeroize nimecif in the corridor and hed fotton a bath ande oleen gheve, end felt very mich refreshea. I told nifito think the metter over ne l poule surely come beck tomorrog, hut before perting he eid, wi vold much rether they


It is true I might have gotten killed in making my esoape", int it toio him thet bes I did on Monday, that he was not transferred on that aocount but that he wes transferred to protect him from whet he then thought were hie friends. I found that he pricies himself on beiref very intellectual and I cotered to hie vanity in that respect ell throuph this conversation.

Before I called in the Warden he ceme ur agein, erabhed my hand and said, "I think you are honest, and if I was only with you e while I knop: would have oonfidence in you." When I celled in the warden to take mim to hie cell he agein seid, Now sonlt forpet to ocme here tomorrow."

This would indicate that these men are beginning to realize their condition and may try to get away. Haywood has aid on several occasions that if the authorities ever got after him he would find a protector in a bade manufacturer named Callaghan or Callahan, who resides either at Philadelphia or Pittaburg, who would get him off on a boat to some foreign country. Mover has expressed himself in the same manner. Take this matter up with the Philadelphia, New Yorkand Pittebure officer in a letter. I herowitin enclose to you three conies of Heywood's photograph, also three apples of moyer'e photograph on which you can place the proper description and have the acme forwarded to New York, Philadelphia and Pittsourg, lest they might want to use them.

Today I hart several conferenoes with Governor llopdimg, and in the ovening held a conference with the Governor and Chiof Counsel Hawley.

I received a telegram from Mr. Hessen isformint mot that Mrs. Simpkine had not left Spokane but was at present living with her uncle, a Mr. Hanson. Owins to the dract that neither of these three parties has been in Idaho during this conspiracy we cannot say that they are futitives from justice, and we may have considerarle trovhle in extraditing them,' However, we are perfectink plians by wich we hope to fret them into Idaho in a legal marner, where there is litile duabt but that we can convict them.

The fovernor remainei until late in the eveninp, Mr. Huwley havin left eariier.

Purin the evenine I was alsc vieitad by Ex-Goveraor Steunenberg's two brothers. Onc of them, A.K.iteunenberg, a banker at Caldwell, remaind with us in my roum for about an hour ana a half. He poched to be satisfied with what Governor Goodinf was doing in this matter, althourh he has no knowledre of the work that nas really been done in this emay as we do not consider it safe tc allow any persons except tho se we cannot help into the secret. I am also forwarding to Governor Gooding a copy of this cipher. This will enable either the Governor or yourself to telegraph to any of our superintendents relative to ar of the parties mentioned in this cipher. Of course in telegraphing our superintendents you will telegraph to them in their proper names and say that, "Lyon" or "Bear" or "Copperhead", as the case may be, was at such or such a place. Not knowing where Adams or Simikins is I cannot give cipher words for the names of the towns they may be in at present, but am also inclosine a cipher list of towns which will be supplemented as the work progresses.

Inis morning it called upon Governor Gcoding und discussed the ase with him so far as we have gone in this matter, also discuseed with him what I had to do In Denver before oalling upon fra. Havley to come to that point. Tho Governor informed fo that lir. Van Dyme, the prosecuting attorney of Caldwell, when informed of Orahari's confession, whe simply amsed but did not seem to take sny offonse that this fact had boen concealed from him up to the presont time. As I understood it, Mr. Miller, the counsel fot the defendent, wan to meet Mr. Hawley inns Mr. Van ryne today when they would arrange wen thie case was to be tried. The Govemor telephonef to the penitontiary and found that filler wa dow there, and made errangements with the warcien to have the penitentiary phaeton meet me at the penitentiary fate abcut 1:30 P. M., as I wanted to see Oraharj kefore Leaving tornorrow for Dentor.

My dear Judge:
I take the liberty of askinf abont one day of your valuarle
time in a matter that is not only irportant to Colorado aind all western states but a lis of great importance to every good citizen of the United States, anis yourself in particular.

I have been absent from lenver since the morninf; of January Sth investipating the murder of Ex-Sovernor Frani. R. Steurenberg of Idaho wile enterint tis yard on the night of Jeperner 30th last, where he was blown $u$ by a homb. In making my investiggation I have unearthe the bloodiest crowd of anarchists that ever existed, I think, in the civilized world, not even excepting Russia, and as we are not ready to livulpe to the purlic anythinf of what we have do ne in this matter, I have headed this letter "Strictly Confidential."

In lookinf over the lon List of Prominent men in Colorado who will oventually know all about this and who will surely help us, I have concluded to at first confide in you, not as Justice of the Supreme Court but simply as a food citizen has inp the welfare not only of Colorado but of the United States in peneral, at heart. I think it will take 18 one or two days to po over the details in this matter, an therefore would be pleaseil if you could absent yourself frar your duties on the Benc for two days. Wy office, roor 217 Onera Youse lock, benvar, will be the best place for us to ocnter as I will have all the documents there to prove my assertions.

In connection witt this matter woul: say thet the outrages committed by the lolly Mchires in Pennsylv nia were simply childe plav when compared with the acts of these blcadetirsty aissabsins. and I thin: it was throum an act of Devine Providence that I have buen enablel to get at the bottor of this consuracy. This matter is of mort importance to tie State of Colorado, and all the western states where the klifht of the Western Federation of "iners has telsen root, thian all the cases that yry misht try on the supreme orurt Fench of Colorade in a year or in fact, diuring your lifetime.
!!ow, I si ply iake these statements, which I wils confirm, to show wis thertant rission thet I have selected yon for. Secrecy for the present, is the watcrord, and the mainstay of triis matter. I will be i's wenver on onday, tret, leth, an: will be ready to take this matt, up with you at nine o'cloc: A. in ry office.

Enropte, Monday, February 12, 1906.
I continued on my journey enroute to Denver arriving at the latter place at $120^{s}$ block noon, our train having beer delayed at Cheyenne waiting for connecting trains and again delayed snroute from Cheyenne to Denver on account of the roof of the chair car taking fire from an overheated stove.

Upon arriving in Denver $I$ found that Supt. Cary had personally seen Judge Goddard and delivered my letter to him, and the Judge after reading the same informed him that he would meet me at 9 o' clock tomorrow and told Mr. Cary to $1 . n f o r m$ me that he would be at my service just as lone; as I wanted him, that he would make an excuse for not attending the sessions of the Supreme Court at the state House as long es I wanted him.

MgT. James McParland reports:
Denver, Tuesdav, February 13, 1906.
This morning: Justice Goddard called upon me at 9:00 A.M. I called in our oriminal olerk and had him read over to Judge Goddard the confession of Orchard, al so the three subsequent reports that $I$ made on visiting Orohard aiter his lawyer, Mr. Miller, had aalled upon him. To say that Judge lloddard was dumbtounded would be using a mild expression.

During the lunch hour after Judge Goddard had linch with me he went to his home and discovered the screw as mentioned in Drohard's confession whioh the latter had pu't in the gate. He also informed me that no grass has grown on the spot indicated by Orchard where the bomb is located. I was suryrised at the nerve that Judge Goddard showed on being informed of the intended assassinatiopy of himself.

I have arranged with Gen. Bulkley Wella, who is a mining engineer and an expert on explosives to take up the bomb froviding it is still there on tomorrow morning. He will do this himgelf, Judge Goddard having notified his wife and family that a man would do some little work around the lawn tomorrow, and Gen. Wells will appear in a mining suit such dis ho usos around mines, and $I$ will have two men in the immediate neighborhood to see to it that 'd orowd does not assemble while he is takine up this bomb. He thinks it will take only a. few minutes to do so.

I informed Judge Goditird what we wanted done in the premises. The Judge is very much in favor of arrestins Haywood, Moyer amd Pettibone at onob and shippirg them on a special train as we have decided on to Idaho. He is not in favor of allowing these men to roan around here on the prospect of getting Adams or enybody else. He has essured me that he will arrange with a few prominent citizens to have the Sheriff act just as I want him to. As you are aware the Sheriff is my personal Iriend but I wanted somebody else besides myself to get hii: to act as we want in to in making these arrests. After the mer are arrested and sent away you certainly can get a continuance for a week or two without showing your hand in Idaho.

He gpoke about the legai talent that would be provided for the defendants, asked me about Mr. Hawley's ability and witiout my even suggesting what we hicd nlready deoided on he suggested that Johm Whildron should be retained to assist Mr. Hawley in the prosecution, and that the State of Colorado should pay John Weldron's fees or rather the Mine Owners. I told him we would like to get the State of Colorado to do this or rether the Mine Owners' Associations, but whether or not that you
( $\quad$ 2m
had informed me that we must prociure the services of John Waldron as I had sugesested his name to you, that this would be taken up with Mr. Hawley and Mr. Hawley would take this matter up with Mr. Waldron. However, the Judge said he would prepare Mr. Waldron for Mr. Hawley's visit. The Judge like myself oonsiders Mr. Waldron the sblest prosecutor in the United States.

As to gettiag other matters in shape whioh concern the State of Colorado, all of mioh you are conversant with, the Judge holds that wo should "arrest thesemen first; send them to Idaho and then oali on the offiotalis of Colorado to bear the expense of looking after their own oriminals including, Sherman Pariker, W. F. Lavis, Wm. Eokman, Vincent St. John and nembers of the Executive Board who vere present in Denver when they determined on the assassination of Lyte Gregory. He stated in calling the meeting for that purpose he did not propose that any deputy sherdf'f or any outside detective be emplcyed on this case, that the matter should be placed with the Agency, or rather under my supervision, to locate these people and subsequently prosecute them. The Judge is of the opinion that the conviction oi Moyer, Heywood and Pettibone sounds the death knell to dynamiters in the West. I will telegraph you the result of the search for the bomb tomorrow morning.

It took us from $90^{2}$ clock in the morning until $5: 15$ in the evening to read over the reports of the confession and the three subber quent reports made by me on visiting Orchard. I did not take up with Judge Godard the reports of the first three days that I visited Orchard as they are not material to the oase now although they were the most material part of the whole business and through the work done on those three days we got Orahard's confession. It now looks to ne after talking with Judge Goddard and knowing the kind of a man he is anc. as I explained to you how Judge Goddard stands in this community as thouk we are going to get the proper help that we wanted from the State of Colorado. We may possibly ohange the matter of sonding Mr. Hawley on the special train, or if he does ec on the special train after reaching Idaho he must turn back and come back to Denver to attend the meeting whioh we intend calling after tinese men have been landed safely in the State of Idaho. After the prisoners are safely landed in Boise if a writ of habeas corpus is applied for I think a continuance oan be secured until Mr. Hawley gets back to Boise, but this is a matter we will take up with Mr. Hawley here.

I am very muon pleased to learn that Mr. John Waldron is at present in Denver as he certainly will be just the man tha: Mr. Hewley wants for an assistant in this cise, and the two of duem I think will be able to combat with any legal talent that the defiondants may employ. Judge Goddard is very much pleased at the prospect of having Mr. Waldron in this case. After reading over the reports $n t$ and with the corroborations we can ge: he sars there is no doubt but that you heve a grood case and can hane these men in Idaho, and he wila see ort, they are gotten there.

Today when my clerk got to the point where Walley was killed by the bomb set to kill Chief Justice Gabhard, Judee Goddard had him stop
reading, and said on that morning in question just as Kr. Gabbard had come to the edge of the path across the lot where he usucily walked something seomed to tell him not to walk in the path, so he came back to the side walk and game straight to Colfax Ave and down Colfax to the State House. Chief Justice Gabbard told this to Judge Goddard and thought he was rather silly and superstitious. However at loblock that day when they heard the report of the bomb and subsequently heard of the killing of Walley, Chief Justice Babbard said he did not want anythirg said of this matter, rut Judge Goddard said he thought he was released from his promise when he heard what Orohard had to say in the matter, and therefore told it to me.

Denver, Wednesday, February 14, 1906.
At 9:00 A.M. Judge Goddard called upon me at my office and a few moments afterwards Gen. Wells called. For you to better understand who General Wells is would say in tine first place he is a civil and mining engineer and he took the management of the Smugeler-junion mine at Telluride after Arthur Collins was assassinated. In addition to this Gen. Wells having had interests in large mining properties in the Cripple Creek District in the early days of that camp is an old time client of tine Agency, and at the present time is Adjutant General of the Colorado National Guard.

On the General's arrival at the office I told him that I wanted him to excavate this bomb, that it must be done in the day time and nobody mist be made aware of this fact. To protect the General while excavating I had two Assistant Superintendents of the Denver office placed at the street crossings about half a block amway from were the General was to work to prevent anybody passing too near where the General vas excavating. It so happened that my two men had nothing to do as the hour was about 11 o'clook A.M. and there was nobody passing to and Pro. The General dug up the bomb with a large jack-knife.

The box contains about ton pounds of powder with a hundred caps. We can see the caps through the opening which was made to admit the acid. The bottle was there held by a piece of cotton and wire. There was a portion of the cork gill there but it had been eaten away by the acid. There was a thick sediment in the bottom of the bottle which had been frozen to the bottle. On Friday last when talking with Orchard on this matter $a .8$ to the reason this bomb did not explode, Orchard stated that as the bomb had boer made for a few days it was possible the acid had eaten the head off the pin that passed through the cork and when the Judge opened the gate the pin pull d out leaving the cork in place. When reminded by ne the the hole made by the pin mould be sufficient to allow at least some of the acid to drop out, Orchard said he thought not, that the head of the pin was corroded in the cork and mile the pin had been eaten through the head would close up the hole, and when the hoad of the corr would be eaten through the nook of the botide would be corroded. This we have found to be a fact.

I have placed the bottle and the screw that wis in the fate in envelopes, sealed the same, attached thereon the names ot the pitnesses and have placed them for safe keeping in my site. line bomb $I$
had wrapped up securely and sealed the same with the nemes of the wi.tnessas that saw it excavated, viz. Ass't Supto. Préttyman and Londoner, also Associate Justice Goddard of the Supreme Court as well as Gisn. Wells, and heve committed this. bomb to the safe keeping of Gen. Wells who has placed it in his private safe in the Armory as he , said there is no danger of its exploding. Judge Godderd said this bomb can be used at the trial of Haywood, Moyer and Pettibone in Idaho as they will be tried on the conspiracy act and this was part of the conspiracy. If it was not for that $I$ would have had the box containing the borab thrown into the Platte River; Judge Godderd would not allow this and I expect he is right, and I have acted on his acivice.

The Judge is of the opinion that as soon as the extradition papers arrive here that we should at once have these men arrested and taken out on a speciej train as we do not know what District Judge they would be tried before providing e writ of habeas corpus is. obtained and he doesn't want any writs or legal points tried here.

After recovering the bomb I telegrapned our Mr. Hopkins in
cipher as follows:
Well Governor everything progressing fine.
Unearthed bomb at Godderd's gate this
morning. Waldron is at home. Hope ilils
has started with papers."
It will take some days, in fuct until some time next week, before we can get a meeting of the Coloradoans that would be interested in this matter, and I think we will all sest easier men we start, Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone on their way to Jdaho.

Mgr. James MoParland reports:
Denver, Thursday, February 16, 1906.
Today I learned through an informant whom I can trust inpliaitiy and whom I have asked to get all information he an on the matter in question as he is in a position to do so that a couple of days ago he met John F. Farley, General Agent of the Thief jetective Association, with whom he is well acquainted. The informant is also well acquainted with Capt. Swain. Mr. Farley knowing this informed the informant that he expected Capt. Swain down here in a few dells. He went on to state that Capt. Swain had about finished up the investigation of Orchard, arrested for the assassination of Ex-Gov. Steunemberg, and he had just received a letter from Swain who informed him that his investigation showed that Orohard was an innocent man and had nothing to do with the assassination of Ex -Gov. Steunenbergs however he was held without bond. The informant replied if Orchard was innocent he hoped he would be acquitted.

On Tuesday this informant had a talk with James J. Sullivan while the latter was eating lunch. Sullivan opened up the conversation by remarking to the informant that he understood that MoParland had returned, and wanted to know if he had met me and $1 f$ I had told him where I had been. The informant said he had seen me but had no talk with me, but so far as where I was wen away was concerned he supposed I was on my usual tour of inspection of our western offices. Sullivan then aid, Why didn't you see the papers just about the time that he Left? The newspapers showed that he had gone up to investicinte the Ex-Gov. Steunenberg murder and he has not been around any of the western offices. He has been up at Caldwell and Boise up to the tire he left for his hume He then went on to say he had gone up there to see if Orchard was a man that he was acquainted with and found that he was, that Orchard wanted him to become his attorney but he refused to do so. The informant asked Sullivan the question as to whether or not he thought Orchard was guilty, and he replied that was a direct question that he would not wish to answer either one way or the other. He went on-to say, "When McFarland went up there he found Capt. Swain in charge of the investigation, but after a few days the services of swain were dispensed with and Swain is pretty mad about that."

Sullivan asked the informant if he was not on the police force in Denver at the time that Swain killed a man on 16 th and Ierimer $3 t s$. The informant replied in Ene affirmative and Sullivan then said, wasn't that a cold blooded murder $?^{4}$, and while the informant was aware it was
a cold blooded murder and that the coroner's jury was fixed to bring in a verdist of self defense, the informant repliod that he never thought it was a cold blooded mirder and that the coroner's jury exonerated Swain. Sullivan then went on to say that Orchard's friends seemed to be very much pleased at the fact that the matter had been pht into the hands of the Pinkerton Agency as they knew that nef.ther the Agency nor myself would sanction the putting up of a job to conviet a man whether he was innocent or guilty. The informant replied by saying that was his opinion of the Pinkerton Agency as well as his opinion of myself. Sullivan then said, "Well I would sooner have Thie. in a matter of this kind because any institution that puts up jobs founded upon falsehoods is easily found out, but McParland was shmp:ly brought in there to perfect the evidence of the State, and mark my word, before he gets through he will have enough ovidence to hang Orahard. There is apparentily no direct evidence at the present time and what evidence he gets will never be known to aase on trial." The informant said, "Why I thought you and MoParland were good friends, and surely to God you would not accuse him of trying to get somebody to perfure himself", to which Sullivan replied, "He will not do anytining of the kind, but he will make a strong cast against Orchard, so strong that there is no doubt but that he will conviat him and that is all there is to it." The informant informed me that on Monday night Moyer and Haywood ontered Watrous' Cafe and sutt in the lower booth next; to the rear docr. They were oloseted there for over two hours talking in a low whisper. Haywood is acquainted with the oook in this cafe and at times has gone into the kitchen and sat down and talked to him. The informant investigated as to how Haywood and this cook were so well aoquainted and found that the cook had formerly worked in Cripple Creek, knew Harry Orahard and know Haywood well and at one time was a member of the Western Federation of Miners, as nearly all the cooks and waiters in Cripple Creek in those days belonged to that organization. The cook said that Haywood had been telling him about time arrest of Orchard but that he was innocent and that the man who assassinated Ex-Gov. Steunenberg had since died and made a death-bed confession whion he (Heywood) had in his pooket. The informant did not dere to question the cook too closely as to this man's name, but the cook'said he knew the man who did it and there was little doubt but that he would do a job of that kind and he believed what Haywnod said.

Mr. Mills arrived here with the requisitions todey and I placed them in our safe. I had a long conference with Judee Goddard, and e.s Mr. Hawley had arrived I sent Mr. Cary with a carrifige after Mr . Hewley as I would not risk having Mr. Hawley seen on the streets. Mr . Hawley and Judge Godaard had a long conference on the legal points involved in this matter, and also who should be present at the conference which we are going to have at as early a date as possible. The Judge thinks that the Pewer present the better at this time; we nay hold a conference after lioyer, Haywood and Pettibone have been ar:ested and taken into the State of Idaho. The only persons that are wanted at the conference to the present time would be the Governor and a few others. who would advise the Governor as to the granting of the requisition and
a couple of others that would have influence on the sineriff to have him act as I direct him to do in making these arrests."

Judge Gocdard is of the opinion that we must; not play the
Game of the boy and the nuts and grasping at too much might lose all, that is to say in waiting to locate Adams aleak might spring at any time and Moyer and Haywood clear out as well as Pettibone, and that would be a greater loss than the loss of all the others put tosether, and his advice is that we aot as quickly as possible as soon as we get the Governor to honor the requisitions.

On account of the fact that neither Mr. Hawley nor myself had the power to engage Mr. Waldron and Judge Goddard could not say that the mine owners hore would pay Mr. Weldron's foe ialthough he thinks they will and that matter may be settled tomorrow, the Judge thought it was not advisable for Mr. Hawley to meet Mr, Waldron under such conditions, so he went and spent at least a couple of hours with Mr. Waldron while Mr. Hawley waited in my office awaiting his return. The Judge returned about 6:20 and from the authorities that Mir. Waldron had looked up in the matter of extraditing these men we found that Mr. Waldron agreed with Mr. Hawley that if these men were arrested, on a writ of habeas corpus any judge that they wuld be tried before would discharge them. While it will not be so hewd to get them out of Colorado it, will be a hard matter to get them through Wyoming.

The Judge is to arrange for the meeting tomorrow et the Governor's office in the strte. House and will notify me as to the hour when tinis meeting is to take place and $I$ will notify Mr. Hamley. At this proposed meetine we expect to get matters settled clefinitely. It is too bad that we will have to make these arrests before Adams is arrested or at least located, hut we cannot afford to weit much longer becausa those men are eetting very ureasy.

Mgr. James McFarland reports:
Denver, Friday, February 16, 1906.
Relative to the matter in question would say that although it had been arranged on yesterday that the meeting with Gov. McDonald at Gov. MacDonald's office would be held in the afternoon tod ely, however, at 9 A.W. I was informed by Justice Goddard that the meeting would be held at $10 A_{n} M_{0}$, and he instructed me to have Mr. Hawlev present, also to fetch up the requisitions and confession of Orchard to the Governor's. office. As Mr. Hawley, Justice Goddard and myself had discussed the fact that if a habeas corpus writ, was served on the officers in charge of the prisoners while enroute through Colorado and Wyoming trey would surely be discharged and we might get into trouble with tree United States authorities, and as $I$ would have to be present at the prosecution it become necessary to keep not only myself but the Agency in the background during the arrest, and the conveying of the prisoners from Denver to the state of Idaho. In order to clear ray self particularly on this matter $I$ never looked at the requisition papers, nor did I carry them to the Governor's office, but had hr. Prettymme one of the Asset Superintendents, do that.

On arrivius; at the Governor's office I found Gen. Wells on guard at the side door. Justice Goddard was present, also the Hon. James Will isms, who represents all of the interests of bovid g. Boffat and Wi. G. Evans, the latter two be ilk. at present in New York City. Subsequently Chief Justice Dabber arrived, also Kr. Hawley. To expedite matters at the suggestion of lir. Harley I was instructed to detej? the substance of Orchard's confession without reading the whole record. This took at least three hours, after which the matter of getting those men out of Colorado mas discussed, and I informed the governor that foyer, Haywood and Pettibone were so uneasy mod acting in sur b a suspicious manner that is mas impossible for us to keep them in line, and it' we arrested one of them, in his attempt to scare the other two would get away. Al of the parties present including the governor thourte it was better for use to secure the three leaders and trust to luck for the others afterwards.

The matter of referring the extradition papers to the Attorney General was discussed. Attorney General Filler is not to ie depended upon, 'il: the first place he is a drunkard ard ic liable to tale. His deDuty Mr. Velvilie is lot removed very far from an amorbis", ja a personal friend ot hover and Favoood, and while jiving in Tel Turide belonged to

[^0]the Western Federation of Miners. The custom in Colorado as in nearly all states in which I have ever had extradition papers honored is for the Governor to refer the application to the Attorney General. It was shown to the Governor that the matter of honoring these papers by him was ministerial and it would be death to the case to refer the papers to the Attorney General, but the question was as to whether the Governor was willing to stand the roasting he would get from the Rocky Mountain New and Times for playing, as it were, the part of a kidnapper if he signed the papers without referving then to the Attorney General. The Governor simply picked up the requisitions and examined them and said, "I will sign them, and the record will not go into the Secretary of State's office until some time next week, and I hope that we prisoners will then be safely in ldaho."

Antioipating that we might have trouble in passing through Wyoming even with some of the train crews if not stopped by the United States Marshal to serve a writ of habras corpus, I wanted not only a man of intelligence but a man of nerve to take charge of the train. On account of what I have above stated I dare not place one o: our men in charge of this train as if we had trouble that would fetch in the Agency which might cause us a great deal of trouble in prosecuting these cases. Therefore I made a request of the Governor to detail Gen. Wells to take charge of the train, and if worst comes to wroret gen. Wells can run an engine just as well as any locomotive engineer in the country, and except he might consent to obey a United Statee hiarshal, he wilj not ohey the order of any sheriff enroute, that you can depend on. Before I made this request of the Governor I knew that Gen. Wells would do anything that I requested him to do. The Governor turned too the Gencral and said, "You are at liberty to go if you want to." I immedfiately reninded the Governor that $I$ would like him to order the General to go, and the Governor then said to the General, "I hereby athorize you to take charee of that train and see that these prisoners are landed in Boise city." In connection with thise matter I wish to draw your attention to the fact that Colorado has at least got the rieght kind of a Governor.

At this meeting we did not take up the matter of employing hir. Waldron, hut Mr. Williems, who represented Mr. Eioffat in tris matter, and wir . Wells, who represented the Wine Owners' Assn. of Telluride, intormed me privately that Waldron would be employed, and that they would raise $\$ 25,000$ or $\$ 50,000$ if necessary to assist in this prose~ cution. Wr. Wells instructed me to imaediately detail an operative to go to Cripple Creek und eet young. Chas. Neville out of there as son as possible and he would see that the expenses were maid. 'Th_s is afl I want of a man like Gen. Wells. Notwithstanding the fact that Wells is acting as Adjutant Gereral of the State, nevertheless $I$ wish to say he is a milljonsire and one of the finest young men in the onuntry. I have given Gen. Wells a letter of introduction to you and I krmy you will see that he and his deputies will be treated richt while in moige.

We left the requisition papers with the Governor ard Gen. Wells subsequently brought them back to me in the afternoon where I discovered the Governor had overlooked the signing of one of the pepers and returned them through the Generel who will bring them bacir here tomorrow. It was about 2 P.M. before I left the Governor's office but before leaving arranged with Mr. Williams to see Sherifi Nisbet and bring him to my office at 3:00 P.M. As I stated to you while in Eoise I have no better friend than Sheriff Nisbet, but this was a very partioular matter and $I$ wanted heln in such a way that the Sheriff would not refuse to obey my orders. Ger. Wells, Mr. Willypar and the Sheriff all appeared at'my office about $3: 30$ P.M., also hr. Hawley. I explained to Sheriff Nisbet what was wanted, although I was infomnei by Mr. Williams quietly that he had explained to the Sheriff in advance and that everything would be all righti. The Sheriff said, "I am at your service, now you go on and detail just what you want done."

I stated the sollowing were the plans that I had layed out for the erreat of these men and their conveyance to the suecial train at Fortieth St. First the Sheriff procures three carriagles; he also procures three drivers whom he can deperd upon, that is anteches of his office, men that won't tialk. He will place four deputies in each carriage including the criver. One of our operatives who trone the prisoner to be arrested will accompany each carriage simpi.y to identify the prisoner. All thc sheriff'g officials together with ny three men who will be used to identify the prisomers will meet at the court House at 6:30 A.M. Sunday mornime and from thore a carriage wiju prooecd to the residchoc $0^{*}$ each loyer, Haywood and Pettibone. The errestos will be made and the men will be taken to the speaial sar at 40th St. Mr. Mills, the messenger, will be $\vdots n$ the car with den. Wejla to receive the prisoners as they are brought in and deliverod to hin by tho fleriff. The Sheriff will serid two deputies olear through to zoise. I selected the deputies mivelf and fnow that $I$ made ecod selection. Gen. Vells will seiect two :.nch whom the Gheriff will deputize, which wifl make in all foum men and Gen. Wells who wijl have charge of the trajn. These men will ali be properly armed and with Mr. Wills, the mescencer, I think we will have a very strobig a uard on these men, who aill fe able to resist any sheriff enroute attemntine to serve a writ of habeas corpus. In, connection with this I qiol have two mon at fortieth st. to see that the train is started in proper time.

Now in comection with tirovisioning this train the menu will roct be elaborate. It will consist simply of plenty of oona rojolem and ham suldwiches. We will not be able to eet any ooffee and momino the men that $I$ an detailing on this matter $I$ will place a case of beer in charen of Ger. Wells so me: oar have a racil at least with a littie boer, Es l know he will sec to it that nobody will get any more of the beer than they are entitled to.

In oolifection with this matter would sav I have as expres:man that I cun depend uron. The night ocok in the Watrous Cafe is an old acquaintabce und friend of Haywood. liv expressman wili enl? about five
$0^{1}$ clock in the morning, for the provisions. He will drink a cup of coffee in the kitchen ind then say to the cook, "My God, I must hurry up, I must take these provisions to Eurnham". Eurnhan iss the first station south on the Denver \& Rio Grande, the Santa Fe, ine Colorado \& Southern and the Colorado Midland Ry. Mr. Wetrous will see that the cooks gets a vacation all day on Sunday and we know there will be a great comnotion raised when it is knomn that these men were arrested, and we expect that this cook will immediately go to Haywond's residence and inform them about the transaction with the expressman and they will hunt over the D. \& R. G., Colorado \& Southerr, the Santa Fe and possibly the Uidland for the prisoners instead of the Uninh Pacific. At the union depot they will find that no prisoners were taken through the gates. This may work and it may not, but it is the best $I$ cen do.

I will arrange for the train tomorrow lorning. I would like very much to have detailed some of 1 oven mer on this matiter, but Mir. Hawley and Judges Gabbert and Goddard thought it best; that we keep out of the arrest and the conveying of the prisoners to Iosise as $I$ will be wanted and wanted badly at, the proseoution and will not have to defend myself on that, score.

From this report you wilj see $I$ have overcore all the diffiaptine that we antioipated $I$ would moountor in Colorado.

> Denver, Saturday, February $] .7,1906$.

This morning I called on Mr. Stenger, Supt of the Union Pacific R. R. Co., where I met Mr. Whitney, Supt. of the Wyoming Division of the U. P. R. R. Co., and made the proper arrangements with these gentleman as to the special train. The train will ocnsist of one baggage car, one Pullman and a Special car for the Superintend ont of the division on which the train passes. No telegrams will be received by any of the train crews. The supt. of the division will receive all telegrams and the train will be subject to the order of General. Wells who has charge of the deputy sheriffs guarding the prisoners. The train will be on the track at Pullman, formerly known as the Fortieth St. Station at least by 6:00 A.M. tomorrow morning and we intend to have the prisoners aboard the train at least by 7:00 A. M. I will see to it that the provisions reach the train at 6:00 A.M. The intention of Mr. Stenger and Mr. Whitney is that Mr. Anderson will leave Cheyenne with his special car on Sunday morning, meet this special train at the top of Ethel Hill, substitute the crew of Mr. Anderson's special for the orem that leaves Denver. They want to pass through Cheyenne about 10 A. ${ }^{\text {po }}$. when the yards will be blear, and will run the train in the rate of thirty miles an hour through Cheyenne. They will not change crows at any division point, but will change at a delegraph station. The oar carrying the prisoners and deputies will be locked and not even the train conductor will be allowed in there; fe may either ride in the official's special car or the baggage car but he has no busies in the car where the prisoners are. If everything goes right the train is expected to reach the Idaho line by midnight on Sunday. I will have another meeting with the Sheriff and Gen. Wells this evening to perfect our plans as to the arrests. The operatives engaged on this matter must take quarters down town tonight so as to be at the Sheriffs office in the morning by 5:30 A.M. We will have to take these men right out of their beds as the train in order to expedite matters must leave at 7:00 A.M. or otherwise would be delayed at cheyenne.

Thergere I wired you today through our Mr. Hopkins the following in cipher:

Well Governor have overcome all difficulties. Will get Waldran. Neville being looked after. Cant hold three suspects. Will take them in tomorrow morning. Train will leave for Wheeling with suspects, Mills four deputies in charge General Wells tomorrow morning seven o ${ }^{\text {t clock. Ail arrangements with railroad completed. }}$ Tiger left for Wheeling lest evening. Considered then
course best from legal stand point."
As strafed in my report of yesterday it is absolutely imposable for us to hold these men any longer. We had to take too many into our confidence in this matter and it, would be only a day or so until there would be a leak and then we would lose all.


I received your latter of the 15 th inst. and while we will try to get the book in question would say we find we have no authority to search or confiscate any of the property of these men except such as might be found on their persons. I will have their clothing thoroughly searahed.

Circulars were in the hands of the printer three days ago, and I presume they are being distributed at the present time.

Since writing the above through our Mr. Hopkins I receeived your telegram which reads as follows:
"Iyron in full acoord with sentiment expressed by bear in your letter feels there is danger in delay. Hopes to see guick action. Finis."
I am very much pleased that you take this view of it as it is the only rational view to be taken at this time as explained in the forepart of this report, and we could not get around to the arrest any sooner than tomorrow morning.

After writing the above I received information by telephone from our operative at Montrose who was trying to locate Adams to the effect that Adams was at Haines, Oregon, under his own name, steve Adams. Thereupon I wired our Mr. Hopkins in cipher as follows:
"Inform Jyon Fox it Helnes, Oregon, under proder name. Suggest Lyon order arrest charging fugitive from Idaho. Send Thiele formard to Haines at once. Have Jyon eet out papers of extradition, deliver same to Nichols. Finis."
This is the best news I have received yet. We will arrest adams at the same time that we arrest the parties here, and after Adams' orrest I will then see what can be done with St. John, Carpenter and others, but suppose that I must come up to Idaho rigitio away in order to break Adams down. As you will have al ready seon I hurried out wy lieport for the 17 th and placed apecial delivery stam on the same so thet you would reoeive it in advance of the arrival of the spooial train ciarrying the prisoners. However there was a great deal still to be done during the ovening of the 17 th as you are aware. At the time I finishod up the roport our plans had all been laid to make the arrests thig morning. We had guarded against a surprize and therefore had the Sher:iff with hia offiners and three sarriages in waiting all night, and also had cur shadown placed so thet they could be relieved and visiter by Ass't Supta. Pretitymin and Londoner, and also Capt. Howard of our for os.

It will be seon that it was nesessary for us to do all this for about 8 F.la. Moyer took his arip-aack and mrooceded to the Union Depot wher me took the Deadwood sloeper which lays on this trank during the night as the train does not start until 1:30 A.t.. ouah mornine. There is no doubt in my mind but Moyer was about to nsike jis esape and the others would have followed poesibly on Sunday. The operative in ediately telephoned our office and we had Deputy sheriff Delue etfect the arrest of Moyer. Unfortinately for us there was a big throng at the depot at that time as that was about the tine that , he evining traing leave. However, we fot him safely into the County Jail.

Now this chansed our plans entirely. On the arrest of Moyer we had to arrest Haywood ind Pettibone as quiok as yoseible and take them to the County Jail. Our ahadow had Haywcod in i rociainer house on fifteenth Sti., while other operetives had taken Pettibone to his home on Evans St. Havins the Sheriff's officers at our somand we arrested Haywood in this rooming house; he was stark naked and in jed Fith a woman notwithstandine the fact that he has a wife and onid living hore in Denver. The deputy gheriffs secured a huge revolver titat he had laying on the dressint, ouse in the room where he was arrested. Moyer also had a very large gun in his possession. Pettibone add Haywood had often cleisugd they would nevor be arrested ulive, however we subsequently securbathe arrest of Pettibone without munh trouble. About 11:00 F.W. Mr. Hawkins of the firm of Patterson, Riohardeon end Hewkine telophoned to the county jail and inquired if Moyer, Heywood and Pettibone were there. Jailer Duffy repliod that thoy were not. From this it -ill be seen that the Therife aerried out his instructions to the letters

As the raportars ware riooking around the jail wo oonoluded that the best thing to do was to have the Sheriff turn trese prisoners over to Mr. Mills, your agent from Idaho, about 2 A.M. The dally papers then had all gonc to press and no reporters wore around. This was done and the prisoners werc removed to the Oxford Hotel, just a fem yards from the Union jopot, three rooms having been procured for then where they were properly guarded until they were taken to the traina I had tried to get the apeoial train to atart at $2 \mathrm{~A} . \mathrm{N}_{\mathrm{a}}$. but as they had made up tine gooial gonedule for $6 \mathrm{~A} . \mathrm{hi}_{\mathrm{g}}$. it could not be done. However, the train was roady at 6 A.M. with the prisoners aboard.

During saturday I had made arrangements for provisioning the train, and not knowing what might happen enroute $I$ had fumished two daya' provisions for nine people, the three prisoners, $\operatorname{Hr}$, lidils, the four guards and Gen. Wells, making in all nine. As ve could not arrange to have coffee on the train $I$ had three oases of beer packed in a barrel, knowing very well that Gen. Vells would aee to it that no person eot enough beer to infure him. I also furnished the car with a box of cigars. The guards including Mr. Mllis and Gen. Wells as vell as all of our offioiala had been up all night, and at 6 A.M. we got the prisoners away sefoly, there being nobody around the dopor. We had saved an hour by starting the train from the union depot instead of Fortioth Strét.

The Chief Diapatoher of the Union Paoifio at Denver acscompanied the train in 3upt. Stenger's apeaial oar. The Chief pispataner of the Hyominis jiviaion aooompanios the train to Green Rivor in inis mame apeaial aar and wr. Stenger had made arrangements for the Onief Dispatohor or sone other offigial of the Orogon short Line to misat the train at Oreon River and take it throuch. No attention will be paid to any writ that any aheriff mirint present on the way. However the onanging of onkinas and areve will not be done at the diviaion points but at telegraph atations, and the train waie to prooesd through (heyonne, where the United states Marshal lives, at the rate of thijty miles an hour. These arraneomenta I vhink have been carried out beaause at about three o'slook I receivod a telephone ressage to the effeot that the spocial had pabsed Rawlins at $2: 16$ Podi. Now this is the most remarkeble run on reoord when you take into oonsideration the high grades the t this tiain had pasged at this time and the elow time that is mado olimbing Athol $H 111$ and subsequently Sherman Hill. Yinen I reoejved this tel ephone message I rested easy, as I then renlized rhioh you yill readily see that overy plan that $I$ had lay ed from my arrivel on Jan. loth up to dute had carried without a hitoh, and that overy promige thet I had nede to you about being able to control the authorities heref in Colorado had bean carriad out.

The only thing that I regret is the fact that, Sun Vood, Gov. koDonald's private secretary who is an old newspather man formerly in the onjiloy of the Denver Republioan, fot from somebody an inkliny of whet was joing on, and while lis roports in the Rovublioan are simply mad up, novertheless it is fivinf me a preat deal of bother, but with the number of people that I had to take into my onfid on oe here in fenver


I think you will agre with me that we have done very well to carry matters to the point whion means auocess as we have done.

Last evoning I received your telegram through Mr. Hopicing which reads as follows:

Upon recelpt your tirst message Lyon left for Showhone. Will wire him return immediately.
Thiele Houston return tonight."
Hevinus arranged that even night messages would be delivered to us knowines that wo would be at our offioe all night, at i:30 A.M. we recelved your nitht message which reade as follows:

Myon returned Cougar away Robins and Thiele go formard tonsght. Lyon wants you wire him resulta in rorning."

John who wae then et lurko, thore da littile doubt in my mind but that fox talked over with et. John the worf he had been aetailed on, and $1 f$ Fox 18 arrested as I expect he will be, if our information lis ripht and ho oonfesses as we expect re wili do, then we oun try Vinoent. $-8$ I immediately comunicated with the Weatern Union Telegraph Compeny's offlce to see whether the telegram I had sent lir. Hopkins had been delayed or not, and they informed me that there had been no delay at thils end of the iline, and subsequentiy informed me that the telegrem had been delivered, therefore I did not reply to your telegram. At E.P.M. I reaeived your telegram through Mr. Hopkins whioh reads as follows:

\section*{Wrifiele Baker City. Fox Soorpion not at Kaines. parties answoring desoription loft Haines for Horthpowdor; operative following. Lyon wired Sheriff Lrown Baker City oooperate reliable under Tiger'g advice Coyote ordered arrested. Lyon oonsratulates you, suys splendid work."}

I thank you very wuoh ror the oompliment contained in this telegram. I have instructed Mr. Cary, our Superintendent of the Denvor offise, to see to it that you are furnished with nevapaper ollppings froik the Denver papes on this netter. There is no doubt but Orohard will carry out your anstructions in the matter of standine pat, but they certiandy mist know that we have direot information in ome wey. 1 understana that litr. Riohardson of the firia of Pettersen, Richardson \& Hawkins vill loave this ovening ror Hoise.

I am very glad to learn that the prisoners arrived safely; the only thing I regret is the fact that I was not able to send some of our own men on the train but as my reports will already nav is whom to you that I acted under the advice of Chief Justice Gabber ard isooft Justice Goddard they olatmad the Agency and myself tire of too much importance the present time to get into any trouble with either United states or county officials enroute to boise. mise replies to your letters of the $18 t h$ and $17 \mathrm{th}_{\mathrm{g}}$ also of the ISth inst.

Since telegraphing you as above i have disawered that there are so many iftite things to be attended to here at Denver inge it would simply be impossible for me to leave tomorrow morning, there fore I wired Mr. Hopkins as follows:
 morning. Operative arrived here with Neville this morning.
You see there are leakages all around and I have given a Ifttie something to the prese in order to assure the pubito that we will convict all parties now under arrest and others that will be arrested. I have instructed our Mr. Cary her to forward newspaper clippings to you frow our Denver papers. chic vil bo attended to ch AB. Again reverting to the arrest of Adam you cannot imagine hon good
I falt to get this information, althoxg we vere woll sebiafled that our Danver operative wan on the right trail, still a man like Adams if' apprised of what was going on might have made his get-away.
It was minee meiting the above that I received a telephonie message to the affect that the opepative mocieeded in getiting the oonsent of 4 ys. Neville to take her boy out of Cripple Creetr for the prosent. The boy is earming mix clollare por wook working; in an assaying office learning assaying, and we must pay his mother the amount of money that he would oarn and keop him until such tide gis we use him as a witness and until all anger is past. The oont of taking care of this boy will be paid by Gen. Felis. I knew that the fact that we have proventied the assassingt ion of this boy will bo good neve to you, and indead it is very pleasing to our friende here in Denver. It is just pessible that those maxderers have reoeived suoh a jolt thet they might leave the boy unharmed, but he is too muoh of a menace to Moyer and Haywood to be allowed to 1ive.

He went over the trip from Cripple Creak with his father and orohard to thormopolin, also the arrest of his father at Thermopolis from which point he was taken to Cripple Creek, and the boy don't know whether he got a trial or not, hovever he was mbsequently disohargel. He stated that on hin father being dimonarged at Oripple Creek, thut he and his fathir came to Demer and atopped in Denver about four or five days. On one ocomeion he visitod the headquarters of the Veaturn Yederalion of Miners, at in the outside room for a fow momente and then was taken into the room were thore wore two stenographers working and his father vas taken into another room. He maid he thought the man who was in there was Moyer but his rathor did not cay so, but he aubwequentily saw this man oa the atroot and two men whom he did not know said that was Moyer. Ho said when his father want into the inser room the door was olosed and his father was cloaeted with this man, whom he thinke wes Moyor, for quite long while, anc finally the door was openod and the boy went in. H1s father thon took hie hat and sald he would go. He dows not know what convenravion thoy had there, nor did his father over tell him wat was talked over in the inner room, nor dic his father over say to him that he expeoted to get some mozoy from Moyer or tell him whet his real businiss was up at thit office. They subsequently wont to Thermopolie onif got the team, retarged to Denver and sold ths team. Then his father went to Coldifelde and he went to Cripple Creek to his mother. I asgurel him that hie father had never ommattod any orime but owing to the fact thet he kopt a saloon where these men hung out he was oognizant of their orimos and therefore how they vanted to put him out of the may. Our operative'a reporte on this matter will show what is said about Neville's death.

Governor Goodinf arrived in Boise this forenoon, an called at my room in company with Warden Whitney of the Penitentiary; and Mr. Huxley subsequently called, and we had a lone conferences.

The Governor suggested that he would give out to the public throuth the prese that Orchard had mede a confession, and would also state to the public that he had withdraw the reward that he had offered for the arrest and conviction of the murderers of ExdCoverncir Stemenberg, as it was umecesmayy to have this reward outertunding at the present time. This is something that will help the prosecution as one cannot go froir house lo house and tell people that the Pinkerton Agency never operates for rewards.

The Governor being very uneasy at rot hearing any thing further from Denver in the matter of $r$. Moore's conference with Governor "Donald, at his request I wired "r. Cary aE follows:

Mia "wore get favorable reply from Governor Vionald? When will he leave for Boise, quick action important. Answer."

In the evening :'r. liawley called at my room, an cubegently Governor loo vine arrived with a statement for the presa relative to Orchard havin confessed, which will be pullishou ir full in the morning papers.

As I had received a letter from $r$. Cary outed the 23 rd , in which he st ted he would not ac i on the telegram sent hin by the Governor throw Tr. hopkins until he heard further from me, at the Governor's reyneat I wired "r. Cary as follows: \{in cipher

Tetter received. Why i you not telegraph me you would
not obey telegram sent you ry Hopkins. See Wells again and try to fret the promise we want from Governor donald. It is dill-important. If core has left Denver have governor c:on ld wire hire her , care of Governor boding the promise astrid for. Rush this work. Lust have hadean a witness bot? in Colorado and Idaho."

If r. "core hat hot succeeded in rotting the promise from Governor "cionicld that the State of Colorado would not prosecute Adams providing that he became state s. witrase I will take the matter up with Adams tomorrow, and I think I will succeed in get tine confession from him.

I am very much pleased that the governor has given this statement to the prese, as a greet many people have believed rirhtalong that the Agency ia working for the reward, and this statement I think will have the effect of putting a quietus on Captain Swan.

The Governor informe me that Thompson, seorstary of the *ine Owners Associstion or deputy meriff, I don't know which, is here from Cripple Croek and wanta a full copy of Orchard 'a confeseion, which fe will not get. He aays he wants it for Shoriff liell of Cripple Creek; and that is somethine that Sheriff Bell will not get at the present time, nor anybody else, sare those interented in the prosecution.

As I had been made aware by Operative No. 9 that Adars smoked continuously I had provided myself with a pocket full of cigars, and I never maw cigars disappear so fast in my lifo as they io on monday, Tuesday and Wecinesday during my conversations with Adams.

In the evening i held a conference with Governor hooding ara: Mr. Hawley and detailed to therm in a concise manner what Adams ha o confessed to. I mas subsequently called upon by Sheriff Nichols of caldwell, who subpooneed me to appear before the (rand. fry the following day, Thursday "arch list.

1 have nothing of particular importance to report today, as I have been confined to wy room mont of the tire on account of having contracted a very bed cold and have ton very low people.

Relative to L. J. Simpkine, I received a litter from Mr. W. B. Ohandloris of Mull in, Idaho, which reade es follows:
"I wish to drop you a line in regard to Jack Limpkins" wherebouts, and hope to give you a clue that will cause his arrest if possible. As you probably know, ho has a timber claim on the upper. St. Joe river, and a positive he is in hiding in some of the cabins now vacant in the vicinity of Huckleberry Mountain, above "ia Meadows, near Warble Creek; and I do not think it would be much trouble to locate him if your men go in after him in the proper way. Officers From this district have made several trips in after him but have made the mistake of goiter by way of St. Joe and fica Meadows where limpkins has a number of friends who warn him by taking a short cut over the mountain from Price's camp, and fe has plenty of time to get farther back in the mountains wherehe could camp till the coast is clear again. I spent several months in that district t year ago lest sumer, and knew Singkins well. At that time he had a sidekicker with him, and both wert always seen together hunting, fishing and chasing back and Forth from his aubin to price' ${ }^{\circ}$, where he made his headquarters. Ed.Bouly at that time told me and other that thee e two men were wanted in Colorado, and that he could implicate tier in the depot blow-up, and said ho intended to blow on them. Several days afterwards his was found shot to death in the trail, and a few months later "only's partner, Tyler, was also found a short distance from there, mere he had been clubbed to death and hidden in the brush. Simpkins is well acquainted with these mounttaine, and have an id he will sta: in the vicinity of Marble Creek till the snow goes off, and then make h. way north to B 。C. He elway gets his supplies at Pr ace', an probably make trips back and forth on a trail of him 0 mm . The best way to locate and catch him unawares would be to po by way of Santa on the Moscow trail, which ends several miles above his claim, and were his friends would not be apt to get ire and warn him. It is there for you, and can be easily taken if your men $c$ ans stand the trip over
several feet of snow and take proanution not to let his Priends and pals know of their coming. This concerns me in no way, only I know Simpkins to bo a bad man, and I would like to fee you get him: Don't conncot my nome in any way as do not care to form the diapleature of his friends around here, and eapecially him.
I replied to this letter as follow:
"I bea to acknowledge yours of March 4th, and thank you very kindy for the same. We are ware th ati Simpking has a claim in the district you refer to, but if he is thare it would be a very difficult matter to locate him at the prosent time. Howeror, there is one thocasand dollars reward offored by Governor Góoding for his arrest or information that wruld load to his arront; and I think that when the aprine opens up if he attempta to leave the place where you mppose he is located somebody will kive him up for the reward; and if he should remain after mprinf op ans up he could be esily cupture However, inall take this matter up with Governor Gooding and coide by whatever decision he makes on the matter. Again thanking you for your information, I remain, dtc."

It would take a great deal of trouble to effect the arreat of Simpkina in the locslity mentioned by Chandler at the present time, iven if he is there. In fact, I would not suggest 'the undertakine; of it until the conditions are euch that a posse could scour thet part of the country without using snowehoes.

Fhckingham of the Ortyon Short Tine Railroad, and General Pasgenger Aseint Burlay, who arriyed here on a special car in company witi Mr. Stubba, the ceneral Trat'fic Manaper of the fiarriman Syatem. Both Mr. Buckingham and Yr. Burley congratulated me on the food work that has been done, in the Steunenber matter.

Owinf to a mi take, first, in the sheriff or prosecuting attorney rot notifyin the warden of the penitentiary in time, the prisoners were not broutht or taken up to Caldwell in the mornin to be arreigned, or rather to lead to the indictments, Then, when they were broupht up in the afternoon, court had adjoumed. Therefore they will be arraigned tomorrow morning.

It is very unfortunate that St. John his not been iniicted, but from what I can learn Swain, of the Thiel detective agency who had forced himself on the Grand Jury went before that body and testified that he had St.John uncer survelllance for the past year, and that he was not out of the city of Burke duriner that time. I do not know how ruch Swain was paid for this; however his positive testimony prevented un indictrent beinf found acgainst St. John. We are well awari that we coul not convict St.Johr on the Steunenberf matter, but could have held him until we had used Adams as a witness and then removè̀ him to Colorado an ; prosecuted him for the murders he committed in Telluride. As St.John was at Wallace, Idaho, twice in conference with Orchard durinf last sumer you can see as to the truthfulness of Swain's tastimony. When he swears St.John was not outside of the Jity of Burke, proviline that my infomation is correct as to what he swore to before the Gran: Jury. Gay inf rot this information I wire.i lir. There is no doubt but boyer would confess, but the State does not want any confession from him. Richardson was afraid that so lone as the prisoners were at the penitentiary I might have a chance to mproach oyer unknown to either him or his associate counsel, or even to heywood and Pettibone. If we wanted to approach ? Foyer at Caldwell it could not be very easily done without the knowledge of Pettihone and Heywood at least.

Touring the evening I held a conference with Governor Coding and 7 r " "awley relative the case and more especially the natter of the writ of habues corpus in St. John's case. It looks to me ass though - Judge Stuart will be compelled to grant this writ. However, Mr. Hawley is prepared for this, and St. John will immediately be rearrested. Owing to the severe storms prevailing in the last it is very probable that Sheriff Rutan will not arrive in Boise until after Judge Stuart has rendered his decision which will be 10:00 A.'. tomorrow.

Today in Boise, after lunch, in company with Fanion jitney I took a carriage to the penitentiary, where I had a long interview with Orchard, who meed to be very much pleased to most we and informed me that he had felt rather uneasy on being informed that: I had contracted a bad cold that he and Stove Adars had discuses this miter both claiming that it would be a very bad thing for them if anything should happen to me. I told Orchard that he would have to me to caldwell tomorrow morning in order to be arraigned on the ind ictment found by the Grand Jury and prepared him for the sene. Fie said that some time before the trial come up he would like Mr. Hawley and myself to go over his confession with him that there were a er ami, many thing that he would want to explain which would be of great essistanoa to Mr. Hawley in conducting his examination and prosecution. I told him the this had been discussed by Mr. Harley and myself but there pes no particular hurry in taking this matter up; and furthermore, Mr. Hawley had been very buy in connection with the habeias corpus proceedings.

Ravine closed my conference with Orchard, I had the Warden bring in Steve Adams. He was very much pleased to meet me and mated, as Orchard had done, that he and Orchard had talked of my having caught a bad cold, and both had hoped that nothing serious would result from the same, as they thought it would be a bud thing for them if soy thing happened me at the present time.

I took up the matter of the location of Barney's body, and he drain informer me that it would be utterly impossible for ham to describe where they put this body, an excel ty the beet, of luck it wool tile him personally a couple or three hours to locate this body. te said however he watisfled he could locate it, but it was impossible for him to describe just where they put it. He said the time he was out riding with foily-the-bum when fe, ot the latter to indicate where the body of Carney was locate that he and Felly met General Rulkeley wells frons inti Telluride, an he would not be

surprised byt Mr. Wells might be able to remember that fact, kut he might not be able to do so.

As we are going to take up the five bottles of Pettibone dope or leal-fire plantied at Pocatello in a short time I todk this mattar up with him. The defondante' counmel made no opposition to the extradition papers feelinp that St. Jom had a better friend in Judge Theron Sovens of Telluride, who for St.John's benefit and the others indicted in Telluride in 1902' took ocoamion at ton o' clock P. M. to qyanh the indictments so that $8 t$.John and his friende could leese \%elluride before being re-arreated on information

With this report I inclose copy of a letter written by Wim. yeywod t.o James Kerman, now in charge of the Weatern Federation headquarters at Denver dated harch 3rd; also copy of Kerwan's reply, dated Harch 8th. The feywood letter was turned over to me by Warden' Witney to be copied before it was sent out. The Kerwan lettier was also turned over to me by Warden Whitney to be copied before it was turned over to Heywood. On March l3th Governor Goocing received a telegram from
1..J. Robincon at Oaklay", Idaho, which reads an follows:

We ere holding man andering desoription of L.J. ©impkine; wind officer who an identify him at onoe."
"I replied to Mr. Robinson in Governor Gooding's naras as follows:
"Simpkins' description is followe: Age, forty; hoipht, five foet eight or nine; might, hundred and eighty; build, has.y, thiok chestei, slightly atop ahouldored; eyem, blue with docided cast, hifty clance; very peculiar look nosé large, slightly orooked, teath, large; prominent upper front teeth; hair, dark; mustade, heavy, dark and tamy. May be mooth facod. Complexion, mediun. If he answers this doacription wire me.

I also wrote Mr. Robinson inclosins copy of our circular in regark to Simpkins. On March 14 th Mr. Robinson wired Governor Gooding as followe:

Man anewers deacription perfectly except weight, one hundred seventy-two looks worn and jadedi admitted when arrested that he was simpkins; denied leter; adrits having been to Coeur $d^{\circ}$ Alene and Caldwell. Jeft Colorado three yeers ago."
This telograr havint been referred to me I telegraphed Mr. Ibbinson in 'overnor Gooding's name as follow:

- Circular and photograph mailed you yesterday; after receiving spae if still of same opinion hold man, wire me, and I will send officer.

On March: l6th Mr. Robinson telearaphed Governor Gooding as followe:
We have had Pinkerton ${ }^{\circ}$ s photo and description of Simpkins all along. We think we have the right man, await your inetructions.

In the absence of Governor fooding this telegram was referrad to me. I found there was no person here thet could identify Simpkine excepting Harry Orchard, Steve Ademe or Mrs. Steve Adams. On account of Mrs. Steve Adams háving a three months ald beby and also a littlei boy about seven years old to take care of she could not be made available on
account of the fact thet she would heve to atage at least twentyfive or thirty miles and the weather was vary cold. orchard being so mil knom on the rijilroads it would be impractioable to take him cut there; and if we took steve hdans and found that the man under arrest was Simpkins would have the two primonera on our hand and a Iong stage Arive to get the train. I cormunicatod with Kr. Hawloy on this subject and ho advised that, if the man under arreat was, nof Singkin, or rather, if he wat brought here by the deputs ahefiff and propd not to be simpkink there mas no caume for a dawage suit. This being the cave I consulted with Shoriff Nichols of Canon County, who was here in Denver; and last evening ment Operativo No. 9 with Shoriff Nichols to Canon County. Tomorrow No. 9 and a deputy sheriff ith a proper warrant will proceed to Oakley, Idahe. Therefore I wired Mr. Robinson in the name of Governor Coodine as follows:

## Officers leave tomorrow mornine; hold man pendins their arrival.

I found out diring the ofening that the nows of this man's arrest had been furnished the Associated Prese by somebody from Oaklay. The newspaper roparters talked to me on the subject, und itold them I had heard there was somebody arrested but di nct' know whether the party arrested was Simpkins or not.

Wile the man under arrest may be Simpkins, still it looks very dubious to me, except that simpkine really wanted to be arrested and turn state ${ }^{\circ}$ ey eqdonoe. There is no telling whtt a fugitive might do. However, the matter will be cleared up now as the deputy sheriff ard Operative No. 9 will fetch this man into Boise whore he can ke identified by Orchard Adams and Mrs. Adams if necosaary.

Maven roa: in tho papers that a bomb ha been found ir the Coour a' Alone river at Wallaoe and thinking that this bomb minht be the liomb that was fires manifacturud in Denver for the parpose of killine Governor Peabody, and Eubsequently carried to Wallede by Orchard and Fiven te the man Cunningham, as statel in Orchard ${ }^{\circ}$ confeseion, and subsequently taken fromonninghas by the proprietor of the Eimetallic Totel, who digposed of tine asine in a way that Orchard inew nothing about, I wrot: Sheriff Southerland at Wailace as follows:

This was as much information as I deemed prudent to give Sheriff Soutiorland relative to this bomb. It may possibly be that we will subseguently have Sheriff Southerland core here to Boise with the bomb $t s$ drchard Gan eadily idenfify it providing that it is the axme bond that the gave to Cunninghem reforred to in his own confossion. In discussing this matter with Orchard last evening he ataied thet the place where the bomb was found according to the papers, was right near the beck window of the Bimetallic Hotel, heire it was evidently thrown out of the Findow; and no doubt it is what; is known as the Pembody bomb, referred to in his confession.

Nothing of particular importance han occurred today in the matter except that motions made by the define to quant the indictments against Moyer, Heywood and Pottibone on account of an alleged congiliacy between Governor Coding, Mr. Hawley, Mr. Bowman and yyacli and Foreman Hos of the Grand Jury were denied. The statement of the dafonse on Friday relative to this matter was proven to be absolute ely false.

In the evening Governor Coding and Warden Whitney of the penitentiary called at ray room, and the Governor telephoned for Mr. Hawley. The day that Orchard had been taken to Caldwell to be arraigned, in order to show sympathizers of the mon men under surest that the State was prepared for any emergency, the Governor ordered the ezuardes to gary winchester rifles for the purpose of protecting Orchard. Mr. Hawley had informed me that he had arranged with Mr. Rice, a lawyer in Caldwell to act as Orchard's lawyer, hut wen Orchard wa an ied into court there was nc lawyer, and when he was arraxald he expected Mr. Rice to be present, but he was not sins the Court had to appoint a lawyer for him. Orchard, like all of us, has concluded that if Mayor, Heywood and Pettibune are kat in Caldwell they will break jail. The lawyer that wa m appointed to defend Orchard, as it ware, did not seam to understand his bus ines but took Orchard into the aneroom anteroom and told him what it meant to plead guilty and what it meant to plead not guilty etc, what the penalty would be and all the sort of thing instead of simply entering a plea of not guilty. Warden Whitney had to take the laver aside and tell him what he should do in the matter. Now this tended to make Orchard morose. He came to the conclusion the I had forsaken him, and that the prisoners would escape from jail and he would be left alone in the trial. The Warden with the best intertins had changed his cell during the day in order that he would be better protected from any attack from the outside of the penitentiary. and Orchard thought that everything denoted that he would simply be the only one prosecuted. Therefore, on Friday he would not tat or talk and acted in a very peculiar manner. He would not even talk with Adams. However, Mrs. Adams had a conference with her husband, who stated that Orchard had told him that he wan going to commit' suicicle and that he had the means to do it with. This naturally excited Adams who is very fond of Orchard, and Mrs. Adams told the warden ${ }^{\circ}$. il fe on Saturday evening. Governor Coding, the Warden and myself took a hack saturday night and went to the penitentiary, where I had a lone talk with Orchard in private. He informed that he had not got any poison on his person but he had concluded that ho had been forsaken and was going to get the worst of it and had concluded that he would take the crystal out of his watch and chew it up and do away with rimself. I showed Orchard how the whole thing west a mistake, and that the winchester that the guards carried were not for the purpose of preventing him from making his escape. as we knew he would not atterget to escape.

Further referring to the bomb that was found in the bour d' Alone River, would say that in discussing this matter with an expert on explosives he informed mo that Dynamite, after a certain tire, would orystalize and the breaking of one of these crystals ky the slightest jar would cause an explosion, and the only af safe way by which a bomb such as you have in your possession could be taken care of would be to kop it continually frozen, af after you had had it frozen propoorly to take the powder out of the case and extract the nitroplycorine by mans of hot water, then the powder and cape could be placed in the ouse and would be' perfectly hamnleas.

In the matter in question I satisfied that we will subsequently hive to ute this bomb, as if we are right is home what wade about "lay lin or the early part of June 1005 an. the reason why I am making ti ese letters confidential is that in th discovery of this bomb a valuable piece of evidence has been discoverer and wi be fulsequently used. Therefore won respectfully request that the bomb be ta r roper car of.

I was engaged all day with ratters pertaining to the above case, Mr. Hawley being engaged a portion of the day at Caldwell where Judge Smith denied the different applications made by Attorriey Richardson to quash the indictments against Moyor, Heywood and Pettibone, and also denied the application for basil and informed Mr. Richardson that he was point to separate the prisoners, by sending one to Washington County, one remaining in Canon County, and the third sent tic Ada County, of which Boise is the county seat; the prisoners could either accept that or go back to the penitentiary. Ar. Richardson opposed the sending of the prisoners to the penituntiary and made a lone plea asking the Court to alow oyer to remain in Caldwell. Judge smith thought differently though and ordered Mover taken to the County Jail of Ada County. Terefore "eyer was placed in the county jail here in Base this evening.

During the afternoon Vr . Talley and vo. Borah were present in the United States District Court where Judge Beatty denied the writ of habeas corpus for Lover, Meywol and Pettibono, assimine very fine loge reason a for doing the same.

In the evening I hold a conference with the Governor and Mr. Tawle in ry room, and it has been determined that after a few days I arc to call on eyer with a view to breaking him down. of course I have very little confidence that I will succeed but I do not set; wherein it will do any harm for me to try to do it.

-In reply to yours of March 16 th, relative to a bomb that was found by the landlord of the Bimetiallic Hotel in October, 1905 , I made search of the register of the hotel mentioned, and find there was registered there from September 12th, 1905 , to September 18th, 1905 the following porsonis Cunninghas, sinepkins and MoQuay. This man McQuay is ovidently the MoClusky of whom you spear in your letter, to far I have been unable to leam where Mogiay and Cunningharc came from as il knew it would be folly to try to get anythine from the landlord, who was in charge of the hotel at thet time and is till in charge, as he is one of the mame kind. However I feel confident that I will be able to gain some information in a short time, and sheil leave nothizg unturned. I also wish to tate that I had the powder removed from the bomb found here, as I deemed it best under the circumstances: while everything in connection with it is perfectly intact and can be roplaced \}ust as it was. I thourht thers mipht be some sensitive explosive hidden from view, hence my object for opening it. I will be in Boise in a short time and would be glad to meat you.

I was very much pleased to get this letter, as from the tatements made by Orchard and Adams this bomb was very dangerous. As the evening papers showthat Mr. Sutherland has been wounded while serving a writ of restitution I wrote him as follows:

The evening paper hare in Boise informs us that you were wounded while zerving a writeon some party in Wallace. I repret very much to learn this, and wish to take the opportunity of extending to you my sympathy, and hope that your wounds are not serious. I al 80 ber leave to acknowledge receipt of your letter of March 20th. It relieved ma very much to learn tnat you had taken the powder out of the bomb. The case will be just as good evidence as though the powder were in the same being that you oun testify to the fact of what the case coatsined. When you visit Boise would like that in a quiat way you fetch this bomb down with you. There is no doubt but we know all about this bomb, and that the same oan be idontif jed by cortain partios here; in fact. by parties implicated in the Steunenberg murder. This you will keop
strictly confidential. The Governor feele very bad over the fuct that you are wounded, but like mymelf, hopes that it is nothing serious. In casie you aro not coming down to Boise again in the neer future will. you kindly write me, when you eriseble to, desoribing the bomb. Also oxmine the case closely to soe if there are any initials on the zame. Hoping you mill koap this matter confidential, and that you are recoverting frore your wounda, I remain, Yours, etc.

The Mr. Fulderson was to pet a copy of the synopsis that I had written up Pron Mr. Hopkins and give the same to the associated Press. Now, the object of riving this to the Associated Press was simply tins: We will not h. utile to use this mather in the trials of oyer, Heywood and Pettibone for the murder of Ex-Gov. Steunenberg except that the defense makes a mistake, which they are not likely to do in this case; and as the trades and labor assemblies and other union g have been pase inf resolutions condemning the action of icvermor coding of Idaho and Governor Mollonald of Colorado in the mat tor of extraditing these men, we wished to show to the public the class of men the labor organizations were trying to represent as prod citizens.

Gooding，Warden Whitney of the penitentiary，Tharcas H．Hunter，rep－ resentative of the Denver Post，Harry Crane of the Idaho Daily Statesman， operative Thiele，Traveling Chard Rube Robins of the penitentiary， and Steve Adams，on route to Pocatello for the purpose of locating the building where Adams claimed to have buried the tin can containing the five bottles of hellfire or Pettibone Dope which was riven to him by Noyer and Heywood in September 1903，for the pix pose of burning up trains passing through Pocatello carrying non－union men from the Dour d Alone district to Cripple Creek，an recovering the came．

Ne arrived at Pocatello about 12：30 P．N．as the train was a little late．Nothing of import nance transpired during the trip．On arriving there Warden Whitney and Operative Thiels started with Adam to locate the old building whore he claimed the can was buried．During their absence the Governor Mr．Hunter and Mr．Crane and I had lunch． I should state in advance that the Governor had pot some good citizens of Pocatello to be present wile we would try to uncover there ex－ plosives．Warden Whitney，Operative Thieltand Adams were quite a long lime trying to locate the building，and indeed it was a very hard matter to do from the fact that the building，which had formerly been an old mill，had been recoded and covered wit corrugated iron and sail closed up，whereas at，the time Adams buried these explosives in September＂， 1903 ，the building was vacant uni the front an rear ends were taken out and nothing remained but just a skeleton of the clad mill．However，Adams succeeded in locating this building；，which is now occupied as a stable by the Wester Timber Company，and pro－ cured a key from Mr．Wester＇s foreman，went inside，went inside and showed what he thought was the exact spot where he buried there explosives．They then returned to the hotel and subsequertiy pot lunch，when we proceeded to the building and started to search For the tin can containing the explosives．Fr．Wester and his forarcan helped．Alums，Operative Thiele and the Warden worked very hardin in fact，the Governor assisted in the search．Coming on about five o clock they discovered a in lass stopper which Adams declared was ones of tres stoppers used in one of the bottles，and the stopper smelled of the explosive．You will remember that Adams in his confession sui that the explosive smelled so bad that he had to take it out of his reorg at the place where he lodged in Pocatello．Mr．Wester，also his forerar，Glen Doodin，remembered see ins the remains of the old valise that Adams claimed to have torn up and thrown in the forward part of the all hailing after he haw then en the can out of the valise and buried it．After inscovering the stopper Pr．Wester went outside and fetched in an olid can．He said they hal thrown out a foot deal of rubhis at the time the remoded the building and made it into a stable．In the bot to of the old can was a substance that had been thor ouzhiy turned and scorched．Where，Adams saw the can he declared that the ctn in which the five bott les of explosives were placed mas identical？wit the can found，althengt the can had been dented as

We placed the can and the eubstance that was found in the botto" of it in a valise "hat we had there providing the explosives were found and worked until dark, not discoverine any other evidence of the explosivas.

Aftir dinner at the hotel the Governor startod on the train going west and said that he was going to stop off at his ranch. As we hat had no sleep the previous night we all vent to bed early in the Pacific hotel, prepared to maka a more thorouft search the noxt day.

I forget juat the dates but think it was the $24 t^{2}$ of seperber (See Opt. ihielo's report on this) 1903. Furthermores fich described this man Ward, which was a aplondia description of Adam, an stated that wile Mard was stop inf there he had tol: him (Rich) that he worked in a butcher shop at one time in Kansas lity. On questioninf Adares wiscovered that he did work in this tutcher shop, and he remestere that he had sola this to Rich at thet time when he stopped at t. f: Supeer House.

While workint in the burn durinte the forenoon Chief-of-Police Sribh of Pocatello called ana I feund him to be a very nice, quiet, ur isenminy raidile aged pentleman. In the course of our convaramtion U. Sitr proferred his services if required, ana it looked tis me as tough he meant what hasaid. He paveme a foci history of his lifi, in which he informed me he was amons the first apirentices that ever erved their time as maninist in the Tnion Pacific shops ir 1866 at Ormhe. Hu had worked for the Union Pacific Railrosi for a preat many years, ant had at times been mater mechanic in thir ifferent shops, even worked for there in the ir shops at Golden, Colo., before they wert remend to jenvar aftar thes Union Pacitic ac: the colora o fentral, which now is a portion ot try colorac o southern. He ha been syoriff of inghain ounty, Idaho an hai held several other of ices of trist. He informed me that he mas pretty well fized financia iy, n i, not seel lis present position hut it was tondered to rim, a ", "i practically piven un wark for some youra." in sjacking of the remant: of the ol vaise used by Adams, he statad that he saw a voricr of 1 hat walise, an described it, and there is no doubt in my mini hat he tojs the truth. litalso tolis're that he had eume
reoollaction of a fire that took place down there some time acio probahly a yoar or so ago, but he coula not remember dietinctly fuit how that matter oripinated, but he would make inquiries durint: the clay. In fact, he suid he would devote his time to trying to unravel this matter as he had concluded that Adame had told the truth and that it was very unfortunate that we could not find the axplosives. He informed me that the best frien he had was Mif. Ford, cashier of the Bannock Sounty National Bank, and that Mr. Ford hai informed him that he was a personal frieni of mine, which was a fact, as I have known Mr. Ford for some years. I made an appointment with hira for him to be at the hotel et two o' clock, when he would brine Mr. Ford up to see me, as he know I had been very budy and did not care to travel arcund much. J.A. MoConkey their father, asid he hoard of this at the time and had spoken about it to McNichols and Wright, who kept a saloon in Pocatello. McNichols and a deputy sheriff had been over to the buiddint in the morning when we weris working there, but McNichols nover asid a word about what MoConkay had told him.

As I was going back to Roise tonight I arranged with Operative Thiele to reme in over and he and the Chief of Police and the foconkey boys would try to discover as to whe ther the remains of any of the bottles were around the building and also see Hank Shefer and some others that saw this fire. The Chief informed me that McConkey and his roys were very rospectable poople and there was no doubt kut thay were tellinp the truth.

At 8: 00 P.M. Warden Whitney Guard Robins, Adarys and I took the train at Pocatello. The Chief was there and had brought a man nemed J.F. Byrd, who lives at 1055 South Second street Pocatello. Byrd sta.ted that he boupht some of the timberm that remained in this mill from Mr. Woeter, and he thought it was in the fall of 1904 that he was taking out some of the timbers and discovered this cun contetining the toltied in question. The cun ans ita contents smelled so ofensively that he threw some ashes that had been left there over where the old timber was taken out on the can and let it lie there in the trench. The Thief informed me that Byrd was a man to be $\neq r$ elied upon mit was a son-in-law of old man cionkey. Byrd said thet he would trink the matter over and andi covld possjibly five further information to the Thief the followine day.

As I had already consulted with Mr. hawley on this metter I toll him that the case of the kom? was sufficient eviclonce and therefore it would be unnecessary to place the powder in the bomb as ther woul not aidnit a charged homb into court as evidance. He said that a man known as friday, in whor he hat gonsilerable confidence, and wo is member of the Westrin Federation of "iners, informed'him a short timesince whet he rad ben at liarriacn, a town located on Coour d' Alene take, ant that he there met froticer Federation man who told him that hes haia seen Simpkins on arct and; that Simpkins is encamped somewtere ir the timber around the Doeur d' Alene Jike and has three men witt him. While Shorirff Sutherlan is a very cunrareoub man an has beon sheritit of Shoshone County in Idaho, whict includes the Coour "' Alene mining district, for thres terme, he said to locate Simokine in this timber at pressent, would be a very aangerous matter, but he will have to gist out of there sooner or later, and as he is well known somebody will rive him ur. He is watchine and has men on the look-out for Simpkins. Sutherlan is not a blow-hard but a man that is cool, deliberate, and in my opinicn, thorouehly reliable. He informe me that Bradjey, who keeps the Biretallic llctel where Simpkins, Orchard, Cunningham who ot the Peahady bomb frorf Orchard, and the man riferred to by Orchar as YcCluskey, stopped in September, 1905, is ore of the worst dynamiters in the Coeur' 'A Afene district; and while he has not nerve enciurh to comit an notrage himelf he tries to impress on the pulblic thet he is

Boise, Sunday April 3, 1906.
Today I put in most of my time with Sheriff Sutherland, during which he informed me that he had had a desire for many years to reet me and ho had no other busineas in comine down to Boise at the present time oxcept for the purpose of meetine me and having a fow hours general talk with me. He had also brought his ife down, who wanted to see me as woll. She is a very nice lady. There appeared in the Idaho paily Statesman this morninf an intarviev with capt. Swain of the Thiel agency in which Swain stated that Sheriff Sutherland and his wife ware here in Boise stoppine at the Idahho Hotel as his guests. I referred to the fact that Swin in his interview gave it out that he (Sutherland) and wife were Swain's gueste, to which Sheriff Sutherland replied, Not on your life. In the past I have been-very friendly with Capt. Swain. He has partially lived in Wallace and \#ardner for the kast three years, but from what I have learned lately I have a very different opinion of Capt. Swain to what iformerly had. In point of fact, I have diecovered that he is very cureleas about tollinfr the truth; and I arr not his puest or his associste ky any means, and the only object I had in comine, down here was to meet you.' Iike all good citizens of the Coelur d'Alene district, Sherief Sutherland would like that somethine would turn up that would implicate Fx-Preaident Royse of the Weatern Federation as wall as Dave Costes, ex-Lieut Governor of Colorado, who is at present rurininf \& socialist newspaper in Wallace. I told him that 80 far we hed nothing to implicate these people at the present time. He then refered to the newapaper publication woovt the kidnappine of Aupust Palulson's children, or rather, the contemplated kidnap ving. He said the publication of this ratter in the newepapers was sorethine thet gave him a great deal of uneasiness as he mifht be accused of givine this to the papers, which was not a fact. He said most people that knew him were well aware thet he was close mouthed (and I believe this to be true). He stated the " :overnor Gooding entrusted hirr with this secret and told him that he might, if he saw fit, take this matter up with hugust Pailacn in a confidential manner, whid he did. In relatinf this matter to Paulson, Panlson informed him that ho harl boen made awrere of all that he had sail some time eqo thronh Mr. Robertson of the law firm of Robertson, "iller and Rosenhaupt. Hobertson has always beien recopnized as the legal representative of the Western Federation of Miners in Spokane and a close friond of Simpkins. Robertson made it a point to meet Mr. Paulson some time after the newspapers hai writton up the fact that Simpkins was wanted for the stounenberg murder. Robertson said to Paulson, Now you are a rood friend of Sheriff

Sutherland?" To wich Paulson replied they were friendy but, he was not intimate with Mr. Sutherland. Robertson aid, Sutherland is now red hot after Sirepkins and may eventually get him. Now Bimpkins is not a bad fellow. This man Orchard with three others conapired last September to kidnap your two children and hold them for ransom an Simpkins stopped it, he claiming that you were a good citison and his friend and he would not have it done, and therefore it had been abandoned. Now if thia for this I want you to po to Su"herlend and tell him to let up jn trying to lodate and arrest Simpkine. Pron if he or somebody shoulid get Simpkins Sutherland knows how too let him escape. Suthorland went on to say that the fact of tho matter is thet Robertson, counsel for Simpkins, grave this ratter first; to the newspapers, and then when Paulson was interyiewed he (paulson) said that he had prot information in several ways that his children were tobe kitnapped. Newspaper reporters from Spotans ant all over came to him (Sutherland) to get a story ani he absolutely refused to say anything, so he wished tc impress me with the fact that he neper had fiven a worid to the newapapers upon this subject. and I believe him.

'rise, "onday April 2, 1906.
Today Gov. Dcoding, Mr. Hawley and Sheriff Sutherand and myself hold a conference in my room. The matter of tryine to capture Simpkins was discussed very fully, and Sheriff Sutherland foels hopeful that the two thonsand dollars reward offergi will eventually result in somebody rivint Simpkins up, and expressed himself again to the offect that sirpkins mas still in the timbers sorewhere around Coeur d' Alone Iake, hut at the present time it woul. be ingossikle to locate him, and in fact it would be a very danegerous undertaking. The dovernor stated to Sheriff Sutherland that when I discovered we had evidence enouph to hol. Simpkins for the Murder of Gov. Steunenberg, prior to Orchard's confession, knowins that Simpkins was being looked after by Swain, he had askod Swain to csuse Simpkinn's, arrent at my whereation; thet Swain linformed him (the Governor) that he could put his finfer on simpkins at any rinute, sc he instructor swain to make the arrest, Swain havins clsimed that Simpkins was in Spokane. That was on baniay evening. On "onday, Swa in faiting regortad the arrest of Simpins, I heis wired cur Spokane office tr find out. whether Simpkins was in Spokane or not an if \&c to have fim arrested, and shortly afterwarde fot a reply to the offect that Siopkins had left at 7:15 A. \% onday morning, ostensibly for lardnar, Ifaho. On receivine this telepram I kearnt satisfied tat simpkins hai made hie sacape and did not po to Fardner. Subsequently Goy. Cooding saw Swain, an: Swain claimed that he had vired Sheriff Suthorland to fo to Spokane and make the arrest as he coulc not depend on either the sheriff or police officers at Spokane. Mr. Sutherland was very much surprikei at the statement which the Gevernor made in reference to Swain raviner telegraphed him at all, and aaid, I wish to say to you that I never received a telegram fror. Swain on the subject. Swair simply lied to you. He neyer tel erraphed me at all and this is the first I ever heard of it." The Covernor an myself had always thought that Swain had made a great mistake in wirine Sheriff sutherland instead of the authorities at Epokane, but we never for a roment thour ht that he had deliberately lied in this matter. But taking into consideration what Orohard learnad throurh viller, who was actines as his attornoy evem after Orchard had made his confession, relative to the fact that he coula buy Swain for a little money, and that he had the Thiele Agency investigating nrchard's charactor in Denver, it now looks to me as thourt pr. Swain let simpkins oscape purposely, and that he was paid for the sarce. I do not think there is any doubt about it, an Bherif $f$

Sutherland stated to the Governor, Mr. Hawley and myaelf that there was as capalile a theriff in Spokane as there was in the State of Washington and that Capt. MoPhoe, chief of dotectives, und Detective MoDonald of Spokane, were good, efficiont officers. This winnow ourselves.

Manager James McFarland reports:
Boise, Tuesday April 3, 1906.
As Sheriff Sutherland was about to leave today I held a conference with him this morning, and he is going to exert himself to the wu utmost to try to effect the arrest of simpkins. Ko soy he has got a great many true friends that ares members of the Weatiorn Federation, un d he will do everything in his power to effect the arrest of simpking through those men.

I subequentiy went to the State louse and had some business with the Governor; end in the afternoon I went to the penitentiary to visit Orchard and Adams..

I first had Orchard cone into the private office of the
Warden. He may very $\&$ mia to see me, and thank is me for the letter that I had received frore Mra. Mack lin of Brighton, Northumberland County, Ontario, informing him of tho fact that hor husband had been dead for six or seven years and that Mrs. Albert T. Horseloy was still living there and had worked hard to support her child, and that there had been no trace of Albert E. Horseley from the time he loft Briphton in 1895 up to the present time; that the supposition wu s that he wont West but that was never properly confirmed. This wa m in answer to a letter that I had written moor the name of J.S. Mack and had called to Mrs. Mack lin, or rath or to Mr. Macklin, at Orchard's request. He said that while he mes very much plead to get this letter, however, when he rot it he felt pretty blue. Orchard cried bitiorly in discussing this matter. He se ia he had treated his wife shamefully and that Mrs. Simpson, the women that followed him to Detroit and subsequently to British Columbia, did so of her own notion, ant throws her he had forsaken his own wife; nevertheless, he utiachod no blame to her and said he himself was the only one to blame. He sadi ty had boon devoting hit tire to reading the bible and trying to reconcile himself to hood and akin formivemeas for his past deeds. I thinks that Orchard is a true ponetont, notwithstamina fill the crimes that to has commit ted, and notwithriandimu his weakness:, is no ta bad man at hurt and it he had fallen into food conquian fe would till be a food citizen.

I took up th: matter of the loiter that he had received from Warren of the Warren Drill Company on Blake street, Denver. He said that he had worked for a lone tire for Warren ansi he hud visited Warren al his house and oaten meals with him, find that Marron had propose edo put him on the row d selling these tools. He said Warren was a Western Federation Man but was a rood citizen and nevis suspected
that he (Orchard) would be oapable of committing a crime, just as he had ritton in his lettor. The lettor refirrred to wain a lettor writ.ton by Warren in which he stated that he had heard that the Or chard now under arrest wa the same orchard that woriked for him at Independence and Vindicator No. 2 , and if so he could not believe that he was capable of comertting a cold blooded murder except that he would stata to him in a letter that he wam the came man that had worked for him up to 1903 in Cripple Creok. Orohard asid this wan true.

In discuasing the metter of the attempted assassinetion of Frpd. Bradley in Gan Francisco Orchard ztated that a dar or two after the explosion he pisited the scene where the explosion took plece, and in talking with an Italian who kept s. little store acrosa the street, the Italian told Oraherd that the explosion was not brought about by a leak in the gace pipe but that somebody had thrawn a bomb againet the door of the place where Bradiey resided anc just oaught Bradley, as he was coming out. He aid, however, that the people in the neighborhood would not Iisten to this and therefore ho did not feel like talkine about it, but he kniew all about bombs and knew that thin oxplosion was caused by somebody throwine a bomb either at the building or at Bradley as he came out of the buildine. I have written a special report on this matter and sent it to Gen. Stept. Kamble at Sen Francisco.

I then took up the matter of the bomb found by Sheriff Sutherland. Orchar asked me if the description givem to me by Sutherland corremponded ith the description he gave of this bomb and I told him that it fitted exactly. He then went on to say that since Sheriff Sutherland, or rather, the fireman, had found this comb, he had atudied the matter over and, knowing the conditiona that exist up there, he would say that if the bomb hed been buried thrown into the river at the time that Bradley, the proprietor of the Dimetaljic Fotel had taken it fror Cunningham and McGluskey, it would now be buried in foot or two of tailings, therefore has impreseion was that Bradley, who almys wanted to represent himself as a very bed man, instead of throwing the homb away at the time he had taken it from: (Cunningham and his friend he simply hid it but got scared when he found that orchard had made a confexsion and that the authoritios wert after Simpkins, and ther fore took it out of its hidin place and threw it out in the river. This corresponded actly with the thoory that I had gotten from Shoriff Sutherland. I then wsised him if the to dozen inch and a half bolts were placed in the bomo with the powder. He no becanse the holte mipht pht to rubbing together and cause the dynamite to explode at any time. The bolts were imply tiod outside of the bomb so that wen the bomb would explode the boltis would be throm in every direction und dentroy everything they carne in contact with. Thet is the reason why the bolts were not discovered when the bomb was recovered aut of the river; they had been throw sume where else.

I then aske hin why had made such a bif; bomb, telling him that sutherland said the homb was bir enouph to blow uf the town of Vallace. He said the reason for makinc the bomb so big; was on account of the fact that when he returned from San Frincisio Noyer, Heywoot and Pettibone, more especially the latter, upbraided him for making such amall bomb, and said that if he had made the bomb bi.e onough and put in ten poinds of powder it would certainly have ki led Bradloy. He sain, however, that the case nas too mall to admit more than about six or semen pounds of powder, and they replied that he was a damn fool fer not havin made the pipe or case bipper so that i! would
hold the ten pound of powder so in making the bowb to kill Peabody he rade it largo onough to petify them.

The nempapors publishod for days ago that two bottles of opplontre matorial and a coil of fue had beon discoveral in spokane in the North Sfide of the town, newr where Simpkinn formerly restded. I took this matior up with Orchard, and Orchard stated that on leaving Lenver in 1905 on his miseion to asamainato Gov. Stounonberg, thinking he might stand in need of some hell fire, he purchased a soventy-five cent bottle of stick phosphorus and a twenty-five cont bottio of bisulphide of carbon; then in order to make the hell fire aill he had to io was to purchase the alchhol, bensine ani spirits of tirpentine. Ho maid as a matter of fact he dare not purchame all of thease ingredients at any drus store because they would know what it wolald be usod for, but that phosphorus and bisulphide of carbon art used by asmayers and could be purchased anywhere; but if the other ingrediants were purchssed at the same time any chemist would understanc what it was meant for. He had carried theee two bottles around with him on his trip up to the Sound and up to Wardner and Wailama, where he met Simpkina, and Simpkins knew that he had this stufi. should state here that on hia way up to Caldwell, in topjinfr over at Salt Jake he boupht a hundred feet of fuse, or what is known as a coil of fuse, thinking lie mipht have use for it. When Simpking and he came down to Caldwell to make the first attempt on Cov. Steunenberg's life, Simpkins went to Silver City, and on his return Orchard met hir st Caldwell as shown by his confossion. Simpkins stopped over and etcle the saddle referred to in Orchard's confession and in aidition to takinp the return portion of Orchard's ticket fror renver to Portlan and return, simpkins took the fuse and biotles of phosphorus and bisulphide of carbon, stating that he mifht want to make a littie hell fire; and as Simpking lived on the North Side of Spokane at that time there is no doubt but the two bottia found by some boys, also the fuse, up thore and now in the possession of the police a.t pockene are the same two bottles that he gave to simpkina. I will write Mr. Hasson about this matter.

In talking further with Orchard he told me that, Adaus had been implicated in some other matters in Cripple Oreek and Tellaride which he had fordotten to tell me about. He di.i not think that Adame meant to keop anything back but he hai simply forgotten it. Amons thes thines was the holdinge up of the electric railroad and robbing and beating some persons. He said he did not want me to nama these things to Adams at the present time, but to say to Adams at some other sime that I was aware these things had taken place and get him to rive me the full detaila of these matters so that the 1 wyers for the jrosecution would not meet with any surprised, as Pettibone, leywood tand "over knew all about what Adams had done. '1 his I will tiake ap with Adums or my noxt visit to the penitentiary.

I then called in Adams, and he, Orchurd ani myself had quite (H long talk. There ar sorie letters thatmight be important hidan in the shack that Adams and his wife lived ing whict is in sharge of Adars" uncle, ana also a meal ticket furnimed to him by Helwood, and a sawed-off shot gun, and irs. Alams hae written to Mr. Jillará, Adams' uncle, to brine these nown to oise. Adams informad me thet if his uncle dad not come down in short time ho would write him nimelf instruct ing him to brine these things dow. He seid it woul be dunperons to send Yrs. Adams up there as she wamomat Haines, also at Baker City, and was now possibly known at Nort! Powder, and if she went to their claim everybody woul: be on the watch for her comine out and woul probably trace her hore to fioise, and it is all-important that

we keep her under cover until these triale come up. I had talked this phase of the matter over with Governor Goodipe and he aspaed that Adams takes the ripht view of this mattor. It would simply mean for us to take Mrs. Adaras up there and get her out agein that whe would be trailed right through here to Boise. Both Orchard and Adars seemed to be in very food spirits when I left them, and Adams has been feeline pretty pood since corroborated his statereents relative to the explosives found at Pocatello.

Today I made an impentigation in order to discover who the little short fellow was thet wan diatributing copies of the appeal to reason and the Toledo Socialisti nempapers on ine streets in Boise. This little fellow approached me with one of the copies of one of these paper and I gave hirc to understand that I wal in no way a sympethizer with anirchiste, and I think he will remember whet I suid to $h$ im for some time. I find that his name is Bob Marah. He is an oid-timer, woll known through Idaho, and more ompeoially in Boise. whers he spends his wintere. He has got some mining claire in the northern part of the atate, is an theint, and for that matter an anarchist in his own way; neverthelems he is aircply coneidered a harmiess arank whom nobody pays any attention to.

Mr. J.H.Hawley callod et my room and handed me a lettor from S. Marletion, of which the followine is a copy:
"Yames H. Hawley, Esq. Denver, Colorado, April 1, 1906.
Roise, Idaho.
Your enteemed favor of the $28 t h$ resched me yestordey. Please pardon delay in replyiner to your former fevor. The deilay occurred for the reason that my brother who gave me the information from the roung lady suggested that she might resent aseming breach of har conf"idence, but I feel that and she have a duty highor than self and I venture, rearardless of consecluences, to five you the name of the young lady and I will try aind interview hor tomorrow and are her consent to ? ? the information at her comend.

Gertie Radcliff I don't know if married or a miss, at the stores of Mews. Daniels and isher, Denver, is the person. She roomed at the Burke Baock, I think' it is, opposite the St.James Hotel, in this city, iand on account of the well-lighted hall she often sat there readin at ovening and of ten as many as ifteon of the Iner's Union crown come there at a time; said it was a regular hot bed of unionima; that Pettibone was there every day or eveninss to eall on Harry Orchard; that she was then a mamber of some union ani had perhaps beon leas avoided on that account.

It semes that the house was operated by man and him wife and about the time the tri of the Inner Circle wers arrested the hus-bend left ienver, his wife still managine the house.

Parion me please, but. I really think hould one of your able detectives go there, discuised as miner from Telluride, and apply for medimopriced roon he would, in a short time be

almost sure to draw out the whereabouts of the hurbend and in addition many facta of vital irmortanoe to the prosboution. If a mion card conld be secired it might graatly help out. I foel sure that the place mas a mooting placd for the rank and file and that many private meotings were held thore, if in fact, the principal plots were not there formulated. The departure of the man of the hous just, as moon as the Moyer-Heywocd-Pettibone arrest was made surely mann something.

A decoy letter rigint be written to the woman from Tolluride askines if this miner was rooming there, otatincs that he wis much aousht by the authorities in connection with the crimes and asking that ahe warn him that the officers wers on his trail. In this ranner possibly a confidantial rolationship might be created ant the woman might scon talk, Possibly, should such or ancther plan be adopted, valuable points could be securad from the yompt lady by way of information to the detactive as to the habits and meetings of the union merabers at the house so he would feel at honse when talking with the worcan. It is not unlikely that other union men are still there and a shrewd detsctive mipht make a hit there. In case you shovid desire rey co-operation I shall be glad to do anything in miopower to assiat your representatime and introduces the liadcliff woman.

I di: not plan abandonment of the tip referred to herein but rather, for reasons stated, deferred it, thinkinf there was still time to spare. I are more than pleased with the thourht that I may be oven alibintly helpfinl toward the hanging of the brutal ganes. You surely deserye eredit for personally writing to develop this clue with the many calls upon your t, ime these bmsy dayis. You doubtless realize what it means to humanity shoul justice riscarry this tiree.

Apsin asking your pardon and prorcising ry fullest efforts to sussist you in the plorious cause, beliereme to be, fost sincerely yours (Signed) b.M.Carleton."

It appears that this man Carleton has been writing on several occarions to Mr. Hawley, and from the tone of his letters, although he joes not say so, he tries to creat the impression that he ise a brother of A. E. Carleton the Cripple Creek Nine Owner. It is my irmpression that this ietter is concocted by $0^{\circ} \mathrm{Neil}$ and l'irwan of the F'estern Faderation, and that Carleton is, whose name a pears in the Jeadville directory for 1904, is airply a tool, and the Radcliff woman, whom he claims he does not know whether she is a miss or a misses, is sore friend of Winnie finor, Heywood's sister-in-law. The letter is gotben up in ver: nice styla anil looks a food deal. like a decoy letter written for the purpose of feel inf out Mr. Hawley as to whether or not we are willing to accept testimony of this kind, which they would subsequently prove was forged. The down-stairs hall of the Brarke block is about four f'set by six feet in dimensions, and the upstairs hall is dark. Wren I come to think of it I believe that somebody from Telluride purchased the loase of this block sonie time ago. I have not seen Orchard on this subject, but I know that the meetings referred to as beinf held in the Buike Block between Moyer, Heywood, Pettibone, Orchard ani others never occurred. However, I will see to it trat Mr. Cary makes a careful investigation on thig matter and isscovers who the Radcliff woman is and wat is known of her. In my opinion you
will sind that she is an associate of Winnie Minor, Heywood's sister-in-1aw. The letter in quastion is writton up in very uice style, and is written in the amme form, with the mame type and on the same kind of paper as the letter recentily writton by Kirman, who in at prosent in charge of the Vestern Foderation headquarters in Denver, to Reywood here in the penitentiary at Boise.

## SPECIAL RAPDRI.

Boise, Vedneaday Auril 4, 1906.
Relative to this matter, on the 27th of Maron, during my absence in Pocatello, Supt. Cary of our Denver office wired me as follows:
-Sheriff Bell of Cripple Croek clains Simpkins is at Dorne Washington, near Index, under protection of Calahan, presiciont of local at that point."

As thare is no place named Borne in the State of Washinuton, and as, furthermore, as a rule information receiped from Sheriff Boli is not reliable, I made no reply to this telegram, untif $I$ would further investigate this matter:

I find there is a hamlot named Berne thirtymiles from index. or: the Areat Northern Railroad, but there is no post office there. There is a mininp camp nurced Borne that has a larpe local of the Wertern Federation of iners. This place is located in the Sumpter Djestrict, Baker County, Ore;ron, but is probably twc hundreadiriles or mare from Index. Mir. Cary who receives copy of this special report will try to obtain further information from Sheriff Bell as to how or fror whom the sheriff gots this informations at the sarce time inforning the gheriff as to the whereabouts of Eorne, ghowing him that it is not in the State of Washineton at all, and therefore some ristake must have been made. If we could get sorethinfr cefinite frorn Sreriff Bell we. richt be able to determine as to whether or not it was worth while to investigate this matter.

On karch 29 th I received the followin telegra. from Mr.
Cary:
-Jacor Fillius hes been retained by Colorado interest to gather evilence here for Hawley. Wells and I believe he should examine confessions at once to act intelligently. Is this satisfactory to you? Ploase answer quick. Irqortant."

Relative to this matter would may that after reading over Orchard's atatments to me taken down by Mr. Huebner under dato of January 27th, 28 th and 29th, 1906 I find that if orchard ia allowed to testify to certain parts of this tatement in the coming trials it will be noceavary to hewe these statemente corroborated at once othsarise the defonse misht induce the parties who could corroborate his etatemonts to contradict him. Therefore it becomes necessary to get tatementa from these parties: The following are copied of letters I have written today which not only oxplain themselvea but five the number of the pare in this part of Orchard $s$ confeseion so that it cen be easily referred to by the counsel for the prosecution. Tomorrow I will take up that portion of Orohard ${ }^{\circ}$ confossion which was written by Mr. Hopkins and if I see any thing in the mane that requires further dorroboration will attend to it in the same manner:

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#H.F.Cary, Esq..
    Supt., Denver.
Dear Sir:-As you are aware, immediately after the confession
of nrchard we dared not investigates certain matters to corro-
borate the same but the time has now arrived when we must get
these corroborations. Would sey that in investirseting such
matters as this letter containa you must imprese on the parties
called upon the necessity of keepin% these matters secret
and also try to find out whether or not they would me willing
to come to Caldwell, Idaho, and testify if so required. They
will get ten conts a mile one y and two dollars a day as
witness feen; and if we want s:me of these witnesses we may
possibly have to guarantee them something for their time as
well, but that will be a matter to be taken up after thay have been interviewed.
We find both from Orchard's and Adams's confossions that a large number of rifles were purchased from the Coorige Tritan Hardware Company from time to time by Mr. Pettibone. A number of these rifles were shipped to Thlluride duriny 1901 up to 1904. In the fall of \(1898^{\circ}\) or the sprine of 1899 Pettibone purchaed one hundred rifles from the Tritch Hardware Compgny and forwarded the same to the Comur do Alen district. This was before the blowing up of the Bunker Hill \& Sulliven mine on Hay 4; 1898. It is also claimed that Pettibono purchased
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rifles of the above company from time to time and forwanied them to Cripple Creek durinp 1903 and 1904. It is possible that neither Frank, George nor Fred Tritch would $11 k$ to pive any information on this metter, but would advise you to sees Prank Tritoh, take the mettor up with him and tell his it is a matter of Ereat importance to the prosecution of theme men to verify the ctatementis that had been made to the offect thet Pettibone purchased the riflem or fire arm, and it oortainly oan injure the company in no wey an thoy had a fipht to sell these lire arma and looked upon pettibone as a Denver merohant and not in any senae conneoted with the inner circle of the Fontern Federation of viners, as it ie now roven. If you oannot mets Frank Tritoh firnt then go to deorge. If his nefuses the information bee Fred Tritch. You need not say that the statements that we have relative to theas fire arrs beine solt to Pettibone were made by either Orchard or Adams.

Folld refer you to pages 47 and 48 of Orchard's confession writion by Mr. Huabner, wherein he spanke of the attemptod assasination of Sovernor Peabody. In rolating this he attos that one evening, I think in the sarly spring or sumer of 1904 while it ripht have been in the fall of 1904 or apring of 1905, that he carried a spade to use in digeins hole near the sidewalk near where ciov. Peabody lived to put the homb in and set it off as tiov. Peahody would be entering his resilionce. He was unable to do this on account of the fact that some partiex were watchinf; him und followed him. He wont around to where there is a freon house, eithor on logan or Pennsylvania Avenue, where he fropped the spade or set it down. It was weapped up in paper. Sombody must have found this epade, ant it is of the utmost importance to the prosecution to discover who foun it sind get their tatariont. Therefore this matter must be looked after very arefully, even if you have pot to put an aivertimercerit in the nownuace, whioh pau oan cio by wordiner it in such a way that woula not connect eithar the Agency or Orchard's confeseion with the same. In connection with this would say that the nipht that orchard dropped this apade a man wor he took to be an of icer had followe him up on Penneylvania Avenue, and ho took a shos et the officer or whoever it was. This man as riding bicycle. When Orchard was in Cenon City for the purpose of murdering (lov. Peabody he topped with e Mrs. Adams See pares 50 and 51, ame part of Oroherd ${ }^{\prime \prime}$ e confession). Durine the time he stopped with Mrs. Adurs he maie a trif to Chicapo and return with one wr. Vaughn, and subsequently he and Vaughn left Canor City Orchard leavin a suit. case which contained the bomb with Mrs. Adars, where it remeined up to the latter pert of Aufust or the carly part of Septomber 1905. At this time he went under the name of Thoms flogan. Mrs. Adams must be seon. She will remember this sujt case as she complainec. that it mas very heavy, and Orchard tol her it contained advertining matter. We mant to know from Mrs. Adams if she woul wate the trip to Caldwell.

John L. Stearns, general megent of the liutuel I, if Insurance Company at Donver, must be interviewed, as he geve Orchard, inder the naice of Thomas Hogan : contract to molicit life inaurance (sor pages 47, 48 an 49).

By referriny to Page 52 you will note that Orchard statea that alter bringiner this bomb from Danon City back to Derrer he buriad it in a manure pile by a stable betwen mivan and South 14 th itreets, near 13 th stroet, sbout No. 1300 or 1400 . It, is my inpression that the table reforrod to is momenhere or South 13 th or south 14 th treet betwan 13 th and 14 th avemues. I do not think it would be Erann, still it might, be. Howiver, you will note that he atetes the owner of the staible liven near Cheyenne atreet. It is possible that the owner lived nomewhere noar the old power houne on South 15 th treet. However. you have got orohard's picture, and he mas the one that rented the atable under the name of Thomas Flogan. The horese wan purchamed by Pottibone and Heywood, and the confesicin zhows that the horse was used on heveral occasions to carry Orchard and others while in the act of try ine to asamseirmte momobody. Wh I again see Orchard I will try to get him to desoribe the location of this table more definitely, but, I am airaid he cannot do it as $I$ quentioned him closely on it twice.

In the matter of the killinf of Walley in the racant. lot near Colfax avenue, you must procure somobody that aaw Welley start acreas the lot an heara the oxplosion and knows that Walley mas blown to piecos. The filea of the nowspapers in Denver at that time will possibly frive the name of somebely that you can interview and fet their consent to come to Galdwell if necessary. The trial will come off either the latitor part of May or the first of June.

In the matter of the murder of Tyte Grepory (parees 33 and 35) Orchard ay that Grepory was playine cards in a asloon, he thinks, on Curtis etreet, but it is my impresemion it is on Santa Fe Avenue; and it was after loaving this saloon that oregory was aseassinated. The files of the newspapaze in Denver at thet time will showezactly whare aregory wae playing carde, will rive the name of the saloon keeper etc. and he must be interviewei and the same yuestions put to him ex you will put to other partios that yov interview relative to coriner to Caldwell if require as antness.

By roferrinf to $P$ arre 40 you will note that when orcirard und John "eville and the lutter"e little loy arrived in Cheyenne they called on a saloon kaeper named Pat Noran. Horan was an old acquaintance of Pettibones. Orctaru thinks has know Potitibones in rontana. Orchard mave foran ton collaris to carry a letter to Demer to Pottibone. This oren aid. The letter wes a request for five hundred dolars. Moran retirned with the five handred aollars an heinded the same to orcinard. but Orchard does not think thet Moran knew whet the packspe continined. The first, dey that Orchard und Heville traveled out of Cheyenne ther camped at Crow Creek. Moran an WiF. Devis cane up to Crow Creek an fished all dey beside where they were camped. F. Fayis was in Oheyonne andaround Koranie saloon for a day or two prior to Orchard and Nevillo starting on their trip to Thermopolis. evis wantod Orchard to go to California with hir. It will be nocossary to soe Moran, draw his attention to this fact and show him that know that ho carried this letter and theit Orchard, who was goines hy the name of Hogan, gawt hir ton dull art to oarry this message to Pettibone. Say to moran that he is wanter ae witnome. He will
recoive ton ounte aile one my and two dollers a day as witneas foes, and any othar little expences that he miphti be put to in thim matter, and show him that it cannot make eny alfference to him now as the fact is well known that while he may have been en innocent party ho did carry the lotter to Pettibone and al so carried the geokage back to Orohari.

The operative detailed to intarsion these partion must be a man of good tact, and this matior is of muoh importanoe that an assintant muperintapiont worm you can seloct should be detailod to do this work, with the oxception of locatime the stable.

Wo want thin matter takon up at onoe and full repprts made on the ame; and every offort in your powor muat be used to induce the parties interviewed to consent to corve to Caldwell as witnesses provided they are manted.

On puges $24,25,26$ and 27 you will note where Orohard rofors to the attenpted wrook of the Floronce o Crippla Sreak train, and the furthor faot that when he learned of ind bontraplated wreck he told Conductor Jones, whe directed hin to eeo Special fgent scott, and wile he tola Jones that there was to be sore trouble on the road and told Scott about the same thine he di: not give thern any factis in the case. But absequently Soott got him transportation to Jenver and eccompanied hire to penver In order that he (Prchard) would woe Geongt Fasterly, the moratary of the locs. 1 union at Bull Hill, who had pon's to Pyeklo to visit Hokinney who wee under arreit for this attempted wrack, and learn from Eatarly when he arrived at Denver what Kor inney had to my. MoXinney and Foister mere the partias that, Sherman Parker had hired to wrook this train. I think you are familiar with this matior but would suggest that you write a lottor to Soctt askine hire to corre down to Denver, and hawe a confidential talk with him on this subject. But you must impress on soott that this matter. must bo kept strictly secret, and ask him to teite eractly what transpired between hirn and Orohard and to beprepared to cone to Caldwell if he is wanted. You oen casily larn what Jones knowa on this subject, but if not scott cman find out for yous what Tones knowm and let you know, hut you must impress on $\$$ oott that hemst kegp this matter to hirself, not telline it to either Sheriff Eell or Floyd Thorapmon, or suybody ti as. we do not wish it to get into the rewspepers."

[^5]Iind Barrett, he will cortainly romember him. In this wey you mikht 1 ind throuch Barton and Bariott where Orahard roomed ind sose the landlady of that rooming house, and in talkine with theme ren, if possible wet there to consent to co to (lenldwall as witnesess providiny they are wanted. We do not know whether 1. will want them or not but mint Orchard's etatoment, corroborated. Now it is sery important that this investigation is rade at an early a date as possible. Orohard duriny his atay in seattle oalled on several real eatato men but he has forrotton their names or where they were looated. His objeot in olling on the real estate men was for the purpose of purchasine a farm with a weter front and plonty of timber, whore furitives of the Wentern Federation could hide with safety, an thit mas one of the main thinge that Pettibone. Moyer and Heywood wanted to met - a piece of land that was thickly timbered, with a good water front - und when a member of the western F'ederation Conmitted a orime he wouid imenediately proceed to this farm and if the axthorities got trace of him he would make his escape by water. Parton and Barrett riftht possibly locste some of the real estate men that Orchard oalled upon. You will bear in mind that Orchard's name was Howan when in Seattle.

Bear Sir:- In probaris confeseion on Page No. 41 (in partwritten ly Huebner) Orchard tells of bising detailed to to to SanPranciscc in the simmer of 1504 for the purpese of aseasininating Fred Brailey, mankerer of the Bunker. Hill \& Sullivan Min*i that on arrivine in San Francisco he mapistered at the Rolden Went Hotel eiticr under the name of Thoma ogan or Thores Dorapsey. I think it maf Dempsoy. However, Potidbone, who sifned his name an Wolf forwarded orchard a refistered letter containinp a hundred dollars. As Orchard was not aware from whom the rerieterei letter wes sent; he was unable to gett this money or letter; therefore he call is on Peter I. Hoff, necretiary of the Bar Tencers 'Union, No. 211 Taylor treet, "and thraugh loff was able to get this reristerelil letter. He did not know loff but simply rot his nare out of the uirectory and told his that he one of the deported merl fror Cripple Breor and a union man, ani Hoff fot hirr the refistered letter containing the money. Hoff went to the ost office, and when they asked him where this man bempsey was Hoffeala he a trayojimeman and was at Stcckton, California, at that tiree, so the leiter was formarded to Stockton. Orchard then wrote to tho pgatmaetor at stockton to formerd the wheter to hoffis adurean on thylor street, and throum Hopf he got the money. I think that y thi time Orchari will remember the axact name he rerimbined under at the folien Pest liotel at-the time that jek. You will. understand that heIfft the Colden Wont hictel at the time that John Nevill mas urcested at Therropolis ana took up his quar'ters in a private houge, where he remained up until \&fter' the attompted assesn ination of Bradley. Wouli like you wouly locato licff, call upon hi: uni draw is attention to this incident an fet a mtatement from hirn. It may bs possible thit off beine anion man woul coree to calawoll ant tostify, but at the sama lime we want a statement fror rim, ana will take our chances in tryim to uth hir to cores to Caldwall when tre triel
 ho would cothe if wanted,

Dear Sir:- You rill remember that in Orchard'a confession in the ruatter of the murder of Ex-Gov. Steunenberg, on pese 6, that he stated that before leaving spokane with Simpkine on route to Caldwell in September 1905, Simpkins purchamed a. ten pound box of dynamite at the tors of Holly, Mason \& Markn; that he carried this dymamite or gisnt powder into the office or Robertaon, Miller and Rosenhaupt, and in the elevator they met Millar, who amked Simpkins what he had in the box, and he replied, dynamite by God. ${ }^{2}$

I winf you to take this matter up at once with bolly, vason
is Marks, an use every ondeavor io di\&cover if they heve any record of the ale of this ton pound box of dynarite, or if they 0 an remember whors they soli it to, or if any of the isroployes or clorks in the store knew this man Simpkins. You can use simpkins'a photograph with and without the whisker. I kndw that it may bo hari to identify Simpkins and Orchard as purchasine this tan pound box of powier, an still you may be fortunate enoupi to pet a proper identification. Ihis Inveatigation qust be made ver: carefully.

On the paje Orchard states that he had chected a. trink throuph fror lailace to Harrison on the O.R.ix N. and was froine to re-oheok it' throu, t. to cone across the lake ani up the electric line to spokane. He egave the chack to the purser on a tearmoat of the Red Collar Iine. This may not be the oxact nares of the line, but it is somethin like that. The tmunk did not come throweh to apokene for four or five days. Ha went to Harriscn and saw his irung at the depot and discovered that they had not riven hir the proper aplicat. check. He explained this to the bugkag man and the bagrage man's request he openod the trunk and showed hirr that the trunk was his. Through Robertson, illior \& Rosontaupt le ut in a claim for twenty-five dollars, which the company subsequently peid. "i ler wat to have one half of whet he recoverad aund claimed that ho sent the other tweive and a hailf to Pottibone ${ }^{\circ}$ place at 1634 Court Place in Denver for Orchard. You muet. investigate this mativer so as to corroborate orchard ${ }^{\circ}$ s statement. I think this is a matter that will be easily investigated. (Fe the full names of the purties whon you interview, more especially such parties as could be used as witruesses at Caldwell when the trial corres up. It is all-irportant that we intestigate fully loti: of the shove matters, inn see that it is ione at as early a date as posmible, and report fully on the sare. I do not think at this tiree that we should ask these parties if they would be uilline to core to Caldwell as witnesses as I trink they certainly ill ac so if reguired. However, if the operative doing this work fets tho information we want on this subjoct and finds that tho partien talk ireoly he mikht indidentajly romark that they rioht bo mantod as witnesses at Caldwell durin these trisle."

Dear Sir:-While Orchard was in Wallace in company with sirpkins in September 1905, a jewelry peddier named feorge E. Scott wanted to get some woonlight minine stock. Orchard purchasod fro‥ Fred stroun, a brother of Lewis Stroun five shares of this stock for Mr. Scott, on which he made twonty-fire dollers cormission. (I am not sure whether this nares Strouu is properiy spelled or not). As a matter of corroboration of Orchard ${ }^{\circ}$ etatoment mould like you to investigate this matter, as I prosyme you are acquainted with this stroun brothers, and find out if such a transaction took plase; but in making this investigation kindly koep it as quiet as possible and do nat let it get. to the nowapapers.

As you are trare, we wouls like to pot a tatement from Bradey the proprietor of the Bimetallic Hotel relative to the bomb wioh you have in your posmesion. Since meting you and learninf the true character of this man Brajey I have fiven the mattor of getting a statement from him a 1000 i deal of atudy; and it hes occurred to me that ou mipht havesorne confidential frioni in Wellaoe who is apparently on good term: with Bradley. If so you mirht hare him approach Bradiey in a aecret mannar and say to Bradley as a friend that he hiad discoyered throygh a certain channel that the bomb found in the river, now in your possession, was formerly in Bradley "s poseession; thist somebody had riven you the information to the offect that Bradley, Cunningham and othere had this bomb in Bradioy's hotel last September and intended to blow up certain properties in Wallace; that in adidition to this homb they had some two cozen of inch and a half holte which they had tied to the homp und would have hlow up the town had its not bean for Mra. Bradley, who prevented it $f_{i}$ that in some way you rot at these factis, and in the near futur it is possible that Brailey mipht be arrested un convicted. Now, this friond must toll Bradiey that he rot it throuph a friend that you had told it to confidentially.

Relative to the inch and a half holta wich I refer to, this if fact as when the borb, was rad to kill cov. Peabody, at the sues estion of Pettibone oyer, uni Heywood he grot these bolts, an they were to be used by tieine ther a round the bomb so that when the homi oxploded they woula scatter all over and blow the front out of Gov. Pealiody' e hase at Canon City; thourt, we learned they were never in the bomb neither were agy cape over placei in the borab. Thie I lemed fro orchard a few deys aro.

Proviline you consider it wise to edopt this plan, which is morely a sujuasicn on my part, ans if you have the rifht man to a roach Prauley, he will know that this is truet, ard as all men like him are cowardsat heart he will be ver minch excited, and wil probubly tell the whole tale. Then thise man thoul. sufe est to Bradey that he tell you wou are beine risled ly whoever is fivins yon the informion, ario from what he has learned you are of to opinion that bradiey is in wit trese people. In that way we might get a staton:ont fro" Pradey, or it may be that you comla aiot some other plan equally us pood, but I cannot seot wherein we could end a
stranper to Wallace who coul get this staterent fror Bradey. "r. "bwley, the Covernor and mysolf consider that it would be of erreat importance if we could get Brailey to make a statemont as to how he came in possession of this bomb to corroborate what Orchard has toli abont it; ani we know that Orchard has teld the trexth.

This lettor, as you will see is confidential, an: I want you to think the matter over wri kindy write me if you can act on my suggestion, but if you have got another auprestion to ronke whereby we could get a statement fro: Bradioy would alec lise to have you write ine in regari to the mane.

In connection with this matter, orchard informe that whife St.Jobn introduced this man maninfher to Simpkins and him(Orchard) he subsecuently leamed or understood Irous st. John that his rict name wis not hannifuchere, rut iid not find out fror St.John what Dunninghan' richt name wis. Hes also underatood that the rear he was introduced to aE KeClusky was called by scree other name, lut he did not fet that name. orchird atated that when he first care to Frallace he stopped it the
 depot. McClusky and bunningham also s to ped at that rooming houses. Ona rornint, while he was ajosent dicclusky and Cunning ham out open his prip un abstracteid some of the revolvers and some other articles from the frip. Bofore they made their uscaje he had come bace to the rooning: house and compelled tiom to retarn the revolyers and whatever they took out of the krip. Tt saya the lanilady will rexsmber this trinsaction vary well. I thouret it rifhi be for you to cull upon tris moman un: tako this matter wo with her an fin: out ak to wether or not she remembers anythine aiout the cutcin open of orchard's erip. I do not know whetrer she knevi Orchar or not, but he was stopiner there, but Orchard thinks she will remember him all ripht from the cutting up of his frip anck. Orchara said het in hie opinion this womin weull rember allabcia the row he $h_{\text {fo }}$ with these two men. Ho ulso said that those men worked for 'ierry ciee, bomewhere up the canon about treme miles from Wallace. Ht mays everybo knows lerry cilee as ies is an cld-timer. Possibly yout will dist some infometion fro this ran Ierry ochee but Orchar uoubts it ver ruah. I siraply ive Fori these facts tu ase as you wes fit."

Dear Sir:- In the sumer of 1904 after the murder of I'yler, or possibly it might hare been Boulet, who was killed some time after Tyler, simpkins claimed that the sheriff from Vallaci met him over in the neighborhood where Boulet and Tyler were killed and he talked with the sheriff. Noy I would like to know if you want over there, or any of your feputies, and talked with Simpking on that occamon; and if mo, was thore anyboiy else present except Simpkinm? 'his is only hesramy, rut if it is a fact that you or any of your deputies vent over in that neiphborhood and mav Simpkins at that tinie it mifht become wory important, and if you saw anyhody e].se associatine with simpkins at that time it would also be of importance.

Some time ago I saw that a man named Price who kept a store up there had been arrested for one of these murciers. Would like to find out what yon know ahout this arrest, or if such an arrest took place.

In Septomber or $i$ it might hame been October, 1905, while Orchard was in Wallace Simpkins received one hundred clullare from Heywood or Pettibone I don't know which. This money was to be paid to orchard, and. was aubsequently turned over to him, kut unfortunately Orchard does not know whether the money was sent by a draft, post offjo o rder express money order or telegram. If it was a telegram the telegrar mas liable to be sipned by "Pat Bone". In fact. Pat Bone ja the alias that Pettibone as a rule used in sendins money 1,0 one of their han y men.

A stranger in Wallace could rake $n$ little headway in makine an investigation of this kind, and it has occujred to me that probably you would be in a position to learn through the telerraph operators, the express agent, po atmanter or bank somothime about this tranmaction. I know this is asking a food deal of you but I alao know that you would go the limit to assist in this matter.

Hoping you will give this imediate attontion and let me know the result, I romain, "

Dear Sir:-'On page lo. 1 of Adams' $\varepsilon$ atatement relative to the murder of Iyte Gregory he stated that while at the last esloon where Gregory stopped while or his way home the nigeht of the murder durine the time that, Grerory was playing cards he (Adars) called and bourtht a bottils of beer. As hame was a metranger, and considerirue the fact that Grercory was killed that night, the saloon keeper oupht to remember this transaction. Ndam further etates that when Grepory left the saloon on his may home somebody anding in the saloon door aslled to Gregory seying, You are goink in the wrong direction. It wili be vary important to pet the party that made this remavek to Crectory. Whoever it man, neither Adares, Orchard nor elville know him. The saloon keeper may enlischten you on this matier.

On Page No.l of Adams's statement on the nurder of Arthur Collins Adams states that Arthur Baston, V. E. Eaxt, grly and he (Adams) tock cne lniy Stark, who was either superintendent or foreman of Vinicutor No. 2 , out and beat him up sorerely. This would be either in 1900 or 1901. We wish you to investigate this matter, and if Stark is atill in Cripple Croek he can be used an witness, and if not, locate sorce parison who will remomber the tire that Stark was anaultod.

At another time (Ciannot give the dato) Adarns, W. Eastarly and Sherman Parker pot a man nared Jack Robinson in the Findlay shaft and almost beat him to death. We want tol locate Jack Robinson or somebory that can testify that Robinion was beaten in or alout that time.

Adams tates that some ti in 1903 he and Slire Sampoll atterrptad to blow up the lectric lisht and power plant at Colorado surings. I want yon to not only get the date that thim at tempt man made rut the nan:e of cbieeperson in authority connectad with the power plant that will testify to the fact thet the attempt made.

Adurs further etates that lid winster and himbsl: shortcironited the olectric wires of the United States Reanction a Refininer Company's plant. liat I believe was some tires in 1903. Woulu like to pret soine person in authority connected witr tris company who can tontify to the dates ans the fact th:at an atterpt wis made to shorit-circuit the wires curryins electric current to the company's mill ani racinction worke, and in fact, that the attempt was succossful.

On Pape No. 27 of Adams's statement taken down by " $r$. Huebnor he etates that inile in benver, 6 ither in 1903 or 1904 he was arrestad for attemptine to steal a bicycle un tor the name of S. W. lizon or S. W. ijckson. He is not sure how his nurge was spellod. He cannot ive anywere near the date that this occurred but I may be able to refresh his mercory wher I sets hire tomorrow. He was kopt in iail for editht days befor: ha could notify Pettihone rut on notifyine Pettibone the latter went on is bond for fifty ;ollars, whether it was a casi: bond or not Adars is not sure. llowever, he was relensed wni wubstiquently ischarged. I want the records of the police depart. mest exarined fro 1403 up to May 1905, ant get the nuree of ull patties to this arrest, givins the names of sici partios as conl testify on trie subject. You will see how importiant this matter is in showin" the prood standine thai Adams had with pettitone.

We ouxht to be able to get id full record of his errest end con-fiction ani have the game certified to.

Dear :ir:- Adam in orie of his statements statos that Ed. "inater ani himeslf were detailed to wotackson, California, where there was a strike, some tire in the sumerer of 1903, or in the early fall of the same year. fir. Fred D. Bradley was connectai with bome of the properties involvea in this tronle. I think sone of the propertios were loseted near Caloma, or sorc muct name. However, the properties involved in this troulde are in the vicinity of Jackson. Shortly after they went there the strike was pettiled. Each was armed with two molvers (No.3t Colte), und if the strike continued they mext to wo killine: However, the metter being settied, nothin was done in the way of committinf any outrage. Woul like you wouli make a little inquiry at the orfice of r. Bradey and fins out what they know about this, strike. 'This is wanted a confirmation of Adame's ataterrent, und it mipht possibly be thut we might huse to have someliody core bere as in witness to tesiffy that sinch strike took :lace, lut that will bes a matter to bu; looked into afterwards."

I lave instructed 180.9 tr: leave on the $4: 00$ A. . train tomorrow rorning for Dpien to investipate the ataternent made ry Adams relative to the tine that he arrested in company with inst $r$ in 1903 at that point, wher ein Detoctive Mason of opden at the requtst of Adams wirts feywood for seventy-five ollars, wiol leywood subsequently sent, to Alars, un D Detactive fason ifientified Adams at the exprese office where he not the money. There is no oubt but what Adarstagio only in th:is case but in te"otber cases is trae, but the point is to met the corroboration.
fin, there aro ia nuber of tinge l have fot to take up wil ioth of ther, an wil ... sc tororrow. The wenver office has et a great many matters to investipate, an. I hope Pary will rittend to this as experitiousif as poseible.

Todey I went to the penitentiary, where I hed a long oonference ith Orchard and Anen. A for days ago on reading orar the confension of orchard which he had reviued and arorn to I found that the part where orchard atated that after he had placed the eatchel hion was attached to the boub planted in the peth more Judge Gabbert pained to go to the State Houm, and when he found that there was no explosion he returned and disconnected the satahel and carried it amey was scretched out. I took this matter up with (Orchard todey In the presonce of Addim, and in reply to my questions orighard teted that ho roumberedidiatinctly mains that zatement to me but it was not true, that he pever'returned aftor the atchol or visited the spot until after the explosion. At other times provious to this explosion when he saw Judege Gabbert mtart to aroms the lot and found that other persons were either comink from Colfax Avenue ar coming right behind Judge Gabbert from Emer ion treet he had alwiay detaged ind the matchei and took it away with hirn but boing so sure that cabbort wan goinf to aross the lot upon the day in guestion he did not detach the atchel. Howover, he told Pettibone heywood and Mcyer that he had detached this matchel as they would heve cencured hin for his carelessness if they had know that he did not detach it. It was atated at the time in the newppapers and I believe sukeequently reported by Mr. Cary, that the man Walloy that was killed. Whe en by somebody lo stoop just before the explosion, so the fact that the sitchel was still in place accounts for Walley otopping to pick up the satohel, wich drew the cork out of the bottle or turned the windiess and caused the explosion. I have written Mr. Cary on this mater today. It is all-important that fond the party that sew Welley toop down before the exilosion.

Orchara further statod todey that the night prior to this explosion he planted this second bomb, and hile doing so man came across the path. The man aare on hin so suddenty that Orcherd did not obenrve him until he was ripht beaide him; then Orchard foírad that he mes drunk. The man spoke to him bui Orchard lay with his face to the ground pretenines that he way druak and said he would be all right ina littie while, and the man passed on. It is very ingportant that this man be found.

In reforring to the metter of the kidnapping of Aufust Paulson"s children at Vallece Orchartinformed me that Simpkine in addition to interestine St. John, who procured Cumningham to ineist in this matiter, after orchararefused to have anything to do with ounninghar 8 ingpkins tried to get man known as The big swede", who was manilns a dance hall in Burke, to assist hir in kidnapint these
children The Swede refuned to do this" stating that it might get him into trouble and that hin wifemight Iearn of what he had done and mights quit him. The woman that the swode called his witt whe aimply a prontitute that ho lived with but he thoupht a gimat deal of har. Then simpking alled on a baj: tonder whose name Orohard doos not remember but this man tended bar'al at Dick Dixon a ialoon. He was also a iolinist, and fier leaving Dixon'a saloon he played the violin at the maloon right across the dreet from Dizon" in Wallece. This bar tender or víolinist refused to have anything to do with this kidnapping. I do not think that the Big swode or this bar tonder would testify in this oase, more enpecially the bire swede, an it would broak hic up in buskness and would also bs the means of having the ber tonder leave the oamp or got killed. Orchard went on to state that it was the first time that Millor visited hum that the latter informed him that Captain Swain of the Thiel agenoy had approached him with a proposition to the effect that if hij ler paid him onough money he would give him a mynopsis, or words to that effect, of all the evidence he had in his possassion egainst Orvhard; and at anothor time "as reportod in Orchard's confession, tiller told him that he frad a Thiel operative at Denver making an investigation which showed that he (Orohard) had a first class reputation.

Orchard tated that while in Cripple Creek Pettibone visited him but cnce, and that was in the winteer of 1903 or 1904. Orchara tcok Pettihone up to Adems's house, and that is where Mrs. Adams first meit or ampettibone. Orchard had been down to jonver and kud brought up some of the material to make the Fettibone depe or Hell fire with him. Pettibone broueht the other parta, and the ofject of F'ettiKane's isit wes to show Orchard how to mix the Pettibone cope. Ihey first put in the bisulphide of oarbon then the phosphorua until the risulphide of cerbon was all soaked up or until the phosphorus refused to take up any more of the bisulphide of carbon, then the benzine, wher it would bercin to smoke then they put in the alcohol, and tarpentine ard sealed the bottle. I'hey rade up this dope in George Fasterly's cobin Easterly at thit time boing amy. Adares was not present while Pettibone mas educatine Orchard on this matterr. He said this dope has a very offensive smell; and went on to ray that one time in cornirfe up from Denver he carried some of this dope in hia gripsack and set it down by the steam pipea in the car. Rat Maligny was with him, and the stuff cormenced to mell so mach that Maligny wanted to know what Orchard had in the gripsack and orchard replied

- that somebody in the car must have cavased this stink as he had nothing in his pripsack that would mell so bad.

Referring beck to Pettibone ${ }^{\prime}$ s visit tc Cripple Creek; afteer tr $\%$ han made up considerable of this dope Pettibone instructed Orchard and Adaras to use it at their discretion but sugsested that they oupht to throw a little of it down the Shurtloff shaft, as it was open and there me only a gallows there, but thore was a ict of men working down there; and if they had done this it would possibly have set fire to the ahaft and killed everybody down in the mine. However, they did not use any of this dope for that purpose.

In disoussinfr with Adams in Orchard ${ }^{\circ}$ a presence hje trip to Califomia mith Ed. Winster he mas not sure whether he made the trip in 1902 or 1903. However, he informed me that while at Jackson he assmed the name of john Ward, while inster assumed the narce of Lciwin Lee or Edwin M. Lee; that the labor trouble at Jackson was settleci just about the time that they arrived there and on arriving theire they met Marion Moor, Executive Comittoeman of the Western Federation of finers from: Arizons. On this occesion inster and himseif carrisd
two 38 C lts revolvera a piece, but they had no occesion to use theme. Thay piot out of money and wore telegraphed, either tiarough the tel erraph company or the exprese company one' hundred dolijars each. foor identified them and they each roceited their hundred dollars in gold.

I then took up with Orchard the matter of rogeiving money fror Pettibone by Postal Telegraph while in San Franciaco at the time he was dotailed to kill Mr. Brediey, and also tine registered lettor which Heywood sent him under the name of' Wolf. The telagrama were all igned Pat Bone, but I find that Orohard is not gare whe ther he registered at the Golden West Hotel, under the name of Thomes Hogan or Harry Donapey. As it is very important to corroberate Orchard's atatement relative to the money that wes forwarded to hiva in San Franoisoo, and also Adams 'e tatoment, relative to the money that mas forwarded to him and Miniter at Jackeon, California, and also te get the 1 te letter ard the raferenoes that Pritibone sent to Mr. Etearns of the Hutual life Inmurance Compeny, or a oertified copy of the same, and the references or a certified copy of the sume that Orchard prodented to Mr. Stearms at the time that Mr. Stearns engeged himas an agent, I wrote Mr. Cary at Benver the following letter, geidining copy of the sme to Clen. Supt. Verble at San Frar. cisco: (dated today)

- As you will have noticed in Orchard's confession in the mattor of the attempted asaseination of Mr. Prad IV. Bradley of san Francisco about the latter part of Aupust or first of Septomber, 1904, he atated that Pettibone uncier the name of Volf forwardad to him a repintered letter containina a hundred dollars to the Colden West, llotel in San Francisoo. He now thinks that this lotter wan addressed to Thomas Hogen or Thomas 1. Hofsan, hut, it might huve been addreseed to Harry Dempsey. He is under the impression that he regieteres at the Colden West Hotel under the name of Harry fempsery, hut in that he may be mistaken. Mr. Femhle, who reoeivea a copy of this letter, will kindly oxamine the rersister at trie folion Wost Hotel for the months of Auphet ani September, 19C4, and roport to whether ha finds the name of farry Dempsey or Thoman Hopsen or Thomes $H$. Hopan on the ree;ister, an if so, make a tracine of these names. Vr. Ferble as yav will have seen from my report of Friday, April 6th, has beernwritton to on this subject, but owine to the flacit that I have subse juently seen orchard I arr in a position to pive fuller instractions upon this matter.

Orchard introdueed himself to Pat Moran of Cheyenne as Herry Dempery, and I think in witinfy you a few days arc on this matter i'stated that orchard had introduced himerelf es -Hogran. He had used the name of Hogan while with Mr. istearne, inie egent of the prutual Life Insurance Company in Denver and haci used it while at Canon City and while witime hail insurance in the Arkanses Valey. After Orcherd had fotten thita repisterod letter referred to above he wrote oither Pettibone or lleywood that he had sessmad the name of Demp sey, and that he had used this name on his trip from Denver tis thermopolis; therefore Pettjbone or Hywood, he comld not remember which, changed his (Orchaid a) name to Harry (Trean; ant subsequently Petcibone telegraphed hirs some four or pive huncred ollars at four or five different imes; that in, eout a han red dollari oach time, throurh the Postal lelemraph

Company Pettibone agning the name of Pat Bone to theas tole grama. Now this money was ant at different times during the contlis of Soptomber, October and up to the latter part of NoYembiry, 1904. I auggest that Mr . Komble cell on the manager of the jostal Telegraph Company at San Francisco and try to ascertain if there in any way wherehy we could corroborate Oraherd ${ }^{\circ}$ statiment reletive to this money beine tolegraphed to him as Harry Green by Pat Bone of Denver. In doins this Hr. Kemble Will have to confidentially inform the manager of the cormany why he wante this information and jif the manager cannot pive this information himeslf, as the copies of these telecrems nay have been destroyed, he nipht be able to suggent mome way that we could get this information; and in order to do this we must take the manager of the Postal Telegraph Company into our confidence so far as those trit tolegremese concerned. I suggest further that Mr. Yemble call on Major Munroe, post office inapewator in charge, and confidentially take up irith Mejor "unros the matter of the registered letter containine the hundred dollars that I have refermed to, and see if Major Munroe cannot sufgent any way whorety we could corroborate Orchard': temtimony on that point. I know very well that if Majox 草unroe gan do this he will do it for us. I suggest that you oell on Mr Cevenaurch, manacer of the Postal Telegraph Company at Ienver. and take up, with him this matter of the telerraphiny of money by the company's lines by Pat Bone to Harry "reen in San Francisco fr. Cavenaugh is a personal frien of mine ano you can tell him confidentially why we mant this information, end also say to him that I directed you to aill upon him. You' will also call on the post office inspector in charge at jenver (I, do not think Col. Sullivan is in churgy at the present tinse), and see if there is any possibility of tracinf the registered'letter to Thomes llogen or harry Dempey which is referred to above. Pettibone used the name of Wolf in repisterins the lettier in question. There was ti youns man named Wolf at that time a clerk at the headquarters of the Western Federation of lliners.

In my recent lotter to r. Kemble I stated that Aclame and Mineter went to Jackson California in 1903 , there heing a strike in sore of the mines around lackson at that time. Heywood. Moyer and Pettibone sent them out there for the purpose of lookin up who was responsible for the strike in order to aemassinate them. On arrivinp at Jackson they met Marion Moor member of the Exeontive Committee or inner circle, fror Arizona. The strike, however, was settled and it did not become necoseary to assassinate any person out there. At Jackson Adars ani Minstor roomed with a woman named Curtmarsh or some such name who kept a rcoming house. Adams assumed the name of John Vard, and Vingter assumed the name of Edward Lee or Edward M. Lee. Burine tho time thyt they rerained at Jackson Adares received one hundro dollars. He is not sure whether the money sent by Heywood or Pettibone. Neither is he sure whether it wat telearaphed hin by the Welle Pargo Express Company, the Pobtal Teleiragh Company or the Western IInion Telorraph Compeny, However, Varion toor identifiet him at the express office, as he put it, and he mot this hunted dollare in rold. Hinster also got a hundred dollare in the same m. hdans ie very poor on datas inf in dis cuasinf this mattor wit mi tode he is of propinion that he an: ineter were sent

Warden Whitnoy informed me that Mra. Adame in ts. kines with his(the Wardon'a) wife a day or two ago told her that her (Mrs.Adams 's) fathor was groet hand to look for souvenirs, whether it was a train wreck, an oxplosion in a mine or anything elae. She unf lded a piece of paper' and took out a little aliver of wood and asked Mrs. Whitney if she know what that was. Mrs. Whitney replind that it was a piece of woon. Mrs. Adams lauphed and maid, That is a piece of the gallows in the penitontiary which steve managor managed to get and stevo instructed me to send it to my father telling him that that is a piece of the gallown on wich they intend to hang koyer, Heywood aind Pettibone, the heade of the inner circle of the Wostern Foderation. The Warden further informs me that whon Ademe is exorcising around this yard he ocoanionally goes up on the pletform or trup of the gallows and lies down and takes a nap, but Orchurd will not po near the galdows. In talkinf with Mr. Huebner, the Harden's secretary, the lattor informed me that durinp the absenoe of the Governor, the Waram, my belf and hidams at Pocatello Mr. Noore, the lawyer from Báker City, und Adame 'surcle, visited the penitentiary. This of course I was aware of, but Yuebner went on to say that coore said that a youne man appeared in Baker City about wetk before oore had left for Boise. He called up Mr. Bond on the telephone, Bond beine a partner of $\mathrm{Mr}_{\mathrm{r}}$. Lillard' ${ }^{\text {a }}$, Adams ${ }^{\circ} \mathrm{s}$ uncle. Mr. Piond was not in, but $M_{r s}$. Pond answered the tolephone ani told him that Mr. Bond was not in, lut if there was anythiner in particular, she beint his wife, wula let Mr. Bond know when he came in and we could call him up. 'He the younc ran, was stopping at the hotel there. He then asked her if she knew where Steve Adums was. She said she did not. Then he asked her if she knew where Mrs, fidams was, and she replied in the norgtive. e mubsequently called up lir. Bond and asked the sare questions with the sane result but Mr. Bond referred hir to Mr. Moore. He callad on lir. Moore und first said he was a lawer from herver and reprasented the western Foderation of Miners, and that he had tried to Steve hdans and was not permitted to to so, that ho now wished to see Mrs. Adams and he understood that he (foore) was Adams s lawyer, and he wanted to know if he coult not pive hire an order or somethine of that kini so thet he could see Adams. Mr. Moore reilied that he could pet him permisaion, he thoupht, see Adams, and the youn man manted permission $r$ tht away. "oore sai i that he wculd have to po to Boise himself before this perrission conlt be granted, ani furthermore, he did not know where "rs. Adams was, uni to far is he was concerned she mifht be in tioise, Caldwell or anywhert else, as he had not seen her. "r. foort talked ver nicely to this fellow, an. he subsequently tola Mr. Mocre that his: nume was Whitsell. I do not know for sure but I think tr is feilow Writsell is sup, osed io come frum the Cueur d' Alene istrict somewhere, alth ury in that I may be ristaken. Opt. Ho. 21 - 8 . Has nade reports on tris man witsell.

As Adars is now in surt as to whether he was arrested in Opan in 1002 or 1903 , antas 10.9 was instructed that Adame was arrested in 1903, anis. 5 woul arrive in Oprien thie evening, wand as Adams haid furthi, r infirmed me that the express avent at Orden frave him a check for eeventy-five dollare that oywoois hia: forwarded from nenver hy telepraph, anj wetoctive fason took him to a bank and iderififiel him so that he pot thif check cashed therefor, I wir d "o.G, care of the chief of police at Opden, as follows:
"Fox mays it mikht have been in mping of nineteen and two instead of nineteen and three. Got check fromexprese offioe. Mason identified him at bank whore check wes cashed. Cachier meid Fox being a meson did not need identifiostion."

Mamon, as Adams tatad in his confession, being a mamon, informed Adam that the osehier of the bank or paying toller was a master mason, and when Adars presented the check, Mason iciontifyins him, the payine teller remarked that, Adam beine a brother mason did not require any identification. At that time Adme wes mason in grod tanding. No. 9 will get this telegram on calling at police headquarters.

In further talkine with. Adams he informed me that Shormari Parker had doteiled Yid finstor and himself to kill Mr. Burbridge, who was then managar of the El Pmas rine at Cripple Creek, and sibseruently secretary of the pine Owners Asmocition. He stated that they lay in Wait for Burbridge for a long time and at one time, beiny informed that Burbridge was going down to Florence they went'down the road to a point where there was a cut and the windows of the dar jusi; came up to the top of tie cat. iney lay in mait, one on each side of the train, to shoot urbridge throuf the window providing that hewas on the train, but Burbridge id not take that train. Subsequentiy this matter was abunioned so far as thoy ware cuncerned. Poseibly Parker sent arreboiy else to take up this work.

Fot Orchar and Adums are very earre to have ifr. "awley foo over the ir atatemanta wit them. I tola the that "r. awley wes a. very way man at the present time and possibly roth he and Tr. Berah would take tivis matter up with the in the near future. I peat idars a handful of cigars as he alweys oxpecta a few cifrars each time I visit him. I toli him that I wuld call arain some time this week.
no shard stated that the satchel that was used on this occasion, when Walley was biown up in Denver, was un old satchel which Pettibone brougt fror his house and the satchel found in is trunk was one that he had to show Pottibone, Hevwoo and "oyer if necessery to prove that he had disconnected the satchel frore the bomb in case they shou: accuse him of not doint so (wic: would have been the truth).

This morning I visited Mr: Hawley's offioe, where he hadded me anotiher latter from 8. M. Carleton of Denver. Carletoii went on to state that he had aoen the Radcliff woman and that whe was misa and not a raiames, and that she was very much depressed over the fact that it was known that she had talked to someone about Orchard meetine the different acoers of the Executive Boerd of the Western Pederation of Miners etci: Carleton mont on to atate that he had made a mistake in his previous letter whorein he atated that Orchard roomed at the Burke Block on Curtis street in Denver. He now has discovered that it wan the Belmont, a roorciner house opposite the Albany Hotel on Stout street. In this letter hewe expressed a desire to see Mr. "awley's repreantative in Denver. In rowdin over the lotter Mr. Hewley and myaelf were convinced that the writer had known all the time that the wornan's nume was Miss Radcliff, und also the fact that he had known all the time that Orchard under the name of Harry Bempsey had stopped at the Belmont instead of the Burke Block. Fror the tone of these letters I am led to believe that the writer or some friend wanted to become a witness and was aparring with Mr. Hawley, as it wore, to see as to whether their testimony would be of any importance to the prosecution; hotwithetanding the fact that the type, the paper and the form of the letter was somethine incilar to the letters that Heywood received from Kerwan; etill, it looked as thoufh there was somethine in this matter.

After 1 eaving Hawley' $s$ office I remembered that Orchard in hie confession tated that he een kot acquainted with a man named Vaughn, wo subequently traveled with him in 1905 in the Arkansas Valley sulicitiny hail insurunce. Orchard at that time couli not remember the nare of the rooming house where he met Vaughn but said it was on Stout street opposite the Albany Hotel. The Belmont beins located at that point I went down to the penitentiary and had an interview with Orchard. In reply to my questions he atated that he roomed of $\mathrm{f}^{\prime}$ and on at the Belmont Prom the winter of 1903 or 1904 up to the spring of 1905 , although durinfe that time he had roomed with Steve Adammana while und ho and Steve Adare hed roomed for a while at Downine; Avenue an 30 th s.treet. He stated that up to March 1905 Heywoed kept hiv-Pettibone kert his tore at 1725 Stout atreet under or opposite the Belmont and Hrs. Guerrin and her husband kept the Belmont. Cuerrin was a little fellow, pretty mart, and claimed to be a newspaper man. Orchard thinks at one time Guerrin worked on the Puehlo Chieftain, possibly at Colorado Sprines another time, ani was sometimes employed on the henver post but in what capacity
ho could not nay. Ho atatod Guerrin's wifa was an extragrdinary gmart woman, and neither Pettibone nor hiraself ever believed that Guarrin and this monan wore married. They had frequont guarreis, but Guerrin momed to have some meoret or something in ponneotion with the wman's paet life whion oospelled her to lire with him. Pottibone wit unduly intionate with Mrs. Guarrin. Orchayd fraquantily took har out und ciould have used har in the mame mannar ar Pettibone did but he nover bo thared with her. 8he had a simer mamed Flowis, who wise yount: woman. While rooming at the Bolmont Oroherd absumed the nume of Harry bompaey, An Pettibone was intimate with Mre. Querrin whenever ther was amecting of the Exemutive Comanittee or inner circle of the Wentorn Federation, or a convention, Peltibone almye strer the nomber up to the Belraont and filled the place up with Weatiorn Foderntionites. Orchard frequently met Pottibones Heywosid, Simpkin, Kerwan, Koore and othor Faderationitas ati the Belmont, mostly all of wom roomed at the Belmont when they would visit Denver with the exception of simplins whe alvays roomed in the cranite Block, und most of the time Kerman roomed in the Granite Block. While The Balmont appearad to be a roominu houae, as a rule it mas simply an aselegretion houw. When the Panorama Building burned down, wioh was faced on Thampa trest just back of the Belmont Mre. Guarrin told Orchard that the wished her place had hurried down as she had five thousand dollaris of insuranos on it, but it was not her luek to have it burn down. Pettibone informed Orchard that Mrs. Guerrin had made a propoaition to him to burn dom the Belmont, and that; he had referred her to Orchard. Orohard told Pettibone that he woudid nct do it as he would never trinet a woman in matter of that kind, whersupon Pettihone stated that wrs. Guarrin dare not squall as she wis at one time connocted with a train robbery in Montana and most of the parties connocied with that robbery were arrested and sant to the penitentiary but, she maneged to make her escape, and as Pettibone lived jin tiontana and knew all tabout it he conla fix hor if she ever apened her lips. While vrs. Heope tuerrin frequently intimated that she wished the hotel was burned she never proposea that Orchard do it. Hes wit on to tate that at the time that he was detailed to go to Cripple Creak to blaw up the Vindicator he was roomine at the Belront. (in leaving he did not notify Mre. Guerrin, in adition to which, he lest what thinge he had, clothine ete., behind him, and after $\&$ few days Mrs. Guerrin und hor husband becane xeited and thourht that he alipht have been killed and were poine to notify the police and have thems make search for him whon oithor Heywoo or Pettibone atopred them and seid he would turn up all right. During the time tha be stepped the re there was youne man rooming there named Hollivan who is now workine for the Donver Gas \& Electric ompany, or at last was working for thet company in 1905 . Hollivan was asthmatic and was very weet on Plassie, the sister of Mrs. Guerrin. However, Flossio had a sclid man that she went with who was about to marry her, and in ordor that the boys would keep Flossie from marrying this man they pretended to raise \& purme to tart Holliven in housenceping, and Flossio consented to merry Hollivan. Some of them conveyed this information to the fellow that was to marry flossie and he broke up his engegement. It, turried out eftorwards thet the purse mas not raised for Hollivan and aso they rotained losisie the reorinc house. Hollivan became very persietent then in his advances toward Flossie and Mrs. Guerrin threw him out. Hollivan will remember about the meetines of the Western Federationites in the Belmont, and will remember Harry Derapsey. Howevar, Orchard says that Hollivan was veryr adical, hut. poseibly that was on account
of the fact that everybody that stopped the re was radical or supposed to "w.

Orchard ment on to way that during the cherter election there was possibly a huired people rogistered from the Belmont, On election day Pottifons and this man Vaughn, who mubequantly traveled with Orchard throuph the Arkanase Valley solioitine hail insuranoc, handled a gang of repesters. Vanghn conceivod the idae that Pettibone and he could make a little money both ways. Therefore it mas agreed theit Vaugin go up to Ropublican headquerters and mee Angel Face. As the name wam nof to me an Orchard could not give tho proper name I A.M.Stevenson. I then asked him if Anesi Face wain not nameci Steron-無品, and he maid Yos it was Archie Stevonmon. Vauphn callod on Stavenmon anl ald that he knew a man who wer rinning a lot; of repeatere and tihat he could be bought off. Stavengon told him tes end the $\operatorname{man} u p$ to his office. Pettibone went to Stevenmon's of ice, but told Vaugin to stay outside. On entering Stevanaon's of fice stevemson. esked hirr his name. Pottíbone replied that his name was Pat; Bone. Sterenson said, Are you sure that is your name? Pottiborie ragiaed again that his name was Pat Bone. Stovenson looked at him a minutie anc said. Now damn you, your name is Pettibone and I am going, to have you locked up if you are found on the s treates at any of the poliling places todey." Pettiibone ran out the back way and then went to Chief-ofPolice Armatrong and reported to him what Stevenson had cone, and Anastrong instructed him to go ahead just as he had been dcing and not ciare what Btevenson did.

It will be remembered that when Orchard wan in Sen Francisco in 1504 Peitihone in tolegraphinp him maney by the Postal Telegraph compeny aipned the name of Pat Bone. Stevenson would remember the incident of the repeaters and would be very willines to tesifify to this which would stronely corroborate Orchard in the matter of the a ttempted sussassination of Prad Bradley.

In connection with this campaign Orchard stated that a lot of democrats went to Heywood and wanted him to subsorike two thousand dollars for the chartar campaign. Heywood said that he had siready subsoribed that much and showec thim receipts for weunts guns that had been purchased at the Trich Heurdware Company ${ }^{\circ}$ store and other places for use by the Westorn Federation at Cripple Creek, Tellu ride and other places; and Heywood told Orchard that these nen dia not know the difference betweon these receipts and receipts fror somehody collecting for campaign funds. Orchard want on to sey that the noxt dey or so after the election registered letters were sent to every man whose name had been voted on from the Belmont. This ennoyed Guerrin, the proprietor of the Felmont, very much as he did not know what to do with these latters the the parties named on the addeesses had never roomed there, ani Orchard don't know what he aid with thens.

After Hollivan had been thrown out of the Belmont und Pottikone is moved to Court Place Orchard le ft the Beimont mind roomed at the Virginia. The Virfinia was e nice quiet place und was kept by two ladier numed Huster and Forton. Pettibore and other members of the inner circle vieited Orchard wile at the Virginia, more especially Pettibone. inarine this time orchard and Pettibone fot \& contract from these two la ies to ell out the place at a certain prioe. They securad a purchamer, a man named Dely from Cripple Greok. At that time there was sone convention in Denver and the Virginia rooms were all filled up and the women refused to sell out. Orchard thinke thet


Pottibone mued them, and ays he might possibly have aued them not only in hie own name mut in orcherd a moll. for two hundred doliare. Orchard tas knom, the Jirginde ae Thomea Hofsh, but as stated bove, won at the Belmont he war known es Harry Dohpery. His ramion for uining that Pottibone startod anit was that Crohaid on Learinc Caldmell ment dom to goit Lake as you will obarve in his oonfeselom, in Novermor, 1905 , and Pattibone serit his some arfion its there to elen apd aoknowiedge in connection with this suit, but he did not sign thens. It would be a good thing to have thase two woten intorvi med, and find out what they know about Pettilibore and Thoman hogan, it now becomes yery neceanary to corroborate the stiftmentis mede by 0rchard on all matters wherein we den corroberate him.

In further talking with Orchard he maid that all the gune that ware purchaned ither from the Trich Hardware Company or the sacond heni stores were cont to Pettibone's atore, where they mere shippod mometimes in boxes and ometimee in piano caces He seid that Heywood told him he had purchaced a hupdred dollarg wotth of guna from the ersend hand tores and pawn shope in Denver and whipped thom to Cripple Crook. Telluride and other points. Aftor puroharine mome of the puns it Trich's they had the Trich Company convart them into eamadiff shot guns. He said that at the time that the western Federation store ma closed by the troope at Cripple Creok a number of the puna were htuled down to Denver by one of the teame uned by the tore. After arrivinp in Denver they mere placed in Pettibone "s store. He dose not knew what has become of them.

After getting through with Orchard I had an interview wi.th Adams, in which he wint on to ptate thet George Easterly pot four or fire men and himself (Adames) at one time before the strike of 1903 in Cripple Crook, went over to the Economic Mill and bent up the suyerintendent and mother man. He di not know what this was done for but Eastorly wanted them to do it and they did it. He cannot remember the names of the other perties that were with Rastorly and himelf.

He also stated that at the 1 ime that E . Minster and h were trying to asmansinate Mr. Burbriclges on the last night they wire out after Burbridge Minster had tola him thet there was a sab conductor on the electric line and Parker wanted him bemten up, and that Parker had told him about this conductor. ineter aud he knew the conductor and the car that he on and they wouli cotch him at the siding where the two cars paesed between Victor and Cripple Creek. They went to the iding and got the conductor, ut EX. Minter dic not act in his usual mannas as ingtaad of beatines the man up ho imply went throush his pockets and robbed him of thirty-five dollare, ani only gave Adams two dollars. Adams is of the opinion thet Minstor imply vanted to get a littie money and had never baen informed by Puriker that this man was acab, as the man ran on the romi for a long time aftermarde.

A man Eiving the name of John Diamond, claiming to be a brother of Mrs. Adiams, had tolephoned Warden hitney this morning eskine if he knew where ris. Adame was. The Farden sid nobut he woula see Stove and fina out if he knew eny thing ahout. it. Instead of that ine telephoned mo an i instructed him to siver no infornetion about this to either Steve or his wife, and to telophone this man to the foffect thet Steve dici not know where his wifo was. The Warden replied to this man Diamond as I had instructed him to do. Diamond clajmed that he lived
in Telluride. In talking with Steve this afternoon he informed ne that his wife had a brother named John who was living in Thluride the last he heard of him, but that ho (Adame was never pepy friendly with Mrm. Adame folk and knew very little about them. Mins man may have been Mra. Adans is brother, but it may here been this man Whitesil who is trying to locate Mrg. Adam.

On roturning to my room st 6:00 F.M. Mr. Hopkinn had received the following telegraw for me from No.9:
Wire me if Adams or hia partnor gave pair brown covered
opora crlaman to Chief Detecfive and gun to officer. Chief
dotactive was James Fender, date arrested June thvee, nineteen
oupht three. Did Fox's partnor use alias G.G. IIllimms' Records
chow four A.M. time of arrest."

Being tired, I had Mr. Hopkins go to the pendtentiary and have the Warden interview Admas on this matter. Adern covild not remember whether Minster had assumed the name of Williams cr not; however, he remembered ge giving the detective a pair of opera playeen and the fact that Minater missed one of hia revolvern and claimed that it was tolen from him ty the police. On Mr. Hopkine e roturn I wirsd No. 9 es followe:
-Fox gave pair dark red glasees to Chief jetective, he thinks railroad detective named Mason. Fox'e partner reinged thirty-oight colts gun, old style, fikune of horse on rubber hand ef supposed officer stole it;' thinks partner went by name of 5 .

In tre eninf I had a conference with llr. Hawley who is going to visit Adams and Orchard tomorrow at the penitentiary und gro over the statementas they have made wi th them.

In talking with Orchard today relative to the satchel that was found in his trunk he stated that I misunderstood him. He claims he did not buy this satchel for the purpose of showing it to Fieywood Pettibons and Moyer in order to convince ther that he had taken the satchel away from whore he had planted the bomb in the lot at Enersor and Colfax Avenue in Denver as they believed his anyway but he states he subsequently purchased this little satchel in Nampa thinking that he might have use for it in the natter of killint Ex-Goy. Eteunenberg however, it mes not used.

As it is very important th t we corroborate everythine possible in connection with the statements of Orchard ani. Adame I havo tedey written Mr. Cary at Denver as follows:

- As you will have noted from a copy of a recent report there wes emboaied in it copy of a letter from S. M. Carleton of lenver to Mr. Hawley here at foise, also my conmente on the ame. In is morning (Tuesday kpril 10th) thile calling on Mr. Hawley he handad me another letter from Mr. Carletor, in which he stated that he found that he had made a mistake when he stated that Orcinard roomed at the Burke Blook; that he had talked wi th the Radelipf woman and found that her name was Miss Radcliff. In his previous letter he claimed thet he diun not know whether she amism or a missen. In this letter he states that she became yery excited on learning that it was known that she knew that Orchard, Pettibone and othere were in the habit of meeting eachother at the lelmont
on Stout etreet opposite the Albany Hotel. He also ment on to sey that Mr. and Mrs. Ouerrin kept the Belmont, and that Guerrin was some kind of a nempaper man. On questioning Orchard I ind that it is fact that he topped a ereat part of his time at the Belmont in Denver during the winter and apring of 1903 and 1904 , also a portion of 1905, and that Pottibone $\&$ efore was at No. 1725 dout etreet up to March 1905 when he moved to Court Place. Orchard furthar etates that he not only mot Pottibone fo frequently at the Belmont but almo Hoywood Kerman, Schnelsirs Noyer and nearly every one of the Executire Comittee. It is very important that we should be able to prove this, as it would show that Orcherd was a trusted member of the Vestern Federation and in contant consultation with the inner circle of the Fecieration; and I would suggest thsit for the tine being, if Wilijams, who is acting as prosident, and Kerwan, who is acting as secretary, woudd not become suspicious that you place No. 24 in the Belmont, have hir sedure a room there and rope in with Mra. Guerrin anc her husband, as I am now led to believe that eitise Hrg . Guerrin or her husband, or both, are the real authorm of thase leitters that have been'written to Wr. uawley, in one of which it was suggestied be sent there to secure a roon in order to rope in wit these partien. The operative detailed rust be very careful not to ket too anxious as Orchard informs me that Guerrin and his wife are very amart poople, ospecially the latter; but the operative, above ull thinge, must ot hail from Telluride.
Orchard essumed the name of Harry Dempsey wile stopping at the Belmont. Pettibone rays that this Guerrin roman a't one tize lived ir Montans. There is a fellow named Hollivan now working for the enver Gas ix Flectric Company who also roomed at the Felnont, hut we will not take that matter up until 1 pet to ienver. After leavinfr the Relmont some time ir 1905 Orchard went to room at the Virfinia. 'ihis place man kept by ise Hueter an a. Miss Horton. Orchard assumed the name of Hopan at the Firpinia. Petifone frequertly visitad Orchard at the Virfinia, an scre time befor orchard went to Canon 0 y or ossihly it mirsht have beon before fie first went tic Caláwell to murder Coco. Steunenberg, Pettibone pot a contract from these two ladies whereby he was to sell the hotel at a certain price. He procired a pirchaser and then the two women refused to sell out. It is Archard's impression thet Pettibone ased them for twc hundred dollare comiseion. These two ladies should be seen to discover if the: rememtier that Orchari under the nume of Thomas Hogan, an Pettibone fre uently met at their hotel duriny the time that Orchare roomed there, and sey if it is possible that we could ret at lamen one of urese women to core to Calweil during the trials enc testify tc that effect for further purticulare on this matter see copy of my report for today, the loth.

Orchard went on to say that before the charter election in nenver a large number of straw men mere refistered fror the Belmont. On election day a fellow named Vaughn, who stoped at the Belmont, an Pettibone were haniling a great many repeators. Thinkinfe they conli make a little money on hot fides Va curn caldd upon A. $\therefore$. Stevenson at the anti-charter or repatiicar hoadquaters. Stevenson wes known to ther as Angel face that he knew of a man who was han line a ganc of repeaters and he thourht he could be boutht off with $\varepsilon$ pittle money. Stevenson held hint us senta the man up to him. Pett. ibone went up there tad Stevensin asked him his name. Fe replited that his name was pat Bone, then Stevenson tola him he was a God damed liar and that

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his name was Pettibone, and if he was caupht on the etreete during the day near any of the pollinp places he would be arrestod and that he would be arrested anyhow. Pettibone pot scared and ran out of the headquartors into the alley and made his oscape. You will remomber in my letter to you yesterdey which was dated the loth by mistake and should have been dated the 9 th, I stated that Pettibone in telegraphine mongy to Orchard at San Francisco under the name of Harry Greon use: the name of Pat Bone for himself. I would suggest that you call on 4 r . Stevenson and ask hir if he can renemer this incident of the repeaters etc., when Pettibone told Stevenson that his name was Pat Bone. If fie or anybody present at, the anti-charter headquarters can reaember this incident it will play a very important part in corroboraline Orchard's testincony in the matter of Heywood telegra hing him money to San Francisco."

Having dofinitely settlea try fact that it was during the month of May 1903 that Adman and Einster visited Jacison County or ihe town of Jackson in Californix, I wrote 'r. Fe: ble today as follows:

- Relative to the matter of the invectigation that I wished you to make at Jackson, California, wich was included in copy of a letter to "r. Vary dateid te loth und wich shoul. histe been dates the Gth, woind say that we have now definitaly learned that Axame and ineter were at Jackacn aurint who montlo of tay and possibly the month of April, 1903. In rey letter to Mr. Cary, which I have rufarrod te to I statesi laa it looked as thourh it wis 1:02. As we liave now definitely setticd thie joid need not mind lotkin up the necords for 1902.

Mave found officer with gun, horse on handle, thirty-eight Colts, uset botte-necked cartridges. Arrest entirely corroborated. Have trace of money deal. Will use every means to corroborate same.

I trust we will locate who sent this money throurh the telegra;h office as it is all-important.

Today having reoeived a roport from seattle to the effect that neither Barrett nor Berton the saioon keeper at Seattle seemed to remember much ebout orchard who under the name of Hognn, visited Seattie in Soptember last, 1 wrote Mr. Ahern as followis:
"Adnt. Supt. Dye' report for the 9th has arrived and it looks as though neither Barton nor Barret wants to remamber anything about orchard. It is all-important that we corroborate the fact thet Orchard was in Seattle. There is no doubt but what he called on everal real entate offices, nore especially such reail astate mon as deal in farmand ranches, and thore was one man in particuler that he callid on meveral timen. Therefore on receipt of this letter take orghard's pioture and make a careftil ounvans of all the roal ontate officos. I do not eet in the present roport where you celled at the rooming houne where Orchard stopped. As he described it, it must bo within a voor ar twe of where Barton formerly kopt his saleon."
I subsequeritly received e tolegram fror No. 9 at Ogden which reads as follows:
-Have positive information that Adam raceived money by woistern Union about June fifth ninatoen oupht three. Nanager Festern Union not allowed to show recorde withont authority from Supt. These recorde will inform re who sent money. Can you wire our Supt. Taufhlin at Onaha ask Supt. C.B.Horton of Wostern Union et Oraha to wire ranaper Western Union here to ghow me record of money trensfer during June nineteen ought three. Very important that anthority be secured.

I immediately wired Mr. W.R.Targhlin, our maperintendent at mpana, as follows:

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I subsequently wrote M_r. Laughlin follows:
"Relative to this matter would state that in the confession of Steve Adams he stated that the lattor part of April 1903 he and a young man named gid. Minater were detailed by Moyer and Heywood to go to Jackeon, California, whe there man a trike in nome of the minen oporated by Fred W. Bradley of San Francieco. They got broke, havine wasted their expense money, while at, Jackson. While at Jackson Minater, under the name of Tawin' Jee or Eidwin M. Lee, got a hundred dollarw. The money was telegraphed him from Denver by Wr. D. Heywood. Stove Adams, who wal going by the name of John Ward while in Jackson, also rocoived a hundred ucilars. which was telegraphed to him by Heywood from Denver over the Western Union Telograph Company's lines, or at least so fur as Adams cian remember it mas over the Westiarn Union lines. In returnine to Denver, as the strike was mettled, they were broke and were urrasted of Ogden on June 3rd while beating their way in a Southern Pacific froight oar by Southern Pacific mpecial officor McIntire. Adares telegraphed Heywood for seventy-five dollara, and Heywood on or about. June 5th cent this seventyfive dollars to Adams at Ogidn by Eestern Union telegraph. Adarns received a check from the ostern Union Telegraph Company's agent at Ogden and had the same cashed in a bank at Ogdori. Adams as I presume you are aware, is one of the partion urrested with Woyer, Heywood, Pettibone ani Orcherd for the murder of Ex-Cloy. Steunenberg of Idaho. He has made full confesticn, and in doing so confessed to the above facts, and what we want is to corroborate this portion of Adams ${ }^{\prime} \mathrm{s}$ confession and $1 ; 0$ show the connection that oxisted between Adams and Heywood, who was then secretary streasurer of the western Federation of in iners. I detailed Operative 8.C.Thiole to make this investigstion, and ho has corroborated all that Adams confessed to with the excoption of the fact that the manaper of the Western Union Telegrajh Company at ogden refused to rive any information relative to Adams receiving this money except instructed to do so by the superintendent at omaha. In takine this stand the manager" of the: Western Union Telegraph in Ogden I suppose was sirply carryins out rie instructions. Therefore Operative Thiele wirea me the ahove fucts, and I subsequently wired you aie follows:
'Sec Supt. Weatern Union Thlegraph. Omaha; ask him if coneistent to wire their manarer at Oghen to pive oparative Thiele name of perty who wired Steve hame or Steve lizon eaventy-five dollaris from Denver aboul June fifth nipeteen ought three. This ralates to arrest of inner circle western Federstion, is of utmo st impartance to prosecution. Wire S.C. Thiele in cipher care of Hesley fotel. Ogden, resilt of conference with manager.

If the superintendent of the Western Union ot, Omaha refuses to instruct their manager at Ogden as requested would adyise you to call on Mr. Fohler or Mr. Orr and see if they can assiet you in inducing, the superintendent of the Western Inion company et Omaha to let us have this information.

I arn sendine copy of this lettor to Mr. Fraser at anFrancisco, and if you succeed in petting the supt. of the Western

Union Company to instruct his manager st Ogien to give Opemative Thiele the date we want, kindly take the matter of gettins the data of the transaction at Jackwon, California up with him and see what he and do for us in gotting the record at that point. Mr. Kombla will ask Mr. Calvinat San Francisoo to asaiat, him in this mattor.

Rugby ia mining casp noar Colorado Springa. About four years ago fight ocourred in ficran s sajoon which rosulted in the deeth of one of the partios ongaced in this fight. Morun becane acquainted with the Western Pederation officiale through Pottibona, and as Moran's patrons in Cheyenne aremontly union men of nome kind and as he is very friendly to Pettibone, fir. Cary jes of the opinion that Moran would poseibly decline to make a atatement, and in any event he thinke he wopld not go to Caldwell or Boise to testify. Moran is very frienaly with a cortmin man in Denver who is a good friend of Mr. Cary ${ }^{\circ}$ and mine, and Mr. Cary is going to see this man and try to get his ansistance to have Moran make a istetement or posibly apree to corne to Boise. In any ovent Mr. Cary, being $s 0$ well acquainted with Morax is the best person to ontl to Cheyonne to interviow Moran. However, am afraid that we will not be sble to use Moran as a witness, but we will arrange matters in much a way thet the defense cannot use Moran to contrad ict Orchard etentimony. Durin: the day I hed several conferences with Cov. Gooding, who had arrived in the city last evening, and also with Mr. Hawlex. The lattor will arrive in Denver oither onday noon or funday evening.

Above these pictures was printed epinkerton's by birth". This yostal card was sent from Denver ky Fred filler, ono of the lawyers for the dofonse who has been here in Boise but recently went to Denver. Miller wrote on the card: "Sam Tierney iest night.; show this to Sman. Tierney is the rapresentative of the Rocky lountain Nem of Denver. You will understand that these pictures are on the back of a postal card, and from what Miller wrote Driscol it is to be presumed that he obtained the postal from Tierney; and the fact that he directed Driscol to show this to 8wein confirms what we have thought for a long time, and what "iller told Orchard before he (hillor) wis aware that' Orchurd had rade a confession, that s, triat is that Capt. Swain was working on behalf of the defense. Ancl as Miller tola Orchard that he had employed a Thiel operative ir Denver, anc also the fact that Swain had proposed to sell information to him, and the further fact thst Swain allowed simpkins to escape, I think we have conclueive ovidence that capt. Swan of the Thiol agoncy while oetensibly working for the state had been do infe all he could to holp out the defense. This postal card had to be forwarded to New ork by the officials of the Idan-ha lotel; however, Mr. Hopking sower it to the Governor in my presence but had to return it right away to pr: out on the maid for the East.

I oall of Trank $J_{0}$ Cavanaugh Manager of the Postal Fieleraph Co.p and took up the mitter of Pettibon who under the alis.e of Pat bone had telegraphod money to San Jranolsco to Orohard under the name of Harry Green between August 10 th and the early part of Deoeaber, 1904. Mr. Cavanaugh informed me that the only reoord they kopt of suoh transe cotion was made in their impression or oopying books, and that every six monthe they forwarded thes impression books to thoir hestquarters at New York, and while he expeoted that all books for 1904 hed boen destroyed, nevertheless they mieht be found et thedr hoedquarters in New York. Therefore I wrote the following letter to Mr. Beage, our Genera? Mamager in Now Xork, whioh explains itself:

I had a lone taik today when lrank J. Cavanamen, Manager of the Postal Telegraph Co. relative to the money nert by Pettibone under the alses of Pat ien to Orohard under the allar of Histy Oreon over the Postal Tolegreph Compeny's ince botweon August 10th and Dooomber, 1904. Mr. Cavanaugh informed me thet the record of thos telegrams would be found in the inpression or copying books; thet these books were kept
for mix montins at the office here in Denver and then forwarded to New York; that it was more than poasible that the inpresaion books showing the traneactione in question had been des.troyed at Mew York. Ke is almost oertain that tha impression books for 1904 have all been destroyed.

Mr. Cavansagh is not only an old personal friend of mine, but is very friandly to the Agenoy and is one of our best citisens. It would be of the kreatest importince to the proseoution tho be able to show through the recorde of the Postal Tellegraph Co. that Pat Bone, who as you are aware is no ether than Gon. A. Pettibone, telographed thin money to Harry Orean, pinioh was the name by whitah Pettibone addrasad Orchard in these tolegrame. What is desired is to approach the management of the Postal Telegraph Co. and try to get the record of the sending of this money between Aukust 10 th and December, 1904. I know you will use overy means within your power to get this resord for us; as a metter of fact if the books are destroyed thet metties it.
-I presume that owing to the disaster that has befalion San Franoisoo no record of these transactione otin bis obtained at that point. Kir. Cavanaurh informed me that he thourht by some time tonight the Postial Pelegraph Company would establinh un ofrioe at the Ferry at San Frenoisoo and have at least one line ruminer in there.

Petitibone from Denver under name of Pat fone wired Orohard und or name of Harry oreon to san Franoisoo money on four or five ocoasione during the period above mentioned."

I also received a 1 ettor from a man named $J$. Ton Allon who gives his address as Morgan kine, California, who claime thet he was formerly a resident of wise and elves as referenoes edpar wison, Chas. Norwood, Geo. H. Stewart and Chier of Police Philifye of that odty. This min thinks he has simpkins located end wants a photograph of him. Ais there is no post office known as worgen uine, i think this man has made a mistake, therefore I have written to Opt. No. g at lioise to oull upon the above pertios and try to asoertain if thoy heve Allen's address, and then write him. In fact I have sont the operative Alien'e letter.

The lead in question is not used for trap m in Denver, and in making the bomb out of this $6-$ pound lead he covid effort to make it cheap as ho had this piece of lead on hand and had no way to use t up.

The Pavorite secret ink and the hardest to detect is writiten with a solution of lead acotate, whose invisible marks on paper turn blaok on exposure to sulphuretted hxdrogen, owing to the formation of sulphide of 1ead. While I make the mattor of invisible ink a portion of this report, however for the benefit of Gov. You will have noted from a report from the san frunoiseco office dated April 17 th that we have secured a record at that peinif of tine registered letter sent by Pettibone to Orchard oontaining $\$ 100.00$, and es we have secured a record of the sending of the meme at the Dover on I think: this matter is in a very good condition.

I reoolved Mr. Haley's letter of the eth enclosing ant order on the postmaster for delivery to me or Mr. Moran ${ }^{1}$ e letter to Mr. Haley dated the 16th. Ae the augeeations in Mr. Eoriah "s letter are very important, I herewith quote the same:
"In August or mptamber, 1905, Potitibone, Haywood and Orohard bought a horse and buggy. This horse and bugger was to be used in the execution of orimes around Denver. this horse was purchased of a colored man whose name orchard does not know, but he say that a man by the name of Vance who keeps a livery stable on lawrence St. between 18 th and 20 th kn aws the negro and signed the bill of sale with the negro, in a way vouched for the title of the horse. I thourfit this might bet important ais corroboration.

The most important date connected with Orohamis refacenot in between the 80th, 26 th and sooth of September, 1905. It is vary important that we be prepared to show that Haywood, Mover and iettibone were in Denver at this time.

There are two women who own whet is known as the Vipeinda Hotel or boarding house in Stout st. between 18th and 19th. Shay likely know of the close relationship between pettibone and Orchard and their vo-operating; Pottibone and Orchard sold the Virginia Hotel for these parties and had some trouble with them over the comadesios. It mi kit be well to look them up.

There ans old ran by the name of black who was Galled old man black who was around pettibone's store a great deal who knows that Oranerd and Stove Adams were constantly in and out. If he will talk he is perfectly familiar with the close relationship of the parties.

Pectibone went Mares bond over on the Fest side in a criminal court a couple of years ago, Adams going, under the mane of S. W. Dixon. Judge shields was adams lawyer. He was arrested for stealing biayols.

There was an old Jew around Pettibone's who aells mantles, eto. They ooula remember only hís firat name, sian. He han a divoroed wife who lived at colorado Springs. This Jew knows that both Alame and Orohard wore oonstantiy in at Pettibone's pleoe, and Orchard thinks that the divorood wife would be perfeotly willing to talk and would be a good witneas as to the alose relationship of the parties.

Haywnod purchased aoms horses and took them to what i.a knorn as the Fiopers corral on 14th 3t. owned by Ropers Bros. He want down thero with Or chard a number of times and left word with Roper Bros. that Orohard should have the use of the horses eny time he wanted them.

It was about July 1, 1904, thet Adame had his talk with Heyrood ot al berore leaving for the Cotur d'Alunes.

I do not know whather you know it or not, $i$ did not until yestarday, but Haywood sent a man to Idaho about the tize of the Pocstelio convention by the name of Jack NoCarty to kill Gov. Stounonberg. This MCCarty is no loneer Priendiy to the eituation, and Orchard thinks if he could be loastad he would be vory valuable. He does not know where he is at prom sent. You perhape know also that ho sent a man by the name of Art Baston for the same purpose.

Nothins now here at presont."
Our Denver offloc han taken up the metcer of locating the colored man trom whom Pottibone, Haywood enc Orohard purchased the horse and husey, axid glso Mr. Vance, the livery stable keeper on Lawronce Stroet. As you will have noted from reports from our Denver office the two ladien that kopt the Vireinia Hotel, viz. Mrs. Huster and Mrs. Horton, went to loo Angoles. The Los Angeles office was ingtructod to take this matter up, and 1 woula refor you to the reportes from the los angeles office deted April 23 ra and 24th wherein you will note that the ladies thet kept this hotel don't remamber anythine of impor tiance in connection with Pettibone or Orchard. If we soula finc Mrs. Dunlap, which may be a vory difficult thine to do, we might be able to get the infarmation we require on this subject. From the reports of the Denvor and los Angeles offices you will note the matter of the Virginia Hotel had been takon up some time aso as per my instructions frora boise.

We W11l try to lonate Black and the Hebrew to whom bir. Borah refers. Wa can find no record of a lawer named shielde in Denver, but by reforrint to Opt. No. 9 's report from Park City you wili find that a man named Dan Shields was omployed hy the Western Federation to defend Adame at the time he was charged with house breeking at that point. At the time Adams was arrested in Denver on the charge of stealing a bicyole the Proseouting Attorney was Judge Sayles, and Adams vho has not a vory good memory may have confused the name or Sayles pith Shielde or Shielde with Sayles as the oase may be.

Arthur Baston was sent to Idaho for the purpose of killing bix-Gov. Steunenberf prior to either Adame or Orohard being sent there, but I don't know the date that Baston was ment there; Orohand or Alama may be able to inform us on that point. rixcept we can get monie furcher data from Orohard or Adame in the mister of MoCarty I cannot engeent any way whercby wo mignt looato MoCarty at, the proaent tipe.

As you have received the reports of Opt. C. S. of Syiolean on the matter of finding the bottles of "hell fire" or "pettinone dope" or at least a portion of the oompounds and as the bottles are deserised in the report, I would like to have Orchard describe the apperance of the bottles that he gave Simpkins.

In the matiter of the money telegraphed from Denver ty Pat: Bone to Harry Grean in San Prancisco over the Poetal Telegraph Comanyy ${ }^{\text {an }}$ lines at the time that Orchard was detailed to assaesinsiev Mr. Bradiey, our General manager writes me as follows:
"Replying to your letter of April 20th, Gen'l Supt. Dienl today called on W. H. Baker, Viae-President and Goneral Manager of the Pogtal Telegraph Co., and after gtating the mattier oontained in your letter to Mr. Baker, he atatod that all that would be necessary to secure the papers (with the exoeptiok of the telegrame, which are all destroyed after six montha, with the exception of the state of pennsyivania, where they ere compelled to keep ther for five yeare) would be to seoure an order or aubpoena from a Judge in the State of Idaho on any officer of the Poytal Telegraph Co., stating what is requixed from that company, and the offioial whonit is aerved upon will communioate with the head office at New York, where all papera are kept, when the popere will be sent to that officitil to be used by $n i m$ in court.

Mr. Baker gain that they rould have receipts for the monies bent by Pat Bone and reooived.by Harry oreon, hut whatever peocrds they hove in annnection with these people can be socuref by an orier from the oourt in the State of Idaho on any ofeiatal of the nompany.

referring to your letter of April moth to me, on the gath inst. Genii supt. Diehl called on President W. H. Truesdale, of the D. L. \& W. R. R. Co., relative to that part of your letter concerning Mr. Stearins, Manager of the Mutual LIfe Insurance to., of Denver, the reason. for his calling on Mr. Tmiesdale was that he is the chairman of the reorganizing committee of the Mutual Life Insurance Co., and a friend of the Agency.

When the matter was thoroughly explained to Mr. Truesdale, he fated that he thought he could help us out in the matter, and for the agency to write him a letter explaining briefly what was desired, and then ho would do the rest. We, therefore, wrote Mr. Pruosdale a letter, which was delivered to him this morning; and of which a copy is attached. We wi:12 wait a fay days, and then, not hearing from Mr. Trueadele, his. Dion will call and see him, and will then advise you what $h$ has done in the matter."

Principal Robt. A. Pinkerton wrote Mr. Truesdale as follows:-

In connection with the arrests and indictment of the Grand Officers of the Western Federation of Miners for the Murder of ex-Governor Steunenberg, Harry Or chard, one of the conspirators, who has made a confession and is a witness for the State of Idaho, states that in May or June, 1906, he vas delegated to go to Canon city, Colorado, to kill Governor Peabody, of Colorado, with a bomb, and in order to cover him it was suggested that he become an insurance agent, and in furtherance of this ne made a contract with John $L$. Stearins,

He was also given a lettur from Mr. Conon, of the IIrm of Sullivan \& Cohen, of whion Mr. Sullivan was the attorney of Mr. Pettibone, one of the arand officers under arreston He also had letters from Pettibone and severai others.

> As thia is a very important link in the ohain of ovidence in oorroborating Orohard, and against the man under indictment, the state of Idaho desirea to sooure from Mr. Stearns the original lettors reforred to, and other documents relative to Harry Orchard's appointment as a solicitor for the Nutual Life Insurance Co., as well, if nooessary, of Mr. Stearns' ovidence, In Idaho, at the tirial.

> Kr. 3tearns, to a representative of this Agency, representing the state of Idaho, has refused ta produce the papers mentioned, or to become a witness as desired.

> If you oen assist the State of Idanc and ourselvas in this mattor by influonoing ix. Stearns to produce the papers, and respond to $\varepsilon$ subpoona from Idaho, it would matorially aid the ends of public justioe."

I wian to draw ur. Hawley's attiontion to a copy of Supt. Laugh1in's roport from Omaha dated April 1 sth, wherein you will notio that an informant tells Mr. Laughlin that auring last maroh while in sialt hake caty he was shown a telegram whion had been aent to Harry Orohard or whioh was being sent by Orohaxd to some attorney in Denver. If the informant is right it looke to mo as though this telegram was in conneotion with the sale of the Pirginia rooming house, therefore would augeest that Mr. Hawlay take this matter up with Drohard and find out from him as to whether he recoived a telegram at any time while in Salt Hake, if so from whom, and if he sent any telegran to whom it was tuaressed.

I hope that something can be done to oinoh the parties guilty of approaning the Grand Jurors.

Today I had a long conference with Mr. Minus and Supt. Cary, and as a result $I$ outlined a plan that if successful will gut fullivan, who formerly roomed at the Belmont and Virginia rooming houses and who from Orchard's statement to mo must be in a position to testify that he frequently saw Orchard in company with Pettibone, Haywood, Kirman and other members of the Executive Board of Inner Circle of the Weatiorn Federation of Miners. If my plan works I will have Haliivan at my office tomorrow morning, which is the best place that $I$ could interview nim.

As we wished to get some corroborative ovid ea in Cripple Greek Mr. Cary detailed a competent operative to proceed to Cripple Creak. Before making the investigation at Cripple Creek this operative will visit Canon City and interview Mrs. Adams with whom Orchard boarded at the time ne was detailed to assassinate Gov. Peabody and with whom Orchard loft the satchel containing the Peabody bomb at the time ne mede a trip to the Arkansas Valiey soliciting hail insurance from the farmers in that district. I am in receipt of a letter from Gov. Gociing: enclosing a letter from Henry O. Morris, an insurance and real estate agent residing at Pueblo. Morris' letter reads as follows:
${ }^{4}$ Hon. Governor of Idaho, Dear Sir:-
From my own personal observation $I$ believe that should you allow the infamous oongpireoy to hang Mover. Heywood and Pottibone succeed, that the vengeance of the woricers will. stagger humanity". That it is a cold blooded muirdercus conspiracy I have not the shadow of a doubt, and! this belief is general. The men are victims whose only crime is being persona non greta to as miserable a band of wealthy outlaws as ever disgraced God's footstool. You may bo a party to this sohome to hang innocent men. I hope not. If you are, may God have mercy on you. Yours truly, (signed) Henry O. Morris.
I thought it best to incorporate this letter in this report as a matter of record, because the letter of itself is to bay the least threatening. We know Morris by reputation as a notorious anapohist. We
had already arranged to send the operative to Cripple Creok, but on reoeipt of this letter we ohanged our plans and the operative will first visit Pueblo and make an investigation ralative to Morria, ticen prooeed to Canon City and from Canon City will go to Cripple Crear. In conneotion with the operative's viait to Cripple Creek I have egegested that he visit Mrs. Orchard, and he has been eivon full ingtructions as to how to approach Mrs. Orohard. If we are not mistaken Mrs. Orcherd is reoeiving money, or as it will be termed by the Western Federation whe is reoelving relief monay from them.

In conneotion with this visit to Mrs. Orohard the operative will take up the matter of the ingredients to make "Pottibone dope" which Orohard olaims is buried near the cabin where he and his wife resided winile in Cripple Creek or Independence. We would like to get this dope but it is possible the Vestern Federation has zecovered this before now. I am well aware that Sheriff Bell and Lloyd Thompan have been giving this woman a great deal of annoyance and it may be hard to get her around to our way of thinking. Still we should try to find cut what the Western Federation has been doing with her since Oroherd"g errest.

Hy referring to No. $21^{\prime} \mathrm{s}$ report from Caldwell, it will be noted that Barber wanted the operative to accomeny him in a rig last Sunday when he would introduce him to farmers near where the Government ds building a dam. I hope that the operative availed himself of the opportunity to make this trip. As it takes reports some time to reach me and when they do arrive here it is too late for me to advise the coperative how to act, I would suggest in future when the operative asks for ingtruotions on a matter of this kind that Mr. Hewley irmeaiately sive the instruotions to Mr. Hopkins or No. 9 who will in turn instruct the operative at the earliest opportunity possible.

In connection with Mr. Stearns of the New York mutual, the dollowing is a oopy of the letter received by lir. Robt. A. Pinkerton from Mr. Truesdale, The Chairman of the Nev York Muturi, which explaine itcelf:

It seems to me the suggestion made by Mr. Davies as above is probably the best course to follow in this matior.

Deputy Sheriff Al Baker replevined the goode in question and wanting to know wat he had seen in the atore I hed Mr. Cary see sheriff Miwbet who had mis Deputy, Al Baker, call upon we this aftornoon. Baker said all he had powar to 1 evy on were the wringery, fixtures and some other artiolea which wore clained by the American Wringer Co., and in looking for what he wanted he discovered everal ordinary wooden boxen whion contained a lot of loose ourtridges. He aleo notioed a lot of botties but does not know what thay oontained With the exception that ne notioed the labol of gasoline and benzine upon some of these bottlee. these bottles were taken by wrs. Pettibone in one of Tumer's vane. Mr. Gary took down the memorandur of the oartridges and shellm and will raport on the game and will almo soe Mr. Turner and find out where his driver stored the matorial that he hanled away for Mre. Pattibone.

In talking to Mr. Kennioott of the firm of Kennicott \& Patterson, transfer men, he statad he thought mr. Patterson, his partner, was formerly mployed by the Robert 5 . Roe transfer sompany and hal informed him that he at one time had hauled a lot of rifles enclosed in piano boxes from Pestibone's atore, and to the best of his beliaf those rifles were shipped to the Coour d'Alene Distriot. My informant did not want his name mentioned in this transaction, but would say he is a very reliable man. I have instructed Mr. Cary to investisate this matiar and he will report on the same.

There is nothing further of importanoe to report on this matter excoot to say as you will have already seen from the Denver reports the ald man Elack is Mrs. Pettimone'g father ond also the fact that Mrs. Petsibone intended to lenve for lioise and probably has gone. while I have little confidenco that \(I\) will bo able to a anytulme th this man Jaoob wolfe, nevertheless \(I\) am going to meke an attompt to egain his friondenip providing he will agree to come to the offise. If he don't there is no further use in following after him .

I have just read over No. gin roport for Tuesday, yuy ist, and note that threatonins letters have been rooeived by the saitov of the Caldvell News and that the barn belonging to the Rditor of this Parma Herald haz been burnod. It looks to me as though they aro goilne to inaugurate a reign of terror not only in Caldwoll but in Canyon lounty In general, and as lone af the sheriff pormfts inflamantory atroulars to be posted not only on Court House property but around the town nf Caldvell you oannot expeot other than a reign of terror, as tine Snepiffe actions indicate that oither he personaliy or the citizens of Celdvell or Canyon County are afraid of the threata and bluffe made by the gang of anerohiste that ere doniciled in Caldwall. I vould ilke to be Sheriff of Campon County for one week or for tmenty-four hour is and this ganc including Mr. Cavanauph and whitsell would either be in twe county jail, run out of town or as a last resort there would he a job for the Coxoner.

Is it not possible that, by taking this matter up in the proper manner with Judge Smith that oonditions mould be dhenget before the trial somes up as it now appears the sooialists and anarohiata have teken ontire possorsion of Caldvell at least if not of the whole sounty, und no matter whother it hurtes the feelings of Mr. Cavanamgh and Mr. Whitsell und thip gang, the citizons should take nold and either forco the Sherifi to do his duty or the County Commasioners should aproint somebody elne to tike hib plabe.

Orchard in his oonfossion or at some time later informed me that turing the sumer of 1906 while talking with Heywood and Mover, Sohmelzer, a member of the Executive Board Prom Colorado and Utah, came into headquarters and a general conversation ensued in which Sonmelzer informed them that the President of the foal union at Silverton had killed a scab in the following manner: the president of the union had his gun dow in his side coat poiret and shot this man through his coat pocket without pulling his gun from his pooka at all. Sohnelzer stated that the man that did the shooting was very nervous as it was the first man he had killed, and he (Sohiaelier) wanted Haywood and Moyer to appoint this man as an organizer and let him travel over the country until he pot over his nervoumeas. I am not positive nov as to whether the man that did the killing was present or not.

Fishing to get the facts on this matter I had a talk with a couple of informants some time ago who are well posted in silverton. The had a slight recollection of this killing tut murders were so freequent there that they paid little or no attention to it. However one of the men stated he was going to silverton in a few days and on his return he informed me he would have all the data \(I\) wanted.

Today he called on me at my office and informed me that this murder concurred on the night of July th, 1905, and the nave of the Preston the local union then is Sam Stitzer who iss still president. The Secretary is Chs. R. Waters. The name of the man killed was Reward Mensoho or Menreho but was generally known by the name of Moron. It was reported at the time that this man had formerly worked in the lour d Alone Disriot as scab. There was an inquest \(h\) id d at the time and some parties testified to the effect that this man had been quarreling with several unknown men and was drunk at the time he was kill od, which according to the statements made by Sohmelzer to Mayer and haywood in the presence of Orchard is not go.

I would suggest that the first time Mr. Hewiey visits Or hard that he take this meteor up with him in order to help Oraherd's many on the facts as he got them from Schemer and help him ont a little on dates, that is to say it must have been some time after July fth that this conversation took place.

Havines read over No. 21's report for May 3rd and knowing that he was doing very well and thinking that the loss of his position would jeopardize to some extent hie usefulness, I wired our Mr. Hopkins as follows:

I was very muon pleased to receive the following reply from Mr. Hopkins:

The only thing that bothers me now is that some of the good citizens of Caldwell who are hot on the operative's trail, and we can not blame them as they are not in position to know what the operative's business is, may attempt to run him out of town. I therefore would sugeses that without giving the operative away that Mr. Pice or somebody that can be depend ed upon should be instructed to 2 at this man alone as I an see the importance of the position that whitsell has now placed him in. In this way the operative urey bo able to get a great many facts relative to the manner in which the lawyers are erring to conduct the defense. In fact he may be employed by then during: the whole trial if the thing is worked right, and takings this into oorelderation it is very dangerous even to make any suggestion such as I have mentioned to Mr. Rice or to anybody else for the simple rosie the Mr. Ri oe might confide to some of his friends and the operative might be urioovered. I Till leave this matter to Gov. Gooding and Mr. Hawley.

Denver, Tuesday, May 8, 1906.
Today I had a Long conversation with Mr. Filing on the matter of obtaining the evidence we require as to the telegraphing of money through the Western Union Telegraph co. by Haywood to Adams ats Ogden and also the telegraphing of money to Harry Green by Pottibone under the name of Pat Bone to Orohard in San Irunoisoo. I also referred Adams' request on the Manager of the Western Union Telegraph Co. at New York to Mr. Fllius and forwarded the same to our New York office. Notwithstanding the promises we have received from the Western Union Telegraph Co. it may possibly be that the record that we require will mot be given to us even on Adars' request except that a subpoena dues tom be issued by Judge Smith For this record. Mr. Filing holds to this opinion and \(I\) am inclined to agree with him.

The Western Union Telegraph Co. has a rule, here in Denver at least, that requires the signature of the party sending money to be written on a form, and if the Company carries out its agreement, that is in New York, and delivers up the documents requested by Adams we will find Haywood's signature on the form referred to. At present I don't know whether the Postal Telegraph Co. requires the signature of the sender of money or not, but that \(I\) will have investigated.

In the matter of Pearl Moore, the registry clerk of the Denver post office, as has already been reported, a subpoena dues cecum will have to be 1 sued for fer. In the matter of the unsigned telegram gent from Spokane to Orchard at Caldwell after his arrest, the original telegram as far as we can learn is evil at the Western Union. Telegraph Company's office at Spokane, therefore a subpoena dices torus should be issued to the Manager of the Western Union Telegraph Co. at spokane. I suppose the same thing would have to be done with the Telegraph Company 's agent at Caldwell. This is the opinion of Mr. Filius.

All that the Agency an expect telegraph companies of oils to give us is the information that wo now have and the officials ind ed have been very kind in giving information an to how to olotain copies of the telegrams in question, as have also been the post office officials. I have written today to our San Francisco office to find out if the receipt that Orchard gave the posflofficials on receiving the registered letter addressed to John Dempsey 1 s still in existence. fo know that it existed prior to the earthquake. A subpoena dues team would have
to be issued to the proper official at the post office at San Franoisoo in order to obtain th1s reoelpt.

Hullivan is atill aiok in bed and therefore is unable to oome to my office providing he wili oonsent to come at all, but I am of the opinion that after Mr. Mrucaurf, the Manager of the Denvor Gas \& meotric Co., thalks with Hullivan he will agee to oome to my offioe.

Mr. Hewl whas writton me in oonneotion with Orohard's making a full breast of the Canadian end of his confession. I know that Orcherd wants to do this as he does not want to tell an untruth, but that is a matter for the counsel for the prosecution tio decide upon. I have no advice to give on that subject exoopt to say that if Orohard testipled to his Canadian reoord it may injure our asse to a oertain extent but the probabilities are that the defense would bring this out and if so it would be still worse. If Mrs. Orchard No. 2 oould prove that Orchard was visited by Pettibone or that Pettibone had spor brought up dope or hell-fire to the Orchard house or that miller had offered her firty coliars for making an afridavit as roforred to by the voman that Fioyd Thompson has roping Mrs. Orohard, she would be an important witness to us, but as to whether she would side in with orohard after learning of his dupliaity after having another wife is g.mathing that we ounnot now detormine.

This afternoon by appointment I met lir. D. H. Woffat and Mir. Wi.g. bvans at the latter's office, and was in consultation with them for about two hours and a half. They both feel highly pleased at the condition of this oase as it now stands and informed me thet when any financial help is needed wr. Filius by making application to Mr. Evans or Mr. Moffat oan seoure the same.

I think we will not be able to get any information fron Jacob Wolfe who is now keeping etore for Mrs. Pettibone or rather is seling out the balano of the stook that was not seized by the theriff. However, we are doing overythine in our power to oorroborate the statements of Orchard and adams.

By reforring to a copy of the Idaho Unionist you will note that this papor has been subsidized by the Western Federation of Miners and in my opinion the language used in the paper is just as bad as in the Appeal to Reason or the roledo Socialist or any other anarchist publication that we have in the country. I don't know who publishes this paper and it may possibly be that somebody would have some influence over the party responsible for the nublication of these articles whion is simply a matter of ash to him. I fust merely refer to this matter so that it oan be looked into by the Governor, Mr. Hawley and Mr . Horah.

In oonnection with the Western Union Telegreph Co. I forgot to state that J. G. Lay now in the Company'si employ at Hartford, Conu., was manager of the Western Union Telegraph Co. in Denver in June, 1903, at the time that haywood telegruphed the seventy-five dollars to Adams, at Ogden.

Manager James Mcfarland reports:
Denver, Wednesday, May 9, 1906.
At 7:45 A.M. Brig. -Gen. Hale called at my house. He informed me that at the instance of President Roosevelt he had been oallod to washington and had just returned a few daysago. at one time in digcaning the way that President Roosevelt book hold of matters with General Hale, I remarked that I had never seen a man who had so much business on hand who looked after small details as President Roosevelt did. The General stated that while he was called to Washington on matters relating to conditions at Fort Logan which is loaated at; Denver, the manner of President Roosevelt reminded him of whet I had sa: ld relative to his keeping in touch with mali details.

When he first met the President after the hánd-shake, the President asked him if he over had been oonneoted with any of the labor troubles here in Colorado, and if so he would like to hear from the General on the subject; as few persons in the state of Colorado are better posted on the outrages committed by the Western Federation of Miners, the General gave him full details in as concise a way as poribile. The President then remarked, "The developments that have been made in Idaho on the natter of the assassination of Ex-Gov. Steunenberg show a terrible state of affairs in the Western States more eapeotaliy in Colorado and Idaho." He then asked if he (Brig-Gen. Hale) knew me personally, and the General replied he did as we had lived netphbors and ware close frionds for many years; furthermore that I was a very quiet and unassuming man, not only well liked by my neighbors and friends but that all good citizens who knew him and some that were more or less inclined to Socialism respected me and would believe anything: that I said. To this the President replied, "I am very glad to hear you speak in that way as anon persons as I have talked to who know moparlend five him the same character. Now knowing the General as I do, it looks to me that an opal to the President by the Western Federation of diners would get a cold reception.

I am sorry to say that the man hullivan by wore I hope to prove the intimacy that existed between Orchard, Adams, Mover, Haywood, Pettibone and other members of the Inner Circle is still confined to his room and unable to come to my office.

You will have noted the special report I forwarded you yesterday, copy of Marion Moor's note book, and I have delivered the note book and copy of the report to Mr. Elifus who after examining the same

Filius atiny office and took up with him the letter that Orohard wrote to his wifis to be handed to her by a representative from the office, al so other mettera pertaining to the oase. Mr. Filius thought that the lotter in question would induce Mrs. Orohard to tell anything thet she knowe and also reveal the hiding place of the material for making "hell fire" or "Pettibone dope" that Orohard mentions in his confession.

He stated that Floyd Thompson had told him that Mrs. Orohard atill had a vory warm feeling, for her husband, that he had eereral conferences with her, had obtained a portion of a bottle of benzine and a portion of a bottle of aloohol, aiso that Pettibone was first introduced to her und or the name of Morgan, and that she was getting eomewhat friandy with Thompan as he had given her a little money. Hig went on to say that Thompson in his position as secretary of the mine Owers' Asen. was pretty well thousht of by Mr. Campbell and others on whom we had to depend to get financial absistance, and while the approching of Mrs. Orohard on the plans laid down by me would be all rifit and would probably get what we wanted, nevertheless whon this matier developed at the crial providine that her statement was of an: value it might be misoonstrued by Mr. Thompson, and Mr. Campbell amd other mine owners who now support us mient not be satisfled. Manager James MoParLand reports:
Denver, Gaturday, May 12, 1906.
At 9:30 A.M. Hoyd Thompson oalled at my oris se. d first took up the matter of Rmett Coohrane and subsequently Baker." Thompson very frankly aduitted that he had Cochrane omployed for some time and that Coohran had suggested the employment of Baker. I told him dil about Baker and Coohrane, and that one of the main things that I wanted to see him about; was to warn him against these two men so no sistake would be made by him or the Mine Owners' Association. He seemed to be very thankful to me.

I thes went on to tell him that on aonount of the fact that he had been recently talking with Mrs. Orohard I did not allow our operative to approaoh Mrs. Orchard as I had Iirst direoted him to do but wanted him (Thompson) to work the mattor up in his own wey. I stated however that in advance 1 had written Harry Orahard to writie a letter to his wife instruating her to give us all information she had in her posecsion and also deliver up all material for making "Pottibone dope" and if her ovidence was important wo would take care of her. I aid Orchurd was not willing to do this at first but aftor Mr. Hawloy and Mr. Borah talked with him he changed his mind because two days arso I reacived a letter from him (hending the letter over to Mr. Thompson to read). Thompson said he expected a latter of that kind but didn't get it, although Mr. Hawley informed him that he would get iz. I told him if he wanted to he oould present this lettor to her; he eald thetwould not do, which of course I knew it would not, as he told Mrs. Oronard he expeoted a letter of this kind addressed to himself. I seid, "wr. Filius says that you are of the opinion that this women is still very fond of Orahard and you have made a fair impression upon her. Now am going to \(\in i f\) e this lettor to our superintendent to have him oall on Mrs. Orohard ond I would sugeast that you eo with Mr. Cary, our Sujt., over to her house." This seemed to please him vory umoh and then he went on to say that urs. Orohard was very hostile to the Pinkerton Agenay and intimated that he onocuraged her somewhe in her hostility in order to get her'to comply with his wishes which I told him was natural as I considered it was no difference how he got the information as lonk as ne get it rlght. He sadi mes. Oroligrd 18 a wondorful talker end you must let her have hor may before you can get her down to facts. He is afraid she won't make a very good witness, however the fact of Pettitone going

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there under an assumed name would be vory inportant. She olamad to Thomoson that if Orchard is convioted she mas omough evidunoe in e trunr te hams all the memberin of the Ventern Pederation. thomoson like mymelf thincm the talke wild on that point, neverthelens ane may have some lottern. sine would polnt to the north side of the houne when the gaid ha had anough evin mac richt thare that would conviot mar members of o the Wentera Federation, and there is no doubt we told Thormeon at the time, whe delivered to nim the bottiles of alcohol and bangine a good many faots although rather unduportanti.

I called in Mr. Cary, our Smperintendent, and told hin what I wanted done, therefore he and thompan will go to Cripple Creek tonlght or comorret morning and will oall upon Mrs. Orohare. Thompaon will get a large grip-sadk for the purpose of carryiry way the material for making the Pettibone dope that is cached somewhere arcund the Oranard house. If Thompson is risht that me still loves Oronard and if she has eny letter or any other matter that oas be used as ovidenoe, no doubt Mr. Cary will be able to get it from her as she will see from the letter that Mr. Cary delivera to her that Orohard recognizes ne as his friend.

Thompson informed me that swain told him that I blamed him (Thompson) and Sheriff Bell for the efoape of Simpking and had called thon all names imaginable, and that \(I\) not only tola swain of this but that I had told it to the Covernor wo had al go told Swain the ame thing. I desoribed to Thompson the doubla dealinge of gwain with Gov. Gooding in not onusing Bimpking arrest as the Governor instruated inin to do, and also showed him why \(I\) would not ask the Governor where 3wain vas looated. I also told Thompson that Swain alaimed to tho oovernor that he could not depend on the offiaicie at Spokano but had wirod sheriff Sutherland to come to Spokane and arrent Simpkines and when ho made this mtatement to the Governor I believed it although I thought it very strange that he oould not append on the polioe or Sheriff's ofelce in Spakane, and on the IIrst day of April while the Governor, Mr. Hawley and myself wore in conference with Sheriff Suthorland in Bofa the Bherifz informed us thet he never reoedved any telegran fron Swain to make this arrost. Thompon sald, what is true, he didn't get amy telegran from Swain but sutheriand did got talegren fron your Supt. at Spokanc on the day that Swain left for waraner became I sew the relegrame ire Governor will romember that the next rorning after Swain had boan instruoted to have simpkine arrested I wired our Supt. at spokane to see whether Simpkins vas visiting nis wifo that point, and subsequentiy got roply to the effeot that he had left, on the 7:45 A. H e train for Wardner. When I Fired badr to our Spokane offioe to have iniseiff SutherLand ffeot his arrost, and that is the tolegram that sheriff bell and Floyd Thompson eaw, and up until foday Thompson did not know that Swain oldined to have wired Sherdip smberland.
1. Then thrmed over to Page 21 of the Idaho Magzine and arev nis attention to the abuse that Swain through this men Sispenn has heaped upoil Orchard ' head, our chtel winess, and romerked thet wile possibly Orcherd was the mongtor thet Mr. Swain had ropresented him to be, it wes a blow at the prosocution to heve out an ariole publishod anc from such
a source. Thompson thought that was a terrible thing to do., I then drew his attention to the third paragraph of the interview with Swain in the Spokeaman-Review, Sanday, April 29th. When mompson had examined the two artioles in question he adinittod that neither the kearst papers, Miners' Magazine, Toledo Socialist or Appeal to Reason oould have published any articie that would do the prosecution as muoh harm as the publications in question, and he came to the same conolusion that \(I\) have, that the tiniel Agency vas working on behalf of the western Federation. This seemed to ohange Mr. Thompson entirely.

He furth or informed me confidentially that he had to break away from Sheriff Bell, and in future would mind his own business. He said he ald not see any show for Sheriff Bell to be re-nominatied or eleoted if he was nominated. He seomed to be highly pieased with the interviow. He thinks that Floyd Milier, the man that furnished the powder for the Independence mine is a very weak man and informed me that at present miller is renting a farm near Salina, Kansab. He has relatives in Salina, Kansas, named Williams. If Orohard and Adams are allowed to testify on the matter of the blowing, up of the Independence dapot it would be vory important to have Floyd Miller who furnished the powder present to corroborate their testimony, and if Mr. Hawiay and Mr. Borah tinink we ahould have Floyd Miller I would sugrest that a first-class operative be detailed to go to Salina, Kansas, where Miller lives and take the mattor up with him. I think we might be ahle to scare him into makine; a statement.

Joe Krieg, Mrs. Orchard's brother, is said to be in Dellas, Texas, running a smali frocery store, and Bill Caffney, who kept watoh on the outside at the time Aikian and Orohard placed the bomb and gun in the Vindioator whioh subsequently killed Beak and MoCormick, is now living somewhere near midiand, Maryiand, working in a aoal mine; his mother and sisters are living thore. Relative to the Vindioator affair Thompson clalms to have the eun that was used to explode the bomb on that occaeion. It was originally purohased in the Tompkins hardware store at relluride. I would like Mr. Hawley or Mr. Borah to interview Orohard relative to this gun and get all the facts that Orohard knows about the gun that was used on that occasion, and if he knows anything about the gun having been rebored to kive us the name of the party that reboced the gun. So far as the olerk in Tompking hardware store could remember he thought the man that bought this fun resomhled Steve Adams. I would ifke very muoh that this matter be taken up with Oroherd. Hefore questioning Thompson about the frun that wes found in the ruins of the Independenoe depor I informed him thet there had been no gun used there by the partios that exploded the bomb, and that the gun muet have been oarriod by one of the poor followe that was killen. I didn't want Thompson to tell me about the pione of wire that he clame to have found attached to the trigger. Thompson said he thoupht that way now, but at first thought, on acoount of the eun beinf used in the explosion at the vindicator thet possibly a pun was used at the Independence depot, therefore I have wiped the matter of this run out of the way.

Thompson stated a man named W. R. O'Nell had gone to Hoise with a thousand doliars giving Kirwan a reooipt for this thousand dollare. Inis information \(I\) believe was given to Thompson by Coohrane and there is no relianise to bs placed on it. Thompon alav referred to the meeting at Frinidad which Mrank Hangs attended and winioh 18 reported In a special report, and stated Hangs had selected two men to go Canyon County with twenty thousand dollars to diatribute among prospective jurors and that the money would be oarried up there by W. R. o'veil. I told Mr. 'Phompaon that ho aould not plade any reliance on the Prinidad affair, that the defonse had men that. were attonding to that part of tho business but that thore was not twonty thousand dollars to be distributad as they did not have twenty thousand dollars to be used in that. way. I have writtell No. 21 and albo No. \(10^{\circ}\) to look out for any gtrange mombers of the Festern Feneration that may arrive in Caldwell or Boise sud \(4 s\) soon as thsy are reported the -Governor or Mr. Hawley will have to lave somebody that aja keep close tab on these men at sither plade. The two oporatives will not be able to do that; they wilj keep in onntact with thom as muoh as possible but oannot shadow thom.

I find that, mompson through a woman named Day is tryinf to ap roach Mrs. Georin who is at present in Chioago; that is the womari who kept the Belmont on Stout St. where Orohard ueed to board. He says that notwithstiandinf the faot tingt Mrg. Day 18 friendly with ivis. deerin ane could not get anything out of her. I tola Thompeon to oontinue in that direotion as we knew MrB. Geerin could give gome information if she was approached rifht. He aaid lirs. Day was out at least one nikht with Orohard, Pattibone and Mre. Ceerin. \(I\) would suggest that Orohard be asked as to whether or not he ever was out with Pettibone. Mre. Geerin and wri. Day as Mre. Day may be telling a falsehood. However, we know that Pettibone ased to take Mrs. neerin out.

Denver, Monday, Mey 14, 1906.
Today I had a conference with Mr. Filius. Mr. Filius is of the opiniton that we should try to locate Floyd miller on the information that we have reouived from Hloya Thompson that Miller is lesated somowhere on a Parm near salina, Kansaz, amd has relatives living in Salima named \(w 1111 a m s\). It was agreed that I cetail an oporative to go to Balina, Kansas, to locate Miller if possible, and embequentiy \(I\) would go to Saline porsonaliy and interviet Miller. Miller as you are aware is the man that proour od the two lirty pound boxes of powder used by Miams and Orohard in blowing up the Ind opendenoe depot. fullivan is atill unable to do bustnems, bentios Mr. Frueaurf of the Donver Gas \& meatric Co. has been buaily ongaged in eleotioneering for a new franohise. The election take place tomorrow and after that it looks as though Mr. Frueauff will be able to get Kullivan to oome to my office.

Later I saw oen. Wolis and had long conforence with him. As. Mr. Hawley's letters on the subject of what shoula be done with the Goddard bomb do not contain the information that we want, that is whethor we shall extraot the power from this bomb or not, I woula like very muoh that Mr. Hewley see Judge Smith and give us definite information on thet aubject. I on'e believe in oarrying this bomb en it now is to Caldwell; I think it would be dangerous and \(I\) am led to believe that den. Wells has oome to the same conclusion although he did not say so. There is no coubt but that he would be willing to undertake the carrying of this bomb to Caldwell.

Mr. Filius has concluded that the memorandum book of Merion Moor should be kept and has advised mo to send Mr. Barlow the twenty collars which is the amount of the reward thet Moor offored for the return of this book. You have already peceived extraots from the book in a roport made by me for days ago.

During the day ass 't sapt. Prottyman received telophone mesaage Irom supt. Cery now at Cripple Creok for the purpose of interviewing Mrs. Orohari, in which kr. Caxy sild that Mrs. Oronert eeemad to be wholly unreliable with the exooption thet she stiolse to the statiment thet when she first sav Pettibone at her nowe in Independence he gave the name of Morgan; that was the time ne save Orchand the three botties, one contalning alcohol, another bomsine and still another turpentine. I have asked that orchari be interviewed on the subject of

Pattivenc abouning the name of Morgan on that occasich, and have received mo ropir as to whother Orohard proren this trumeaction or not. Mrs. Orohard denipe knewing where the meterial vas buried that was to be weol in mating Sholl fire" or Pettibeme cope. Mr. Cary otetod that vr. thompaen hal wiref Mr. Hawley to ene orohard and get the exact loeation where this material fat gached, and leat Mr. hewl oy would not take action on mompaon'e telegram Mr. Cexy requent ed that we telegraph our Mr. Hopking to sec Mr. Hhaley on this matter. I therefore wirod Mr. Hopkins as followa:
"8ee Havioy. Request; nim see Orchmit. Get information requesten Thompson's telegram and wire mompson direot. Answer."
I have read ovor No, \(9^{\prime \prime}\) s rapert for the 9 th and note thet Chief of Polioe gnith of Poontelio is a good law abiding ditizen, and it is possible that we may get a good deal of information from his son now at Portiand. I note that m. Hopkins has taken this matter up by sonding a copy of No. 's report to Mr. Kulper, our superintendent at Portland. No. 21 meens to be doing excellent work. A oopy of the affidavit whioh the defonse is getting up for the purpose of e;tting a chamge of vonue whioh No. 21 has raported is all right. I hope that eventually No. 21 will come in contant with Milier. I would like Mr. Hawley to advise No. 21 through Mr. Hopkins as to whether or not No. 21 shoula try to destroy most of the sodalist and anarohist ditarature that comes into his possession instoad of miling the save. That is a mattor for Mr. Hawley and Mr. Eorah to deoide upon. I note the apeoial roport of No. 15 whion is very interesting, bet the quention \(i s\) as to whethor the parties whose names are mentioned in this report ould be uncd as witnesses, more especially Mrs. Roy A. Cook and her hutband. In omse ve should uso thom there munt be proper means tak to protect then.

In the matier of the attompt to take Oroherd's iffe as reported by No. 16 on May 11 th, there is no doubt but on effert will be mede to kill both oreherd anf Adams and possibiy others connooted with the prosecution, the fact thet seintolair, who has been making throeta, is a youns man does not go to prov that he will not cary out his threats. Fake the recorde of the anarohiste thet have oomattod marder from the time thet the mupreas of Austria vas aseasedinated in Switzerland up to the present time, and you pind thet the parties who threw the bomis were all young men. This hold sood in the anarchist riot at the Haymarket in Chicage; the young man who threw tho bomb on that ooosion mbsequentiy blew his hoad off whic in the cook County Jail. Al cuander Beokian who made the Cesporate attempt to assessinste Mr. Friok of Pittsburg was not yot twonty years old Czolgosm who assaminated Premident Mokiniey was merely young boy, therefore I advise that means be taken by the prosecution to look strictiyl aftar this yourg man saintclair. Younes men like him and the others I have ment ioned would conelder themselves highly honored by assessimeting somebody, mo matter who it was. Then road and digest in thoir own way anaronst and sociaist interature
-
to mon an extent that thes are realy to 90 on the streets and assassinate anybody whon they think opposes them or their caune.

At the ragcention of Prinoipals W. A. and R. A. Pinkertion on m next visit to Idaho \(I\) will take vith me a man whoge sole purpose W111 be to look after my welfare and others engeged in the proseoution. I an not afraia, but at the same time an ounce of provention at noarly all times is worth more than a pound of dire. After the state has mbaitted its teatimony, I boliove that the state of affairs that now eximte vill be consfierably modified. I base m opinion on the fact that oven at the present, time monar is not pouring into the Federation headquirtere, and when the testimony is made pubilia and the veil is iffted from those marderers now under arrest, the contribution funds for ins dofane as In the case of the anarohiats will praotioally osase. ve are vell aware that the hat-passers at sooialiat meetings as rul oonsume nearly every dollar that ia subsoribed. What we have been up against is the fact that morbers of regular organized unians have been subscribing for the defense of these men under false apprehensions and wen the veil is lifted these subscriptions will cease entirely.

Again referring to ryy telegran to Mr. Hopking would agy. I received a telegram from Mr. Hopkins reading an follown:
arimbley will do as requested."
I have not heard further from Mr. Ciry on this subject.
In the mator of the blowing up of the Vindicator Mine, Mr. Thompson informed me that the defense wo proouring affinavita to show tifat Oroherd, Akman and Sohultze oould not have gotien on the aixth I. \(r\) el as Orohard olaimed they did. Mr. Thompson has e civil enfineer who will be able to show that what orohard said relative to entering this mine is correct. I would augesest that this oivil encineer with a proper map of the Vindicator Mine be in attendance as witnese durint the trial or be prepared to cone on recelpt of \(\varepsilon\) telegram.

In my conferance with Mre bilius he shoved letter whid either ne or Mr. Thompan had reoedved from mmot Cochrane from San Francisco in whioh Cochrene recommended a man named Lewis of Tonopah as a good informant. This men Lewis vas formeriy an organizer in California and took a prominent part some yeare ago in managing the strike of the fron Mountain Copper Co. at Keswiok, California. Lewis in thoroughly unprincipled. The Lact thet Coohrane recommended Lewie showe that I was rieht when I informed moyd thompson and Mr. Filius thet Coohrane was apy in the mploy of the western Federation. Coonrane has been in the omploy of Mr. Thompson, Secy, of the Cripple Creek Mine Owners Assn. and tried to have Lewis mimus Baker at present in Goldfield takon into thoiv employ and now ho reoommonde this man Lowis as a good informant. It in possible that Haker and Coohrane my how up eround Boise, Nimpa and Caldwell during the trials or cvon before the triads at caldwoll and may attompt to manufacture some informetion for tho state in ordor to get omployment by the stato. Herewth are the descriptions of both Cochrane and Eaker but at preaent I an unable to osoribe Lewis, but I think it mare than possible thet. Or shard and Adansheve met Levin.

\section*{Description of thanet Cochrane.}

Age 29; Height 5 ft. 8 in.; weight 185 to 160 pound a; nationality, American; Place of birth, Pueblo, Colo; married; florid complexion; light brown hair; occupation, Miner; is member of Western Federation of Miners and member of the Ancient Order of United Workmen. Description of Lewis mImas Racer.
Age 86; height 6 ft. 10 in. weight 140 to 140 pounds; nationality, American; plane of birth, Pittsfield, Ills: married; proCessions, miner and barber; is member of the Western Federation of Miners and I think of the Barber. Union as well. I don't know exactly as to Baker's complexion but will get that later on.

Both these zen are spies in the employ of the festernifedereLion of miners. Of the twopoonrane is possibly the worst as in e is matter than Baker. I havoroopiec of the demoriptions of both these mon to Mr. Hopkins with instructions that he give the same to opts. No. 15 and No. 21 mo that they can be on the look out, and if Orohard or Adams can describe Lewis the description should be given to Mr. Hopkins who can \(\mathrm{g}_{\mathrm{s}} \mathrm{t}\) e the same to Opts. No. 15 and No. 21.

In connection with this matter would say that too mach care cannot be taken for the safety of Or chard and Adams enroute to and at Caldwell. We. cannot afford to have their meal cooked in gay of the hotels. I think arrangements should be made with the sheriff or some cither oitizon of Caldwell to provide these mon with meals amd also to provide for a place for then to stay when the oonasion arises that they
 the Governor, Mr. Howler and Mr. Bora make provision for as it is some thing I cannot provide for myself.

Nampa being a particular point onrouto from Boise to Caldwell ala o the fact that it is located in Canyon County as \(I\) understand it, \(a\) good operative should be detailed to take up the work in Nampa on the same lines that have taken the work up in Hols and Caldwell end a Citizens \({ }^{\circ}\) Comitite should be organized in Nampa and in boise. I under m stand there is citizens committee already in Caldwell. It would be hard for an operative to work in Nampa unknown to Marshal Millard, but \&\% We can possibly place one at that point unknown to Mr. Lollard it wold be much better; notwitingtanding the fact that Mar anal millard is a law and order men. officers are as a rule inclined to talk to their friended. \(L\) dons know whether \(1 t\) is the bar tender or the proprietor of the Pulinum bar, but either one or both are socialite or inclined to be ac; that I have heard tire and again.I cont think I have authority to place a man in Nampa without the consent of the Governor, and would life to hear from the Governor on that point. Relative to this mattor would may that todsy I received the Pollowing letter frem Mr. Thornhill, our superintendent in New York whioh explains the mannor in which the Weatern Union Telegraph io. Wishes the State of Idaho to prooeed in order to get the telegrams 4 in question:

Mmis acknowledges your letter of the Bth inst. to Mgr. Cornish at New York with the original order Prom Steve adams on the Wantern Union Telegraph Company, asking thes to give the information as to the tranafer of money on or about June 5rd. 1908, from Denver to Adame. at Ogden, Utah.

I called at the Weatern Union Telegraph Co's offi oe this date, sav the representatives and saw the original transm for of the \(\$ 76\). , which was sent to Adams by Haywood on June 6 th, 1903. The original transfer showe that it was handed in at the Telegraph Co's. offioe at Donver a.t 11:06 A.M., that the amount was \$7\%. and that the sender was W.D. Haywood, \(625{ }^{6}\) " Exohange. On the back of the money transfer it shows that the identification wes waived.

The receipt for \$75. at Ogden shows that the money was received on June 5th, 1903, the sender being W.D. Haywood, Denver, and is duly signod by 3. W. Adams, who identified himself by letters and questions. The money was paid him about 2:30 P. \(\mathrm{H}_{\text {. at }}\) Ogden.

The original transfor for thi money has been ont to the Western Union Telegraph Co's. manager at Denver. me reoeipt for tho 776 . and signed by Alams at the time ne received it at Ogden has been sent to the masager of the Telegraph Co \({ }^{\circ} \mathrm{s}\). offioe at Ogden with a lettor, stating that the state of Idaho will serve a aubpoena for them to take the original papers referring to the \$75 and proceed to Boise City or werever the trial is to take place and to give testimony in the oase now pending, that if, the instructions are, the manager wili piok out the mal. olerk or female clerk who recoived the money transfer in Denver from Haywood and send him forward to tentify; the same at Ogden, the party payine the money to go forward.

I think this oovers the matter mo far as the 875 1s concerned paseing between Ademes and Haywood.

As to the telegram sent and mentioned in Supt. Haeson's letter to Mr. Ahern und or dete of May 3rd, whion telegram was sent from Spokane, Jan. Erd, to Harry Orchard under name of T. Hogan, o/o Sheriff Caldwell, Idaho, reading as follows:- 'Attornoy Fred Milier will gtart for Caldwell in the morning.", the Western Union Telegraph Co. here tofay telegraphed their superintendent, Mr. Reed, to obtain this original telegram from the auperintendent or party in charge of their spokane office and to sand same forward tc main office in Now York. It is desired that an order ba ontained from Harry Orahard requesting the Telegraph Company to turn over or give full partioulars relative to the above montioned telegram, which was sent to hin on Jan. 3rd, 1906, under name of T. Hogen. A similar order to the one just reocived from Adamb. The compeny vill likewise return this telegram to their Spokane superintend ont with same instructions, that when he is served with a subpoena from the State of Idaho he will send forward the olerk who received the telegram with the original telegram to Boise city to testify.

In the future when mattera oome up regarding telegrams, etc., the same prooedure will be necessary us in the above mentioned oases."

While we know that a subpoena duces tecum would have no effect in an ordinary matter, but as the officials of the Western Union Telegraph Co. are willing to assist us they merely want to say that they obeyod an order of court. Mr. Hawley will get an order from Orohard in the same form that the Alams order was drawn up and sond it to me and I will forward it to New York following the same lines that we did in the Adams matter.

I wish to draw your attention, also the attention of Mr. Hawlay and Mr. Horah to the oonduct of Dr. Hers as reported in No. 21 's report for May 13th. Is it possible that Dr. Myers is a traitor or may ne not be connected with the Citizens' Comittee. If wors is a traitor we may find a number of other citizens in Canyon County and more apecially in Caldwell that are traitors at heart although on the outside thoy appear to be good citizens. This thing should be fully gone into. I have writton our Mr. Hopkins today to inform No. 21 thet he must take up with witsell the matter of being paid for his work. If Mo. 21 continues to work for mitsell as he is now doing, the defense is liable to become sumpicious as they will figure out that a man in his position oannot afford to live on air and that he must be receiving monoy from some source or other and will naturally begin to suspect him. I have given No. 21 full instructions how to act on this matter.

You will note that No. 15 in his report for the 14th refers to the carbon signed \({ }^{4} \mathrm{H}_{\mathrm{y}}\) which was found in Room 8 at the Kenimore House.

Tins "/y" is evidently somebody employed by the defense and i have imetruoted Mr. Hopkins to instruct No. is to try if possible to learn who this "fy" is but to be very careful not to uncover himself in so doing: If he is unable to do so without uncovering himself, I have instructed Mr. Hopkins to have Mr. miele all soon as he arrives in Boise try to locate this man.

In the matter of Con Ryan, when the time \(00 m e s\) and we want this man as a witness the best way to get him is to send an operative after him whether it be operative Thiol or not is a matter that I will determine upon later on, however I am very glad to learn that he ants as though he wanted to do what was right. To write him and send him the price of a ticket might not work. It is better to have him in charge of somebody so we are sure to get him. You can see hew important his testimony is from the fact that he saw the bottles while they were still burning and also the fact that his shoes were burned off him in trying to extinguish the fire.

I herewith attach copy of letter received by ie e from Orchard also copy of my reply, and also copy of Orchard's letter to his wife.

The chances are ninety to a hundred that she or some of your old friends would learn of these trials through the newspapers. Furthermore as quick as you reveal your diontity on the witness etend there ia not a doubt in my mind but an investigation will be made by the
defonse in Northumberland County, Canada, therofore the step thet you have taken in writing to your wife is in my estimation one of the best things you could do. She will not be taken by surprise. It is just posaible that the lady that answered my letter has conforred with your wife, and your letter now will reveal to her why \(I\) made the inquiry. I have given your wife the same nowe and address that \(I\) gave in the letter that I wrote to your Priend some time ago.

The following is a copy of the letter that \(I\) wrote to your vife whioh I think covers this matter:

Dearest Florence since \(I\) left you I have been goinc; from bad to worse have fell as low as man could fall in crime and sin 1 am writting this from behind prison walls yes I have lived a fast and reokless life for the first eoven years after 1 left you Dear I worked most of the time made plenty of money but it done me no good it is easy to make money in this country I was very miserable se tried to drown sorrow in the pleasures of the world but did not find any oomfort I at last fell in with a band of murderers thieves robbers and I wac arrested \& oharged with murder a fow months ago my confederates would of got me out of this we had plenty of money \& would not hesitate to ewear to anythink as they have done befor I do not think they oculd of convicted me I did not care much whet did become of me. I knew I would be tried for other charges if \(I\) was not onvicted of this one I wan oharged with then I conoluded I would tell the officers some of the orimes \& thought I might get a ohense to get away \& if I could not do that I might get a hold of somethin;; to do away with myself but while contemplating this I was prompted to pray to God praise his holey name I know he hoard me that has been between two \& three months \& the way is getting brikhter \& today \(I\) would rather be in prison serving God than leading the life I led for the last ten year or more. Manager James MoPerland reports:
Denver, Thursday, May 17, 1906.
TRoday as por appointment Mr. Hoyd Thompson brought Mrs, anna Heilman and Mrs. Orchard to the Agenc. Mr. Thompson sugeested that I taik with Mre. Heilmán firgt as Mrs. Hellman was Mrs. Orohara's oonfidant, which I found to be a fact not only in questioning Mre. Hellman but in questioning wrs, Orahard. In talking with Mrs. Heijman she informed me that Haxry Orohard and other members of the Westein Federation frequently called at her house prior to the blowing up of the Infependence dopot; that Orohard frequently expressed himself as working for the Western Federation of Miners and would make inquiries as to whether certain mines, at least those worked by leasers, ware shipping ore or not and if he discovered them shipping ore he would attend to them later on and he further showed how certain mines could be wrecked by the use of giant powder attaoking the mine from the mountain or oliffs above. She aaid he falt and looked very important after returning from Denver before the explosion of the Ind epend ence depot.

She further went on to tell me of the wild taiking twat Mrs. Orahard had done relative to Miller's visit and the promise she had of money from Miller as also anticipating money from Mr. Cary, our Superintendent. She was to get the money from Milier to make a statement about Orohard being non oompos nentis brousht about by a kiok from a horse in the head, and money from Mr. Cary if she could make statements that would help to oonvict the defendants, Moyer, Haywood and Pattibone. She had talked very wildiy to Mrs. Hellman relative to the prospect of efeting a large amount of money. As I interviewed Mrs. Orohard later will not dwell further on this money question.

In the course of conversation with Mrs. Heilman she stated that Mrs. Orohard told her that Herry Orchard had been born in Canada and had left a wife behind him on leaving Canada and that he had been acoused of burning down a oheese factory. I would say right here that Mre. Orchard denied this and donied that she had made any statement to that effeot, and she seems to think that Orcherd was born in some part of New Yorik State, had lived in Detroit and had run a choese factory somewhere in the neighborhood of Detroit, agreeing to what Orohard stated in nis confession as to what he had told poople about his nativity and about his business. I an at a lose to undorstand how Mrs. Hoilman could get this information from Mrs. Orohard as Orohard stated in his oonfession that his wife was not aware of the fact that he had beon born in Canada
or where Miller could have recoived this information if he told this to Mrs. Orahard, although the latter denies that millor over made guoh a meatement.

I got through with Mra. Keilman about 10:00 A. M. and with the exception of about ome hour between 2:00 and 3:00 P. Bi. I I had Mrs. Orchard \(^{\text {a }}\) in my room from 20:00 A.M. until 5:30 P.M. I had to let her tell all her troubles over and over again, and would ay right here that she is rather an innocent unsuspeoting littile woman and has bean through a lot of trouble, but on the points that I questioned her and from the fact that \(I\) asked the same questions on several occasions, I am led to believe that no matter what she may have told Mra. Hellman or anybody elso that she told me the truth. I am not quite through with her and expect to see her tomorrow afternoon as I have one or two points to question her on.

As it would take a stenographer for days to write up the imaterial matter including the matter of her troubles, I will only refer in this roport to what \(I\) consider is meterial for the prosecution with the exaeption of saying that I am aatiafied that Mrs. Orohard was woll brought up and she 1s very ladylike both in her discourse and her appearance. Hor rirst husband's name was Toney and was a nephew or cousin of Judge Toney now of Denver: His mother was a sister of aen. Alford of Dallas, Taxas. Gen. Alford in his time was a vory able lawyer. She etates that her husband's cousin Alfrod L. Alford at one time odited a paper in Idaho known as the Tribune but she does not know at what town the Tribune was published, further that at one time he had written her huaband that ne was a momber of the Idaho Legislature and urs. Oroherd thinks was speaker of the House. She thinks that this wes possibly ten yours ago but she is not sure as to the dates. The name Alfred L. Alford is somewhat familiar tio me but at this time I cannot exsctiy reoall why the name is so familiar to me, but will try to rememer and write further on this subject.
the following are the principal points that i seoured during my long oonformoe with ErB . Orohard and which I am sutisfied are true. In repiy to my questions she stated for a long time before the blowing up of the Independence depot Harry Orohard and John Neville had oontemplated making trip to Cody, Wyoming. From their taik to her it was thair intention to looste there. This corroborates what Orohard acid in his confession. She further stated that about one week before the blowing up of the Independence depot steve Adaras, and, if she remembers rightiy, Steve's wife called at their house; this was about the first and last time that 3 teve Adame oulled at their house. After taiking a ilttie while hidams took off his coat and she thinks his vest and said to her, I wish you would let me have your brother makintosh. The brother was Joe Krieg; Mr. Krieg, her brother, was not present and she informed Adtans that she supposed Joe would not eare if he took the meckintosh. He not only took the maokintosh but she thinks he took a soft hat boionging to Joe or Harry Orohard. Adams and Orohard then went out and she asked the er where they were going and when they would return; in a joking way they replied, "We are goine to see some girls and will he baok in an hour or so."

They came back about midnight whem adame left the ooat and hat where he had gotton them and put on his own clothes and went home. You will remember in both Orohard'm and Adams' confession of the matter of the blowing up of the Independence that they had everything ready to do the Fork but Sherman Parker and Davia requested them not to do it at that time on aocount of the delegation from the western Federation convention that had come up to try to make terms as they claimod with the Mine Ovners, and therefore nothing mast be done until this delegation had left. I think this will account for the action of Orohard and Adams upon the night in question providing Mrs. Orohard is telling the truth. She then went on to tell that the day before the explosion how Orchard and John Neville and Neville's boy left on their trip for Cody and she gave Orohard ton dollars on that ocoasion. He promisel that she would be taken oare of, at least would reoeive strike honefits from the Wastern Federation whioh she did for a long time up to the time that the strike benefits were cut off. Her two ohildren were down with the measlea at the time that Orohard left and she had veen up and dow all night attending to these ohildren the night of the explosion. She thought when she heard the explosion that lightning had struok the house as a flash oame in over the coor, but hearing the ories of the wounded men as overything, was dark she concluded that the Delmonioo Mine had been blown up. While she now knows that her husband is guility she never suspeoted him, besides Noville's boy had olaimed that he had slept between his father and Orohard when they oamped on thelr way to Colorado Springe and he knen that Orohard had slept with them all night as he (the boy) did not sleep much on account of heing: crushed a littie between h1s father and Orchard.

She has never seen Orohard since he left the diy before the explosion, and she received only two letters from him ; one was dated San Francisoo, April 1, 1905. This was handed to her by Pat Maloney who olaimed that it had been addressed to h 1 m and he tore off the outside envelope. The other one she could not remember the date. We know that at the time this letter was dated Orohard was in Danver. In this letter Orchard directed \(n\) er to address \(\mathrm{h} i \mathrm{~m}\) Harry Orohard, General Delivery, San Franoisoo; she did so and the letter was returned to her through the cead letter office. She received another letter from him dated Nome, Alaska, whioh was handed to her in the same way. This Nome, Alaska, letter was received after she had quite a querrel and tulk with Haywood and threatened him that if she did not hear from her husband she would put the officers on his treil and try to looate him. We know that Orohard never was in Nome and in writing these lotters he deceived his wife, ulthough I didnot say so to her.

After the expiosion of the Independence Lepot she was siok for some weeks, in fact has never been well from that time to thin. Mrs. Adame wrote her from Denver on July 12, 1904, giving her her address and told her thet if she sent a lettor to her for Orohard she thought she could mail the same. There is nothing in this letter of any partioular importance, but ahe answered Mrs. Adame lotter and subsequentiy Mrs. Adams wrote her anothor lotter, which she thinks she

has in hor truix, ankiag hor to dome to Donvor and aaking her to go where she had formeriy lived and pack up all her things in a couplo of trunks and bring them to Donvor with hor. She said that ahe did this and that Mre. Alame had a lot of eturf that she thinks she did not get honestly. The house was a furnished house whore Mrs. Adame iived and in Mrs. Orohard's opinion and from what she has learned since a great many things whe packed in the trunk belonged to the party owning the house, at least the party told her so.

During the latter part of July she arrived in Denver and went to the Belmont on Stout Street as Mrs. Adans had direoted. She could not get Mrs. Adam for some time neithor could she got Pottibone as it being Sunday his store was closed. Howevor, Mrs. Adams oalled upon her and took her to 622 22ad \(3 t .\), a house kept by Mattic Kamfman. They got into oommanioation vith Pettibono through a feliciv named J. H. Harper, a union man who used to be a policeman at either coldfield or Indepondence, and in the evening Pettibone and Arthur Beston oame to 682 Rand St. oarrying Mrs. Orohard's grips. At one tise Pottibone had bean to Independence and aalled at their house and inquired for Orohard. Oschard had introduced Pattibone to her and the ohildren as Morgan. This was the time Pottibone gave Orohard the bottle of turpentinc and as he was giving the bottie to Orohard she happened to oome into the room and Pettibone aaid, "Give this to Fasteriy; he is aide and 1t will do him good." However Orohard put it on the wholf and she used some of it to put on her boy's foot who had injured hin foot on anil, and at the time off the explosion of the Independence Depot this bottie wan knocted off the shelf and was broken. The other tro bottles referred to in Mr. Cary \({ }^{\prime}\) s report and by Mr. Thompson she found on the dining room table one morning; they oontained alaohol and benzine. Orahard aid not say where he got those two bottles from but she knowe he did not get them from Pottibone at the time Pettibone was at her house und er the name of Morgan.

She went on to say when her eldest boy Mark Toney was outside Pettibone and Arthur Baston oame with the gripe, and when Mark oame in Pettibone patted \(\mathrm{h}\{\mathrm{m}\) on the bak and seid to him , Do you know me?" Mark said, You are Mr. Morgan. I saw you at our housen, and then Pettibone smiled and seid his name was Morgan Pettibone or something to that effect. Baston, Pettibone, Mrs. Adams and herself had a long taik about the conditions et Cripple Creek and she related her experience on the night of the explosion and told how the wounded men groaned and soreamed; she said she would never forget it. Pottibona laughed heartily and said, "They hollered like hell did theyp" She said ne made other remarke which she did not care to repeat, but I suppose he said, EThe scabbing sons of b--.- hollered ilke hell did they? She intimated as moh and she seid hor boy could tell just how potibone acted.

Mrs. Adams was doing the ohamber work and running the house for Mattie Karfan who lived with a young man; they weron't married. Mattie Kaurman 1s Madas or head of some dress making dorartment in some large
dry goods hopee here in Deavor and Mrs. Adams was runnime the houne for her. She remolved to leave the Kaufman house as she did not like the essociates and didn't like the way Mrs. Adams oarried on. She intimeted that lus. Alame was very loose charaoter. She hed ranted a room where hor two boya slept from Mrs. Mam: who aoted as houso-keeper for Mrs. Kaufman and Mrs. Alams oharged her \(\$ 8.00\) a month. She musequently disoovered that all that lira. Adams gave Mra. Kautman was 36.00. Mrz. Orohard propared to leave and wanted to leave quietly without notifying Mra: Mams, but on the day that she was proparing to leave Mrs. Adams said she was leaving and that she had arranged that the colored exprossman who stands at the corner of 22nd and Stout Sts. or 22nd and California Sts. to take h ar trunics to Pettibone's store and that lettibone would pay him for hauling the trunks. She said that Mry. Adame mtole a lot of thinge from Mrs. Kaunman including a lot of nice hem stitohod handkorchiefs and other artiolen. Mrs. Adame, left but did not say where she was going. The colored man did not come around arter the trunk: as Mrs. Adams had stated apd in the absence of Mrs. Kaurman ahe sent her boy for the colored expresaman, but he demanded pay for moving the truaks before he would lay a hand on thom. She pald him and told him to colleot the monay from Pettibone and \(1 f\) Pettibone paid him to return the money to her, at the same time he took her trunk to Mrs. Katis'e rooming house 1251 stout \(3 t\). She subsequently oalled on Pettibone and Pettibone aaid he had paid the nipger and then she hunted up the nigeger and got hor money baok. That was the last time she say Mrs. Adins. She etayed in Denver until somewhere about the loth of Soptomm ber, 1904, before going back to Cripple Creok. She took in some sewing and hor eldest boy worked in the Golden Zagle Dry 0oods store getting \(\$ 2.50\) per weak, but she did not get sufficient to reep her and pay the rent of her rooms. She told this to Haywood and she thought she could do better in Cripple Creek and Heywood geve her \(\$ 0.00\) oash extra. She subsoquently oalled upon him when she was about ready to leeve and he geve her another five dollars outside of the six dollars per week she was getting as strike benefits. Not having supficient money to pey her fare and the fare of the ohfidren to Cripple Creek she oalled on Pettibone and asked him to loan her ten dollare tailing him her conditions. Bettibone let her have the ten dollars; this was the day she left for Cripple Creok, or rather she left that ovoning. After getting the ten dollare from Pettibone nhe callod down at the Festern Federation headquarters and again oell upon Haywood. She told Haywood that ne must ifind some meane to discover wher her husband was so she could write him and again threatened him with seading the officers on the hunt of her husband. Haywood talked very mioely and sald he would do overything "n his power to dimcover the whereabouts of her husband. While she was sitting talking with Haywood, Pettibone came into hoadquartere, took down ledger fither out of the rafe or from a shelf bohind the door, put it on the table and mado an ontry in thin lodger. Whil. she oould not swear what the ontiry was she concluded that ho wes simply giving himself aredit on their books for the ten dollare given her, and therefore she ooncluded never to pay
hin the tom collars back oven if whe was able to do so. she left for Cripple Creek and a few dayn afterward ahe recoived a letter hamed to Lier purporting to have beon writton from Mowe by Harry in whion he told her that ho was going to sand for hor, had a fine job and thought he had gtruok it rish. This made hor feel cood for some time; she wrote a letter to Harry at Nome but the lettor was returned, and then she took up With Haywood the matter of trying to looate her hasband and haywapd maid he would do all he oould and that he did not know why Harry shotil not write her. She oleims to have this letter at hor home in Cripple Creck and will sond it to me. She has no use for Mrs. Adams, in fact they are two differont womon altogother and \(I\) know oould not agree, and would have to be kopt apart providing we want Mrs. Órchard at Caldwil during the trials.

Rolative to the dope or the materlal for making the dope found by Mr. Cary and Mr. Thompson, she said that Harry after ooming from Donver at one time put; something in the shed and told the boys they must not touoh it. The boys being inquisitive wanted to know what it was and he told thom it was stuff for killing bears and that was the gtupf thet wae buried in the yard because Pormerly there was a hole in the yard where the boys were playing shaft slaking, therefore Harry would have had no trouble in placing the box down there where it was found and raking a little dirt on top of it.

Relative to the oall by Miller she sald Miller aotod very gentlemanly. He aeked hor whether she had any knowledge that Orahard had been kicked on the head by a horse and wounded so that at times he was not responsible for what he said. She said that Harry has a sar badr under the hair on the forohead and he told her that at one time he fcll off a horse; some grey hair growsover the goar. Miller wanted to know if she did not know that he had been kioked by a horse and ahe told him he had not. Miller meld he diln't want to deceive her buti if she appeared as a witness for the foderation it would injure her husbard 's ohances to escape and assared her that her husband had a very fair chance, and if she appeared against the Federation it mi, ht help her husbad out nome but he hardiy thought so. He questioned hor olosely as to how John Neville died and what doctors attended him. This she could not answer at that time but told him she would let him know. Me asked if Karry had always treated her kindly and sh said he had aiwaya treated her very nioely. He wont on to state that if Harry had done as ne advised ho could not have been convieted but now it looked as though he might be the only one to auffor. She told him that it looked queer to her that her husband should auffor for inis crime and Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone who were qually guilty get froe and thet she would bo willing to do everything in her power to liberate her husband and oonvict the others who were mort guilty than no wan although ahe could not oonceive thet her husband was guilty of the orimes he was acoused of. She weat on to tell Miler that hor husband hed promised the Fodoration would look after her wants and told miller that they hud not done so, that they had eiven her

strike beacifits for some time but they did not allow her enough to live on while she was in Donver. He mid that this was all wrong and he would take the matter up with Kirwan. He asked her financial oondition and she said she had three grocary bilis and a dootor bill and he intimated that he would see that these matters were settied by Mr. Kirwan and that he would oall again. He did not call again bat eubsequently wrote her a letter and asked her these questions: when John Reville died, who was his Doetor and what was the Dootor's opinion as to what oaused his death. Another was if Harry Oroherd had beon kind to her while her husband, and another was as to whether or not she had known of Oraherd being a member of the Mine Owners' Assia., amo she thinks that he inquired as to what she knew about his getting wounued in the head by a kiak frome horse. She is not quite positive about this last question but at the time Miller Celled he asked her whether whe oould testify to the lact that Orchard was a moraber of the Mine Owners' Assn. and she told him she could not but that he told her at one time he would get into the Minc Owners' Assn. as a spy for the Festern Federation. After consulting with Mrs. Neville she wrote Miller that the name of the dootor that attended Noville was Turnor and that the Doctor asild that Neville diod of aancer of the stomach and that ahe did not knov anything further as to how Orahard got hurt and whether it arfeoted him or not. As to what roply if any she made about Orchard belonging to the Mine Owners' Assn. she did not remember. She said she would end miller's letter as well as Haywood's letter when she returned to Cripple Creok. She told me that she told Miller that oroherd had always provided for her in good shape up to the time that he left.

She stated at the present time she has three grocery bilis amounting to about oighty dollars and a doctor bill, she does not know how muoh it is. She intimated that ano was willing to go to Boise to teatify to the facte that she had stated to me. I think it would be well for Mr. Thompson to investigate the bille that she owes and to in some way pay them as her evidence in the matter of the associations of Haywood, Pottibone and Arthur Baston are ini portant in my opinion. She agreed to oall at the Asency tomorrow afternoon when I will have some further talk with hor. She seeme to be very bitter against Sheriff Bell for the way that he aoted after his return from Idaho. He told her thet Orohard had an old hag of a woman with him that no man of am principle would pio out of the gutter, and she told him he ahould havo brought that hag down to Cripple Creek. I tola her not to pay any attontion to Bell that Thompson was her iriend and anything she could remember from \(1 ; 1\) me to time further than what she had told me she could give the information to Mr . Thompson in future. She wanter me to give my opinion as to whether Orchard would be hunc or not. I told her that was a matter on whion I oould give no opinion that no promises had beenmade to Herry, that he was a vory ohanged man for the better and reelized that he had beon doinf wrones.

I questioned her very olowe on what she knew of Oromard's 11fe previous to hor marrying him. She told me thet Oroherd was born
somewhere in New York State and lived in Detroit and had run a obese factory there, b ut to her knowledge he had never been married. She maid he had showed her pictures of is sister and of a baby. She said the had never heard that Orchard had another wife or that he over lived In Canada although she thinks the papers published something to that effect but on that point she was not sure. She declared that Miller never offered her a collar or never claimed that the Western Federation would pay hor any money for making affidavits nor did they ever prosent efridavits for her to alan.

She gave me her photograph to send to Orchard minion I will do as mon as I have the time to write to hire.

In conclusion would say I had a short conference with Floyd Thompson today, and early this morning I had a short conference with Mr. Filius, and from what Mr. Flits tole me we will probably not be in a position to take up the trials of these men in June on account of the pending of the habeas corpus in the United states Supreme Court. I make this note short on account of the fact that this is a matter to be discussed by the lawyers for the prosecution.

I find that Mrs. Orchard thinks a great deal of Mare. Hellman
and I know that Mra. Hellman recognizes Mrs. Or chard as a non-suspecting, harness, virtuous little women although she may have exaggerated matters in a financial way to Mra. Hellman. However in talking to me 1 know she told we the truth.

Denver, Friday, May 18, 1906.
Today I had another conference with Mrs. Orehard and acain took up with her the following ilatters:

1st. The carrying of her rrips by Pottibone and Baston to 522 22nd Street the day of her arrival from Cripple Creok and the talk she had with Pettibone, Baston and Mrs, Adame.

2nd. The storinf of Mrs. Adams' trmaks in Pettibone's store and the payment of the charfes by Pettibone to the expressman.

8rd. The recolpt of \(\$ 5.00\) at two different times over and above her strike allowance from Haywood.

4th. The recaipt of \(\$ 10\) from Pettibone just before she left for Cripple Creek in September 1904 and the subsequent entry that Pettibone made in the ledeer at the Western Federation headquarterg when she was in conversation with Haywood.

5th. The visit of Pettibone to her home in Independence where he assumed the name of inorgan and the handing of the bottlc of turpentine by Pettibone to Orchard telilig him to take it to Bill Easterly as Easterly was sick and \(1 t\) woild do him good.

6th. The deception that Haywood used to her wen she appealed to h im to locate orchard.

7th. The letter that Haywood wrote her, which she still claims to have in her possession and will send to me, in which Haywood stated he did not know where Orchard was.

8th. The three or four latters which the received from Orchard which were evidentiy decoys- one in particular that had been mailed at Nome. (As Marion Moor was at Nome about this time there 13 no doubt that Orchard cave it to h 1 m and he carried f to Nome and mailed 1 f from there.

The three letters that this woman rece1ved from Orchard, two apparently from San Francisco and one from Nome, wust be taken up with Orchard so as to corroborate what she has stated to me.

In addition to this she informed me that one evening before the Indepenience explosion, a fow days before the explosion, Steve dams came to her house in company with zis wife and after sitting aittio Whil ldams dispensed Fith his coat and vest and hat and asked her for her brother, Joo Craigis,mackintosh and old hat. He and Orihard went out

and romained out until about midnight and returned. I think this was the time Adams and Orchard got the powder from the shed in the rear of Floyd Miller a cabin and put it in the old shed where it was kept until they used 1t. This matter must be taken up with Orchara and Adans also. On meeting Mrs. Orchard today she told me she felt fine, that she had the first good night's slap that she has had in six months, that she felt as though a great weight had been lifted from her shoulders.

I again went over the matter of Milier's call upon her and she repeated the same thing as she did yesterday. She told me she would send Millerfs lettor, Haywood's letter and any other letters that she could find that she had received from any of these people including her husband as soon as she went back to Cripple Creek. I had Mr. Cary give her ten dollars and \(1 t\) seemed to please her very much, notwithatanding the fact that she told me that iir. Thompson had furnished her with sufficient money to pay her way while here in Denver.

She afterwards stated that her son Marle could tell all about the cans of dope that Mr. Cary and ir. Thompson had dure up as he sav It in the shed before Orchard buried it but she still adheres to the statement that she did not know it; was buried in the yard. I told her to have her son tell Mr. Thompson all about this and that ghe could have the most implicit faith in irr. Thompson, and if any body called upon her for her to be very careful and if asked any questions to make no definite replies and to remember just who thev wore and carry the information to ilr. Thompson, and she promised to do so as ahe also promised to have her boy make a statement to hr. Thompson. She thinks that Mira. Heilman is the only friend that she ever had and I aegain told \(h\) er that I talked with Mrs. Hollman and that in makiner a confident of irs. Heilman she had medo no mistake.

In partirf Mrs. Orchard said she hoped that I had sent the photograph she left to Harry and if he wanted her to write she would do so but he first must write to her that he wanted her to write. Now I do not know what to say about his writinf a lettor to her but will take the matter up with ilr. Fillius and Mr. Hawley Ehen the latter arrives here in Denver and will not send this photograph to Orchard until I get thoir consent.

If Mr. Fililus thinks that we shovld have Mrs. Orchard swear to the statements that ghe made to me I would suFgest that he, on receipt of these reports, draw up an affidavit and sond it to wr. Thompson ard there is no doubt but ir. Thompson car fet her to swear to the same as I am satisfied she will now do anything that 13 reasonable that Mr. Thompson may ask. I know that she has a good opinion of ir. Thompson and in fact \(I\) krow she has rrest confidence in him.

After irs. Orchard left I saw ir. Mhompson ard fad a lone telk with him on the subjest in question and suegested that r. Thompson eet Mrs. Orchard's boy, Nark Toney, a job whereby he could carn some money. I also took up with IIr. Thompon to see thet is s. Orchard's grocery bilis are paid as I think that this is a food investment, and he sald he will attend to both and will fet a statement from the boy relative to pettibone's visit to Cripple Creek and the expressions that Pettibore made at the meetirig at 522 22nd Street on the day of the arrival of irs. Orchard here in Denver. On the whole I am convincod that irs. Orchard has told me the truth and with a little traininf will make a Food witnoss.

I note that No. 15 has discovered that the man that used the carbon paper referred to in a previous report is named Thorp and that

Thorp is trying to be very friendiy with the operative. The operative must be very guarded in any convorsation that he may hold with this man Thorp and today \(I\) have instructed Mr. Hopkins to instruct the operative to that effect.

Relative to the man Bradiey gettine information through some ponitentiary official, that may be true and it may not be. \(I\) hope that the statements that iradley made are untrue. However, this mateter can be essily run out by gettine some person that you can depend upon to shacow Bradiey and see whom he comes in contact with. So far as Bob Marsh is concerned \(I\) Fould pay no more attention to him than \(I\) would to the barking of a yellow dog and yet at the same time I am lod to believe that Marsh was the author of the threatening letter that was sont to no some time ago as mentioned in my report. As someone may have a sample of Marsh's handwriting I herewith enclose to the Governor and to Mr. Hawley a tracing of the threatening letter in question.

I hope that the matter of Dr, Myers, referred to in operat Are 21's report a few davs ago, will be looked into thorourhly.

In regard to No. \(1.5^{\prime} \mathrm{s}\) spacial report in the matter of Bell and
Campbell, we are well aware so far as Orchard is concerned nelther of these men vere in any way concerned with the murder of fi-Governor Steunenberg. We are also of the opinion that if Orchard had escaped after the murder of In-Govornor Steurienbere he would have been put out of tho way and it \(1 s\) possible that these two mon may have ben hang1ng on the outside for that purpose or for the purpose of killing ExGovernor Steunenberf if Orehard falled. From the time that Orchard took 11: this mattor i take it that simpkins anc the other members of the Inner Circle got impatient with him. We know this from the letters that Orchard fot urging him to do this work.

As to the recelpt of arms by varties 1: the Coour di Inenos. as set orth in ivo. \(15^{\prime}\) s spocial report, world sav that i have instructed jur. Hassor: to tako up theso mattors with Sheriff Sirtherland as the latter mav be in a position to verify the statements that have bean made to the operative relative to tho shippine in of arms to the Couer d' siene district. We are verv well aware that parties connected with labor unions are in the hatit of exaggerating arin we have found that the afitators for the \(W\). F. of \(l i\). have beer adepts \(1:\) misrepresenting things to their fellow mombers and \(1 t\) mey be that the representations made to the operative relative to these arms were not so. However, Mr. Hasson will take this matter up with sheriff Sutherland tho firat time he gees f17.

Last evoning I had a talk with Frank Tarkington who tends ber in Walker's saloon. Walker's saloon is a very respectful place and Tarkingto: is a very nice fentleman. He informed me that a men named Libbey, who at one tine had been stanographer in Judre Indsey's court, had callec seversi times in Walker's saloon and inauired for me. Tarkington dia not pay muen attention to this but on Thursday ovening Ilbbey called in company with another man fhom Tarkineton did not know. Libbey aeain asked Tarkincton in a kine of a whisper: Has McPariand been in here today" Tarkirfton anawered infthe neeative and Libbey asked: "Don't he call here some times?", and matherforaid: "0, oceasionally but not very often." He then asked Tarkineton: "Do rou ever hear him talk about this Idaho affair; you and he are friendss Tarkington said: Yes, but I am not friendiy enough with him to ask him any questions about it, which is true. Libbey thon talkod aside to this companion and said: I have rot a rood contract from ar. fichardson; I am going to Idaho to report these cases. The man asked Libbey how it, was he cot next to lishardson and he replied: mir. Richardaon fot next to me.

As a preface I would say that Tarkington lived at one time in Boise and in a general way is acquainted, with the people there. He is an Elk and Libber is also an Elk; Libbey 15 a member of No. 17 here in Denver. Tarkington went on to say: "Now I can eves why Richardson picked out Libbey. I asked him what his guess was and he replied: "As You are aware, Mr. McFarland, they have a very select lodger of Elks in Boise; the best business and professional men in the city all belong to the Elks." I told him that that was true, and he went on to say Richardson expects that libby will be able to get a great deal of int formation on the strength of Elkdom while in oise and th 110 going back and forth from and as is natural to expect, a great many citzens from Boise "til be present at the trial. I am indined to think Tarkington's views are rich. While Libby is an Elk he 19 not a man of any prominence but may have made it spear to Richardson, who is not an Elk, that he could get a great deal of information on account of has being a member of the fraternity. I may be doing Libby an injustice in this bit \(I\) think Tarkington is rich and merely wish to draw atentron to the fact.

Relative to that portion of my report of the 17 th in the matter of General George F. Alford of Dallas, Texas, being an wile to Mra Orchard's first husband, would say that I have examined our records and find that as agents for the American Bankers Association we arrested ore Allen I. Alford in 1896 charmed with forgery completed at Ios Aneles, convicted him of the crime charred ard he was sentenced to three years In the San Quentin, Cal., penitentiary. On his release in 1899 we again arrested him charged with committing forgery in San Francisco; besides the charges against him at San Francisco we had some other charges against him. His father, howe came to the front, made food all the forgeries that the son had committed and took him back to Texas and at that time it was said that allen I. Al cord's brother edited a newspaper at lewiston and was speaker of the house of representatives in Idaho. It does not seem as thourh Mrs. Orchard knew anything about allan L. Alford's misreads but there 18 one thine certain- that Nile I. Alford was simply a brother of alfred L. Alford that rs. Orchard mentioned as being speaker of the bouse 1 i Idaho.

During the day I have been engaged on the matter in hand and giving instructions on the same. In the afternoon ind a co nference with Mr. Hawley and Br. Fillius at which in. Fililus informed me that I was correct in my surmise that Libbey was the man that had been hired by Richardson to fo to Idaho and he is takine one or two otrer stenographers with him. It was arranfed that Mr. Fillius and I met Mr. Hewley at hig room, No. 200 Brown Palace Hotel, tomorrow morninf at \(90^{\circ} \mathrm{clock}\).

Tuesday, May 22, 1906.
Mr. Hawley, Hr. Fillius and I were engared all of the day at the Brown Palace Hotel going over our reports and getting the names of such parties as we would want to E 0 to Caldwell as witnesses.

Dhrinf the afternoon Floyd 7 hompson arrived and was present with us until after \(5 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}\). Therc was one matter that Mr. Hawley referred to- which was that in one of his interviews with Adams at the penitentiary Adams stated that on his way from Independence to Denver after the explcsion at the Independence dspot he stopped over nirht With a fanily named Pobet at a place near Divide and left at tine Pobst house a rifle and belt. Mrs. Pobst and her family are now residine at Gold Hill, Boulder County, Colorado. Mr. Hawlew requested that this matter be investicated, which 1 wili take up later.

Mr. 'ihompson informed us that it was utterly impossible to fet …rs. Guerin, formerly groprietress of the belmont rooming house here in Denver, to talk. I am not surprised at this on account of the fact that an undue intimacy existed between Pettibone and ins. Guerin. This we have earned through Orchard and it is not likely that she would take the witness stand and show the intimacy that existed between Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone and other members of the Executive Board of the of the W. F. of it.

I have not civen up hopes of beine able to cet somethinf from irs. Guerin's husband as Th. Thorpson informs me that Guerin ane his wif' are now divorced althourh Orcherd was of the opinion that he and his wife or so-called wife had not been married but he had no proof of this except he thourht so.

At this conference inr. Thompson claimed to have the revolver that was used in the explosion of the Vindicator shaft which is a New Pocket Col.ts No. 6173. However, Tr. Thompson \(1 s\) not clear as to who first discovered this revolver after the explosion but thinks that a \(m\) an named Shean, who was kind of a machinist around the Vindicator mine and who is now residine in tionver, was the fir st man to reach the level where the explosion occurred. I will take up the matter of
locating and intorviewing Shoan later on. I would also request that Mr. Hawley or ifr. Bor ak on their next interview with Orchard take up the mattor as to what kind of gun was uad at the vindicator explosion and where he purchapd the gun or at least fro w who he fot the cun; we have a record that this cun was pur chased at the Tompkins Hardware Company in Cripple (reek or Victor.

Today I had a conference with Mr. Hawle: sid 81 so with Shoriff
Nisbet of Denver. As the Socialiatic and Ansrefistic press and also Socialists, Anarchists and others, who are not orily indifferent to the prosecution of these men but claim that Moyer, Haywood and pettikone vere model citizens, I discussed this matter with ir . Hamlev and Mr . Fillius yeaterday and discussed the advisibility of producirf the three doputy sheriffs who arrested these men. It will be \(r\) omemberod that o.t the time of his arrest thero was founc on ioyer's person or possibly 1s: his valise a 44 Autom atic Colts revolver and 100 rounds of cartridges and that Haywood, who was written up as onc of the most model mon in the city of Denver, was found sttippod naked in a room in an assignation house with a woman with a. No. 44 Colts revolver layine on the takle in the room. Pettiboro was also armed, as I understand. Today I received the following lettor from Floyd Thompson:
"Arthur Rogers an Parker, Davin, Rasterly, Orchaxd, Adams, Simpleine and two other men sitting on dump of the Full City, June 4th 1904, watching men come from work. He saw Victor Poole get ohair leg from Zingler'n biloon and give it vo Adome and Parkor.

Harry Hynds oashed two cheoks for Orchard in Chey enne, Wyoming. Hynde is a saloon man. Get after this rope as \(I\) believe it will prove O.K.

In my last report 1 spoke of Orchart's Union record in No. 19. Rogers can idontify these reoorde as he fis o nembar in good atanding in the same Union.

There are some mistakes in the kirs. Orohard statemont ane I will ohenge it before she signs.
A. T. Holman is thoroushly familier with the Vindioutor mine and will make a good witmess."

I would advise that Orahard be seen and tiake up the statoment that Rogers ham made relative to secing Parker, Davis, Easteriy, Ormard Adame, Simpeins aitting on the dump of the Hull dity placor on June 4th, also as to whether Viotor Poole got the chair leg from :ingler's ailoon and gave it to Adem or Parker. Neither Oroharaj nor Adams ina ever informed us whore this chair leg was obtained. I oannot see where Orohard had any oheoks to oash as he reoeived ourrendy before leaving Denvor for Choyenne and we know that he received ourrancy through Pat woran after the latter's return from Donver at the time Orenard and Neville were going to Thermopolis or Cody. Lest Mer. Hawley and Mir. Borch are now bumy and may not have time to attend to this matter I have referred Thompson's letter to Mr. 'Phiele also other matters on this subjeot with the request that he visit Orohard and take this matter up rith him.

I know Harry Hynds wery well but there is no use of sending an operative to Cheyenne to interview Harry Hynde until we hear from Orohard, and if Orohard says that he did not have any trereaction of this kind with Harry Hynde it is not necessary to investigate the matter further.

I wrote Mr. Thompson as follows:
"Replying to yours of the eth in et. would say that if the statement of Arthur Roger: is true and can be corroborated by Orchard or flame or both, then Rogering in opinion will become an important witmons. In case that neither Orchard mar Mams can rancmbor the transaction as stated by Rogers then it is a matter for the lawyers for the prosecution to determine as to whether they would use Rogers as a witness of not. In ease Mams and Orchard cannot corroborate Rogers statement, my judgment and I think your judgment would be that we do not use Rogers as witness.

Neither Orchard nor dome has over been questioned as to where they got the chair leg, however it looks to me as though Rogers would be an important fitness at least in the matter of identifying the records of No. 19, and there is no doubt but A. T. Holman will be wanted as a witness.

In the matter of Sheehan, the machinist employed on the Vindicator, the latter seems very sore against the Mine Owners. He states that on account of his working on the Vindicator he wan posted as a scab and when the Mine Owners were ready he was discharged and could not get work at Cripple Creek, therefore he would not \&o across the street to assist then although he is opposed to the actions of the western Federation of Miners. However he did state that he saw Major Naylor pick up the revolver in \(q\) erection but nov or saw the gun since except ait the inquest. He also thinks that Naylor picked up a pair of pincers and some wire. You will no doubt know where Naylor is now located and if within your reach interview him on this subject and if not let me know where he is and \(I\) will have an operative interview nim.

I incorporated your letter in my report of today and as the lawyers for the state are now busy, I have referred your letter to our operative at Boise who will interview Orchard and Adams on the matter in question, and I will let you know the result a soon as i hear from our operative. I hope you have Mrs. Orchard's and her son'e affidavits acknowledged all right."

In reply to my questions an the matter of the letters that he had written hia wife from San Pranciaco dated April Ist and April 17th, 1905, he stated that these letuers were written at the instance of Heywood, and Pettibone, he being in Denvar at the time specified notwithetandine the fact that he dated the lettere San Francimoo. Heywood, Pettibone and foyer informed him that he must not reveal his whereabouts to himife as the latter, beine fully convinced of his innocence in the matter of the blowinf; up of the Independence depot, would be sure to tell the authorities where he wea; therefore he misled her in this correspondence. Both the letters of April lst and 17th were riven to Paddy Maloney to carry to Cripple Craek. In one instance Paddy Maloney delivered the letter in person. and in the other instance the letter was left at the Union store to be deliverfd to her. In the matter of the letter of August 5 th. 1905 this letter was writion at the instance of royer Heywood ana Pettibone by Orcherd, addreseed to his wife and dated Cape Noms. It mas carried to Cape fome by Marion oore the executive committeemen from Arizona, who mailed it at that point. He etated that he hated to deoeive his wife in this way but beine under the control of loyer, Heywood and Pottidbone he did this just as they sugesested.

In 1904, on his return fro" lyomins, where he had gone with John Neville after the hlowing up of the Independence depot, he only stopped in nenver few day before he ment to San Francisco to assassinate \(P\) r. Bradley. Mra. Orchurd had done to Denver at this time, but under the advice of yoyer, Heywood and Pettibone he failed to meet her, as, they claimed they were afraid she would tell others of his whereabouts so that he would be arrested and charged wit the blowine up of the Idependence depot, and lest she should discover his whereabouts they hurried him off to San Francisco.

He said that on leaving jenver in 1904 of ter the blowing up of the Independence depot Pettibone and Yeywooi told him that they would send his wife a hundred dollars and would give her ten dollars a week as trike benefite, so she would be taken care of. He supposed that this was done, and in fact up to the time that he met Adams here ho thoupht it had been done, but has found out now that his wife was not taken care of.

He stated that Heywood knew very well when he wrote to cre. Orchard on Nov. 18th, 1905, that he, Orchard, was detailed on the Steunenberg matter and was not in Fairbanks. Alaska, us ho, leywood, stated, bat it was eimply a letter to mislead Mrs. Orchard. In fact

Mra. Adams left the Coffman House on 22nd street, Denver, for the purpose of avoiding Mre. Orchard, es she mes afraid Mre. Orchard would tell where he mes locsted, as Mrs. Orchard seemed to take it for granted that noither Aiams nor Orchard was guilty of any crime. He went on to sey thet Heywood at one time informed him, Orchard, that he, Heywood, had dotailed Arthur Baston to amansinate Stounenberg but Baeton had come out here to Idaho and subaequently got married and did not do the jolb. He has a faint recollection that Beston told him that wile he was in Idaho Winster met him and claimed that he had beon eont to assist in the asmasination of Gov. Steunenberg but subsequently want beok to Oalifornia and they made no attempt to carry out the instructions from houdquarteris in the matter of amaneinating the ex-Governor. In talking with Adanes the lettor informed me that Baston never spoke to him on tiss subject. orchard wont on to may that durine the fow dcys that he remained in Donver on his way to Fyoming with John Noville after the blowing up of the Independenge Heywood informed him that the morning after the explosion senator Pattormon oalled up Heyrood over the telophone from the Senator's house. The Senctor ceoped to be very mat, and enid. Now you fellow have put your foot in it, Through this explosion there has probmibly been twonty people kilied. This act will prevent the olection of a Densocratic governor, and not only that hut it will prevent the ettlement of the strike': Your committee went to Cripple Creok and they certainly knew very weli that this strike could be settied theruby ingurine the election of a Democrat as Governor of this state, but now there will never be any aettiement of the trike, and the chances are that no matter what man the nomocratis place in the field as a candidate for governor he will be defeated." To thí Heywood replied that they were not fuilty of the blowine up of the Independence and that the blowing up of the Independence depot injured the Western Federation more than it injured anyone ele, and that Mr. patterson was mistaken. Heywood laughed very heartily in telling this to orchard, and said "The old devil (meaning Patterson) is wies; he knew very well we were guilty "but I had to make the best I could of it and deny that we had anything to do with this outrage, hut I know very well that Pattermon did not believe me.

In the matter of the pun that was used to oxplode the homb in the Vindicator, Orchard atated that it was a 32 Colta, and he saw it on exhibition at, the coroner's inquest. He did he rot that little gun from John Neville, snd Neville had got the gun either in Ieadville or Ouray in 1890 or 91 . He did not know where he purchased it but knew that it was purchaned before any kold was discovered in Cripule Creek, therefore Neville could not have purchased it fro the Tompkins Hardware Company in Cripple Creek as that compony did not oxist at that time in Cripple Creek; hoever, he may have purchased it from the Tompkins Hardware Company at Ioadville wich company wa: in business lone before Neville got possession of this gun.

As an essayer named Ropers had claimed not only to Ployd Thompson tut to one of our operetives that he had before the blowing up of the depot seen Orchard, Sherman Parker, W.F.Davis, Victor PooIe, Jack simpkins and Steve Adams gitting somewhere near the Independence depot. I mentioned this to orchard. Orchard claims thie is absolutely false, and furthermore, that so fer as he knww Jack Simpkins was never in the Cripple Creek dietrict. Adams corroboratos this watament.

None of the partios above mentioned knew that the depot was to be blown up oxoept Parker and Devis. Parker was in Cripple Creek with a comm mittee of delegates from the Wentern Faderation that had visited the wamp for the purpose of trying to effeat a mettloment, but had loft two days before the explosion. Parker had been placed on thet comattee by Moyer and Heywood for the purpose of preventincs a settlement providipg that the mine owners would ha wo conmented to a settlement. Adane stat od thet he did not me any of this comittee, which orchard corroborates.

Orchard informed me that a bar tender named Cameron who works at silverton is kept thoroughly posted on every act of the Western Foderation by fohnelser, the executive committeman For Coloredo and Utah; and it was this man Camoron, in company with Stityor, presidont of the Silverton looal union, who murdered a man suppoed to be - seab on July 4th, 1905 at Silverton.

Orchard and Adams wont on to may that Heywood had offered fifteen hundred dollars for the ansassination of the secratary of the Mill \& Sreeltemen' Union at Colorado City, Colorado. ''his man's name wan Crane. They concluded that Crane was a detective and had to be put out of the way. There had been sone attempts on the life of Crane but they were unsucceswful. However with the aid of the city marshal and police officerm of Colorado City, Crane was taken out one night and put aboard a train and told to never return. They also gave him a "good licking". This was before the law and order citizens, or Citizens "Alliance, had taken hold of affairs in Colorado City. Heywood maid it was a'nice gtate of affairs to think thet when they organized a union of melter and mill men they elected for their secretary a detective, and he had to be taught a lesson, and the best way to toach him was to kill him, and show that detectife agencies could not place men within their ranks. I remember dietinctly the time that Crane was mun out of Colorado City.

In revortine beck to the letters thet Hoyer, Heywood and Pettibone had Orchard write his wife, Orchard informed me that while his wife was in ienv \(r\) during the EAgles convention in 1905 she visited Freywood's office, and Heywood telephoned him that she was then at his of ioe and had threatened dirs vengeance if he, Heywood did not inform hor of his, Orchardis, address. So Heymod told orchard that he must la, low und he would get rid of her the best way he could. This corroborates the statement made by res. Orchard to me in which she said that while visitinf Heywood on this occasion he stepped out into the other room and telophoned to Somebody, and she almy supposed he was telephoning her husband. Q
I told Orchard the matter mich have reported concerning Pettibone making ein entry in a ledper after he had given Mre. Orchard ton dollere, and that rre. Orchard did not know whether Pettibone took this ledger out of a sefo behind the door or from a shelf located behind the door of Heywood 's office. Orchard informs me that the big safe stood behind Heywood's office door.

You will remernber Mre. Orchard's matement in regard to the night that Adams called at her house and borrowed her brother Joe Craig'e makintosh when he and Orchard went out and were gone for soupie of hours. It took this matter up with orchard and he informed me that it wae about two toym before the blowins up of the Independence depot, and when they loft the house that evenine they went to an ald shed in the rear of a shack and pot two hores of powder which they placed under the Independence depot. © said that ris. Orchard was mistaken as to the time as instoad of a week it was only a couple or
three days before the blowing up of the Independence depot. Orchard eaid he wes very blue when he got the information to the offect that the trial was postponed, and thought it was through the fault of the laryore, wo he maid, are almay ready to get a continuance, but when he taiked with Mr. Hawley and Mr. Bora on the subject he beome setisfied that he had made a mistake, and was very woll pleamed thet the wate did not fall into the trap got by the defense. He maid he mae very glad I had come up hore an he vanted to take up a mettor with me which he did not mant to first take up with the Warden; that wes, he had concluced to write a short history of his life up to the time he became connected with the Woatern federation of Miners, and then detail every outrage that he had beon connected with and that he knew of, Just in his own mey. Fe manted to know if I thought he would get pormission to do this, and if I thought somebody would take his manumeript and odit it for him. I told him I thought it wan a very good plan, that it would keep him busy for some time and that the Wordon no doubt would be hichly pleased to aseist him in any way he could, and that I would take this matter up with the Warder before I left the penitentiery, which I did, as I also did with you, gettinu your approval. This will keep him busy for sore time; besiden, it will refreah his memory on the events of the past and rake him atill a better witnese than he would be otherwise. He feels rather bad that his first wife has not replied to his letter, but states that it is just possible that she has left that part of the country.

Orchard informed me that in falking with Adans since the lattor's return from Tolluride he is matiefied that Adems has looated the exact place where the hody of Barney is buried, and he is very sorry that the snow was so deep that they wore unable to exhume this body.

I then took up with Orchard the reater of Floyd Thompson, the mecretary of the C.C.D.Mine Owners Asmociation, and informed him that Thompson had broken ay from Sheriff Bell, and told him what Thompson had done for the comfort of Mrs. Orchard and the children; that he had paid hor store bills which had accumulated at times when she was sick and had also given her eldest don employment pay iner six or ever collare a weef, and would subsequently pet him into an assay office. Orchard replied, whell now am very much pleased at what Thompson has done. I know' that he did it through your instructions but still it is satisfactory to me that he has carried out your instructions on this matter. I know myeelf that these crildren were in the habit of ickins up little things eround the mines and stores, whatever they could ei dispose of and selline the sami and it is true they would fetch the meney always to their mother but now as the eldest hoy Mark, has fot a fair show to carn somethinf I want you to write Mre. orchard to tell Mark that he must be honest. I told Orchard thet I did not care to take that, metter up wit tis wife but had taken it up with Mr. Thompeen and Mr. Itompson had piven the boy a good fatherly talking to and would 100 k ofter him anc Thompson thinks that the boy will be honest in future. That seaned to inmprese Orchard very muoh. Orchard thinks areat deal of tres. !eilman and her hueband, and was vory ruch pleased to learn that rs. Veilmary has not ceased to be a friena to lirs. Orchard.

I then had the Warden brin in Stev: Adme, and all three of us chatied for a couple of hours. Adams wes very sorry that the condition were such that he coul not uncover Barney's body, but he says that if

General Wells is not able to dimoover this body after the snow has gone he could go there at night just as he did at the time that Carpentor and he re-buried the body, an could uncover it, as there is no doubt about it providinf, that it has not beon removed, and ne does not beliove it has. He said he was weil treated on his trip, and as far as he know oxcept in one instance he was not recognized, and in that instance General Wells was able to throw the ran off.

I again took up the matter of the atatoment made by fogers that he, Roperm, had seen Victor Poole, Sherman Parker, F. Favis, Jack Simpkins and himeslf, (Aderm) and Orchard at the Independence depot the day before the explosion. Adams stated that this was not trie; that he had never gone nemr the dopot in day time as it was not neopsary he know all about it. Orohard aid that for about three nights before the explosion he had gone to ine depot, but was unaeen by any person, and wethed for the train coning in so as to pet the time of the train axactly.

In particular I wish to refer you to what Orchard and Adams state in the matter of Arthur Baston, as I do not think that the statements they have made would be sufficient brounde for us to attompt to arrest, Beston on the Steunenberg murder.

I remained at the penitenitentiary until 5:32 P. N. . During the evening I had a lonf conference with Governor Gooding relative to the convormation I had with these men, and we al so talked over the case in a genersi way.

Today I received a letter from Orohard'e first wife, which had been directed to me at Denver, and inclosed was a letter for Orchard. Mri. Orchard' letter to me was a very nice little letter. I ar sorry I cannot incorporate it in this report on account of the fact that on vising the penitentiary today I gave it to Orchard to read and he said he manta to kep it for a little while. He would not open his wife's letter to him until he wont beck to him quartern. After reading the letter which was addressed to me he cried a little while, but in a short time I had him feeling all right. I informed him that I hademet Dean Kincke yeetordmy, and wont on to say that the Dean had expressed a wish to have talk with Orchard, and told him that the Dean mas not one of those sanctimonious men but was simply a good man and a very pleasant conversationalist, and I knew that he, Orchard. would like to moet him. I said he would not bother fum to any great extant on religious dogma, and would simply rake a friendly call. Orchard said in that osee he had no objections to meet the pan, in fact he would like to e him. I told him that the Dean was well aware that he had become a penitent and realised whit harry ho had done and was trying to atone for the same the beet he, Orchard, know how, and that was one reason why the dean wanted to gee him and help him out if he could. This point being mottled would suggest that the loan all on Orchard at any time, but I would like to talk with the Dean before: he makes his first visit.

In course of our conversation I asked Orchard where he got: the chair leg that he and Adars used in blowing up the Independence depot. He told me that Adams brought that chair leg and he did not know where Adams rot it, but Adams would possibly remember where he pot it. He said that the wire that was used to turn the windless was purchased by him Orchard, at Elis \& Sons hardware torn on farmer street, Denver; that he purchased a lot of wire there, some of which was used in the peabody bomb and for other purposes. and he threw some spools of ware way some wee up on Clark mon or lamington Avenue, Denver, but he brought the wire the was used at the Independence depot from Denver. I asked him if he romombernd any rock e fly ins around in close proximity to him and Adams at the time of the explosion, and he said he did. that there was a big rock fell almost between them and there was debris falling sol around them. Adams said this part of the bodies of the men that, had been killed but he orchard, knew it was rocks. They intended to take the wire away witt them but it got fast nome way and tho y were unable to do so, and just dropped the wire and ran way.

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Orchard in very much pleased at the prospect of writing up his life, and he hat been to the \(1 i\) brary of the penitentiary to se how atories sommat mimilar are comonowd to., and he anked my opinion as to whother he whould comaenes this work as though he we writing the book himecri. I told him it would be beet for him to write it as thouph he mes writing it himbelf, but that whoever would edit the book might alter the mamper in wich it was cormonced and other littie matters, but that was wowething thet would be taken up later on after he got the hi wtory started. He said ha had sicgested to the warden to get him a slate as he would like to put down hik ideam firet on a clate and btudy them over before he would write them: in manuseript.

On my lant visit, day before yesterdey, I uggented, that he should write his Cripple Creok wife a lotter, and he maid he would decide upon that later; 30 it appeare that he decided to write a letter, and handed the ma to ine. Following is a oopy of the letter:

Dear Ida, Independence, Colo

Boise, Idaho, June 6, 1906. Well Dear, I will write you a lettor now. I cannot write you as I would like to for feeline as I do now, and with the detarmination I have to do what I believe to be right in the aipht of cod, I would not usu any deoeit. I cannot tell you in this lettor at this time what \(I\) will some time later if I ever pat to talk to you.

I know how ahamefully and diegracefully I have treated you. Believe me, Ida, I never meant to do anythine wrong to you, and when I left there laet littie I thoupht of Ereating yog as I have, but many things came up different from what I oxpected, and as you know. I got mixed up with partiose that I thourtht were my friende anci perhape were for a time, but in reality were friends to no one. I an not tryinq to lay the blarne all on them. I know I was not doing ripht, but you know the feeline in that strike after it tarted, and I listened to the leaders und pot worked up to such e pitch that I thou ht violence wes Justifiable, and once started wes afraid to turn back, and got mare hardened all the time. You may think I had a pood time. True, I had plerity of money, but money is nothing when a man ss mind is occupied in such devilish work as mine was. I was afraid to write to you for a lone time for I knew that they was openiner the mail up theref and Heywood tola me that he was andine you money all the time. I never knew any different. For a Iont time I could not sett ie down anywhere; did not know when I would heve to hike. I well knew if you over mistrustad any of thie devilish work you would no itand for it und therefore I kept out of your sipht. I supposed when 1 came fror Cslifornia in Dec. 1904 that you was in henver, and would tee you. They told me I had better not let you know where I wes or you would tell the officers. I was in and around Denver most of the time after coming from California. I was petting ready to leave Denver for Idaho when you was in Denver at the time of the Fagles' convention. Heywood telophoned up to Pettibone \({ }^{\circ}\) store und told me to keep out of sight for you was there. I seen Heywood that nipht, and he wanted me to come down here and ds some work, and hunt up ranch, and then I could send
for you; und you know the rest. I seen Mr MaParland yesterday, and he told me all about your talk. I am gled that you went to Donvor and mon him. I used to look upon him as my morit onvery, but I man diaobeyine the lave of Ged and man, of which he atands for both. 1 do nat look upon him an my onemy any more but a a friend. Ho told mo you did not think thore may muah to change in me from the re was when you knew mo; but Ida, there waf ne noed of a charge outmardly but there was a great nood of a change invardly; and praiut the blepeod name of God, I heve reosived that change or I would not be here todey to write you thin letter.

I was broueht up of pood parents. My doar mother taught mo what was rient. she taught me to love and foar God, but alan, how soon 1 forgot and oh, what bitter tears 1 ahod today for my forgetfulnean. I see now to my sorram and shame the folly of leading a life, of sin and wickedness. I have brourht this upon my alf though no fault of anyone lece, for if I had followed the towhine of the blensed Jeaus I would not be here behind these prison walls; but I praise God today that he did not cut me domm in my sina but apared me to ropent and ask forgivemesa, which I have the proof that he has forgiven me. Ida, if it had not been for the fear of Cod I would of died with my lips sesled and would never unearthed these ewful crimis. for this has been worse than death to me. But I believe it is the will of Cod and therefore before I go I intend \(\%\) by \(G_{0}{ }^{\prime}\) 's help to do what I can to stop these enful crimes and cave others frombeine in the sume plaee I am today Yes lda, I prayed lons and anmestly before I oould believe that dod would foreive my sins, they were so great, but I have studied the bible a great deal sinco I oame here, and Goa says whomesver will come may thouph our sine pe se mosclet He will make ther as snow, and God almaya fulfils his promisos. I am sorry I um hers in this affliction, but I would far rather be here than leadin the life I was. I can plainly eo the hand of Providence workine in all this, and therefore I truet Him for all thinge for he doeth all thinge well. Ida, I prey for you now that iod may help you. I believe ho has heard my prayers and that he will help you. I may never be able to help you again. I wish it was not so, but it is too late for me nowi bui look tu God for help and grudance, so we oan reet in Heeven. You may mey thite is poor consolation, but it is the best \(I\) oan dand it is the beet thes you could do to trust in his word. I lone now to do you grod und to help you in some way if I could. Now, Ide, I um goine to write the boys each a letter, and trusi that it will have a prod offect upon them, but am af ric it will not have the offect I would like it to heve as the will not have confidence enough in me as I did not pay any atterition to them when I was there. But you must explain some thinge to ther, and it may do therr a. lot of pood. I hope so at loant, for some of the habits they sot into may lead to somethink, bad if continued. Now Ida, you curht to loarn them to love and fear God; read the Bific toc them and take them to onnarch and Sunday School. Oh, if I had of only done this I would not of been here today. I can see it all so plain when ic is too late hut I feel like waming others that I know and love before it is too late. I think thet Mr. Moparland will be abie
to Pind somethin that the boys can do to help you; and you should improce upon thens the mosesity of be ing honant and truthiul. You knew tha little habite they got into, wioh was not alfoge thar thair Pault, like getting coal. That loade thom to doine othwr thinges. That wat not right.

I haye been freatiy diasppointad to think we would not have our trimis. Now the lone aupence almost wnorves me. If I had my oheice I would much rathar be doad than in a prison, but I blíeve it is God'a will and I will ondure it by hia help.

Mr. Moparland forpot to bring your picture. I would like to had it, and would like to have you write me. I fonl thie vory keenly, but the offioials here are very kind to me. I have all the privilegen I could expect, bul the time meems very long; but how true it is we hall reap what we eow. I rould ond you my pioture but I nover had any taken -ince I lo? there. If I oan get any taken I will and you one. I cunnot think of unythine more this time. So hopine thi will find you woil, und the boys, and hopine to hear from you soon, I Will clome

He told me to read the letter over when I got to my room and not to mail It until visitad him owein an heally did not know whe ther he hould end it or not. In my opinion this letter ahould be mailed to Oripple Oresk to his wife whom he now oalls Mrs. Tony" whioh in reality is hor name. I told him that I mas poine up to cildwell tomorrow momine and would not be back until Friday evening, and on saturday I wouli oall upon him and if he decides to have this letter muiled I will attend to it. Murine the trike at Cripple Oraek there was one man whom the pepers and General Bell (Adjutant) oladmed to be more or less implicated in all the outrages that were committed; and lieneral Bell him piven it out cold at times that this man whome name is Viotor Poole, was connected with the blowing up of not only the Vindicator but also the blowink up of the Independence dapot. The prese was kept full of the doings of Victor Poole notwithatandin the faot that our operatives wo were detailed at Cripple Creek at this time had come to the conclusion thet Victor Poole wa rather a harmloas man. I took this mattor up ith Orahard, and he atated thet while Victor Poole was union man he wae never implicated in an outrace that he knew of: but that some time after ho come to the cripple Croek district he lived with his aunt, who had whoue on the flull Plaoer property. Adjt. Gen. Bell, who wes then just plain Sherman Rell. was superintendent or had some charge over 1 le placer property sid used to collect the rents. One time he oalled on Victor Poole's aunt and insulted her, and Poole simply oniered hir out of the house, olaining if he did not go he would kick hir out se Bell walked out. Years afterwards when Bell becmas Adjutant weneral of the State of Colorado and the strike started in 1403 Sherman Parker publiahed in all the labor papers that Bell had ben kioked out of Victor Poole "s aunt's house by Poole. Bell could not oontrudiot tis very well thrount the prese and therefore concluded
to find something that the boys can do to help you; and you should improses upon therr the moessity of boing honast and truthiul. You knew the little habita they got into, whioh was not altoge ther the ir fault, like getting coal. That leade them to doing othor thing . That not right.

I hare been greatly disappointed to think we would not have our triale. Now the long muepence almast unnerves me. If I had my choice I would much rather be dead than in a prison, but I believe it is God'a will and I will sndure it by his help.

Mr. MaParland forgot to lering your picture. I would like to ha it, and would like to have you write me. I feel this very keonly, but the officials here are very kind to mo. I have all the privileges I oould expect, but the time seems very long; but how trup it is whall roap what we now. I would end you my pioture but I never hau any tiaken since I loft there. If \(I\) cran get any taken I will wand you one. I cannot think of anything more this time. So hoyine this will find you woll and the boys, and hopine to hear from you moon, I will close

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He told me to read the letter over when I got to my room and not to mail it until \(I\) visited him apain, as he really did not know whe ther he should ond it or not. In my opinion this lotter should be mailed to Cripple Creek to his wife whom he now calls "Mrs. Tony" which in reality is hor name. I told him that I was going up to Celdwell tomorrow morning and would not be back until Friday ovoning, and on Saturday I would call upon him and if he decides to have this letter mailed I will attend to it. During the strike at Cripple Creek there was one man whom the papers and General Bell (Aajuutant) claimed to bemore or less implicated in all the outrages that were cormitted; and General Bell has given it out cold at times that this man, wose name is Victor poole, was connected with the blowing up of not only the Vindicator but also the hlowing up of the Independence depot. The press was kept full of the doings of Victor Poole notwithatandine the fact that our operatives wo were dotailod at Cripple Creek at this time had some te the conclusion that Victor Poole was rather a harmlogeman. I took this matter up with Orahard, and he tated that while Victor Poole was a union man he wan never implicated in an outrage that he knew of; but that some time after he came to the Cripple Creek district he lived with his aunt, who had a house on the Hull Placer property. Adjt. Gen. Bell, who was then just plain Sherman Bell, wes superintendent or had some charge over the placer property and used to collect the rents. One time he celled on Victor Poole \({ }^{\circ} \mathrm{s}\) aunt, and insulted her, and Poole simply ordered him out of the house, claiming if he did not go he would kick him out, 80 Bell walked out. Yesirs afterwards when Bell becme Adjutant General of the State of Colorado and the strike started in 1903 Sherman Parker published in all the labor papers that Bell had been kicked out of Victor Poole \({ }^{\circ}\) sunt 's house by Poole. Bell could not contrediot this very well throuph the press and therefore concluded

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to run Poole out of the camy. So durinp the atrike he had Poole in eh the bull pon half a dosen times but could never got any charge aggainst him; but Orchard believes if Bell had been able to catch Poole after the Independenoe explosion he would have \(h\) ad him lynched. In talking with Adaims, who had been in the camp before Orchard over went there, Adsker romembered this incident very woil, but the matter was never talked about until the strike in 1903 ome up and Sherman Parker had this matter publiahed as Orchard stated to me. Adams asid that Poole was incapable of doins anybody any injury, and he was the last man the inner circle of the Weatern eoderation of Uierg Miners would trust to commit an outrage. Adams told ne that the night they moved the powier, he and Orchard, that was umed to blow up the Independence depot, from Floyd Miller's shed to the shack that had been formerly occupied by Adams \({ }^{\circ} \mathrm{Ey}\) bther he (Adams) found the back of an old chair lying in a hole near his brother's shack, and he took the wire that Orchard had broufht from Denver off of the epool and wrapped it saround this cheir leg or rung, whicherer it was. Both he and Orchard told me that they put some flat atomes on top of the two bores of powder so that when they pulled the wire to overturn the windeas the powder would remain in place. This clears up the chair leg matter.

Apter Orchard went back to he his cell Adams sid. "I have seen from the papers that Mrs. Pettihone is here in Boise, and would like to know how she is behaving herself. I askei him was Mrs. Pettibone a loose character, and he said, Well, I only know what Orchard told me abcut her." He waid that one time Pettione left the city on some business, and Orchard and Mrs. Pettibone accompanied him to the depot. Pettib ne told Orchard to take rood care of Mrs: Pettibone in his absenow, and after Pettibone had left on the train Orchard startud to accompany her home. She intimated to him that she did not care. to \(k 0\) home just then so Orchard took her to a rooming house and rented a room and stayed with her all nijht. I asked Adams if he thought this was trie, and he suid well I suppose it

In course of the conversation I referred to the nimht that Adars called at Orchard's cabin and took Joe Craig's mackintosh and hat and went out with Orchard, ard asked him if he romembered that. He sai: he did remember it very woll as that was the nignt that he and Orchard moved the powar from Miller's shed to Adams is brother \({ }^{\circ}\) s house and the night that he pot the chair leg and wound the wire on it that was used to turn the windlese. . This corroborates what. frs. 0rchard told me and was subsequently corrohorated by orchard.

I pave Adams a few cipars and he seemed happy is usual. And in fact Orchurd seemed to feel very well, hut I suppose that he will have i litile nervous speil efter readin' his wife \({ }^{\circ} \mathrm{s}\) letter, but he will soon fet over it.

Boise, Thursday Juns 7: 1906.
At 7:30 A.M. I left Boise for Caldwell in order to familiarize myself with the murroundinge there and to travel over the route traveled by Orahard to and from The Steunenbers raisidence prior to and at the time of the amassination also to visit the different points from which Orchard viemed the steunenberg residence by the aid of field glanees, and to trasel over the route followed aiter the first failure to agcaninate Mr. Steunenberg and see the plaoe were Orchard buried the bomb at the a tock yards.

Arriving in Caldwell I proceeded to the Court House and made an cxamination of the jail in company with the sheriff, and to use a rather arcastic expression, would say that while a prisoner could hardiy fall out of the jail he could easily walk out without much of an effort and the only way a prisoner could be kept afe in the Caidwell jail would be to have stroner puard on the outaide. As you are amare, orchard irequently informed me that it would have taken him about twenty minutes to make his encape out of the kitchen, which is used as a sittine room for all the prisoners; and there is no doubt but that orchard's tatement to me on that point is correct.

The shoriff got arig and took Mr. Stone, Prosecuting Attorney Van Duyn an myself over the route that Orchard traveled on the nipht of the a maseinatmeion, al so drove arcund beside the stoc yarde following the route that Orchard and Simpkins took carrying the bomb with them fror steunenbergis residence after they had pailed to hlow up the Governor, or rather after they had made the first ettempt on his life. I had a lons talk. with Mr. Van Duyn and Er. Stone durine the day and evening" that is to eay I talked with "r. Stones curine the evening, and al so with Mr. A.K. Steunenberg. Witin 211 three of these gentiemen I broupht up the metter of the necessity of procurin the very best material they could for sheriff when Mr. Nichols term expires as areat responaibility will rest on the shoulders of the sheriff durine the trials of lioyor, Heywood and Pettibone. I ven superested that it might be woll for the Democrats and Repubicans to fuse on the que stion or rather on the county ticket so that a rood man would be elected shoriff. I also took up the matter of judge end cautioned them that they must be on the lookout to see that the socialimes and anarchists do not colonize the judicial district so as to defeat Judge Smith. and for that matter, it was the duty of the Democratic party to nominate a first class man for judge so that in case Judge Smith was deftatad we would still have a zooc man on the bench. However, I find that the Democratic party is short of material for judge. Mr. Rice is a witness in the case, which would disqualify him From acting as judge oven he were elected. There is Democratic lawyer nam Harris living at Veiser wha is very gmart man and alwas know to be a law-and-ordor man, but after the arrest of oyer, Heywood and Pettibone he expressed himself as being dissatisfied
with the manner that these men were taken out of Colorado, and that places hirs outside of the nomination. This beinf the onse, impressed upon these gentlemen and every good citizen that I met while in Caldwell the necessity of keeping a strict lookout to prevent colonizera petting into any of the counties embraced in this judicial district.

Would also say that durinf the evening I walked oyer the route from Gov. Steunenberg's residenct that Orchard took on the nitht of the ascasaination, and timed myself in malking from the end of the bridge designated by orchurd to the Saratopa Hotel, and found that in walking at an ordinary gate I covered this space in two minutes and fifty-six econds. It will be remembered that the bar tender. of the Saratoga Hotel claimed that Orchard stepped into the ber just about three minutes after the explosion, and that Orchard states the bar tonder told the truth. The arohitect of the new Courtlouge an the dining room girl that waited on Orchard both claimea that Orchard appeared in the dinine room about six minutes after the explosion. Their statement is also true, and thoupt the theory of everybody in connection with this case, oven up to the time that Orchard made his statement to me, was that Orcharí expioded the bomb and must have been in the neighborhood of the Steunenberg residence at the time of the explosion, with the three witnesses above mentioned it would have been a hard matter to pet a jury to convict orchard if he had refused to male a confession.

This morning I visited the County Court House and had a long talk with County Judge Church and County Clerk John Tucker and the sheriff, also a Mr. Sebree, am e a banker, and Mr. Steunenberg. I again took up the necessity of the good citizens looking to it that a good man is elected sheriff and that Judge Smith is ro-electod to the bench. I find after a quiet investigation that the present sheriff and some other people in Caldwell, sill of them being good citizens, are very favorably inclined to the nomination of De pity Sheriff Payne to succeed the present sheriff. As faery few people have any confidence in Payne s who formerly lived at Park City, Utah and was a member of the Western Federation of diNers, in a quiet way I showed the above mentioned gentlemen that they must look out for other material than Payne. Mr. St unenberg is afraid that lan Campbell, who is highly spoken of, would not accept the position. Mr . Campbell is very well off and has a good deal of business on hand, and the salary of a sheriff being but two thousand dollars a year there is no groat inducement for a good man to take hold.

At 12:38 P. I took the train for Boise and during the afternoon on was engaged looking over mail and reports and frivint instructions on the matter in question.

I visited the penitentiary and took up with Orchard in a detailed manner how he acted on the evening of the assassination of Gov. Stoupnbers. Being that I had traveled over the ground on Thumiley last I had a clearer idea of this matter than previously. I also waned to get fact relative to the conditions existing about the gate and how the bomb wan placed. outward from the po at not to the boulevard. This poet gite blown ara et the time of the explosion. He had placed the both at the alice of the point and tied the string that matteahod to the cork in the bettie of sulphuric acid around aglet of the gate. In this one he did not put in any corem-ye. The Ex-Governor being wounded merit in the right aide, and as on rasohine the gate his loft aide monad have been next to the bomb. I had Orchard explain how it wac that the Ex-Governor \({ }^{\circ}\) wound was on the right side which he explained in this way: The -Ex-Govornor \({ }^{\circ}\) sept eide mould be next to the bomb on reading the gate, but he would use his right hand to open it. It is puseible the gate did not open far enough to jerk the cork out of the bottle of acid, and that the cork was not jerked out until the fr-Governor's foot struck the string attached to the cork or the the cork wee jerked out when the gate was opened and the acid did not have immediate effect on the explosive; at any rate, the Ex-Governor had probably turned s round facing the trot to pull the gate shut after him -just as one would turn around to pull a door shut when penning through a doorn and had his right side toward the bomb won it went off. The force of the explosion truck the Ex-Governor on his right side and forced him over to the right ide of the mar to his bouse where ho was found. Orchard demonstrated this matter to me on one of the doors in tho Warden's office where ho and I were conversing.

He mated that after placing tho bomb he went out to the middle of the fret, ran down to the Boulevard; and on remaking the boulevard the snow wis soft, and in order to mislead any person that might subsequently march for him he ran to the right for about half a block to wore the now wa m hard then turned on his tracks again and faced toward the city. He ran down the tret to where the show get hard again and then crossed on to the side alk. He met tine Er-Governor shortly, wi was on his way home. Orchard then increased his speed, and there was nobody on the street until he reached the little church, where he met two men. He intended to crone the bridge at the little church but on account of meeting these men he went straight on to the next street and crossed the bridge on the street that rune dom alongside the Saratoga Hotel. It wis at the end of the bridge not the bouleward that he met two other men, who i believe were lix-Cov. Staunsnberg' son and somebody else and he said he had hardly got to the end of tho bridge nearest the Saratoga Hotel wen the explosion took place.

He had writton hie wife and deughter in Canade a lettor ecoh, handed the same to mo and wanted me rame them. I told him I did not care to do 30 , and therefor he sealed the mam and hended them to to have them mailed from Donver. He also concluded to send the letter that he had writton to hia othor wife in Cripple Creek but in this lettor he addresmed her as Tru. Ida Tony". In fact, the tirst letter mont hor man eddreand as Mra. Idm Tony. He almo requated me to mil this letter, wioh I submequontly did.

He went on to tell me that at one time while in converastion with Hoywood the lattor oxplained to him how I managed to eset into the Molly Maruire orgmiratiom, and recited wy first vinit to Dormaris in Pottiville, and also the fight thet I had with Jaok Frasier. Hoywood went on to cay that after that fight it min oany maling for me to get in clome tough with theme people, put remarked, I man \(l i k e\) MoParland could not got into touch ith us. in the firat place, Harry, as you are mare, when wo intand pulling anything off we never talk of it publicly, in lact only digougs it with the parties that are going to do the job; and men like McParland if datailed to do - job would make some plausible excuse to avoid doing it. This would oxaite our suspicion at onco and we would tot him again and if the result of the moond tent was the aame as the firet ope why we would have to put him out of the wey. The Molly Maguires were not amsit onough. In the first place they talked over the jobs that tiney were about to do, and in the next plece they never looked after the mon, whom they dotailed, even thouph they made a failure. But we ron't have work of thif kind? Heywood then laughed heartily and naid, Wall, if we mansge to keop out of the penitentiary we ere going to have a glorious time all our liven on work of this kind; but the only way we can get money into the treasury is to coccasionally pull off some bif thing just as we have been doing. But you can bet on it that no MoParland can get next to um. We are perfectly safe. The Warden had boupht Orchard a bif slate so that ho is putting down notes preparatory to Writina his book, und he seomed to be highly pleased. He says he has got something to take up his time. He wanted to know whon Doan Hincke would visit him, and asked ne if ho might take the pean into his confidence in the matter of writing this book, as tho Doan might asirt him a good doal. I told him I would take this metter up with the Governor, and in wy opinion the Dean could render him great asmistanoe. I have made orcherd believe that I man wory familiar torms with the Doan and as the Dean and I really \(h\) mot, in osse the Dean visits Orchard he must at least pretend to be very friendly towarde me. However, as I have atatiod before I would like to heve an hour si talk with the Dean befors he visits Orchard at all, as I think it will holp mattors out. Orchard informed me that he was very much put about on roading the lotter that his wife in Canada had sont him throurh me, and I had to read the letter over, and mowed him that it was a very manly lottor, and instoad of making him feel sad it ourht to maico hin Peel good. Ho seid the fter he delibereted on the contente of the lettor for \& litile while he arreed with me that it ourht to make him feel good, and in fact it had made him foel good to think that that woman had been so true to him, and that it was throurl her prayers that he had been saved or rather, got the chance to atone for his ains and to be the instrument of preventing furthor murciors
by the inner circle, as he was eatiafied that when ho gives his testimony in court and the vail is lifted from the facos of Moyor Heyrood and Pettibone it will put an end to the asmaminations that have been going on under their apoervision.

I then called in Adems and handed him a fow cigars and had a lony talk with hie, more aspecially on the locetion of Barney \({ }^{\circ}\) a body. He gays he hopes when the snow depurts if Gen. Wells is not sure of the looation of this body that he will not attreapt to dig it up the ground to any extent an he (Adaran) knowe for a fact that he can go etreight to the place where the body and clothes are buried. He went on to dezoribe to mo how he placed Beryey's body in a mak. He maid one of the hands wam missing am thenph some animals had ahemed it off, but there were mome bones around chere which he put in the mak. He divested the body of all clothing. The body hed on a goat, reat and trousera, also a pair of hob-nailed boota. The clothes and boots he put in a soparste mak. Carpontor took ick at his tomach as he could not ctand the stonoh. He aid he (Adams) just pulled the feot out of the sockets at the knees and put them into the rack, then pulled the thigh bones out of the sockets at the hips and put them in the mack. He mid the maget had got the ir work in in the intestines and were just in black balle about the size of egge. He anio the only part of the body that was not in a badly docompoced condition was, to use his expression, the hide on the back. He said the hide gemed to be a little touep, and therofore aftor taking off the limbs as above described, he took the ribs, which tuck out, and aquesed them into the aeck, then rolled the hide and the head up, as it wore, in a round ball' and shoved them into the asck. Adame carried that sack while Carpenter carried the sack containing the clothes. The ground was level where they dur the grave, and as they had an axe with them they aut some roots and brush and when they buried the body in the grave they put a lot of this lrush on top of it so that if anybody was walking around there they mould not notice the frosh carth. He said the place where the clothes were buried was very shallow; the boots kind of stuck up and he had to dig the hole a little deeper soas to ocver up the boots. On leavine the place Cerpenter left ahead of hin and on his leaving the place he cut niok in an evergreen tree with the axe. This was not a very large tree. He said he had thoufht this mattor over thorcufthy since he got back to the jail and he knew very well that he cut a littie nick in the tree, und the body is not loceted over thirty feet from that nick and is on leves ground; and possibly some of the remeins of that briah that they put over the erave might be there yet. faut of course that was a rood wile acro and the brueh may have all decompo and turned into soil by this tim.

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Weise $r$, Idaho, 6/5/ 1906.

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Mr. James McFarland, Denver, Colorado.
near Sir:
Do you know anything about one John Nihall? We have a man here in jail by the name of John McDermott and i have heard a rumor that he was connected with the Molly McGuire outfit. Shortly after he was put in jail here letters were sent him by the dditor of the Appeal to Reason try ing to get Majormott to make affidavits about you. I have been informed that there was a reward offered for himat one time in Penn. Nihall or McDermott, as he is now called, is in jail here on a charge of rape and is about sixty years old.

As I know nothing about the man Nihall or Mclermott I replied to Mr. landon as follows:

Replying to yours of the fifth, which was forwarded to me from Denser, would say that I have no knowledge of this man Nihall or of Majlermott. While he may have been a Molly Mchuire there is one thine you can rely on, and that is that he is not a fugitive from the anthracite coal regions. Nevertheless I would like very much for you to send me a description of this man; that is, his age weight, height, complexion otc. Would also like to learn if the editor of the Appeal to Reason outlined what kind of an affidavit he wined Mcibermott to make. For the near four or five days mail will reach me at our office in Spokane, P.O. Box ill, as I leave for that point this afternoon. Thanking you very kindly for your interest in this matter, I remain, otc.

I also received the following letter from Sheriff Sutherland: of Shoshone County, Idaho: (dated June fth 1906)
"Yours of recent date received today, and in reply will say that so far there has been no new developments relative to Bradley and his friends; while we are still doing all we can and expect to
continue doinfs so until we accomplish momethink, we are very strongly under the impression that we have located the rendaxvous of our friend simpkine, but have not been able to get in whare he is on account of the weather; however, we will start in start time. We have good reasons to beliere that he is in the Marble Creek Dietrict and around noar the St. Joe River. Iet me know when you will be in Spokane, and I will meet you there.
I replied to the above letter as follow: (under dete of June 11.th)
"I am in receipt of yours of the 8th and note what you say about our friond Simpkins. It is hardly necessary for me to say how pleased I would be to have fou get this man, and I hope that you heve got the right ateer. fleave this afternoon for Spokane, and will remain there at loast three days, and an stated in my last lettor I certainly will be pleased to meet you so that we can talk those matters over personally. As the railroad is not very good I will remain all night in Pondloton tonight and take the morning train for spokane, arriving in Spokane tomorrow evening. Therefore, am my letter will go etraight on to Wallace, you will have this lot te: before I arrive in Spokane. Hoping you are well, I raman, "etc.

From ry reply you will note that I lauve this aftemoon for Spokane where I will be possibly three or four days. On my return I will arop off at Roise tor day.

They were assisted in this murder by man named Chmbers who is now aerving time in the penitentiary at Ealem, ore. Ther was also another man mitar Bowley who escaped, but was wounded in the arm. Thie man who escaped is now in Canade, but would come at any time to probeouto. Thet is the opinion of Sheriff Sutherland.

It is resonable to suppose thet whether siupkins is up on the st.Joe river or not, Giover and Mason know where he in. These men will have to bo promecuted at mome time for the mardor of Tylor and Bowloy. I would now mugeemf for your epprovel thet Bherife sutherland mear out warrante for the arrest of eason and alover and effoct thoir arsost, as clajm he can oasily do, take them to wallece, get a continumee of their oase and then try with the loverage wo have as to their guilt and have them inform ue of the whereebout of shapsins. The Sheriff informe thet in cesse simping is up in thet nefenborhood and tries to make his osapp aftor those men aro arrestod, that he can capture him and thet he wili bo prepared to do this. If I an ripht in the matter of Mas on and Glover lesowing of the Whereabout of Simpkine, I think we can get one or both of thom to taik and give us thif infor: mation, but in case these men are arrented, we would have to take Adeng to wallace to appear againgt them. it dot boilove there would

Thin morning in company with Opt. No. 11 I wen: to the penitentiary and had a long talk with orchard. Ho wan very cheerful and told me, as he has always done, that it always ahoere him up and he feel geod anon time that I visit him. He cid he had road over the book that Mri. Stoumonberg had ant him with a grant deal of interest as the greater portion of it consisted of quotations from the Scripture. He mays the only thing he fear is that in some way either during the wings or just about the time the trials are to come up the Fontorn Poderationitos will adopt some plans to remove Adam as well an himself, thereby causing miscarriage of justice. He looked up at ma nd arid, Now I would not care if they did that after we had exposed these mon and their re those and know that justice would be done and that crimes surah as we have been guilty of would not be repeated." I told him he need have no fear on that account, hut he begged of me to keep a sharp lookout and try to discover what the Western Federationitos worm doing as he aid that the election of Mahoney of Anaconda looked bail us Mahoney ie a notorious aritator and always ready to do wrong or advise somebody else to do it. The reason for shoney' s election in his opinion war on account of the fact that Williams, the former vice president, was a very conservative man and simply figurehead. We aware ourselves that it has frequently been necessary for the men to force Mahoney to remain quiet at different meetings of the Aneconde union, as he always tried to raise a disturbance when he cor au. Orchard is well aware of this.

In speaking of Heywood Orchard claims he hes more brain that all the rest of the Executive Board put together, and that he could plan mere deviltry and cover up his track e than any hundred mon, or in st all of the Western Federation put together. Heywood would frequently say he did not are if they employed all the so-calied detectives in the country providing they did not employ the Pinkerton Agency, and always claimed that the mine owners were too damned stingy end penurious to pay the price that the Pinkerton charge, and so Ion as the Pinkerton did not cut down their price they were seato to commit any kind of an outrage as they mould never be caught.

Orchard mem to be very anxious to meet Dean Fincke, anil I told him I would take this matter up with the Governor just as quickly as I could. I am aware that the reason why the Dean has not been out to visit Orchard is on account of the fact that he unable to have a talk with me before I went to frokane as I think it is necessary for me to talk with him before he orchard, but I did not my sis to orchard.

Orchard informed me that he is gettiny along nioely with his book, and manted to know if I had seen Finch and Campell in Spokane, and I told him I had, and had also met Mr. Culbertson, who we fonmerly manager of the Tiger-Pooman Mine: Orchard informed me that Simpkinemeant in the near future to geti both Finch and Campbell, more eapecially Campbell, and wanted to get him badly, and he is entisfiod it would only haye boen a question of time when he would not only hare "got" Campbell but, all the officials of the Bunker Hill \& Sullivan Company as well.

I then had a long talk with Adame and gave him a handful of cigars. He was foeling in good spirits, and in reply to my guestions said that he thought that if anybody on oarth know where Simpkins was it was Knute Glover up in the St. Joe District; that if simpkins was in that district Glover was the man that oarried him aupplios as the lattor had a boat and piled up and down the st. Joe River and to use Adman's exprosmion, Glover was a regular water rat". He aid diover is a fine pistol and rifle shot, and furthermore, thet Simpikins told him that Mason regretted very much the part that he took in the murder of Boulet und Tyler. He informed me that the man that made his escape at the time that Boulet was killed was named IIndsey or Lindsley and sirapkins learned from Price he think that Lindsey wont to Canade. This corroborates what Sherift Suthorland told me wile in Spokane. Adams further informed me that the man who anis.sted in the murder of Boulet, whose hame he could not menber in former convereations I had with him, was known as Andrew, but Adams did not know the last name. Adams maye this man \({ }^{\circ}\) hair was red. Sheriff Sutherland exy that thir man's lat nome was Chambern, and that he is now in the penitentiary at Salem Oregon.

In the matter of the qquint that Simpkins has got in both syen, one of them eapecially, he informed me this morning that Simpkins told him that at one time they had placed some dynamite on the toad to blow up a man whose name Adams aid not know. At thet time they ware not posted on making bombe am they are now, and they had to explode this bomh hy meshs of a fuse. They had et the fuse all right end Simpkins wes on the lookout to si.gnal when the man would pans. Instead of the man that they werat- wanted a certein doctor drove up in his bugesy and Simpkins mignalled them not to lipht the fuse but thoy mistook the signal and ift the fuse and then ran away. Simpkins ran up to oxtinpuish the fuse in order to sefe this doctor's life, and just es he fot there the oxplosion took place and seriething struck simpkins in the eye or under it and knocked his eye-ball clear out on his cheok. Thi \({ }^{\circ}\) doctor fixed the eye up again, but it is Adams's impression that he cennot see very well out of thet eye.

Adams also informs me thme simpkins is a poor hot and could not hit a haytack if it was within twenty foot of him, and is almost deaf, so much so that yon could ap, roach within ten feet of him and he would not hear.

I arrived here yesterday roorning, but owine to the Governor' a absence the matter of the arrant of clover and liamon has not ass yet been taken up.

In talking with Adans today he informe me that Simpking had more contidence in glover than he had in Mamon, and if Simpkina has left the st.Joe District ahd would write to any person it would be to Glover. If he was in the district there was little doubt but that Glover. Was the man that furnished hir with supplies, as Glover has a canpe and travels up and down the St.Joe River at will, and to use Ademe sexpremeion is a "regular water rat". He hardly thinke thet. Simpkins would attompt to go to Price's for supilies, although Price an simpkins were very friendly at the time that aderrs was up in that Region in 1904, and Simpking frequently ate at Price's with hir (Aderms). Adams went on to say that simpkins told hirr that ason had not only cried but repented very bitterly for the part he took in the assansination of Tyler and Roulet, and that he had little confjdence in wabon feepins his mouth shut if he was ever pinched
 and that you could approach hir within ten foet without him hearing you. "1 thinke that the man that oscaped the nicht that Roulet was killed was numed Tindsey or Tinasley. Simpkins subsequently told hime that this man haw rone to Canada. This confirms what you told me in Spokane, except that I do not know as to whe ther you gave me this man's nume or not. He further aid that the man that aseisted them the nish that poulet was killed, who you clai is no in the ponitentiary at Salor, Orepon, had very red hair, nd the only neme that Simbins trave hir was "Andrew wich was hie first name. I wal like to know from you if the first nume of Charbers ie Ancew. If you have seourta the dital woul like to have you informe where Simpkins was hrowht up, where he was born and raised in all the fumily history tha: you cangot relutive to him, as neither orchard nor Aame soms to know anything of his furnily history.

In tulkin: witt: Adars today he reforres to the suint in Simpkins"s eyen. Aders said thet Simpkins at one time told him how his eye fot hurt, and saia that it occurred in the coour d Alene sistrict in the followin munner. He und eure others ha. place sorre powder on ro rod to low up a man. They were not poste at that time on bombe, and therefore hei to exploce thik powder y meane of a fuse. The has sot the fuse all right un: Simpkine took up a position to wato for he victim to come unu to simal the man who wise to lisht the fuse. A certain doctor whose nume Adams cannot remember now came alone in a hupey. Simpkins signalled ther to not light the fuse but instead of that tey iciloht the fuse and etartod to run. As Simpkins dil not wis to infure this doctor tie carre out of his hidins place to prevent the explosion. lowever, the explosion took place ans somethin hit simpkins rimt at the hone unier the ey and knocked hie eyeball out on his cheak, and this sarnes octor that thoy came nearly blowine to esternity fixed the ey up, and thero is no scar al prosent.

Adams is of the opinion that Simpking has wot very little sight in the eye if any. Me mays Simpkins could not hit di haystack if it was twenty feet from him with a gun, but that Glover is an expert shot with roth a rifle and pistol. I would like you to make a little investigation and try and discover as to whether the statements made by Simpkins to Adams on this matter are true.

Simpkins is uncle, whose nume is Hanson, I wrote Mr. Has son today to first discover who this man Henson works for and who is his best friend, and if his friends are law-and-order men, and if so for Mr. Hasson' to approad them with a iow of having them bring about a metiny between Mr. Hasson and this man Hanson, As the Governor has intimated to me that even a larger remerd than two thousand dollars will be paid if nocessary to any person that would inform us of the exact location of sirapkina so that we could offect his arrest. After Mr. Hasson first thorcuphly investifates this matter we will thent ake up the manner in uich Hanson ahould be approached.

Ireceived a lons distance telephone call from Sheriff Nichola of Caldwall durine the day, in which he informed me that he would come down to Boise this evening. He did so, and informed me that a woran named S.A.Norwood, who is residing in Caldwell for the patt couple of weoks, hed wipht an interviow with him, but as she is rooming in a block that the sheriff thinks is the headquartors of the socialists and anarchists he at first refused to see her; btt he subsequently albered his mind and had a tulk with her. She claimed that at one time her husband and he ran a hotel in Portland, which was burned down, and the they also owned considerable minine property around Baker City, Orepron, and in the Coeur d Alene District of Idaho. Of course this property was non-prociucing. She claims to have considerable mining interests one place or other, and since her arrival in Caldwell she has made a couple of tripa with some parties to see prospects that they had in the hills. She wanted to know from the Sheriff if she could locate Simpkin what amount of the two thousand dollars would she receive. She Eaid she was well aware thit the officers th:t undertook to arrest Simpkins were entitled to a cood percentage of the two thousand dollars, but she wanted to know exactly what arcount she would get providing she located him. The Sheriff told her that he could not tell but would let her know in a day or two. He the asked her what erimee-eke grounds she had for thinking she could locate Simpkins. She said she kne hint and had seen him ahout three weeks ago, and knew where she could put her finfer on him but was not foing to do it excupt she knew exactiy how much money she was goine to get of the two thousan: dollare reward. She eaid that at the time she ran the hotel she and her husband located two men for whom there was a reward of five thousand dollars offered, and after the reen were arrested the of ficer that made the arrest, claimed aill the reward, ano she and her husband never got a dollar out of it. I told the sherif thet he could assure her of fror one thousand to fifteen hundred dollars for simply indicatin the exact location of ampkins. I told him that the officert that made the arreet of a dosperado like this man were
entitled to something, in fact they were entitied to about one half the reward, but if she did not like to accopt one thousand dollars and he concluded that she was telling the trution he better induce hor to come down here to Roise and see the Governor, and he would confer with her; and she could also see Mr. Borah who, she claimed was her lawyer. The heriff aaid that so far as he was concerned ho was willing to let her have the wole reward; but I told him there must be some provision made for the officers that made the arrest as they were recognized in this rewnerd.

The heriff does not seem to have much confidence in this woman : talk; but at the same time there might be something in it, and he will talk further with her, and if she is not satisfied to take the one thoumand dollars he will have her see the Governor. She assured the sheriff that Mr. Borah had transacted soris legai business for her, and if this is true Mr. Borah will be better able to inform us as to the character of this woman.

He found a combination pair of plyers and cap trimmers in the hols made by the explosion an fot them from the Coroner's office. They are of an unusual pattern and if 0. left such a pair they can be identified.
H. A.Maylor, of Victor, helped hunt for evidence on the station and' while he id'nt pick the pun up himself he saw a strancer pick it up and can identify it; he also has had pun and wire in his possession for some time since the explosion.

Lawrence Ramsey sais he dici not identify prun as hise Step-father's and woula teatify that Mr.Mc(Sormack never carried his gun in the mino.

Ike Cartley was made shift-boss on the Vindicator after the explosion and directed the work of puttin ull hulk-heads in the mine. He vill testify that No. 5 level cirift between 'o. 11 and \(\% .1\) shafts was clear before he put the bilk-head in.

Orarlee Tohnson was carer on th: Vindicator an was
first man to reast the level after the explosion; he can only tell alout conditions of station and hodies.

Prs. Jottie Ray has seen Orchard ani Pettibone torether numerome times ano has lunched with hom in company with wrs. Tuerin. She always knew Orchard as empsey.

Arthir Rogers is positive ahout llarry llynds teliin him the he casho checks for Dempsey in Cheyenne."

I woul sugcest that when fr. Huwley or 4 . Borah visits Orchard they question him relative to the plyers referred io in this report an learn if he knows anything about thom.

As to the matter of Harry Hynds oashine checks for urchard under the name of Dempsey ai Cheyenne, I woula like that thit be taken up with Orchard; un let me know the result.

It is my impression that this man Ropers lies outrioght.
As Mr. Thompson is aware, several statments liat Rosers has made
in connection with this natter are untrue. As Pettibone sent a
bundle of money \(t_{\text {i }}\) Orchard through Pat Moran of Cheyunne I cannot see why he would be getting cheoks cashod in Hynds's. We know that Orchard will tell the truth on this matter if questioned, and I would like to hear the result. I know Mr. Thompson is very desirous to get this information, and as quick as I hear from Mr. Hawley on this matter I will convey the result to Mr. Thompson.

While in Boise befcre leaving for home, as I have writton you, I took up the matter on several occasions with Gov. Gooding and Mr . Hawley of arresting Glover and Mason. As a result both the Governor and Pr. Hawley concluded that in order to hold these two men Adams would have to eppear at Wallace, and in the cross oxamination of Adams at the preliminary certain matters would be brought out that we wish to keep secret until Adaras appears as a witness in the Moyer-Heywood-Pettibone case. In othere words, the placine of Adars on the witness stan in the (ilover-kiason case micht flush our fame. Now, there is a great deal of truth to this, and that, if ycu remember, was one of the things which we considered stood in our way when you and I talked this matter over in Spokane. Besides, while not probable, it mipht turn out that, neither of these men knew where Simpkins was iocated.

The Guvernor informed me before I left Boise thit I could say to you that if you could discover somebody who could rive you information leadinfr up to the arrest of Simpkins and who mi ht be hanering back for an increase in the reward. you could in eddition to offerine him the two thous nd dollars mentioned in the circular offer him thrue thousand dollars more wit: the promise that the party giving this inforration would never be known to simpkin: or his friends. Now, "r. Williums or yourself or some of your friends might accidentally drop on tc somebody who coula rive you this inforration providine there was enourh money in it, and therefore you are at liberty to offer three thousand eadditional.

Owinf to havin to leave Boise just after I had this conversation wit the Govemor, and havinf een very lusy for the past couple of days since I came home I have been unakle to write you before this date. Yinily let me know what you think ahout, the offer of this extra three thousand dollars.

Now while this will necessitate a little expense nevertheless I consider it wise to do so as we do not want the public to know the contents of this latter in advance of the trial.

I am also in receipt of letters for Orchard's wife and daw ter in Canada but as he has written me that he sent a package for me to former to his wife uni daughter, an the me not having arrived, I will hod these letters until the packer arrives, and have so written Orchard today.

Replying to yours of the 28th would say that, as you will have noticed in a report that I recently sent in, General Wells called on me and told me the result of the investigation made by Runelds and himself at Telluride. As to Adams makine another trip, would say that if this trip were made and Adams shown where the clothing and boots were found he could exsily designate where the body was placed. As to getting a clergyman to accompany Deputy Warden Milis, it is possible that General Vells could secure one, but I do not know of any to reconmend.

You will have noticed in a report that I sent in recently wherein a fellow named Rogers in Cripple Creek had reported to Floyd Thompson that Orchard got some checks cashed at Harry Hynds' gambling house in Cheyenne at the time that he waing to Cody or Themepolis after the blowing up of the Independence depot. Now, so far as we know, Orchard did not have any checks in his possession. As I understand it the money he received from Pettibone through Moran at Cheyenne currency. Would like you would call upon Orchard and aak him if he got any checks cashed through Harry Hynds in Cheyenne or any other place. in that city. We have been able to show Mr. Tho apson that nearly everything that this man Rogers reported to him is absolutely false. Pogers is the man that claimed to have seen Adams, Orchard, Yennison, Simpkins, Parker and Victor Poole in the neifhborhood of the Independence Depot the day previous to the explosion. This Orchard and Adams claim is absolutely false, and

I am satisfied they tell the truth. Furthermore, Limpkins never was in Cripple Creek to the knowledge of either Orchard or Adams. And Victor Poole, who has been held up as an all round bad man in Cripple Creek, so far as Orchard and Adams know was never known to commit a crime in his life except to threaten to throw General Bell out of his aunt's house if he ever called there again.

I wish you would see Orchard at your earliest opportunity and write me the result of your interview in respect to the checks that he is said to have cashed at Harry Hynds' place in Cheyenne.

You will note from No. 21's reports that the so-called socialists, or rather, anarchists, are about to hold a public meetings on the streets of the City of Caldwell for the next two weeks. As numerous cities in the union, including Chicago, Cincinnati, Denver and other cities, have prohibited meetings of this kind don't you think that the Mayor of the City of Caldwell should be called upon to prohibit these meetings. It is about time that the citizens of Canyon County, more especially of Caldwell, would resent some of the doings of this crowd.

\section*{Manazer James EOParland reports:}

Denver, Wednemday July 11, 1906.
Relative to this matter would say that a few days argo Mr. Floyd Thompeon was in Denver and he and I had a lone conference. Amone the matters broupht up was the fact thet we had not beer ahle to locate the man that Orchard shot at in the Vindicator on the night he and Joe Sholtz ontered the whaft of that mine for the purpose of blowing up the shaft. Mr. Thompson stated theit he had some indirect information to the effect that this man was workin at Colorado City in one of the milles and agreed to make an inventigation on his way back to Cripple Creek. The following is Mr. Thompson's report on this matier: (dated Cripple Creek July 9th)
"On my way from Denver last Saturda I stopped off at Coloraio Tity and looked up Clarence I.. Harrah who was shot at by Orchard an Joe Sholty on or ahout the 2lst day of October 1903 in thie eipenth level of the Vindicator ine. I found him workins at the Standard uill. He is a frood honest follow, or seems to be, an will do anythin he can to help tho prosecution. His testimony will be that he had just sent a loa of men up from the \(\because i\) irhth level to the surface and was waiting for the cage to return to him when one man carme out of the drift ciose to where he was sittinf on the Station; he thourht it was a belated miner anc saia for hir! to hurry up or he woula get left whereupon the man immediately turned an ran back down he drift. He started as if he were goins after this fellow when there were two shots fired at him. About this time the care was lowered to the eiphth level and he jumped on and ran to be hoisted to the surface, where he told his story about beine shot at to several persons inclu ines el Beck, the foreman, who was afterwards killed on the sixth level hy the explosion. They tried to discredit his story but from information 1 can gather around the mine it was generally buieved, enpecially by the mansement, Notwithstindin this he was fired the next day, any I think it was done more to guiet the miners that wore workinf: there at that time than anythinf else."

While it was pretty touph on the man Harrah to lose his job for reporting the truth, nevertheless when we tuke into consideration the conditions that existea at that time in iripple Creek, if the officials of the Viniticator minu had seemod to believe this statement of Harrah'b it mi ht have caused a stampede of the employes in their mine. I am very ruch pleased to pet this information.

A few days a o the Denver News published an article purporting to come from a correspondent in Boise, in which it stated that great privileges are shown to oyer, Heywoca and Bettibone by the sheriff of Ada County, and wound up by saying that it was very evident that the authorities know that these men were innocent and therefore are not trashing them as ordinary prisoners.

I believe myself that these mon should not get even as much privilege as an ordinary prisoner, being that they are the greatest criminals that ever were confined in Ada County foil or in any other jail in the United States; and if there is any way to induce Sheriff Mosely to simply treat these mon as he does other prisoners I would like to see it done.

Denver, Friday July 13, 1906.
Relative to the abiove matter would may that I wish to refor you to Aset. Supt. miele's regort of saturday July 7th, wherein you \(t 11\) note that party informed Capt. Coverly of the spoknene City Palice that he had mot and apoken to Simplins, and that the latter's mustache was shared off and he looked as thoufh his large front teeth had been replaced by others, and that he had gold teeth in the upper jam. But this informant, for reasona sot forth in the report, wan not at first inclined to ive the information to Captain Coverly. Howezer, the Captain vouchen for the truthfulness of his informant, and I have known Capt. Coverly for many years and believe him to be thorouphly trustworthy, as also Detectives MaDonald and Madree of the spokane police departmert.

I have a paint recollection that in a converaation with Adams and Orchard at one time they informed me that this man Lyle, who reaides on Yica Bay Coeur d Alene Jake was a personal friend of Simpking's. It might possibly be that Marail Cordon (or Mansil Gordon mipht ive us the necessary information as to Simpkins'a whereaboute if properly approached; and while thet is problematicel I have instrudted Mr. fasson to have Gordon epprasohed.
it would appear that it is going to be a difficult matter to find some person who is sequainted with Hanson and whon we could depend upon to approach the lattor on this subject. Howerer we will keep trying. Mr. Richardson, Mr. Darrow and Mr. Nugent, with their man Friay whitsell seem to havepmatiouliy taken charge of the defence, leaving Miller as it were out in the cold, but nctwithetanding this fact Mr. Hasson and I feel confident that Miller knows the whereabout. of Simpkins. We do not believe that itiller if no longer connected with the firm of Fobinson \& Rosenhaupt notwithmtanding that there have been hints thrown out to that effect. We elso know that iller from time to time has been engaged in some very questionable logal transmotions, in fact has beenaccuse of fiackmail. A man who woul resort to blackmall tactics is always open to a proposition of any kinc, and it has occurred to Mr. Hasson and myselt that if the proper party were found you could approach Millor with the proposition of five tincusand dollars provicine he succeeded in locstiny Simpkins an that if he knew where Simpkins he might. accept this proposition.

I amare that in makinc a proposition of this kind we must be very areful firsi in electing the man whom. we wish to make the proposition. I do not think it woul be pood policy to have any person connected with the Agency attempt this. Neither ic I think it would be good policy to have any of our minin friends irn spokane make this proposition, that is, providing that Mr. Wawley, Mr, Borgh and yourself would consent to huwe Miller appromohed by unybody. If you aid consent it mirht possibly be that Mr. Hawley, Mr. Borah or yourself
could suggest the proper party to approach Miller. While I would not hesitate to have Henson mpromahed providing we could discover some personal friend of the latter whom we could depend upon, nevertholes I would not attempt to approach Miller wi thout Mr. Hawloy, Mr. Borah and yourself had taken this matter up and after carefully discussing the mane had concluded that there would be no danger to the promoution in approaching Miller. And as stated above you might probably be able to suggest wo was the best party to do this. But in any event the Agency has got to be kept out of this matter so that if Miller refuses he cannot lie as an argument that the Agency tried to purchase him.

I would like very much that this matter be taken up and thoroughly discussed, ard let me know the result, that is what conclusion the counsel for the prosecution and yourself come to.

Mis mon Dity is a hard working man and is at prement working in a ming cripple Creek on his ogrc. There has never been aything ageinet his oharater. I told rr. oncmpson thet he ohould go ghead and have this woman get all the infomstion she can and when went to Boise after conforring with you, Mr. Hawley and Mr. Borah we would detemine whet could be done in the matter but there wes one thing which must alwy be borne in mind, thet i while wo might intimato to Minstor that the state was not in the habit of prosecuting its own witnesser we cannot make hin any promises.

It would cortainiy bo great thing if could get Hingter. The trouble abot thin retter is Ehat Mre. Daly is to bo conined in a rev تoke and we mut act quickly on her. i have mome plan haid out on this metter, but it is not nocessary to sey nythins about them here until conior with you.

In the ther of John F. Hullivan whom yqu rember roomed at the Belnont houst Inew all of the Inner circle in pact aji of the Executive Comittee of the wertim federation ol liners and knew how olome Orchard weseociated with these people, have cen Mr. Huliiven. in in now runing an moloynent aegency fand doine a very fair
 rind of conmumption. I had one of our hes 't Superintendentis approach

Hullivan who tated while he was a law and order man he did not want to have anything to do with this mattor but as i had done him a favor may years, ge when ho firat arrived in Donver he would sall upon mo. le said he had the higheat regard for me at I hed acted very kindly to him when he was a ick man. On our Assistant Superintondent reporting this to mor atudiod the mator over and rocolilected that in the Spring of 1671 had befriended a young man that had come to Donyer Irom Comecticut in very poor hoelth, in fact I got him some cmploysent, but had supponed that he wan dead.

Hopever Hullivan callsd upon me this afternoon. He inforned me that he knew Orchard undor the name of Hogan, was weli eqquainted -ith Moyor, Haywood, Patizibone Schmelzer Parker, Davis Kirkan, Sinpking adq al thi nquber of the Frecutive Bcatd or I hner Circle, and that while he would like to ansist me on acoount of my kindinese to him many yeare ago, nevertheless he wan a poor delicat man and was in a businan maing a vory fair living now and 1 knew as woll as he did how reyengeful those poople mere und he would not want to lay himself in their power by taking the witness stand. It is not necossery for me to tate the argmente I put up with Mr. Hullivan but ofter taikines with him for two hours showing him that his fare would be paid from here to Boise, that he would receive his witness fees, twenty-five cents a mile one wiy for mileaje from the border of the State of Idaho to Caldwell. his hotel expenses and thet we would pay the salary of whoever he mployed to take his place, he agroed to trake the motter under edvisement. 1 know that he has no aonsideration for the financisi ond of it but he is afraid of what, might happen whether those men wre convicted or not, however I think we mill get him. He certainly appreciatem vory highly the favor I did him when he came here almost deud some nine or ten years ago. In my talk with him I showed him how 1 could heip him in his present business as omployment agent by hevins all the railroads refor thsir business to him.

In course of our talk he told me that we should not place Mre. Gearin on the witness etand as she wes a notorious oharacter. neardr is the sixth man that she has been living with; they are not married: that she lived a lone time with outlaws in Pontana and that Pettibone knows all about her and that the defense would be able to show that she was a notorious charactar and unworthy of belief; her husband is simply a pimp and Pottibone could show that, und using witnesses that could be imporod like Gearin and his woman would poseibly have a very bac effect on us. As Orchard has told ue that this woman is a noterious charactar and that Pattibone knew her to be connected with train robbers in Montana, I believe this to be coca advice and sse she never answered the note I wrote her last miay ion't belleve she woula dare to take the witness stand any way.

You ramember in orchara's confession he mentioned man named Vaughn who had assisted Pottibone in havine repetere at the chartor election and had also been Orchardis partner in soliciting hail insurance year apo last sumar. Hullivan told me thet he was well ecqueinted with tayon, but, he does not know where the latter is now located. He said that neter hoyer Haywood and Pottibone were arrosted, Vaughn had been here in Denver and he and Vauegn had guite chonr telk on the matter. While neithor of them doubted but whet the inner circle of the Western Federetion were guilty of the crimes they were charged with and thet Orchard as thoy understood it was one of the inner Circie, novertheless noither of them bolieved that Orchard had over made thin confession but they knew a great many of the mettores published in the papers to be facte and thought that womebody must have given information but it never could have beon Orchard. Hullivan went on to say that he

based his opinion on the fact that the nowapapors published at one time that I claimed that Orcharl had never made a confesmion. Now I remember seeing such a tatement in some of the newapaperaj as a mattor of fact f had aaid nothing about it at that time. He stated he had told Vaughn I was a very faif man end he would believe anything I ald and as the newpapors waid Orchard had not made a comf asion and knowine how loyml Orchard was to these mon he was gatisfied Orahard had never made a confession and had held that opinion until he met me today. He stated Yaughn mas acared on account of boinp a partner with Orchard in the insurance business and cleared out so that he covid not be oblled upon a.s a witness in this casa.

I do not doubt for a moment but that I will succeod in getting Hullivan to verify Orchardi s atatement as to his intimecy not only with Moyer Haywood and Pettibone but with all members of the Executive Comittee of the 1 estern Federation. He furthor told me that one of the outlawn with whom Mra, Cearin formerly ived in Montana was now confined in the Leavenworth penitentiary and he had put down the name on an old book and would try to find this momoranduen and let mo know the name of this outlaw.

It eppears that ada \(s\) was \(r\) ade to belleve that he conli not be convicted for any of the murders he committed in Colorado and as his lawyersald not know of his crimes in nort? Idaho ther wanted to ret him into Colorado, without recard as to whether he wold be convicted there or not, so that he could not avpear as a witness agetnst hover, Haywood ard pettinone in liaho. Thoy semed to realize thoir mistake. While the colorado officers will come atter Adams, nevertheless, be will be take: to vallace to bo tried or the urder of owler ant ry er. I talked wit: the Governor until minnirht.

Hr. Hawley. At my request the Governor tried to have sheriff ifosely al-
low me to see steve dams in the boise jail. This the sheriff refused, claiming that he would not allow any person to gee Adams except his lawyens, who are also the layers for Mover, Haywood and Pettibino. The actions of the sheriff were not unexpected by either r. Haw ley or myself ass botif of us had come to the conclusion that Sheriff Mosely was a traitor; still we thought he would not refuse the Governor's request.

During the evening jiessrs. Hawley and borak and I fad a conference when ir. Horah informed us that Darrow had called on him and actually cried, saving that Adars had deceived rim in not tellIng him that he had committed the two murders in north Idaho- thetis is the TrIer and Bowleg murders. If he had know this he would never have made this move as it now put him in n hole if hams were convicted of these murders for he would always feel hat he had caused Adams conviction. It was at this point, threat he cried. However, he whaled ir. or mi to see to it that Sher li Sutherland, who hat arrived to take Andros to wallace, did not leave for a day at least as he (Darrow) was roine cow r the road for a dar ald wanted to be here fr: of e before Adams was taken away.

After \(r\). Torah left us ir. Hawlev and I concluded that Dam row was movably folie to iso li City to arran e to hames corpus: the sheriff as te passed thro:rh oregon enroute to lialiace. Acting on our suspicion Mr. Hawley put a man to shadow Darrow. This morning I conferred at different times with the Governor, Wi. Havicy and Sheriff sutherland, arreeins on the proper plan to be carried out during the day, which was carried out satisfactorily.

Lt 2 . m. Adams was brourht into court and on motion of the prosecuting attorney the chare arainst him of murdering leyte Grerory was dismissed as the Colorado officers were not present. Adams was then turned over to Sheriff Sutherland who took him to the penitentiary for safe keeping. I had already arrived at the penitontiarig, unseen by the numerous: 'Thief detectives who were shadowing me, three hours before Adams ai c had spent my time with Orchard, who 13 in food spirits and sorry for the way Adams has acted and blames Adams" wife for advising him to act as he has. From Orchard I learned that Adams has hardiv spores to him in the past month.

I met Adars after his arrival at tho penitentiary. When he sa" me I thourth he would faint. I talked with him for three hours, using every effort ir: my power to ret him to talk but, all he would do was to cry and say that I was lis best friend but he covin not talk to me nor would he look me in the face; therefore, my time was wasted.

Just as I finished up with Adams two of hi: lamers, Ex-Gov. morrison and J. Pe Hurent, arrived at the enitentiary. 'They did not see me. They desired to see Adams but the warden refused their request without, permisaden from sheri \(i\) Sutherland who he knew would not grant them a permit unless he were present. this had all been arranged last evening.

The men whom ir. Hawley had shadowing Darrow telegraphed that Darrow was at Pendleton closeted in the St. Gecrre Hotel all day. This man went to Portland and Darrow was to and did leave for noise later and from the description of the man met by Darrow it 13 the notorious Ed syce, the founder of the F . H . of it. As Boyne 1 s a millionaire no doubt but fe will carry out any wish Darrow ray make.

Manacer James McParland reports:
Wallace, Idaho, Thuraday, Septomber 20, 1906.
This morning I called on Stere hdam at the county jail. Ke told me that he did not want to thik; he had his mind made up and there was no further use in me calling upon hin as he roalized what he was doing. He thanked me for the pipe and tobacco I sent him but as he wes not disposed to talk I told the jailer to take him back to his cell. The jailer on his return told me that diams told him he djd not want to see arybody but his lamyer and his poople in the future, fror thiche it will be seen that he is wholly in the power of his lawyer, wife and macle.

As the defendants' lawyers have expressed themselves to the effect that they want to get me on the stand so as to get at all of the confessions I was of the opinion thet we could hold Adams on the testimony of Asst. Supt. Thicle and Warden Whitney, to whom diams has often talked on these murders. Therefore, Mr. Hawley, Judge Knifht and Prosocutine Attorney Gyde and myself met in Mr. Gyde's office where Ir. Thiele and Mr. Whitney repeatod the numerous conversations they mad with Adams. The lawers acreed that this was sufficient to hold Adams without me takine the stand.

As hir. Hawley had to co to Boise and the heartnit wes to be postponed until Monday it was agreed that Mr. Hawley, Mr. Thicie and Deputy Sheriffs Burkhardt and watson leave for Spokane at \(2 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m} .\). The deputies would roturn to Denver by ay of Spokane. In my opinion Darrow and Nufert suspent them though they did not think so. Mr. Havley did leave for sokane but aubseque.t events caused the Colorado depities and Mr. Thicle to remain.

The noon train brourdht in Deputy Hick and a man named Glenny who was supposed to know a food deal about the murder of 'lyler and Bowle. However, on beine questioned he had no information of importance. Deputy williams came in with Meson. It appears that on account of williams takine sick lawyer Worns, fuided by the notorious mike Dowd of Couer d' Alenc City, fot to hason first and after posting him browiht him out and delivered him to Williams, Worms accompanyinf them to wallace. Both Masor: and Glovor want a lawer ramed Crane to appear or them. Crane's home is at Harrison but he is not at home. Hr. Hawley wiji try to ret into commuication with him. Nason will retain worms for the time being pencine the arrival of Crane.

As neither Glover or ason woild talk to anvone, much less me, I had to await events and in the eveninf Glover sent for John Gray, a friend to all o us and a rood lawyer. Mr. Gray did not sseem to want to mix up in the case but I sent Judre Knipht to Gray and tol.d him to say to Gray that all we wanted was cor hir to advise Glover to meke a clean breast of it and save himself.

I subsequently saw Mr. Clayton Miller of the F. M. S. S. Company. Gray is attorney for the latter company. I told Mr. Miller what was wanted and he went at once to see Gray. I subsequentiy saw Gray myself and had quite a talk with hivi and he apreed to siee glover this ewening. I then wired Mr. Hasson the particulars, instractine him to see Mr. Hawley and have the latter Eet in touch with Gray as Grav will have to be pald for his services. Glover does not seem to have any money. The trouble is if glovar and Mason keep their nouths closed, owine to the stand taken by Adams, we car not convict them; but with Adams it is quite different. During the ovening I saw Judge Knlght. He had a conterence with Gray who sew GIover, but as GIover wanted to see Urane Mr. Iray thourht it best not to acivise Glover until he (Gray) sees Crane. fray wired Seatile, Iacoma and Spokane for Cranc, asking him to come to railace at once and keap his mouth shat. Gray thinks he will get Crane at some of the above mentioncd places and if he sees him first he thinks he can arrance matters satisfactorily.

Mason 13 confined in the city jail and Glover and Adams in the county jail. It was very unfortunate that the deput sheriff was unable to reach iason bofore Worms fot him as I am of the opirion re woula have confessed. However, he told Judre kniriht and Mr. Gyde that he knew Adamis and saw him in comvany with aimpkins in July and Aupust l904. Darrow and dugent are tryinf to locate crane and mav possibly succeed before sir. Gray feta th tonch with him.

Today in Hal lace I had a long conference with Deputy Sheriff Hicks, who seems to bc on mood terms with Newt Glover. The latter told Hicks that he did not want to be mixed up with Adams or the lawyers defending the murderers of Ex-Gcvernor steunemberg and he told lawyer Forms so and he did not intend to talk with any outsider and would only talk to John Cray and Crane. He also informed Hicks that he knew Adsmis and that he saw him in the camp of Simpkins up in the St. Joe country in July and Aurust 1904 at the time Tyler and Eoule were killed. Since Fis confinoment in ioil Adams has passed hin fruit throukt the party pecupying the cell ketween thew and had shouted to hin to stand pat.

I Instructed Mr. Hicks to see Glover when an opportutity presented itself and tell him that while in the prosecitine attorney soffice he had rotten a cilmpse of Adams sworn confession but did not have the opportunit,y of reading it near enolifh on account of inr. Gyde canine into the office but he did see where Adams said that Adams, rason and Glover killed Tyler, Simpking having Eone to Harrison so he would not be suspected, and how they had cau ht Tyler at the Spring, disarmed him, kept hir in simpkins' cabin all nirht and led him out next mornine when Adama shot him. Also the fact that Glover was uresent at the kilifin oi Boule and whlle Adams and Simpking killed Boule Glover fallod to kill Boulo's partner althorrh he wounded him. The ran that was monded car 1dentify all of thom, includinf the fourth man that was with them. albo the fact that althourh Masos: was not. \(r\) esent at the kililinf of Boule he Eave Adams 100 to fet awa: with.

I instructod Hicks how to ghow Glover tre wry he could save himself, also his claims, by civing information that would lear to the arrest of Simpkins; he (Hicks) and Glover could make a claan-up of about a,500 a plece; that even if the state dismissed the cases nending now, Wr:en Aama sam that je was foimp to be convicted, he mould compromise with tie prosecuting attorney and in turn prosecute ther to seve his own neck.

Mr. Grav saw glover and le ft wallace. I had no opportunity to
talk with Gray. As Darrow and Nurent think that Crev stands in with we, wh le I do not know, I think it possible that Gray has mexteot in touch with Crane and has cono to meet him. Lewver pilier 1 a ayinf in wait at Harrison to intercept Cranc.

I held several conferences with Messrs. Gvde and Knifit, also the sheriff and the two deputy sheriffs crom Denver. As I could see no reason for them remeininf here any longer I advisen them to retirn to Denver. As we could not use ifr. Thiole until ionday he left with the two Deputy Shert fis or Syokane.

During the afternoon I received telegra relative to locatIng and bringing Mr. Iindsey (the man who sscaped when Boule was killed) from Manitoba as a witness. The telegram was sent at the sugfestion of Mr. Hawley. As Sheriff Suthorland has been in correspondence ath, this man and had informed me that he was going to see Lindsey the matter was not in our hands and I wired Mr. Hasson to that effect.

In the ovening I had a conference with the sheriff and undersheriff uccabe, who has charce of Mason, and was informed that Worms held a lonf conference with Mason todsy. Although it seems useless to approach Mason on account oif the training he has had with Worme still I suggested that (as he is in the city jail and is taken out for his meals) ine be brought up to the sheriff's office tomorrow morning and I will have a talk with him as it can do no harm.

It will be remembered that aftor the arrest of loyer, Haywood and Pettibone man named Chandier wroteme. His letter was dated Mullen and was written on the letter-head of the Tiger-Poorman Store Company and in it he informed me that Simpkins was surely up in the St. Joe country and showed a thorouch knowledre of that country. yhis letter I reported but neither Sherlff Sutherland nor myself could shafest any way that we could find Simpkins even thourh we could ret into the corntry, Which mas inpossible at that time.

Since comine here and findine Chandier to be a reliable man I had him subposned. He called on me last evening and tolid me that he had apent a portica of the summers of 1904, 1905 and 1906 in that country. He knew Simpkins, Glover and Iason; also knew the murdered men Tyler and Boule; Steve Jogan, Frice who keeps the stons up, Enkstrom and several others. Between the murder of Tyler and just before the murder of Boule he and a man named Root, who mins the Comir \(d^{\text {B }}\) Alene Hardware store, were um thern fishing. At the request of Simpkins the attended a meetine of the settlers in the timber presided over by simpkins. He read over a list of claim jumpers that he had notived to leate but none of them har left excent lyior who aparently had left. Phey did not seem to want to leave by falr means sn that \(1 f\) thny would mive hirn five or six volunteers le woujd see that trov left in short omer.

Chandier west on to asy that nether ason nor wolle were at that meetine but montioned a number of others. Simpkins and a man named Red came there over a blind trail down the hill. Chandler did not know Adams. the \(t\) an Red was quite a bie musky lellow; some on had told him that Adars was a littie eliow. I had him deacrib: Ned ay he rava me a food description of Adams. I then showed him a "ew photerrajns, amone Which were the photocraphs of Simpkil:s and Adams. He iminejately identifiad the photomraphs of simpkirs and Adams, the , hotorter of the latter as that of the man know: to pim as Eed.

He went on to sey trat he sav oule tre day before he was killed and advised him that his life was in danfer. soule was brave gni said: "I will fet Stmpkins and ed. Thoy blew up the Independence depot in Colorado." The: doule was killed. After oule's murder there was some lady frimi of his up camping. They pot afraid ald asked him to come out with them. On the way out re met simpkns nid ved at Price's store. simpkins told fir now was the tire for him (handier) and fis fricnds to fo in anc take up claims as the jumpers had all mone. He referred to the murier of onie and pointinf hil finfer ot trandior he sald: mo opinion of this killine is that Tyler and oule had a quarrel and when we thourt that Tyier was missinf he was aimply layinf in wait for Boule hintilat last he ot him anc ther ise cleared out. Anyhoy we will never

Chandler arrived in wallace on the \(20 t h\) and left for st. Louis on the 24th. at Billings he took the C. B. \& Q. train and on reaching Alliance, Nebraska, he walked through the smoker, and there sat dent who turned his head away as he approached. Pealing that Adams was a desperate man and had assisted in the murder of boule and tyler he was afraid that he might harm him. After a short time he went into the smoker, shook hands with Adams and told him that he was colin to st. Louis.

As Adams in his confession and in different talks with Mr. Thieve, Whitney, Hawley and Borah has said that he went home on the Burlington by way of Alliance, Nebraska, arriving in Denver the latter part of August or September first, the importance of Chandler \({ }^{\circ}\) momtimony can easily be seen. It was lucky I thourht of him. It was midnleht when wo parted:

Thie morning by appointment I met Mason in the probate judge's
chamber. I had a long talk with him in which I showed him a oertain anount of what we know of the murder of Tyler and Bowle. If Adame had confesed, I almo nhowed him that as Adams had made a full breast of this and all other matter of this kind that he had boen in, al. o that he had gone over to the other side; that as soon as he waw that there wan no hope for him, he would go to the tate attorney ard try to compromise by givine testimony ageinst him and Glover, so as he, Masor, was a man of family, it wae him firsti duty to protect himenlf, nid advieed him to eo the prosecuting attorney.

I gave him a hietory as to how Adams had cone over to the defense, the lattor while pretendine to act his lawyer, were really promocuting him and would convict him; that it was through these lawyers that they were arrested, although we had Adams statement ince last Fobruary, etill these camem mieht have never come up were it not for the Moyer, Heywood and Pettibone lawyer inducing Mr.Adams and his uncle to let them do what has now been done: that they wanted to clome Adame' mouth so he conld not testify in the steunenberg murder and close his mouth as well as Glover's, so they could not give up 8imptine, and wore it not for the latter, neither he nor Glover would be in the beat now.

I dwelt long on the subject of simpkins' whereabouts, showing ham that there was five thoucand dollars for giving him up and he nead not be afraid that he would over be known in the matter when once siapkins was placed under arrest and he would be unable to harm any one, anyhow the stat would see that hes protected from bodily harm, and I advied him to see the state attorney. I reminded him that when he proved up on his claim he could leave there for while if he wished, but even if the case againet him was dismissed now, it could be fetchod up at any time, so now was the time to mave himelf.

He soemed to take what I said in goat part, and on leaving him he shook my hand, aying, "I may soe you again." I told him that if he ever wanted to see me, to tell Deputy Mecabe and be would let me know.

I geve these facte to Judge Knight, Mr.Gyde not boing in his office. The sheriff was present and Deputy MoCute part of the time. I was more than surprised to receive a cail fr mo. White of the Spokesman Review about 6:00 F.M., who recited almost verbatim the conversation I had with Mason. On questioning him, he said thet what he had learned was from Mas on or rather Mas on gave it to the party who told him. He could not have gotton it from Deputy Mecabe, ae the latter told
me that Mas on never open ce his lips to his. I told Whit that I mop cidentiy met Mason in the blieriffic office, but we did not talk on tho matter he was arrested on and we died apeak af simpkins and that I told hi l there was some money for the fellow who got his, however, Mas on had nothing to s may on the mutter, and that was all there was to it.

Since writing the above, Deputy Mocabe has called and told me that both Crane and Wourns had' an interview with Mason this afternoon, and it is to bo supposed that mason must have told them that I had talked with him, and then is how White got it. He also told that Fred Miller had arrivedin tenn. This would indicate that Miller was laying for Crane et Harrison: furthermore, MoCabe informed me that Mr. Gray had taken Crane to his house for dinner; this would look though Gray got to Crane first.
 City and arrange it so that he will be aught, hone it is best io not take the police down there into our confidence.

This forenoon I met Mr. Gray and Mr.Crane in tho etreet and had a short talk with thon, but nothing was anid relatite to the oases in question, as I aid not deem it good policy to have lintaray ochace to my room, nor for me to call. at his office. I had arrangbed that when Gray wanted to see me, he would so inform the wherifi, giving the time and place.

I met Deputy Sheriff Hicks who informed me that he had a couple of long talke with Glover on the lines I had leid down, but that clover world not agree to anything and did not care to eee me; that Mr.orane and Mr. Wourms had been to see Glover, but what transpired between them he could not learn.

Deputy MoCabi Informed me that Mr. Crane and Mr. Wourms had been to see Mason today, and that the latter seemed to feel pretty well.

At 8:00 P.M. John Gray and I, by appointment, met at sheriff Sutherland's house. He told me about his conforence with Mr. Hmwey, and that before he went to see Mr. Hawloy, he told Glover not to talk to anyone; that he had also met Crane and talked the matter over with him and tiold what ovidence we had or rather what Adams had confensed to, reminding \(M r\). Crane of the fact that as oon as adam seen thet there is no chance for him to escape, he will go back to his original conifesion and even if Glover was dischareed now, he would only have his liberty a very short time. Crane admitted that Gray'g reasoning was aorrect.

They submequentiy called on Glover, where Gray informod him what Mr.Hawley had told inim about Adams' confession and furthar-more, that when the latter saw that there was no show for his escape, there was littio doubt but that he would drag Glover and Mason into it, and that if he, Glover, was guilty, uniess he oame to save himelif before Adams again gete his work in on him, he, aray, would have nothing, to do with him, so he would laave it to Mr.Crane to advise with his.

Mr.Crencesid that he wished Glover to maj out his own course and would not advise either one way or another. Giover seid that he did not want to help the Steunenbert murcier came and wanted to argue the matter as to whtt tand he mould take, but Gray would not have it and left. I advised Mr.Gray to aee Giover in the morning and relate to him other incidente of these murders asotten from Adems and to sugesst to Glover that if he wented to do the right thing for himself he had better see

This forenoon was spent in conference with the etate attorney and the witnesses in the atate attorney'g office. Among the witnosseas was a man namad Phillip whom I knew an deputy sheriff in Duluth in the early 80's under herifi will Sergeant. He informed me that he had a cladm upon the St. Joe whioh overiooked Tyler's oabin; that he was well acquainted with Tyler and Bowle, as well as Simplins, Mason, Glover anc Alame; that he had soen adams often in camp with simpzins during July and August, 1904, also saw him in simplins cabin at one time whon he, Phililpe, in company with Bowie were pasming there; that one day he heard some shooting in the neighborhood of ryler's cabin; that he went out or his cabin and saw Simpiking iiring over Tyler's cabin; that they did not ain at the cabin, but kept firing over it. Pnillips gaid that ihis had been done very frequentiy before the aay in question; trat he had heard the shooting at other times, but that this was the only time he saw who was doing the whooting; that "'yler had told him that while they had ofton fired over the cabin, they did not eeem to mim at it.

Philifpesaid that that evening lyler came to his, Phillips', cabin and told him that Simpkins and Adam had oalled on him after the chouting, put their guns up againat him and asked ham how he would like mittle of the contents and told him that if he did not leave, ho would get a full dose; that he maid that adame had often visited inm at his ombin in the past few dayw weoke and teiked nicely witin him and that he thought up to that evening that Adams was a roel nice fillow, but now he was convinced that simpkins had brought him there to kili him, so he thought he would have to leave or get killed.

Phlilipe said that Tyler remained with him, Phillipes, all night, we was afreid to go back to his cebin after his experionce the afternoon before; that he left for his cabin the noxt morning; that the following morning betwean \(\mathrm{j}: 00\) and 6:00 A.M. he, Phillips, heard one or two ehots in the neighborhvod of Simpkins' cabin or a little dietance from it (he indicated the directionto me), and that Tyler was never seen after this until his decomposed body win accidently found in July, 1905.

Ae confirmation of Phililips statements, Adams mays in his confession that Mason, Glovor and he went to Tyler's oabin the night before they caught him; that their intentions wero to capture and kill him, but that he was not at home, and that they waited for him all night and noxt day; that they remsined at simpkins cabin that erening, but etill found Tyler absent from his asbin, but subquentily got him at the epring, took him to simpkine' cabin, kept him all night and the next morning took him out in the woods and shot him.

The day that Rowle wat murdered and left on the trail, he had a Inch, besides which he had \$7.50 and a watch. Then hie body was found: Phillip e being present, the ground shewed that when Bowie was shot, he had fallen on his face, but that he had been turned over on ibis back and his watch and money, as well as the lunch, was gone. Beside the body was found Bowie's pack horse and log, both being shot, the horme still having the saddle on.

It was Lindsay who gave the alar of Bowie's death. He wan wounded in the arm. Phillips tried to raise pone to go after the murders, but they were all afraid. Indsey did not see the men who did the shooting, as they were concealed in the Ximber. Lindane left the country right away and an Phillips had received severini tiarmetaing letters and notices, he left shortly after Bowie was murdered.

Phillips sale that when sheriff Manly and the coroner came after Bowie's body, he told the sheriff all about Tyler and Indicated the direction he heard the mot which he thought killed Tyler and suggested that he get a posse and make thorough search for his body; that Sheriff Manley said that as it was reported that Tyler had left, in e would wait a while and if he did not train up, he would then mace a search, but that he never did so.

I wish to draw attention to the fact the Nugont and narrow told Deputy Sheriff Burkhart, of Denver, that the defense would not
 was bound over, they would sue for writ of nimes corplif and would prove that bowie and Tyler were engines and wore shooting at each other all the time, and that Tyler Rilled Bowie and the corpse found in July, 1205, was not Tyler's, but that the latter was fugitive from justice. iron tine above it will be seen that simpkinf and Adams prepared fir this defense when they shot ever Tyler's cabin. They were not aware that Phillips saw them.

Thin morning I oalled at the atate attorney'm office and had a long conforence with the state attorney. I aleo met all of the etate witnensen and talked with them a ilttie.

The court convened at 10:00 A.1. Owing to the long drawn or ose examination of the witnesmes by Darrow, the proceedinge were very slow, and it would appear all if he was trying to kill time or make a showing for his fees.
A. 11 the testimony today was devoted to proving the oorpus delecti, the result of which was a request to have the body disinterred in order to examine the jawbone of Tyier which appeared as though the builet paseed through this part. The body was disinterred and the jawbone will be oxhibited in court tomorrow, if the dofense so wishes.

I saw Atty.John Gray who informed me that as Glover had not called for him, he did not think it policy to call on Glover at present, but that when he is discharged and knowing then what adame had told and all the evidenoe against Adams, ho may be able to do \(s\) omething with Glover, as they know that it is absolutely imponible for me to get a chance to sec aithor Glover or Mason privately. Mason is in the city jail, where overyone has acceas. Glover is in the county jail which is situated in such a public place that I could not get in without being seen, as some of the prisoner's friends are alway on the watch to sec if I enter either jail. There is no inside pasage between the sheriff's or state attorney's office and the jail, besides Glover and Mas on know thit so long as Adame keeps his mouth closed, they cannot be held, and their lawyer has assured them that adams will stand pat.

Pram this it will be seen that I have no chance, although I have the sheriff and all his deputies at my back.

This mornilng Dr Kiey, coroner, and Deputy Ehoriff Tillimme arrived fromi Mullan with the renaine of Pyler. Although the grave and the cofin did not aesm to have been disturbed, nevertheless, thore was a pair of shoes, an oxtra undershirt and an overmirt found in the coffin, which did not belong to the corpse when it was found and taken to the undertakin in Wallace, but the pieee of the thoe found with the corpse and identiried at the time by Yeager who made the shoe, wae miesing.

In investigating this mattor, the undertaker said that when the coroner left the remains in his back room, the stench was unbearable and he requested the coroner to let him coffin the remaine at once, as thoy had been identified. The coroner tald him to do it and to put everything belonging to the man in the coffin. He did co, and in fact he packed overythine in the room, including an old pair of shoes boloneing to someone. He did not romember the old piece of shoe, and as it did not molil, it might have been wopt out in cleaning up the room after the corpse had been placed in the coffin and taken away for bur1al. Therefore, the axtre clothes and shoes were accounted for.

It had been proven that Tyler carried a tobacco box. This was found in the coffin and identified, also a portion of a bottle of what appeared to be horserradish. We found theit on the day ofore Tylor's dicappeartenca, Mrs. Phillips geve Tyler a bottle of horbe-radish of which a portion had been used. We will have Mrs.Phillips here tomorr ow.

The coroner was on the witness stand all the afternoon. A portion of Tyler's reriaine was in court, by which the coroner demonstratod his testimony.

Unile the coroner was giving lis testimony, Adame was very nervous and pule as death. After court adjournod, he bogged Dejuty sheriff Hicks to get him a drink of wiskey. I do not think Hicke eranted hic request.

By tomorrow we wijl begin to connect Adam with the murder by placing Archie Phillips on the stand after the defense eete through with the croms examination and Mrs. Phillips icentifies the bottio of horse-radish. The warden will then testify, after that Mr. Thielo and Last Mr.Ohandior. Thir is the arrangement we heve made of tre witnosses.

This morning I held a conference with the counsel for the state, when we made arrangements concerning the witnesser to be used today.

Coroner Keys was called to the stand for a few minutesj then Archie Fhililpe, one of our best witnesses, took the stand. As \(I\) have already reported what Mr. Philifips' testimony would be, I will not repeat the same, but will say that the state got thr ough with his examination in chief at noon.

During the intermission of court, Mr. Kinight and Mr. Gyde and I held a conference. They informed me that Phililipe made a ine witnose as I had predicted. I told them that as Aclams had confessed all concerning these murders to Darrow, unless the latter wanted to hang adame, (and in my opinion he did) he would not crobs exanine Fhillip. to any extent, as he knew that Phillips had worn to the truth in his oxanination in chief, and a long drawn crops exomination was bound to damage their cane.

To aumen the whole matter af Darrow up, I would say that he had been paid to prosecute dame, at least I am now thor ourchly convinoed of this. He kept Fhillips on the stand up to the time the court adjourned.

Phillips is about the best witnese I have over hoard of, oven Darrow admits it.

I am of the firm belief that unless the court is prejudiced (and I do not think the court is) we could hold Adame without further tostimony. During Phillios' crose examination, it hurt Admes that he had to arise from his seat and walk a iittio..

After court adjournod for the day, Judce Knjfht, state Attornoy Gyde and I held another conference and laid out plans for tomorrow.

I would state here that as it woild be impossible to hold Glover or Mason and still more imposible for me to zet a chance to broak either of them down, owinf to the condition existing here, as oxplained in previoun reports, they were called into court and on motion of the state, the warrants againet them were diemissed.

En the ovening I received a telegrara from Mr. Hawley, asking me to wire him in cipher how we were getting alons and what had joen done昭 Finimeg. I could not wire Mr. Fewley in cipher for the the reacon that although he hae a list of cipher names and places, he has not a oopy of our cipher; therefore, he could not decipher a cipher telerram.

He maid that Fuller hit him avarel timos on the way to the city jail and knocked hin down eo once aftor he was inelde of the jeil.

After dinner I 8 ww John Vict or who wat drinking in Gordon's placs. I was made acquainted with him everal days oco, but never talked with him until today. Jie said tiat he had workod in colorado during or just befor tho irouble, and that he had to loave tho Cripple Creek dietrict. Kis fosilnge are very bittor meninwt the officials of that part of tho country, wino with the way Moysir, Heywood and Pettibone have been treuted hero. He showed me a dirk knife, and said that he alway carriad it and a gun, and that if the occaition erer came, he colid use thsm. Nie said thet he was frad when ho heard of Ex-Got. Steunenberg's death; that weald hear some more"good news"before long. I askal \(h\) im what it vas and he gaid that gov. Gooding would orose over the devide as soon as this case was ovar with; that there were men who would kill the gover nor now, would it not hurt the prisoners' ease.

I was with him for abcut four hours and his conversation all this time was afinst the officere of colorado and Idano and priefes ior the Federation poola. He was quito drunk when I left him. He said that he was going out about three miles in the country, where he had a Iriend, and pronised to sec me agkin.

Jobn Victor is about 42 yoars of age, has sandy coplexion, hair and mustache silghtly streaced with gray, wistht about iaty or 150 pounde, gray eyes, the skin on his face hangs in folds, mixing him look older then what he is, and is ciresimed in a plein, reat, mray suit.

In the evening I saw Barber and welch together. Barber was helping Welsh to hunt up winesees who had seen Puiler higt, him. I told Barber that I thoueht it was uselees to try to proeecute the marshal. He said that his objoct was to get to cabe, if possihle, and rat him ousted from office, as then Davis, the night watchman, would in ill probability be tho man to succoed him; that Davie was ull right, a mocialist and a friend of the prisoners, but that he was compelied to keop quiet in order to hold his job; that otherwise ho would be as outspoken as any of us, and that if could get him into the position, it would be help to the Sociallsts, inamuch as he would favor us in many ways.

They all seemed to be mare that at least for the present no assistance in that line was required.

This man was arrested at the instance of an Arizoma Ranger who claimed not only to have know him as Simpkins but also to have worked with him in Cripple Greek. The facte are that Simpkine never eithor lived or worked in Cripple Creek and the furthor facts are thet Simpkins has really never done a day's work since the first riote in the Coeur d'Alene District in 1892 up to date, and in partioular he has never done a day's work since 1899, therefore I could not recommend the putting of the state of Idaho to the expense of sending a doputy aheriff from Wallace, Idaho, to identify this man.

I also have thourht that it mifht be poseible that ed Mintster mifht of got in some penitentisary somewhere down south in California, Arison or hexico as Stete has told me that he would hold a min up und had pionty of norte. I have thought thet this mieht be quite probable but this lutter is only imaginary on my part you will be a better judge of that. I am will and hope you are the same. Hoping that you will be able to make something out of this, I remain as ever, Yours respectfuliy.

The Denver' office for some time past has been in receipt of information from informante to the offect that Attorney Prank Hangs, who represents the Western Federation at Cripple Creak, has had an arfidavit drawn up and has trief to induce several parties, whose names at the present time are unknown to the informants, to sich tris affidatit. The affidevit covers every outrage committed in Cripple Creak from 1901 up to the blowing up of the Independence depot in June 1904. It covers each case, as it were, separately, and then declares that the mine owner and the officars of the state militia were responsible for these acts.

It will be remembered that I reported a for days age that while
In Salt Lake I met an informant who informed me that Schmelaer had recently been in Utah and in taiking over the diams' matter stated that they had another jolt for the prosecution in the Moyer-Haywood-Pettione case which would eventualiy ilberate the prisoners. The Denver Times \({ }^{*}\) of Saturiay, october 23th, indicates this fact as shown by the clipping enclosed with this report, and at the same time the Mupeal to Reason \({ }^{\text {W }}\) of oc tober 13th, the same date the article in the "rimes" appeared, pubjished the affidavit in fuil of one \(C\). C. Baldwin. You can easily obtain copies of the "appeal to Reason for the i3th in Gerry's store in EOIse. If not and you wili let me know will obtain copios ior you.

This man Baldwin was for a time connected with the state militia and was orderiy on Adjutant General Sherman Bell's staff. He is an hebitue of low-down dance halls and houses of prostitution where he plays a piano for a living. In September 1905 he pleaded guilty in the west side court here in this city to burglary and grand larceny and was sentenced to the state reformatcry until he should become thirty years of are, and he has just been paroled from the reformatory at Buma Vista by Governor McDonald.

This affidavit made by Baldwin, in my opinion, is simply the commencement of a series of aifldavits ol like character which may subseq! enti:y be used by the defense for Moyer, Haywood and Pottibone. Therefore, I considered that some charges of perjury should be broukht wainst Baldwin and aft \(r\) his arrest he could be returned to Buens Vista to serve the balance of his term. When once returned to the reformatory, if properl: handied, we can cet from him the inducements that vere held out to him to subscribe and swear to this afficavit. We have to nip actions of tris kind in the bud.

To this and I had an interview with Fioyd Thompson, secretary of the Cripple Creek Mine owners Association, and bir. Filifus. They in turn called upon District Attorncy Stideer and took the matter up with him

and also with General Welis who took the matter w with Governor feDonald. The Governor \(1: s\) willing to have Baldwin returned to the state reformatory Dit would like first to have the men who have been libeled in this affidavit swear out warrants for hin. Phis surgestion on the part of the Governor I approve because if a an is paroled he has to break his parole In some way before he can be returned to the reformatory or whatever penal institution he mav have beer: incarcerated in. Therefore, it was decided that Mr. Whompson go to Cripple Creek as quickly as possible and fet the necessary warrants out for Baldwin. In the nean time General Wells thinks he will be able to pick up Baldwin here in the city but \(I\) think Baldwin will be hard to pick up as I believe that the defondants" counsel, more particularly Grank Hangs, will see to it that Baldwin is kept under corer, at least for the present.

I talked over the Adams matter with Mr. Fililus a fev days ago and he afrees with me that we should try dams for the murder of Houlle as we think that Adans at the preliminary for the Boulie murder will not have the array of counsel that he had at the preliminary hearing of the Tyler murder, and that when he seas that he is forsaken to a creat extent by this array of counsel he may inform us the means thet were used to fret him to wo back on his previous confesston. However, tuis will be takon up with rr. Hawley, who statod that he would return from Washington by way of Denver. I am very much in favor of having Adams trigd and held on the Boulie murder. As irr. When witnesses are used at a preliminary hearing and thelr teatimony taken dow by on official stenegrapher it is always wise to frum n1sh such witnesses with a copy of what they testified to. of course, the witnesses in the Adams' case had their tentimony read to the and signed the same but when the trial does come up in the district court the defense, having copies of this testimony, will crose-examine the witnesses on their testimony given at the preliminary hearing, and some times by so doing confuse witnoen- perhaps not materially but the dofendant \(s\) counsel makes the most of any Iittle mistake he may hove made before a jury. Therefore, I asked Prosecuting Attorney Gyde to see to it that the official stenographer who wat used at the preliminary in the fyler case make copies of this testimony for me. This was done and \(I\) have had this copy rewritten, and send by express todey coples of the same to you with extra copies to be delivered to Mr. Hawley and Mr. Borah.

I have forwarded to Archie philifipe, one of the principal witnesses, at Couer \({ }^{\prime}\) Alene City copy of his testimony and aiso to Asst. Supt. Trifele of our office at Spokane copy of his testimony.

I am also sending to Sheriff Sutherland copies of the testimony of iIr. and Mrs. Thonas, Mr. Xeager, Mr. Hughes, Deputy horiff Willians and Coronor Keys with directions thet he either mall or deliver these copies to the respective witnesses. In case we try aiams for the murder of Boulie 1t will be very necesmary st least for hr. LMillips to read over his testimony he crave in the Tyler case. The testimony of Stansbury, who first found the bot of Tyler is 1material. Therefore, I have not sent a copy of his testimony to him as no amount of cross exeining could shake his testimony on that matior.

The following is the letter that I have written to Sheriff Suthorland:

If the state concludes to hold a preliminary in the Boulie case I do not think that dams will be supplied with such an array of counsel as he had in the Tyler matter. This will dampen his spirits to a certain \(n\) extent.

In taking care of dams I would keep him apart just as much as possible from all prisoners and would advise that the jailer and the guards who sleep there at night have very Iftile to say to him. In other words, isolate him just as much as possible. I would lifo to know from you hov le is sta ding his confinement up to the present time.

I think that it mirin be advisable for either you or some one of your deputies, that you might select, to have e IAtric talk with Adams. First just speakire to him e little
 and then brirestr un 1 re subject \(e s\) io how his treatment at the Wallace jail compares with the treatment he received in the penitentiary, ald if le tolls lead him or fo the point where an opportunity will present itself ic say to him: I think, Steve, you have acted very foolish. You know full well what you have confessed and you sew at the preliminary that the static was well proparaj to try you in ease that you attempted to rob back on the con cessions that your made in Boise." Then whoever talk: to him can fo on to say that as the matter looks to him re thinks that hans' relatives, inclucine his wife, had been sadly misled by the comselffor the defense, who simply want sd to close Adams mouth in the trials of foyer, Haywood and Pettibone, ane did not care whether he was mun ic or not.

See if a talk of this kind has any effect on kans or not and if he shows any sigh of weakening I will co to Wallace myself and have a conference with Adams. at any rate I will ike to know how dams is gettire on.

Manazor Jaman MoParland reports:
Denver, saturday, October 27, 1906.
As I reported sonia time ago, Orohard wrote me to the offoct that at the tine the Denver Baving Bank wan pleoed in the hande of a receiver which was Auguat 19 th, 1905 there was a run on the Central savinga Bank in the Mining Exchange Bldg.; the Weatern Pederation had their headquarters in the Mining Arohange at that time. Orchard atated that wile the run was on the Contral Savinga Mank, whioh lastod about three daye, Haywood drew cut something over a hundred dollars from the bank and turned it over to Orchard. Orchard at that time was preparines. for his trip to ldaho. At the time haywood turned this money over to Orchard, man whom Haywood represented as a reporter of the Pueblo Chieftan had a talk with Haywood. Orchard thinke this man saw Naywood pay him the money.

Aftor roceivinf Orchard's letter I wrote him for further date including the desaription of the reporter in question. He said he was a tell slim fellow, but that of course mas very indefinite.

I suocooded in locating this man whene name is A. A. Swain, Room 412 E . \& C. Bide. Denver I called on Mr. Swa in this morning who informed me he remembered the time of the run on the Denver Savinge Bank which resulted in the bank olosing it doors, also that there was a run at that time on the Central Savinge Bank which lasted for three days. On account of the fact that he ( \(r_{0}\). I will let the matter rest until I hear from Orchard and then will afain call on ir. Swain.

In talking with a friend of mine here who is pretty close to the Western Federation officials a couple of days ago，he informed me Judge 0．N．Hilton，who defended St．John seems to be the favorite with the officials of the Western Federation so mach so that they are thinking very ser justly of displacing Richardson as loading counsel for the defense and substituting Hilton but are holding this matter in abeyance until they learn the result of the United States Supreme Court．沙 friend went on to may that United States Senator Patterson had threatened that in the event of the Western federation official a sub－ stituting Hilton for Richardson he would open the column of both his newspaper－The Rocky Mountain News and the Denver Times－in an expose of the doings of Foyer Haywood and Pettibone and the doings of the Western Federation of Miners in general．ll friend info med me he did not think Patterson＇s threat would have any effect in preventing the substitution of Hilton for Richardson．If we could only get the officials of the western Federation of Miners in a fiat with Patterson and his two newspapers it would be a case that when thieves fall out honest men get the spoils．

I doubt very much whether the Western Federation dare incur the displeasure of Patterson，and again 1 am very doubtful as to whether Patterson would dare attack the acts of the Western Federation whom he has upheld for so many years．My informant gave me this matter just as he got it，still I ar somewhat skeptical as Patterson knows too much about the Inner Circle of the stern Federation of liners and they in turn know too much about Patterson＇s actions，and I don＇t think either dares to make a move of this kind．

Todsy I receivad the following letter from Harry Orchard which explain itsolf:-
-I receivad yours of the 19th sone day ago as there was nothins in it that required answar i did not write. But have been thinking of some things since that I was not sure whother I had olled your attention to. The time that Johnie Neville \& myan if man at Cheyonne and Pat Marrann oumo to Denver and got that money for me, wen he orne back that night Davie myself, Pat and IIttle Charlie mayed up pretty late and wae drinkins a good deal. And as you know when meri drink to much it loosens up thoir tongue. But, what I wanted to call your attention to was thim. Pat had a Jew tendís bar for him and he did not drink and Pat, has ince told me that the Jow was no good and that he had fired him. Now he (the Jow) knew whore we was from and who we were and huvir and myself thayed in his room beck of the saloon nearly all the day that Pat went to Denver not knowing just what to do and Pat came over there when he got buck from Denver and gave me the money there and he adid that they thourht overything was ail rircht so after nearly every body had pone home we went over tio the saloon and I dont remeniber just what was said but if you could find this bar tender he miesht remeaber something, that would he of importance. I ame almost sure that he knew what Pat went to Denver for as Pat told us at that time that he was all right and as he was drunk apood deal of the time he trusted him. This would be in June 1904 , I cannot remember his neme. I tall you this because I do not think that I went into dotail before and I think that if this man remembers anythink that perhaps you could induce him to come here, so as you will know this if 1 have not told you before. You will know if this would be of any importance if yo: could find the man, 80 if you think this would be of no importance this will not hurt any way.

I am well and hope this will find you the same. The time seems to be gettiny lonf. I hope that things will soon turn, suspense seems worse than anythinf. Do not think thet I am discouraxed for my whole trust is in Cod and his Crace will be sufficient for he has spoken it, and if it was not for the blessed promises that he has promizes to those that encure to the ond and the peace that he gives us now. I could not stand this nor would I try to."

You will remember that "oran denied he went to Benver and carried the packape of momey which he received from Pettibone to orchard while the latter was at Theyenne in the curse of raking his escape from

Colorado after tho blowing up of the Independence depot. It is just possible we can locate this Jew. He will remember at least the fact that Moran went to Denver on the dey in question and also remember Orchard and Neville keeping quiet in the back room of Koran's saloon during the time that Moran was absent.

I wilt detail an Asset Superintendent this evening to po to Cheyenne for the purpose of locating this Jow.

On receipt of this letter I wrote Orchard as follows:-
"I beg leave to acknowledge and thank you for your letter of the 26 th, as I consider what you say relative to the Jew bartender at Koran's very important. I cannot remember of your over having referred to this Jew in any previous converaction that I had with you. As you are aware, moran would not talk on this subject, besides we know he is cortainly a great friend of Pottibone's, but I will try to locate this Jew arid there is no doubt in my rind but what he will remeniber the circumstances, providing he wishes to do so. I am very much pleased that you drew my attention to this, and I will take the matter up at once.

Yes, there ie no doubt but the time hands more or less heavy on your hands but at the same time it is all for the best, and while we would be very much pleased to have these cases come to a head, nevertheless we are unable to push matter any faster than what wt: are doing. Of course, you are aware of that yourself.

Thisle had with Mr. Richardson wherein the latter stated he diff not give a dam en whether Adams would be tried or not as he mould eventually be discharged on technicalities, since writinfyou on yesterday on this subject I have given the statement of Richardson a rood deal of consideration and can only arrive at this conclusion: After Adams had been extradited on the charge of being un acoomplioe in the murder of ins. Stamenberf, he wan released on a writ of hebase corpus but Immediately mas rearrested charged with the murder of flyte Gregory in colorado mes subsequently role med on the lat tar charge and rearrested by Sheriff Buthorlund charged with the murder of Fred Tyler. The question mugesentink itself to me is when a prisoner has been extradited from another state and is subsecmentiy. released on the charge on which he had bean extradited, can he be held and tried on another charge not met forth in the original extradition papers before he has had due tine to leave the state that extradited him? Wile not asserting the loge status of the question raised, nevertheless it seems to me person having been extradited frore another tater can be tried only on the charge for which he mes - atraditad, or if there are other charges against him he must be allowed due time to leave the stat before he os be rearrested.

However, there mi ht be a saving, clause in the Adams case on account of the fact that the colorado officers appeared in Boise with proper papers to extradite Adars to Colorado, but in the meantime the state of Idaho huvime discovered that Adams had coreritted murder in Idaho other than the murder of Ex-Ciov. Steunenberg intervend and prevented the tate of Colorado from extraditing Adars. This might be a saving clause provided my theory es stated above iv correct.

This morning I met Gov. Wooding at the hotel and accompanied him to the 8tate House where hold a conference up to noon. Jurine our conforence 1 discovered that he mes not amare of the fact that No. 21 had boen withdram from Caldwell although I knew that supt. Hanon had writton him at the time he was withdrawn and had subsequentiy writton, him in rezserd to returnine him to daldwell, but owing to the Governor's absence from Boise those letters had not been celled to his attention. He instructed me to wire Mr. Hasson to retiurn No. 21 to Caldwell at once which I subsequently did.

On my return frora the state Houge 1 aalled on br. Hawley but he was not in his office. At 1:15 P. pl. in conapany with Opt. No. 11 I wont to the penitentiary to see Orchard. He was vory glad to seo me. I remeined with him up to 5 P. M. Durins this time we went over his former tatements he has a good memory and will make a fine witness.

I took up with him about being unable to locate the man that tonded bar at Moran's in Cheyonne in 1904. Ho mays this man while he looked like Jow ma Moran oalled him Jow mifht not have been a Jew. He further etatad that whon he maw foran last in lenver that he told him the d-o-d Jow skinnad him so bud that he hwa to lot him fo. Orchard wont on to say that this bartander had room in the alley; he ronted this room from a woman. de thinke the few took care of il himself. Today I had a dong conforence with Coy. Geoding and in the artermoon In company with Opt. No. Il I visited the penitontiary where I hold a two hour conforonoe with Orchard wherein we pegin diecussed his ovidence; he is in epod spiritn. He told me that at timer he mas a little arraid of come of the guards that in seme may they might do him hare but he did not suapeet any one in particular. I showed him how loyal, und close mouthed those nuarde had been, never rovealing the fact that I had conforred for days with him lant Junuary, alse the fact that I conforred ith down and himelf for coreral day in february and the furthor fact that Adams was taken to colorado and was away for a couple of weeke, that the guaris know he mak gene but nover opened their mouths. This semed to metirfy him on that point. he told me he was mailing a biblo and a Pountain pen to Denver and yould 1 ike Mr. Cary to remail it at onoe to his wife in Canada. Mr. Cary will wee that this is done at onoe as he wante it to reach her before Christmac.

Thinking that in some way might get a man next to the priepmers by representing himself as Chas. Shoddy, fias Chas. Vyatt, I askod him if Moyor haywood or Pettibonelever kné Shoddy. He cluined. they did not. You will remember that Orchard while in Salt lake in November, or it micht have beer Septomber, 1905. in writing Petíibone for money told him he wes goine to take shoddy on the job; he sifo wrote Simpkins to the eame fifect and minted \(\$ 500.00\) to pey Shodiy. the former wrote him he would get the money for him but it did not come in time. As a mattor of frot he cid not gee Shodidy at all mor had he any intention of taking him in the steunenberg murdier ceme.

As Oraherd in confident thet the prisonerf think that Shoddy war in on this murder and possibly set the bomb and cot awmy as they know well. or think they do that on account of Orchird arriving eit the hotel three minutes after the oxilosion he could not have done it personally, it had occurred to me that if man was sont to Boise to impersonate Shoddy he mieht get to sue Haywood or Pettibone throufh their lawyer and get some pood information. But on thinkings the matter over I don't think it good policy to try it for the pollowing romsonge shoddy is or was when 0 rchard know him a member of the W. F. of \(\%\) oi the prisoners throuph Orchard's misrepresentation thoukht shodiy was with Orchard at the time of the murder and after Orchard's arrest lost no time in locating shoddy and it micht be without any investigation put him out of the way. if not they focated him und got the truth lone apro. It may be I am wrone but I dont think it would be pooci policy to try to impersonate Shodiy.

As it had ocesrred to me that if could prove from what bank Lewyer Hiller goti the \(\$ 1500\) whon he went to Donver dftar Orchard had his preliminary lest Januery therwby mowine thet hoyer und haywood and Pettibone or some one of them got this money for lililer either by draming it themselven out of the bank or pivine Milior a cheok on some bank for the money, I questioned Orchard on this point. lie suid they

This morning I wont to Wh. Lav' a maloon, 2003 Arapahoe St., to make inquiries concorning the whoreabouts of Ld Reichter, and found Reichter in the maloon. \(\mathrm{He}_{0}\) atatod the first time he was in Cheyenne wis in Jan. 1905 whon he went there to tond ber for Pat Moran; that there wal a man named Billy Kacle who wal tending bar for Moran just prior to his poing there and that Kagle had tended bar for Moran several times for two or three monthis at time. phe description which Reichter gives of Karie compares with that of the man whom we are trying to locute. Reichter said that Kacle mas rooming in the Warren Block when he (feichter) was working in Cheyenne and that he
 Reichter aaid he thought Karyle was tondine bar for Moran now and if he wan't there that Moran would know where he was. Reichter said Kafle would know overy bertender who had ever worked for Moran as he had been in U'heyenne ever since Moran has bean there and had worked for him off and on.

Reidhter said there was another man whe tended bar for hioran numed (Clint Martin or Marvin after he (Reichter) left und he understood that this man had tended bar for Moran two or threse times. This man was about 25 years of age and weiphed about 165 or 170 pounds, and would not answar the description of the man we wish to locate: Reichter said he thowht Martin, or Marvin, was in Cheyenne still but said that Karle would know every bartender who had ever tended bar for Moran and it mipht be he whom we wieh to locate as his description compares with that of the pert,y soucht. Reichter said that Facle had tended ber for Moran durinf the summer of 1904. Reichicer seers to he rather a congenial fellow und would give any information he could. He suid he conld be found at Law' s saloon, \#2003 Arapahce St., during the day time and if he wae not there the bartender woulc know where he was.

After mecuring this information I reported at the Agency and was ingtructed to po to Greeley by first train and there try to locate the Mcinerny \({ }^{\circ}\) s and learn from them the whereabouts of Gerts and to then uroceed to Cheyenne and try to locate a bartender wino tended bar for Pat Moran two or three months during the sumen of 1904 whose description was fiven me, and who at that time roomed somewhere in the rear of Moran is saloon, and as soon as I luernod who this bartender was and where he is at present to notify the Aprency by phone and await further instructions.

1 left Denver for ireeley at b oo clock pom. via Union Pacific R. R. and arrived at Greeley at \(7: 20 \mathrm{P}\). in. On my arrival I referred to the to directory und could find no ficlnerny listed therein. I went to the post office to make incuiries and found it closed. I made inquiries at some of the business houses that were ofen and learned
there was a man named Michael McNerny, a flagman for the Union Pacific R. R. who lived at 1118 fth Ave. I was told that this man did not have any sons here but had one daughter living here. I did not wish to make too many inquiries concerning this family until I personally interviewed them.

I went to 1118 7th Ave. and located the house where cNerny lives, but did not make any inquiries at the house tonight as I was afraid if this was the right family that Mrs. McNerny who was visiting her daughter Mrs. Hughes at 14579 th St. Denver, and whom I interviewed there, mich have returned home, and if \(I\) were to go to the house tonight and she was there she would recognize me so I decided under the circumstances to interview Mr. MaNerny tomorrow away from his house.

I then discontinued for tho day.

}

I see you have sorsthing to be thankful for since the Supreme Court has at last given their decision in the habeas corpus proceedingm. I am very anxious to find out ar soon as possible when the trials will come up in Idaho. My family is still in Cripple creok and I mant to bring they here as soon as 1 can find out whet is expected of me. I don't munt to bring them here and then lave them alone in this country. Prank I believe you oun arrange to eot along without ine up there, if you have Morris to identify the stuff we dix up und yourself as well as some others can take care of all the information and evidence that I was instrumental in petting. In fact it will cost you people more to get me there than I would be worth to you. I would be on the ruilroad about ten days going and comine and I would have to ask you for my sulary which wonld be et the rate of \(\$ 500.00\) per month. I would not like to ask this company to pay my malary for that, lenpth of time while I would be away from the property, and I feel that it will be too much of a demand to make on the paople there.

I wish you would take this up with sir. Mc and Pillius and lot me know at the earliest possible dete so that I can settle my own affairs.

I am not aware of any particular evidencs in this case secured by Mr. Thompson that would warrant the State of Idaho in expendinf the arount of money that he spypests it would take to fetch hir: to lizho. The fact of the mattar is that from the statements made by orcharc and Adarns, every particle of information that thompson had secured proved to be absolutaly false. You will understand that in makine this statement I don't mean to say that Thompson himself manufuctured these statements hut the men in his employ did manufmoture the statements and no doubt would have been willing to take the stand and testify to the same. Thompson is well aware of the fact that his chief witnems made false stadements to him as he and I talked this matter over very plainly, and as to Thempson himself havine been abl: to give any testimony of any importance he knows nothine except beinf present with our Mr. Cary at the time that the Pettibone dope was due up in Wrs. Orchard \({ }^{1}\) s yard.

However, I have directed Mr. Cary to write Mr. Thompson that at present wo do not know what time these cases will be set for trial but possibly thoy will be set for trisl some time next February. Second wo are not propared at the present time to ave as to whether it will be absolutoly necessary for him to he present during the trials. Third, we expect Mr. Hawley here in Denvor the firet or second weok in'January, and after Mr. Hawley and Mr. Fillius have conforred we will let him know as to whether we will require his presence at Caldwell during the trials or not. Althoufh I hardly think we could use Mr. Thompson as a witness except in the matter of corroborating, Orchard in connection with the Pettibone dope due up in Mrs. Orchard's yard, nevertheloss he has held to the iaoa that the cases could hardly be properly tried withont his presence at least in court at Caldwell, and wat beine the case I mimply had Mr. Cary write him as above stated, otharwise I would have told him that ho should ro ahoud and make arrangernents for his family to po to Parral as wo did not consider it would be absolntely necessary for him to be present durine the triale at Caldwell.

to the reports of No. 21 for Eoc. 30th and 31st and Jan. ist. There is no quontion in my mind hut, what mavin is puilty of this no-callod outrage upon himell and family. is to whothor ho firod the ahote from the inaide or outside of the honse, I think this could be eanily determined by an oxport an also oonld the calibre of the gun used on this oosation. If it is detormined thet the shote ware fired from the outside it might pewibly te that an sxfert could detemine about what distance the party was from the house at the time the shote wers fired.

部 improssion is thet Davis fired thome shots from the outside but did not po out on the road to do it. As we know that Jup Nichols is now and ham beon for a lons time working hand and flove with the dofense, he will do anythint, he can to show that this assuult was made from th' outside therofor I wo sha suest that thim mattor be tiken up with Thoriff thorpe and the prosecuting attorney, Mr. Van Mayn, with a viow of hapinf at least two or three experts such ng I have sipgesten. po to Davia' hoinse and make is thoroush examination, and if possibla oxpose this conspiracy on the part of Devis, and 1 shonld uiso say Nupent, aE ocnsider he is poesibly the leadine spirit in this mattor.

I have today instructed Mr. Hasson to have the ouerative inform us as to the kind of firo arme that Mavjes hus. The theriff or rir. Van Duyn should have somebody whom thoy know in that neiphborhuod to rope in with the Davis boys - I don \({ }^{\circ}\) know how olis they are. We mipht pet. some tanitible information from them. This is only the korinnin of their plots of this kind that will he carried out durine the trials of those men. Ifend a copy of this report to :r. Farson so he will be able to dive the oparstive rrouer instructions alyo to inctruct him if his oxpenses are paid to ro to Wullace durinc the irist of Adare, he will do ec.

Sheriff Biley of Shoshone County must be instrueted that during the trial of Adams her must haye tow axtra doptios, whom ho oun depend upon som in and ready for businoses if any thing oomes up gurine this trial. This as you are aware shomid be done in Caldwoll. in fact overy mood citisen of Caldwell should be deputiseil durint these trialm.

You can see from the notions of Darrow and Richardmon hors that the defondenta lawyera are now devoting all thoir time to getting up their defonse, and the stats must not overlook the fact that we are still in the dark as to what their defonee will be and therefore be prepared to meat any emergency that mipht arise.

The oper tive doge not state as to whether he examined the roud in front of liavis' house to see if there were horse tracks suoh as would have been made by the asebilunte of Davie proviciinf it wes trues howeves so far as that is concerned it is likely that iavis sot on his own hores and mado tracks so as to be able to show that what he statind was true. Pr. Hussen will takn this mettor up with the opurative. Inder no circumetances munt the operative at to waliace oxcrpi his expembes are paid by the defonse in advance, as the eygestion made by Nupent mipht only be a fonler, and if the operative would go to Melluce. without Fi: xponses hainy paid in advanoe then Nuecont would conclude he was a traitor and that enmebody elise was payine his expensea.

I think wo will be able tobut all of thair tostimony sn eery short time. Furthrmore from tho informetion expect to get from this operative we may be sole to locato overy itnese they propose to put spon the tand on the line of tontimony set sorth in the roports referred to, and it is fust possible wo an got some of those mon to
turn over to the state with the aid of this operative. We ogn determine that after I have telled with the operative and reported on the ame. I winh to draw the attontion of Mr. Hawley and Mr. Borsh to the fact that they must sec to it, if ponaible to get the now sheriff of Canyon County and Prosecuting httorney Tan Duyn and one or two experte to mate an eqamination of Davis house for the purpose of showing the chots were fired irom the inside. It is absolutely imposible for No. 21 to do this. You must understand that No. 21 is a mecret operative and he could not ank an expert to come with hin and examine this house. The mooner this is done the better and it is a mattor in which won do nothing furthor than to adive as to the course for the regularly conatituted authoritien to puraue.

Dear Sir:-
Replying to yours of the 6th inst. I note what you say relative to the time that court may comence in Canyon County also in Showhone se unty. That being the case there is no particular hurry for you to come to nenver, although in telkine with Mr. Fillins on yesterday he is somewhat anxious to confer with you. I note what you say about No. \(21^{\prime} \mathrm{s}\) reports which I have read with a great deal of interest. I also note you suggest that No. 21 get an expert to examine Davis house and confirm his suspicion as to the fact that the bullets were fired from within.
Now this is simply something that under no circumstances would I have No. 21 interfere with. What excuse could he make to take a stranke man to Davis' house for this purpose? Purthermore, even if he could pive sufficient reasons to satisfy lavis for takints this ran there he would have to frive himself away to the expert.

Now as I have sugyested in ryy report on this matter, and also in my special report of yesterday the only way this cun be done properly is to have the new sheritf and pr. Van inym tike this matter up, get an expert or two experts, and on a pretext of investipratine this so-culled outrafe examine the house and the bullet marks, and talk to !!av is as thonach they belieyed just what he suid until after they have made the oxamination, in fact even ofter they have made the examination if they discover tine bullets were fired from the inside, fr. Borah and yourself must direct as to how this information should be given to the puikjic. This is no small matter; it is something they are liable to do again and we rust nip it in the bud, but it is somethine that the Agency, and more especially No. 21, cannot show its hand in. I hope this thine has been attended to before this.

I also hope that Mr. Borah will see his way clear to take the matter up with the new sheriff of Ada County relative to loyer. You will have noted in special reports of No. 28 referred to in my report of yosterday the line of defense whici the defendants lawyers are goinf to adopt. I think with good handlint we cen knock this out very easily but it all depends on whether they will still place confidence in the operative or not. You will understand under no circumetances will I allow the operative to make any affidavit, but I will pive him instructions as to how he can avoid making an affidavit and still keep the sonfidence of larrow and Hange.

I am also in receipt of your letter of the 8 th, and would say there can be no doubt about the fact that there is some friction between Richardson and Darrow as to who would be the leading counsel for the defense. My impression now is that this matter has been patched up and that Jarrow has taken the lead. My reasons for this are based on the fact that Darrow went to Cripple Creek to confer with the witnesses as is reported in the special reports of No. 28. When I interview No. 28 I will send in a special report in which I will embody my views as to what we should do. Any how by the time you arrive her here we will have considerable material for fir. Pillius, yourself and I to go over. As matters look to me some of the Mine Owners and other officials in the Cripple Creek District you will have to see yourself, or we will have to appoint a time and place where we will all meat. Even if No. 28 is not called as a witness for the defense, we know that others will be called and will possibly know what they will testify to, and we must be in a position to rebut it and not look for our witnesses when we might not be able to get them to Caldwell in time.

The object of getting the operative to testify and the efforts made by Hangs within the past ten months to secure the oo-operation of the operative is very apparent and is made more apparent by that part of Hangs statement an to what the operative gould ever to in the patter of the operative's conference with 1 . Prank in and the further fact that the Victor company of militia wi under ar man all night prior to the blowing up of the Independence depot so they could take action at one. The operative at the time this occurred was in a position to testify to thin Pact providing it va, true. However, there was no extra precaution taken by the Victor militia company on the evening before the blowing up of the Independence Depot than had always been taken. In fact this company had little or ne munition in their armory and when called into the field the morning after the blowing up of the independence Depot they had to scour through the hardware stores in Victor for car: fridges but wore only able to get ton rounds of oartrideres to each man of the company that was placed on the firing line. bind those placed in reserve did not have a cartridge except some of them mi s ht have had a few. It wan on the afternoon of the day after the blowing up of the Independence Depot that this company bent a detail of their men to Cripple Creak and took what few cartridges remained at the Cripple Creek armory over to Victor. This the operative can prove as also can a Mr. Vandermark who had charge of the detail that went to Cripple Trek for the cartridges, elmo Ernest Freeman, fob Hall and for that motor every member of the Victor Company. Vandermark liver in Cripple Creek. Freeman is now living in tioldiala and Boblall at Victor.

Not knowing exactly what these witnesses will testify to except from the lies laid down by lings to what tho operative should testify to. I think one of the main things they will try to prove will bo that the Victor militia company was expecting some thine to come off on the nipht of the Independence axiosion and this wo must be able to rebut at once. As matter of fact you will understand 1 have serious doubts as to whether it will be legally possible for the defence to introduce testimony of this kind. Mr. Hawley and Mr. Borak will be in a position to enlighten us on this subject.

Ny object in writing such a lon report on this matter is to have the lawyers for the tote take the matter up as to whether thine line of testimony is lifihle to be admitted and what shown ko done to counteract it hut any thine I have said in this report on the subject in simply supertion for our lawyers to take up.

Mr. Davis arrived from Boise tria morning at 8:00 and went with me to the boarding house. He aaid that Jugent was in his office when he nad arrired in Boise and had nownaper raportee there te take lown the story of the biocting at his plade two weeks age. After the reporter had aecured Davis' story and left the office, Nugent told Davis they would begin work as zoon as he recoived money from Denver for our expenses. He said the work would be aecurin affidavits for a change of manue at they wanted the trial taken from anyon county if possible; that one of the Attorney* would try te see Bryan and see if he could be influenoed to take this sase to Washington cpunty; that they wanted it tried in washingtion county, if pensible, and wantul it tried befere Bryan, as he was qualified and was not dimqualified by being orohards attornoy. He said that if the trial was taken to another county we would howe work and plenty of it, an the aame taptica would be resorted to as had boen empleyod here. NOTVITHSTANDING THE OFFICIAL protestations of disinterested fairness, the newspapers of the country almost daily contain dispatches and letters from Idaho showing that the hired detectives and thuge are still active in their nefarious work of securing "cooked" evidence igainst the imprisoned Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone. And now it is shown that a specious plan of systematic intimidation has been adopted by these detectives, with the undoubted approbation of the Idaho officials, as the following dispatch printed in the Focky Mountain News last Tuesday will show:
"Boise, Idaho, Jan. 14.--Inquiry of Prosecuting Attorney Van Duyne of Canon county District Court to-night as to when the trial of Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone, indicted for complicity in the murder of formen Governor Steunenberg, would take place, resulted in the statement that no remititur had been received from the Supreme Court of the United States in the habeas corpus case, and until the lower court was judicially informed of the result of the appeal no action could be taken. A regular term of court has been fixed for Tuesday, March 5th, by which time it is thought all. impediments to the trial will have been removed and the case either tried or a change of venue granted.
"As an indieation of the activity of the prosecution, Jesse Davis, for the past nine years a prominent rancher of Canon county, told a atory of an attempted outrage of which he and his family were the victims in Boise to-night. Davis came to the city to consult with the authorities, and geting no satisfaction made public the details of an attempt to either drive him from the country or murder him and members of his fanily. The event occurred on the night of December 29 th, the anniversary of the assassination of Governor Steunenberg. His story follows:
" I live with my family on a forty acre ranch adjoining Caldwell, but a few hundred yards from the home of the late Governor Steunenberg. I have a consumptive son who is taking the open air treatment and slemps with his brother in a tent at the rear of my house. On saturday night, nearly 12 o'elock, just a year from the murder, I was awakened by the violent barking of my dogs. Mrs. Davis got up and went to the window and looked out. The house is very close to the road. and she saw two men on horseback with black handkerchiefs tied over their faces, riding slowly by in the direction of town. Suddenly they raised their arms and fired two shots from revolvers in the direction oi the house. One of the bullets entered the bedroom window, passing over me and out through the back of the house; the other passed over the bed of the tent in which my boys were sleeping. The horsumen went off on a run, and my boys came screaming into the house. We waited perhaps half an bour, when we heard other horsemen coming, and as they got opposite our house ten or twelve more shots were fired, two of the bullets entering the tent, and the others in varions portions of the house, but no material damage was done. I got my shotgun and stood guard the balance of the night, but there was no further disturbance.
"The next morning I went to Caldwell and, though it was Sunday, I laid the matter before the retiting sheriff, his successor and the county attorney. The result of the conference was a promise on their part to discover the guilty parties and prosecute them, I agreeing to way nothing for fear this would interfere with the officers. However, 1 have done my best to dimeover whether or not anything was being done, without success, until I concluded to make the matter publie in order that people might know what was going on and thus secure the support of my friends mo far as they may be able to itelp me."
"Mr. Davis was asked to what he attributed this act of hostility and whom he sugpected of perpetrating the outrage. He said:
"I war, very active during the recent campaign against the re-elec-- tion of Judge Smith and Governor Gooding. Friends of mine have told me a number of times that I was making trouble for myself in dipping into this matter and going against the sentiment of the people, but I have kept right on and intend to do in the future as I have done in the past. A week or two before election an advertisiment appeared in the Caldwell papers for 'reliable men' to act as detectives. Several answered the advertisement and there have been from ten to fifteen Pinkerton and Thiel detectives at work in the county ever since Steve Adams was released from the penitentiary in Scptember. I am sure that it is because of facts in my possession, which I am not ready to make public now (though it is all in writing if I get killed) that the effort is being saade to drive me out of the country."

Co., was willine to soll th.ckots throufh to Portiand as the ticket agent said the \(0, A_{0}\) \& Mg line into Portland mes opaned at 8 A.M. \({ }^{-1}\) proceeded to Portland, but on ramining Camoade looks on the Colvmbla River tound whil the blookede west of Cancade had been opened on Satumey nipht there was e freight wreck which oloced the min line for trevol. There were two pessenper trains on the track at Gasonde Locke and the reilroad oompeny furnimhod us with nont and ell the panmengers bosnded the boat, and wo errived in Portland about \(10: 30 \mathrm{P}\). M There nut heve boen it leant 350 or 100 passengerm abourd this boit. The boet an old freight boat at that, hovever, we fot throumh.

On thing if certain omit telephone as the telephone wires are not only out of butene but the company does not know when they \(w 11\) be in working order. It may be possible Mr. Harley get through in som why or if not was able to conmuicaso with the proper authorities at Vilace, but leet ho had been oast at some point on the Northern Pedicle or Great Northern where ho oud neither wire or telephone I concluded the nefentw to do to telegraph Mr. Mascon and Mr. Sutheriland as I have dons.

I have Just learned that the Northern Padifo will bo open tomorrow and we will leave here mit 8:30 AM tomorrow for wallace. Rospeotrully subedit teed.

Today in wallace court convened at 10 o'clock. Darrow, Riohardson and wourms were present, as also wore Messrs. Knipht, Cyde and Proseouting Attorncy Hanson. The defondant's lawyers waived the right of Adams' appearing in court, and the Judge oontimed the case until the soptember term. As proper information had been dram up charging Adams witn the mupder of Boule, so that the state could elect next september whether they should try him on the cherge of the murder of Boule or the murder of fyler, he whs to be arrested duringthe afternoon. His sounsel were notifled of that fact and ciaimed they would waive a proilftminary hearing as they were leaving Wallaoe on the 12:10 train. Dampow was going to seattio and Rich rdson to Caldwell. Knowing that the defendant's counsel are trioky and as thoy have mourms who represents dams in Wallace, it mipht be that Wourms mifht insist on a preliminary, knowine that Farden Whitney, ur. Thiele and ryself were absent. Therefore I told Mr. Knight we nould lay over ali day tomorrow In spokane so if they want beok on their apreement we could leave for Wallace sunday. We will know about whether they stand by their apreement by noon time tomorrow, and if we are not otherwise notified, Mr. Whitney and myself will lorve Sunday morning for Roise.

At 12:40 P.M. Wardon Whitney, Mr. Thiele, Opt. No. 11, Mr. Shollent berger and myedr left Wallace for Spokane arriving at the latter place at 5:80 P.M. Richardson, Darrow and Miller were on the same train with us, but they ment around by Fokon. Ividentiy Milier whose home is in Spokane is annompanyinf, Richardson to Boise, although Richardson in a conversation with some man on the train was overheard to say that he was going up to spokane to spend sunday. If that is the oase I aannot undergtand why they would have gone around by the way of rekoa. Riohardson, however, stated the reason he wha going around by tekoa was on acoount of the frot that he had considerable baggage and he oould not pet it cheoked through unless he bought a ticket around by tekos. This of itself coes not seem plausible as he could hnve ohecked it throuph from Wallace over the Northern Pacific.

In cominf, fown from wallace on the train in taiking, about the Adams ofse. Darrow informed Thiele that he had never told the s-- of a b-m, meaning Adams, that he vould ac uit him. He said the defonse adopted the course they did in order to place Adame where he could to no harm; they had accomplished that and he didn't give a d-a- what happened. From this it is very ovidont that so far as Richarison and Darrow are oonoerned, they will never attempt to defend Alams again. As \(I\) have stated in my roporte, all they wanted was to get adams out of the way and didn't eare by wat means he was rotten rid of.

Ex-Sheriff H. \(\mathbb{L}\). Brown of Raker City also left Wallace today. 0ld man biliard and Joe Adamg left for Baker city on yesterday, and

Krs. Meeman, nee Mary Ann Mahoney, left for the oast over the Morthern Paoiflo this moming so Mre. Adame is all eione. Thile travoling from Wallaoe to Cockr d'Alone city, Mr. Thiele had a conversetion with Mr. Brown in whioh the lattor told him hioherdson had refused to pay him the fuil amount of his bill but had referred him to hillard to collect this amount as he had sottiod with Liliard. While going from boeur it Alone City to spetcane Mr. Miele told me Mr. Brown was on the train and I told him to bring Mr. Brown up to me and introduce me to him. This was done and I had a ilttle taik with Mr. Brown congratulating him on the truthful statement he made on the witness stand and begged of him to exouse me for not seoking an introduction to him befcre as he oould easily see I had good roseons not to taik with him until this matter was over. However, as he would have to lay over all night \(I\) asked him to take dinnore with me this evoning. Mr. Brown aocompanied us to the hotel in spokane and warden witney, \(M_{r}\). Brown and myself went to Devenport's where we had a Fory nioe dinner.

After dinner Mr. Brown acoompanied me to my room were we spent at least two hours. I firet took the matter up with Mr. Brown by stating to him that in all my experience in detective business I never regrettod anything more than I regretted to have to take the witnoss stand and assist in proseouting steve adams, notwithstanding the faot that stere adams was notorious oriminal as he had detailed his orimes to me, but oven at that I did not consider stove a criminal at heart: ho ras onsily led and a fow designing mon had led him to as those things for a considerstion as he testified on the witness stand and as he had related to me in his confessions, and if steve adams had been surrounded with good infiuences it is just possible he never would have sommitted orime. Brown olalmed from what he had seen of stove Adams he had formed the sime opinion of him that i had done. Today I reaeiva a telophone mesaage from Mr. K. C. Steriling. who asid he had been direeted by Mr. A. H. Carleton to call upon me. I mede an mpointient with Mr. Steriling and we had a conforence for over two hour ${ }^{2}$.

Boing tomewhat ampicious of Mr. Sterling on sccount of the roporta of No. 23, I aliowed him to do the taiking and did not, in any why, let hin know as to what we knew already concerning the information ho wat firing ue.

He stated that he had been in the employ of Mr. Carleton to get neat to what the dofonse was driving at in Gripple Greok. He had telked -ith Frank Hange, dubeequently with Varrow and MeCarnack and the one papticular point that he was to testify to was the fact that he know Orahard was in the employ of the Mine Owners Association, alwo the Florence and Oripple Creak $R_{0} R_{0}$, and was undor thoir pay. That he knew hir to connect with $G \mathrm{~m}^{\prime} 1 \mathrm{l}$ Reardon (now dead) and that he knew Reardon was acting und or the instructions of the military offleials and wo was workine for the Mine Owers Aseociation during the Gripple Creek trouble.

He had expressed his willimpness to do whatever they wished him to do, he claiming that he had been $11 i$ treated by the life ownore ascoalation and roprosonted that Orchard had come several times to hise room, which was not a fact.

He went on to say he knew fickinney, the man who wac arrested for attemyting to wrock Horence and Crlpple Creek R. Rotrain, subse quently confersed, subsequentiv denied his confossion, was tried and acquitted. He sain that John Jonos, the conductor whom Orchard first informed that the train was to be wrecked, brought Orchard to Sterining and Bpecial Agent Scott where Orchard made his statemont. Today I called upon Mr. Wh. A. Ulmer, the clerk who was formerly employed by the Tritoh Hardware Co., who sold Georee A. Pettibone two auto atic Colts revolvers, one of which was given to Adans, and which he left in the jutrol box at the time of his arrest in Denver, and which we subsequently recovered. Lir. Unner also sold Pettinone other firearms. I took up with him his going to Idaho as a witness for the State in the coning trials. Ulner is now in charge of the sporting goods department of The May Co. rit, I6th \& Champa Sts., having left the Tritch Hardware Co. some time ago. Ulmer refused poaitively to go to Idaho. He gave as a reason that he was afraid of lersucal violence in the future. That he did rot care to antagorize the elenents compong the Western Federation of winers. That he corsidered them a revenfeful srowd, and ff anvore testified against then, those testifying would sooner or later have trouble. I assured hin that there would he no personal violence, and no after effiots, hut he still maintained that he would not go to Idaho. I am certain thet I mam a lisht flash from the end of my cigas and instantly I heard a deafeninc explosion and I mes mashed to the cround. "y irppression was ut the time that some one had fiven me trick ciegur. I sew no limt and no flash from any other place than the ond of my cigar and there is absolutely no question whatever in my mina but that the cauee of the explosion wes the gas which the end of my ciear oume in contact with. Immodiately yoon beinr mashed to the ground, \(f\) cummenced to suffooste and the only thine I emelt mas gas. I eai no borth or any contrivans renembline a bomb and I melt no poider. I faced the door at the time I tarted to open it and with the exception of the frame. eah, hinges and look the door was of heavy plete alase. I have been ongaged in the buainem of mining for many yeers and hovine during my oxperience in thie buciness, become familiar with qynemite und oxplotives and I maticfica ani cortain in my own aind that I would hove coteotsd any fuwe renulting from a dymanto eplosion and mould not have miataisin eny auch fusetpr kat. that is, 1 would hove know the emoll of powter from the 11 of gue.

I Interviewed Manager J. A. Thomas of the I. I. Dupont de Nemours Powder Company, Chronicle Building, who informed me
that in 1904 he was connected with the osilfornia Powder Works, which had an office at \#330 Market street, netry the Palace Hotel. He did not remember any person resembling the piotures of Orohard being in the place and purchasing ten pounds of Geletina powder durinf the latter part of Aurust or the first part of September, 1904. He stated that unless there was something to cause suspicion the California Powder Worke would have taken an order for ten pounds of Geletina powier and would have delivered it without question to any place designated by the person giting the order. Ur. Thomas did not know of any warehouse at Third ard Townsend Stzeets, and said that the California Powder Works had no powder stored withini the oity ifmits at that time, but thet the Southern Pacific 00. might have had some powder for them and that an order might have been given to a purchaser on the Southern Pacific Co. fcr thop powder. I was informed that the books of the callf rnia powder embany covering 1904 had been dest oyed in the fire and that \(j_{r}\) f. Nesnith had ch rge of the ades department. Nesmith has not been with the california Powder company for two ynars and is now ex.d to be with J. W. Kimin, Real fatate of ice, luth and muret strent. At the latter place \(I\) was trid that Nesmith was no donerer omployed there, but that he lived on Gough fire t, near Edry. I went to this neighborhord, hut could not looete Nesmith.

I then went to the offlees of H. H. Elocd and Attorney De Leveaga, but did not find them in their offices. I was told that blood was out af town and would not return until saturday.

I interviewed trs. F. V. Bradley, whe stated that she did not reoall any conversation had over the telephone with cne Herb. George: that at the tine her husband vas injured, End for some we ks afterward, therf were a great many inquiyies nade over the phone as te the condition of her husband, whioh inquities were mostly answered by the naid, sedie Bell.

I was unable to find irs. John o'brien (xie Fionence Miller) at \#234 Iowa street. There is a John otfrien enm ployed at that number, but I was told thet he was out on a wagon axd that his residence was unknown.

LT a man purohased ten pounde the same rule would apily, anse that there were a great many seles made by him, and that it 4 possible that the maiec of tell pounde was made by him and that the order had been sent to the factory with a requent fint a eniphing receipt for ten pounds be sent to the office in Sun Francisco. You will pornape also recall that I took the active reunagement of the smuperier Union propertion at the time our manager, Arthine Colling. mas thot, in November 1902. Consequantly I have been deeply inter rested in atterptine to run down hia murderer. our offorts wero almont. entirely unsixecossful until a little over a yoar afjo, whan the arrest of Harry Orchard for the killing of ex-Covernor stounenbe fy and the submequent confemsion mado by him enabled ue to piece tognther the various clues we alroady had and fix the puilt beyond raagonatio doubt.

Amone other etatoments made by orahard wan one reiatiry to the explosion which ocourred at the house you formarly occupiod ir ban franciaco. I know that you have already been informad of thi and that you have oxproseed definite disbelief in Orahard's story, but I want to may to you in ill sincerity that I believe his story to be trive. per have. so Tar as has been posisible, inventimated every statement made by Orcherd, and have yet to find him wrones or untrithful in es aifule particular or instanns. Acting upon information piven by him rywolf. largely be culues I dorbted his story, wuf up at Iudge Codderd \({ }^{\circ}\) a koine in Denver a bomb similar in constriction to that whoo killed ox-novernor Steunanbere, kna of the same composition as the one wich Orohard tator he placed at your door. FVor in the case of the oxplosion at your hoine we have been able to corroborate a coneiderable part, of Orchard's statement, in spite of the handicap placed upon us by your disbeliof and by the affidavits made by you in the mattor of thement against the fas Company for damas arimine from the oxplosion. The se the defense, in the Moyer-Haywood-Pottibore trials, will at,temyt to use to discredit Orahard and the prosecution, and I um free to contease with prosyects of unpleamantly ombarrassing resulive, be cause of your standing Find selation to the affar.

I hoped to see you, when in californifi about two neeke we but I was so unfortunate as not to do so. I ant told that you have stated that if the W. F. of M. had resilly wished to geto you they have had no end of opportunit,jes wi thout walting so long as to the date of the explosion at your hounc. This. no doubt, is true, but did they not wait over a yoar to kill collins. anci eqveral years to murder ex-Governor Steumanhere? Jet me sicezunt. tro that the opportimity to kill is not enoweh, there mast wijuo. be an opportunity - for suah mon are invariably oowarde - for the men perpotrating suah orimos to make tho ir get away

Upon his return to sid premises, number \(1: 526\) Washineton etreet, at the expiration of said lariod of ten daye. said Berry told affiant that ha misht stay thr e days or thren weeke: he could not how long. Upon one or two ocrasion after his said return to aid uremises, sald berry dined with af iants' family and others, and upon the 1 of of said occasions, which was prior to the time of said exiosion, Eaid Berry told affiant and her deurchter that he expected to leave for Idaho. Said Ber while staying at said iremises, number 1526 Washington street, kept late heurs, cominf, into his room early in the moning, and upon one oorasion not oocupyiny the bed at ail. He usually slept on remeined in his room untid eleven ociock in the forencon or one oolock in the afternoen While livinr at said premises.

In sweeping said room. affiant was obliged to remove said dress mit case from one position to another and the same was very heavy; in fact so heavy that she could not lift it, although she was and is possessed or considerable strength.

Hon. W. E. Borah Boise, tdeho.
My dear Seriator:-
I hope you will pardon me for not havino taken up the work that I agreed to attend to on leaving Boise. In the first place on my arrival home I was simply tired out and had to rest up for a few days before I could do any work. Then I wrote to our northwestern and Pacific offices to learn whether they had the proper man to take this matter up, and some of the offices have not yet replied. Boise being in the territory of the Pacific Difision and as our rule is strict as to territory, the Pacific Division had to be heard from and if they did not have the proper man to take this matter up then the jenver office would attend to it. I expect to hear from all of the offices in a few days. and see what they have.

However, I learned throusch an informant at Colorado Spriness that dillespie wás down there. I expect he is traveline on your truil as I understood you have recently been at Colorado Springs. One of our Assistant Superintendents is now at Colorado Springs and I have had Mr. Cary instruct him to call on our informant and get a line upon what Gillespie is doing and will let you know the result. On yesterday we learned through this informant that Gillespie was thinkines of comine to Denver. As the United States Grand Jury indicted some parties here for timber and land frauds, it may be he has managed to get something from the Covernmert in connecticn with these land cases. If not, he is simply being detailed by rour eremies to find out what yoll were do ine; in Colorado Sprinse, and I expect we will be able to get at what he is doint down there. If he comss to Denvir I will try to locate him and have an operative rope in wi th him, and if he remains in Solorado Springs I will do the same thing, but our informant thought he was goine to remain tiere only a diay or two.

I have not been able to seo General Wells althourh I have written hire, but fron my interviow with Mr. pillius it does not look as though the Colorado people are willing to undertake the prosecution of Adams, at loast not until we get throuph with Pettibone. I have' boen so busy since I came home that I have not had any tirne to sea ayy of the rine owners upon this subject.

So far 48 we crin learn the defense has not settled upon who the counsel will be in the Pattibone case. however Darrow met our friend lifr. McLennon of the Denver Republican, and in talkinf; with

Mr. McLennon he took the credit of everything to himself. He said it was him that suggested the appeal to the United States Supreme Court which prevented the trial coming up a year ago last June, that he had a fight with Richardson at that time, and there was no doubt in his mind but if Haywood had been tried a year ago last June he would have been convicted. He also said it was him that suggested the employment of Wilson; that he had a long fight with Richardson and vent to get them to agree to the employment of Wilson. Then turning to Mccennon he said, "You can see from the instructions of Judge Wood that the money paid to Wilson was the best investment that we made." However, Tom Patterson insists that Richardson must continue as leading counsel for the defense otherwise they can count upon both the News and Times being against the Western Federalion in future.

As I understand it Orchard seems to be somewhat incensed at some interview you gave in Salt Lake which was subsequently published in the Statesman. The trouble with Orchard is he has arrived at the stage that he does not realize that with the exception of steve Adams he is one of the greatest criminals on earth. However, we must use him and I think it would be very well if you find time to make a trip to the penitentiary and have a little talk with him and get him on the right path. I wrote him a few days ago but I must be very careful in writing letters to him because you cant tell what might happen.

I have not heard from the Governor since I left poise although I have written and asked him to drop down to the penitentdiary and visit Orchard.

In conclusion will say I will get a man on ting ground just as quickly as I can which will posisibiv be inside of a way k. loping Irs. Borak and yourself are well, I remain, Yours,

Acting under instructions from the Superintendent, I 1 eft for Colorado springs at 10 AM , arriving at \(12: 30 \mathrm{PM}\).

In Colorado Springs I met an informant who said thet a man by the name of Edward Gillespie of Boise, Idaho, arriveत in this cityr on e1ther the 8 th or 9 thi of August, and refused to regaster at the Spalding house; the name of Ed. Smith was put on the registar by tine clerk at the request of Gillespie. That agrip was checked at the Alamo and later called for by aillesple about the time he left: Colorado Springs. That In the roar at the Spalding house a slip. of paper was dropped with the names of Knox, Giddings, Howbert, Costello, a man \(\ddagger n\) Denver with a name like Faber, but of thila name they could not be certain. Also that a Victor man named Frankin was mentioned on the slip.

Gllesple ropresented himself as a newspaper man. He was arcund the Fiening Telegraph a great deal, and talked with De Tolivar, the city editor, more than anyone else. That Gillespie goti several papers from the Telecraph or Gazette printing offlce. That he went to Manitou and met a man who fram the description given mel by informant and a man named Patton, Fould be a good description of Jemes Kirwail. That this man and Gillespie talked for a fow minutes an then they separated. That gillespie had in \(h 1 s\) pos session a letter farm the Secretary of tha Intorior, throuph Judge Beaty of Itaho, appointinus him U.S.farshal, Becret service man, or aomething of the kind, with request to fill out the blnak before a notary and forward it to Wachmington.

I visited the spauldine house and met Mr. Himbeugh, the propriatar, who sai. G111espic was with them one week; that he refused to gign his name on the register, wn that the clerk sifned the name of Ed. Sme th for him; that he talk ed to but few people, and that (Elmbaugh) was afraid he would not pay him, and ask ed Gillespie for the mone whe wreupon Gillesple left the house. J aje not get a chanceto talk with: the clerk.

I met Hir. MoKee, a friend of mine who was acquainted with the Telegraph people, nn throurh him met Mr. Perry one of the owners or the papor.

Mr. Perry aatd he talked with Giliesple several times, and Gillospie 1 s a very ardent W. F. of M. man, anc talk ed about the rolorade situationas \(1 t\) existed iuring 1903-1904 a great deal; that Mr. De Tolivar tajken with Gillesple more than anyone elso. nhat ho did not know of any old riles of papers eotten by aillesple:

I find Mr. lerry very ready to talk as he was suspicious. or ol se rid not think very nell of Gill espie, for Gillospie was jery talka ilve: ahont union gefairs. Perry says Gillempie was 1 n town just ofore \$on. Borah arrived, hut mine no reference to h 1 m that he knolrs of. Opt. \#1.9 Reports:--
Boise, Ideho, Monday, August 26 th . 1907.
I arrived today at Nampa at 10:00 A.M. and after securing a room at a hotel I telephoned my arrival to serator F.E. Borah, but was requested by h1m to come on to Boise and aell at his residence at 11:00 P.M. I accordingly ief't Nampa and went to Boise, where I registered at the Hotel Idar-ha.

At 11:00 P.K. I went to the residence of Senetor Borah, who informed me that while no indictment had veen public.ly announced, he expected one to be returned against him by the Grand Jury. This indictment if returned would be the work ot certain political opponents of his, among whom he mentioned Jucge Eeatty of the United States District Court (at present traveling abroad); a Mr. Morrison, an attorney of Boise, whom Senator Borah once defeated for Governor: Ruel Rounds, United States Marehall, and N. M. Ruick, United Strtes District Attorney. Of these Ruick is the lading spirit, he having for a long time been very vindicative toward Senator Borah, alth cugh the senator had at one time befriended him and assisted him. Ruick was at one time charged with the embezriement of \(\$ 18,000\) of state funds. He has also avoided payment a number of tines of his civil liabilities by pleading the statute of limitations. He is looked ujon as a shrewd, calculating and secretive man who has little regarci for his business and moril obligations, is open to corruption, and will resort to trickery in order to win a point.

Senator Borah his reison to belleve that Ruick was paid \(\$ 15,000\) by the Wertern Federation of tiners to secure his (Senator Bnrah'ss) indictment in rotaifation for the part he took in the trial of Haywood.

Ls on exemple of Puick's methoris. Senator Boran cites the manner in which Ruick, with the connivance of the U. S. Marshal, secured the Grand Jury that has his fndictment, uncer consideration. Of the orifinal venire the Mirshol made a return theit he could not find seven men, although the whereabluis of those beven men could easily have been ascertained. these seven men were not found for the reason that they were not t? kind of men who could be dominated by Rulck and he therefore had the Marahal make the atatement that they could nit be founc. The Juage then issued a siecial venire, made \(u_{1}\) for the moat part of political enemics of Senator Borah.

I was informed by Senator Boran that the Barber Lum er Company of \(\%\) isconsin had through its former agent, Ex-covernor Stennemberg, or those acting under him, purchased certsin timber claims in Idaho and that it now turns out that the title to soine of these clains is not perfect; thet in soine instances the claims vere not acquired properly. Senator Borsh elicves thst frick on acoount of his great aniansity toward hirn wili grint inaunity to certain persons provided they will perfure themselvers by tertifying in such a way asi to implicate hjm. Senator borminforma me that as General counsel for the Barber Lumber onala: he wars
very careful to have every act done by him in relation to the claims acquired lerfectly honest and legitimate, and he has: nothing to fear froin an indictment provided, as above etfited, Ruick does not incuce people to perjure themselves. For this reason Senator Borah desires a careful investigation made ef those parties who are likely to be used by Ruick as witnesces. He also wished to ascertain the real feeling of U. S. Niratial Rounds and Deputy U.S. Mershal Bryon toward him; also that of Ed. Branran, a mining promoter, who can gener: liy be found about the capitol Hotel.
U. S. District Attorney Ruick I am informed \(\pm\) a very difficult man to appoach and it will be a hard matter to gal in his confidence. Gillespie has his confidence, at least to :a certain extent, and Ruick may be reached through Gilleaple. Rulck is a firm keliever in ohristian science, and ciadme that through it he has been reformed.

Gillesrie I am told is a talkative fellow ard will make friends with any one who will listen to him; he is at present in colorado, but is expectes back nere in a fev dayis. He can rencrally be found around the Hotel Idanha. He is gomewhat of a sncialistic agitator.

I was requested by Senetor Borah to dddress ry report; tc his law partner, Attorney C. C. Cavanah, marking ther "personal". I was also requested by senator \(B\) an to cinll at his residence Thursday, Aurust 29th, \(4 t\) 9:30 P. Wi. For another intervier.
